The bill was first passed by the House of Representatives; now it has received the unanimous indorsement of the Senate, and will un-doubtedly be signed by the President and

When this change is brought about, the Louisiana Lottery Company and kindred undertakings will be confronted with so many difficulties that it will be next to impossible for them to carry on their fleecing operations if public sentiment is at all alive to the enforcement of the law. Any newspaper which uses the mails for reaching its subscribers will not care to adver-tise a lottery, for such an infraction of the law would result in its being deprived of that privilege. In addition to this, heavy penalties can be collected from papers which in any way aid the lotterymen. In-deed, the only agency through which a lottery manager can communicate with the public is through the express companies, for no information, tickets or money can be sent through the mails. It is just possible, too, that the express companies will yet be deprived of the right to act as agents of the deprived of the right to act as agents of the lotteries, but when the matter was before Congress the right to prohibit them was contested, and it was thought well not to vitiate an otherwise good measure by running any risk of having it de-clared unconstitutional. The same doubt was also raised as to the right of the United States Government to seize foreign news-papers, containing lottery advertisements, when sent into that country, and that point was not pressed. But the measure will no doubt be pretty effective in

The hope of getting something for nothing—of being the lucky one to snatch a prize of a few thousands for an investment of a couple of dollars—is a fascinating one. 
