Winnipeg Strikers Get More Sympathy From Victoria, B. C.

Victoria, B. C., June 23.—In re-sponse to the mandate issued by the Metal Trades Council, five-thousand members of unions affili-ated with that organization "down-ed tooth" here at ten o'clock this morning in sympathy with the Winnipes strikers. Promptly at the strike of the hour set the strike went into effect. The larg-est employment organization af-fected in Victoria is the Founda-tion Company of British Columbia, Limited, which concern carries on pay roll 4,200 men of all crafts. The shipyards and machine shops are chiefly affected by the walkout. Two hundred men walked off the Cholberg shipbuilding contract, but, thit the exception of about fifty nen employed on sub-contracts, practically all the employes of the harbor Marine Company, composed principally of returned soldiers, re-mained at work.

After that the city should demand the larger sum of the Board of Trade in favor of accepting the offer, it is probable the matter will be referred to a ple-biscite of the ratepayers. Bonds outstanding against the har-bor are said to amount to \$1,300,000 or thereabouts.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday M. E. Agar brought up the matter of appointing a commit-tee to co-operate with the Dominion Employment Bureau and the G. W. V. A. in the work of finding positions for returned applicare

Luployment Bureau and the G. W. V. A. in the work of finding positions for returned soldiers. He said the council of the board had recently been waited upon by Major McLean and a delegation from the G. W. V. A., which had pointed out that soldiers were not receiving the consideration they had expected. Mem-bers of the board had been promin-ent in recruiting campaigns and had arged the nen to go to the war, thoug i some of the men being young and from humble walks of life had less to fight for than men who owned busin asses and had a place in society. They could not coardier that they had done their duty by paying these soldiers a putance and feeding these while they were at war. They had an obligation to the returned men, and should en-deavor to assist them to resettle in civil life. This work might be diffi-cult, and it might be true some fr-turned men expected better positions than they were capable of fulfilling, and more money than they could earn, but they must face this problem, and learn patience from the men who fought for years without complaining. Some people liked to get up on a sublic platform and tell the returned men that nothing was too good for them, which was no doubt very well, but when it became a question of do-ing something practical for the men the speakers were usually occupied at something practical for the men

ing something practical for the men the speakers were usually occupied at something else. Mr. Agar said they should appoint three merchants and three manufac-turers to act with a committee from the Labor Council and the Employ-ment Bureau and help in finding posi-tions for the returned men. A. H. Wetmore said contractors usually employed the greatest num-ber of men and should be represented on the committee. Geo. L. Warwick said he had heen in touch with the G. W. V. A and in his view the business men of St. John had been showing considerable indif-ference towards the problem of re-settling the returned men. He thought an advisory committee, if it had the proper co-operation of the business men of the city, could do much good. As by that time the meeting had dwindled down to eight members of the board it was decided to leave ut to the president to see what arrange-ments could be made to get a commit-tee to serve. The Dominion Employ-ment Act which was passed some time ago provided for the appoint-ment of representatives of business organizations and labor unions to act with the local efficials of the employment.
