

MAL-NUTRITION. These two diseases are both characterized by under-nourishment, but the under-nourishment is due to causes almost the converse of one mal-nutrition, broadly speaking, is due to not getting enough food into the system for the body's wants; the mal-nutrition of tuberculosis, roadly speaking also, is due to using up the body faster than the food can be taken in. The body in tub-erculosis is "wasted" by the poisons of the tubercle germ—not as some people imagine in the mere effort to keep the germs fed, but also and chiefly in the effort to make up for the damage done by the products of the tubercle germ. How, then, can we distinguish the plain mal-nutrition of school children from the tuberculosis of school children in the

FINDING THE TUBERCLE BACILLUS. This would be conclusive, and in adults is the final sign of tuberculosis, not to be gainsaid. The germ which causes tuberculosis is readily found in the sputum (spit) of adult cases, after the lung begins to break down so that the germs escape to the outside. But in school children, the lungs seldom reach this stage, so that the germs, although present and active in the lungs (as shown at autopsy), do not get out a rule, during life. The school child with tuberculosis is, therefore, seldom dangerous to the other children-or to any associate, child or adult for that matter; while, of course, the adult, from whom the germs are escaping, often is-al-

advanced stages.

LOSS OF WEIGHT. . Loss of weight is one of the star signs of early tuberculosis in anyone—in children, a stationary weight, or failure to gain at the usual rate proper to their age is equivaltent to actual loss of weight in an adult of course. THAT TIRED FEELING? Children with tuberculosis are asily fatigued. POVERTY AND RICHES. How about the worldy wealth of the patient? Can we say off hand that the poor child is more likely to be suffering from mal-nutrition -because he does not get enough to eat; that the rich child is more likely to be suffering from tuberculosis because, though he gets enough to eat, he has tuberculosis to offset the good food? No, this won't do at all. It may sound plausible enough to abeginner; but if we check up the facts we find plenty of plain mal-nutrition amongst the rich children and plenty of tuberculosis amongst the poor ones. In some places, the children of the well-to-do actually have more of both diseases than the children of the poor! Why?
On that is a long story in itself.
Let us get on with the present one.
HOW ABOUT COUGH?

Of course, cough. Now we have something! But wait. Lots of plain mal-nourished children have coughs and lots of tuberculous children have none. Nevertheless a cough that lasts six weeks without any really satisfactory explanation, needs looking into very seriously indeed. The lungs proper may not be affected, but perhaps the glands are—and these may produce a cough, which sometimes is rather like the cough (not the whoop) of whooping cough. (Did you notice that I wrote tuberculous children, not tubercular children? Why? not tubercular children? Why? Because, amongst the curious eccentricities of the English language as we use it today, tuberculous means "due to tuberculosis" or having tuberculosis," while tubercular means merely "covered with little nodules or lumps," A roughcast house is tubercular, but it is not tuberculous!) So the existence of cough doesn't settle the question between tuberculosis and mal-nutrition, nor the kind of cough, nor the length of it? No, that is true; but it is a pointer that no one should overlook all the that no one should overlook all the

EXAMINATION OF THE CHEST? Well, we are getting warmer all the time in our search, but here again we don't find anything quite conclusive in every case. Of course the chest should be examined—the heart and lungs, particularly the lungs—carefully examined by a skilful physician, patiently and slowly and not through the over-cost ether! coat either! The little patient's chest must be bared to give the chest must be bared to give the best results—try listening through a stethscope while rubbing the receiver on the thinnest sort of cloth and then you will see how much the friction of clothing even of the lightest on the receiver will mess up the sounds from the lungs. The physician will tap the chest with his fingers also—percuss is the technical word—and this too should be done with the skin bared. He

technical word—and this too should be done with the skin bared. He will be especially careful in examining above the collar-bones, for tuberculosis often develops in that part of the lung very early,

WHAT WILL WE FIND?

