

UNCOVERING EGYPT.

Years Old.

At the King's College, England, recently, under the auspices of the Egypt Exploration Fund, C. T. Currelly gave an account of the excavations at Deir-el-Bahari, and described the progress of the year's work in connection with the discovery of an eleventh dynasty temple in the visinity of Deir-el-Bahari. Mr. Currelly said the original temple had been arected and dedicated to the Goddess of Love, The shrine was built, it was calculated, about 2,700 B. C. and it differed entirely from the Greek thea of worksipping temples. It was ejected for man and for man's glorification, and it was put up during a reign of tyranny in Egypt. The Egyptian had always been a man who had been dominated by a governing influence. To-day if the English influence were withdrawn the Egyptian would soon revert to his original inactive condition.
