Natives of India Restive Under British Rule.

CALCUTTA, Nov. 9 .- It is the opinion of oreign residents of India that the native foreign residents of India that the native population is growing more than ordinarily restive under British rule. It can be said that close students of the Indian character profess to believe that it would take only a small spark to kindle a fire of revolution that would be far-reaching in its consequences. There recently occurred in Paspawur, the capital of the district of

its consequences. There recently occurred in Paspawur, the capital of the district of the same name in the Punjaub, a series of alleged incendiary fires that resulted in a great loss of military stores. Paspawur is on the Aighan frontier and is an important strategic point, being aside from its military importance the northwest terminus of the Indian railway system. Rumors are current that attempts were made at Rawaul Pinde, another important point, to set fire to the Government stores.

The Civil and Military Gazette of Lahore, commenting upon these facts and reports, declares it is unwilling to believe that they are ominous, but at the same time it questions whether there may not be sparks from the volcano upon the crust of which British rule in India is based. The paper instances the riots in India growing out of the cow question, the increase of crimes of violence throughout the country, the spreading broadcast of incendiary pamphless and other signs of unrest, and says the situation needs careful watching.

AGAINST THE "OLD POLICY."

WHISKARD'S The Rev. Dr. Douglas States His

He is Opposed to the Fiscal as Well as the Religious Policy of the Thompson Regime.

MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—Rev. Dr. Douglas, who is recognized as the Quebec champion of equal rights, is spoken of in Toronto as one of the orators who will address a monster convention to be held there in December in support of D'Alton McCarthy as a federal political leader. In Montreal, however, it is doubted by many that the reverend doctor will give any countenance

reverend doctor will give any countenance to Mr. McCarthy's policy on the trade question, or on any federal issue, as we that of equal rights. Dr. Douglas has removed all doubt on the matter by declaring in an interview last evening that, though now and always non-partian in politics, and though eschewing on the platform every issue save that of equal rights, he was, nevertheless, free to say that he opposed the fiscal as well as the religious policy, so called, of the Thompson Government. He had been through Ontario during the past summer, from Cornwall to Port Huron, and throughout the Province he found a universal conviction that the cost of governments was too high, with wheat selling at the phenomenally low price of 55 cents a bushel; there was a general feeling of unrest, which was intensited rather than allayed by what the doctor termed "the relentlessness of Sir John Thompson in his avowed determination to adhere to the old policy." Moreover, he elieved the Government had alienated many of its strongest supporters by creating new offices in connection with the Cabinet at a time when dissatisfaction was widespread among a people of 4.000,000 or 5,000,000, governed by 60 or 70 Cabinet Ministers. Especially among the farmers, this discontent, he said, prevailed. The shrinkage of farm values was phenomenal. So, too, was the depopulation of the villages and towns. Notwithstanding the depression in the United States, the exodus continued unabated. He instanced the towns of Port Hope, Napanee and Belleville, which he knew as well as Montreal. In these towns houses in excellent condition were selling he said, for one-third of their cost. There was, therefore, an imperative demand for reduction in the cost of government, and reform of the tariff, It was outrageous that a country of Canada's population, which would conserve the interests of workingmen, and yet relieve the country. We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

THE LONDON AND PORT STAN-LEY FUTURE.

Wednesday night's mass meeting of citizens to consider the London and Port Stanley lease emphasized two facts more especially (1) That there are undoubtedly two sides o the question as to the best course to purene to maintain the interests of the city;

(2) The great advantage of publicity. Many facts were brought out on both sides that were before secret to the public, but there are good reasons for believing that they were not unknown to the railways interested in the deal, and therefore Mayor Essery's somewhat infantile plea that secrecy is a necessity to the proper conduct of public business is easily apprehended. A voluminous correspondence was presented to the meeting. It was altogether conducted by the president and secretary of the London and Port Stanley Board and the railway companies interested, with the exception of the letter by General Manager Seargeant in reply to a letter from Mr. F. A. Fitzgerald, of the Imperial Oil Company, written by the last-Fitzgerald's letter, to which this communication was a reply, however, was not submitted to the meeting. At the close the show of hands was declared by the chairman to be in favor of the motion submitted by Mr. T. H. Purdom, Q.C., and seconded by Dr. Gardiner, which held that the line should be leased to the G. T. R.

In opposition to the view that the award ing of the lease to the Grand Trunk would best promote the welfare of the city was put forth the argument that the G. T. R. Company was a business corporation which, like all business concerns, is not influ enced by sentiment. Under these circumstances it was argued that the Grand Trunk was looking at the railway lease as well as at the car shops question from its own standpoint. It was also complained that the company had not put in an offer that the London and Port Stanley Board could fairly consider till after the tenders were opened, and that in any case the letter containing the basis of agreement was to a private individual from the general manager, and distinctly stated that it would be subject to review by the nome board in England. This led to th further argument that, in the event of the Walker offer being rejected, and of the Grand Trunk Board making stipulation incidental to their tender that could not b accepted as for the benefit of London, th city would have no alternative.

The car shops question was brough prominently into the discussion of bo offers. But it is well known that the rail way lease must be first disposed of. The Port Stanley Railway. Wednesday's railway meeting in the City

Wednesday's railway meeting in the City Hall was an important one, and its effects will doubtless be far-reaching either for good or evil to the city. While I entertain strong views as to which of the two propositions voted upon is the better one, I do not write to express them. I desire, however, to give expression to two ideas.

1. The people cannot be too freely consulted by their representatives in matters that affect their welfare as business men and as citizens. There was no information given at last night's meeting that might not have been safely given to the public weeks ago. That information has not yet reached the great body of the electors, yet the vote taken by those who were present is intended to influence the votes of aldermen at the City Ceuncil meeting to-morrow night. My point is that if the people are consulted at all—and they ought to be freely and frequently—there should be no mistake made about obtaining the true sentiment of the rate-payers.

2. London ought to operate as well as own the London and Pett Stanley Railway.

2. London ought to operate as well as own the London and Port Stanley Railway. There are no safeguards that can be made with any railway corporation leasing the road that will thoroughly protect the interests of the city. The objects aimed at when the road was built can never be fully secured until the action I suggest is taken. And why should it not be taken? Every improvement on the road must be paid for nprovement on the road must be paid fo improvement on the road must be paid for directly or indirectly by the citizens, and if other parties make the improvements they will exact ample remuneration for doing so. The tendency of the age is towards municipal and government ownerdoing so. The tendency of the age is towards municipal and government ownership of railways, gas and electric plants, waterworks, etc. Germany to-day owns and operates nearly all her railways at a great saving to her people. France owns and operates her telephone system and England her telegraph system with the best results. The English Government has a margin of profit from telegraphing after charging less than half the rates prevailing in America. Throughout the United States as well as in Canada the municipalities are taking possession of the street railways, gas and electric plants, etc. London has made a good beginning and owns and operates her waterworks. The ownership of her railroad would be productive of still better results if it were also operated by the city, just as the overship of the productive of some city, just as the overship of the


