"Smoking Out" Is New Plan in Third Degree \$

[Buffalo Courier.]

A subtle form of the third degree was practiced by the police yesterday morning in the examination of Marion W. Hutchinson. It was as cruel and heartless as many of those other unnameable things which are countenanced behind prison walls.

When Miss Hutchinson, after being searched and held in a prison cell, was brought into Supt. Bull's office, her lungs were assailed with tobacco smoke. A dozen cigars in the mouths of a dozen detectives, who surrounded her, were puffed continuously until the room was so full of the foul fumes that even a hardened smoker would be compelled to

Reason for this smoke is evident. It was designed to make Miss Hutchinson sick, to cause her brain to reel, to make her

police headquarters. CHARGES SHAMEFUL TREATMENT.

The police say that Miss Hutchinson was treated with the utmost respect at police headquarters and that she was never at any time under arrest. They admit, that as a former employe of Mr. Burdick in his envelope factory in North Division street, she questioned about some points on which she was supposed to be able to give some vital information. Miss Hutchinson tells a different story. She says that she was subjected to the greatest ignominy. She said to a reporter for

It is even said that Secretary Wyndham has convinced himself, as he is convincing the Cabinet, that it may go further than a generous land bill, and maugurate a new Anglo-Irish era of good-will by such a measure of self-government as would be called home rule if it were proposed by the Liberals; in other words, some such provincial councils proposal as formed Mr. Chamberlain's alternative to Gladstonian home rule. Some Radicals even protest that home rule, when it does come, will probably come on the initiative of the party which controls the House of Lords, namely, the Tories. It would be a happy circumstance if the outcome could be an agreement of both great parties, as was the present English franchise. That is a possibility of near politics.






