QUEBEC CONFERENCE

The Big London Dailies Consider It an Event of Supreme Importance.

Hope Expressed That a Settlement of the Questions at Issue May Result.

London, Aug. 23.—The afternoon papers dwell upon the momentous subjects before the Quebec convention, and the gratitude which the convention will derive from a lasting settlement of the questions at issue. The Pall Mall Gazette says: "The convention has an appreciable bearing upon international politics from the fact that the United States and Great Britain are giving the world so striking a demonstration of a desire for a complete understanding. It is a visible sign to all that the two nations may, by their superficial differences notwithstanding, without treaties and alliances, no matter how formal, cannot endure. The Westminster Gazette says: "The convention may easily prove to be the most important imperial event of the year. It offers the first opportunity of settling the better sentiments between this country and the United States. Too much, however, should not be expected of the Canadians, who have scarcely as yet become infected with the sentiment of the war. We may expect them to stand out for what they conceive to be their right, even though this may mean a return to the political arena. On the other hand, the United States senate, unless there has been a change in its spirit and tone, may refuse to ratify the concessions made by the American commissioners. We may be thankful if under these circumstances an American goodwill."

The Times, referring editorially to the approaching international conference at Quebec says: "It is possible that future historians will mark August 23 as a date of considerable importance in the chronicle of the nations between the Atlantic and the Pacific. It is hoped that the Quebec conference will clear away a number of difficulties, and in view of the pending negotiations, and the prospect of a settlement of the questions between England and the United States it is extremely important. The conference has an imposing list of participants, and it is to be done and the business is to be done and there must be very active tendency to conciliation among the commissioners. LESSONS OF THE WAR

Admiral Sampson Gives His Opinions Freely—Fire Proof Ships Are Needed. Torpedo Boats Not So Essential—Speed, Heavy Armor and Large Guns Necessary.

Boston, Aug. 23.—A Boston Journal reporter, interviewed Rear Admiral Sampson on the train for Washington. Admiral Sampson was reminded that Admiral Cochrane, the English naval authority, which was the worst of it, though no lessons in naval architecture for naval strategy. It is not clear why a torpedo boat should have a speed of more than 24 or 25 miles an hour, but it has been thought so important to have them speedily that they have been made too light, and in some instances they are little better than egg shells. The torpedo boat has its uses, but it ought to be built according to the highest ideas of the art. It is not, either, to draw too hasty a conclusion from the way in which the Gloucester was destroyed. The Gloucester was hastily transformed into a torpedo boat destroyer, it is true, but it is not small boats by any means. How about the big guns? FOSS STILL WANTED

Belle Adams' Trial Again Postponed Owing to Absence of Alleged Material Evidence.

The Witness Relied Upon by the Defence Was Sent to Dawson on the Yukoner.

Court Will Give the Accused Girl Every Possible Chance of Proving Her Innocence.

The long delayed trial of Belle Adams, charged with the murder on June 3rd of her paramour, Charles Kiseaid, came up this morning before Mr. Justice Walkem.

It will be remembered, that at the first hearing Mr. George E. Powell, counsel for the defence, asked for an adjournment in order to secure the presence of Fred Foss, who occupied a room in the Empire hotel on the night of the murder, heard the altercation below, and was supposed to be able to give very important evidence.

Immediately upon the entry of Mr. Justice Walkem and the calling of the case Mr. Powell arose and applied for a further postponement to allow of another attempt being made to secure the presence of Foss.

Deputy Attorney-General Smith objected to further delay. The case had already been postponed for two months and all the information which could be obtained as to the whereabouts of Foss, where he would be, had been ascertained.

His Lordship, after consulting a number of authorities, submitted by counsel, said that the case had been postponed since June 27, that four or five adjournments had already been taken, and although he believed the previous postponements had been rightly granted, the hearing could not be postponed an infinitum.

When the court convened this afternoon Mr. Powell read affidavits by Frank Beaven and John Carthew, in which they gave the substance of a conversation which they had with Foss the night following the murder.
