





BARBOUR STRONGLY CONDEMNS HYDRANTS NOW IN USE HERE

Director Murdoch Thinks They Are All Right — Both Gave Their Reasons at Water and Sewerage Board Meeting-Undewriters Favor Barbour — Barbour and Murdoch Will Confer and Make Joint Report as to a Suitable Type.

At the meeting of the Water and Sewerage Board held yesterday aftermoon a letter from Superintendent Murdoch was read, also Chief Kerr's report. After a lengthy discussion on the disadvantages and advantages of the hydrants in use at present, it was resolved that Messrs. Murdoch and Barbour should consult with one another and report at the first regular meeting of the Water Board upon the type of hydrant which would be most satisfactory for the new high pressure water service.

Those present were: Mayor Sears, Aldermen Pickett, McGoldrick, Willet, Bullock, Christie, Baxter, Lockhart and Lantalum; Pres. H. B. Robinson and Secretary P. Clinch of the Board of Fire Underwriters; H. G. Hunter, Director Murdoch, Chief Kerr, Engineer F. A. Barbour was also present and his remarks concerning the unsuitability of the present fire hydrants for the increased pressure due to the Loch Lomond extension, caused a discussion which lasted throughout the meeting.

Engineer G. A. Barbour was also present and his remarks concerning the unsuitability of the present fire plugs arose. He stated that while he was making tests several "dead heads" were continually encountered which had to be blown out. This disclosed defective hydrants. One was at the corner of Wall street and Paradise row and should certainly be at once removed. He went on to say that the Canadian Fairbanks hydrant was a suitable one and could be made in St. John hydrants to be defective.

Superintendent Murdoch explained that the hydrants were of the type used in New York. They closed against the pressure and had an advantage over the Lidlow-threeway hydrants in the fact that they did not close with a cut-off gate. He would not recommend upward-closing hydrants as they were liable to produce "water hammer" by closing too quickly.

Ald. Baxter next asked Engineer Barbour to point out to Mr. Murdoch the disadvantage of the present hydrant.

Ald. McGoldrick at this time offered the point.

Mayor Sears remarked in an explanatory way that though St. John had a water pressure second to none in the Maritime Provinces the hydrants were unsuited, for the increased pressure, and Mr. Barbour advocated the immediate placing of new hyrants in the business, section and the gradual replacing of the older ones.

Ald. Baxter supported Ald. McGold-dick's suggestion, but thought the underwriters should be consulted with regard to the matter.

Peter Clinch on behalf of the underwriters stated their desire was for new plugs in the business district and the gradual replacing of the old hydrants.



If the hackmen had a feeling, that they had not enough room at the depot they should appeal to the railway authorities but the policeman had rules to carry out. He adjudged all guilty and fined them two dollars each.
