London, August 5.—Field Marshal Earl Kitchener has been appointed Secretary of State for War.

London, Aug. 5.—Premier Asquith, in the House of Commons this afternoon, after giving a summary of the war news already published, said that the Belgian government had invitated the co-operation of the French troops with the Belgian army, and had given orders to the Belgian provincial government not to regard the movements of the French troops as a violation of the frontier. Several thousand dead and wounded is the toll paid by the German army for its attack on Liege. The Belgians made a heroic defense repulsing the Germans after heavy and continuous fighting. The fortified position of Liege had to support on Wednesday the general shock of the German attack. The Belgian forts resisted the advance officially and did not suffer. One Belgian squadron attacked and drove back six German squadrons.

Eight hundred wounded Germans are being transferred to the city of Liege where they will be cared for.

Prior to the attack on Liege, General Von Emmich, commanding the German army of the Meuse issued a proclamation calling for an open road through Belgium for the advance of his forces and suggesting that prudence would show it to be the duty of the Belgian people to accede to this, in order to avoid the horrors of war.

The Germans committed repressions against the civil population of the town of Vise, eight miles northeast of Liege, burning the city and shooting many of the residents.

Brussels, August 5.—German troops have lost heavily in today's fighting with the Belgium forces.

When England is at war, Canada is at war. The Canadian people would not have it otherwise. It has already been decided that Canada will send a contingent of brave men to aid the Mother Country, in overthrowing the enemies of European peace. We have abiding faith in the sons of the Maple Leaf, and we feel confident that Ing faith in the sons of the Maple Leaf, and we feel confident that history will again be called upon to record, to the credit of the Canadians, deeds of heroism worthy of the men who, today, are prepared to shoulder their rifles to defend the honor of their Empire and thus to advance the cause of world wide progress and liberty. England may or may not require the aid of the Canadian soldiers, but she certainly will need Canadian wheat and food stuffs of all kinds. Of paramount importance then is it that Canadian ports should be kept open, so there may be no interruption in the flow of Canadian products from the farm or wheat field to the deserving mouths of our British soldiers and their European allies. soldiers and their European allies.

ick to realize the importance of this was Hon, J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. He saw at once the important role which in-evitably must be played by the port of St. John in this vast tragedy, and appreciated the extent of the calamity should the shipping facilities of this port be destroyed. As soon as it became apparent that Great Britain must take a hand in this European conflict, Mr. Hazen interviewed the Department of Militia and Defence, and impressed upon the authorities of that department the importance of sending long range guns to protect the city and port. Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes was prompt to see the force and wisdom of Mr. Hazen's suggestion, and he at once despatched four powerful guns with ample ammunition. These guns are now here, and, in the hands of trained men, should give very comforting assurance of pro-

If additional protection should be needed, the citizens of New Bruns wick and of all Canada may rely upon Hon. Mr. Hazen being thoroughly alive to the situation. The expenditure of the necessary money will be approved of, not only by Mr. Hazen's colleagues but by every member of parliament, irrespective of party, who realizes that Britain's most pressing need will very shortly be food stuffs.





Britain may determine the issue, or may force the German fleet to fight, in which case the issues will be determined by battle.

"If Germany succeeds in downing both France and Russia, she gains a respite by land, which may enable her to build up her sea force equal, or superior to that of Great Britain.

"In that case the world will be confronted by the naval power of a state, not, like Great Britain, sated with territor, but one eager and ambitious for expansion, eager also for influence. This consideration may well affect American sympathies.

"In my judgment, a right appreciation of the situation should determine Great Britain to declare war at once. Otherwise, her entete engagements, whatever the letter, will be in spirit violated, and she will earn the entire distrust of all probable future allies.

"Italy likewise owes it to herself to declare war against her recent allies. In cooperation with France, and with Greece, reinforced by the two American battleships just purchased, she can doubtless maintain the balance of maritime power in the Mediterranean, prevent the Turks giving their expected support to Germany, keep quiet the Bulgarians, if these are so ill-advised as to purpose a diversion in favor of Austria, and, in brief, consolidate the opposition of the Balkan states to Austria-Hungary, whose ambitions are notoriously inconsistent with those of Italy."

Admiral Mahan elaborated on his statements regarding one probable operation of the British and German fleets.