Sometimes a good deal—and then there will be little doubt that tuberculosis is present, But often, in children especially, tuberculosis may be present, yet the lungs show little sign of it, parhaps because it is not in the lungs themselves,

A Memorial

To the Honorable the Premier of the Province of Ontario

We, the undersigned residents of the Province of Ontario, believers in temperance and moderation in all things, hereby desire to express our very grave concern at the prospect of any legislative enactment being placed upon the Statute Book of this Province which will not be binding upon the conscience of a great mass of the people and must be enforced by excessive penalties with armed inspectors and an army of spies and informers.

Many serious-minded and well-informed citizens, including ministers of the gospel and men holding the highest positions in the community, while fully appreciating the material benefits which might be gained from the total prohibition of the sale of liquor, agree with the view that there is a proper limit to interference by the State with individual conduct. They believe that a temperance country can be more surely obtained by evolution, than by legislation and that total prohibition is inconsistent with true temperance and opposed to Christian morality, which is based not upon the manufacture of new crimes for punishment but on the stronger force of love.

Democracy sprang from a desire for individual liberty. Stabilized democracy depends upon the security of individual liberties properly used. There can be no security for the observance of a law dictating what men should eat or drink unless it has the support of a substantial majority not merely of those voting on a Referendum, but of all the people in the Province whose support is necessary. Especially is this true when the prohibitory forces are highly organized at the polls. If one law is not enforced, all law is brought into contempt and democracy itself may be imperilled.

It is a fundamental of democratic government that things innocent in themselves should be regulated against abuse, not prohibited. It is well recognized in law that a municipality cannot extend a mere power to regulate into a power to prohibit. If past generations allowed the open bar to become a menace, that is no reason why we should shirk the difficult dut

We believe that the cause of Christian temperance and of stabilized democracy can best be served,—

(1) By Government control of the sale of spirituous liquors, and, if necessary, a wisely devised licensing of individuals to purchase spirituous liquors.

(2) By the treatment of those who have not the strength to take care of themselves under such

(2) By the treatment of those who have not the strength to take care of themselves under such conditions, as patients, not as criminals.
(3) By permission to purchase beer and wines under a system to be devised by the Government, thus minimizing the evil of illicit stills and the illegal sale of spirituous liquors and drugs. We are not advocating a return to the "open bar."
(4) By the formation of a voluntary organization similar to the Blue Ribbon Army in Great Britain, whereby all available energies and funds may be devoted to the promotion of true temperance by advection and example.

We ask that you provide a means for an expression of opinion on the question of Government control.

We further ask that the Ontario Temperance Act be amended as above, so that the conscientious scruples, rights and liberties of the people of this Province may be fully protected against an organized minority, and accused persons shall not be deprived, as they are now, of the sacred right of every British subject to be considered innocent until he is found to be guilty.



Sir Nevil Macready Says Those On the Force Fully Justify Their Selection.

LONDON, April 1.—An interesting sidelight on the kind of women who are doing police duty in London is contained in a blue book, just issued, giving the minutes of evidence obtained by the ommittee on the employment of police-yomen. The evidence includes that of Sir Nevil Macready, formerly police

commissioner of London. Sir Nevil said that the 110 women doing police duty fully justified their selection, and he believed that their number should be increased considerably. He said that if the power o arrest is given to them, women could be used to good advantage in looking after the women of the streets, and he advised putting this work entirely in their hands.

The kind of women best fitted for

police work, he said, were those who had the human element very largely developed, and who were not faddists or temperamental. In certain cases mar-ried women have been found more suitable than the unmarried.

In answer to a question as to the social standing of the policewomen, Si Nevil said they included a wide range there being a number of wives of constables, who were about in the domes

ic servant class, and also a number of ous conductresses.
"We want all classes," he added. want to have the kind of woman I car put into an evening dress with some diamonds, and be able to send her to place to mix with people, and also want women on the other end of the scale. Then some nurses are excellent It is very good to have women with

nursing experience." Sir Nevil said that all the women em loyed so far were thoroughly satisfactory, it having been necessary to get rid of only six or ten in a year. He advocated making the age of enrollment 25 or 30 years, and said that a certain pension should be created for them probably after they had reached 45.


