RELATIVES FEAR LIFE WRECK AMERICAN TRANSPORT FELL VICTIM TO U-BOAT'S SHOT

Believe Joseph W. Wright Died With Antilles' Crew. WAS NATIVE OF THIS CITY Left Here for States Years Ago To Work in Ship-yards.

Relatives in this city fear that Joseph W. Wright, son of Joseph Wright of 181 Horton street, was lost when the American transport Antilles, was sunk on October 17 by a German submarine in the war zone with a toll of seventy lives.

The family today telegraphed to Secretary Joseph Daniels of the U. S. navy department, asking for word regarding his fate. Previous to that time a telegram had been received from George Wright, of St. Louis, brother of Joseph, stating that he had received word that Joseph was on the transport, and had been lost.

Mr. Wright was engaged in ship construction in the United States, and one of his tasks was the building of the largest dredge ever assembled. This was in the Ohio River.

The Antilles was returning to the United States from foreign service while under convoy of American patrol vessels. The torpedo which struck the ship was not seen nor was the submarine which fired it.

Mr. Wright's relatives expect to hear from the navy department during the day regarding his fate, but have very little hope at present of his safety.

SLIGHT ILLNESS HAS CAUSED SIR WILFRID TO POSTPONE MEETING Date of Conference With the Western Ontario Liberals Uncertain.

[Special to 'The Advertiser'] Ottawa, Oct. 22.—Pending recovery from an indisposition which has kept him to his home for the past few days, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's plans have been held up. He was to have gone to Montreal today, but has postponed his visit.

DUTCH STEAMER APRIE AT HOBOKEN DOCKS New York, Oct. 22.—The Dutch steamship Aprie, of 6,500 tons gross, caught fire today in the harbor off Hoboken, N. J., today. A large part of the fire-fighting apparatus of Hoboken was summoned to the waterfront.

The flames in a hold in which cannot be extinguished, but it was quickly brought under control, but it is feared that the fire had eaten its way through a bulkhead into the boiler room, and the firemen faced the prospect of a long fight, hampered by gas fumes. The ship lies a considerable distance offshore.

HEAVY BOMBING FOR RUIN WORKS IN MAIN TOWNS

British Airmen Wreck Air-dromes, Foundries, Station Near Metz. RAIDING DAY AND NIGHT Naval Aviators Make Excursions Far Into Enemy's Territory.

London, Oct. 21.—Six German airships were brought down yesterday by British naval airmen, says a statement from the admiralty today.

London, Oct. 22.—British airmen carried out numerous attacks on German air-dromes in Belgium and on important objectives near Saarbrücken, northeast of Metz, Saturday and Sunday. The official statement on aviation activities says that nine German machines were brought down, and that four others were driven down out of control.

HOW SUBMARINES ARE COMBATED BY THE BRITISH

Bombed by the Airships and Rammed by the Patrols. BUBBLES TELL THE TALE Short Shift For the German Pirates When Caught in the Act.

London, Oct. 21.—The following incident, surrounding the anti-U-boat warfare have been taken from recent admiralty records: On the coast of the Atlantic, a U-boat's conning tower five miles west of the coast was sighted by another boat at the steamer.

The airship sighted the position of the submarine to all the warships in the vicinity and then swooped down to attack. The submarine was hit by a bomb, but it was too late. Two bombs were dropped simultaneously in front of the U-boat's conning tower and the vessel was engulfed in flames.

The same airship, conveying west-bound merchantmen, sighted the U-boat of a torpedo aimed at one of the merchantmen. The submarine, relying on the rough sea for concealment, had dived, but the airship's searchlight spotted the vessel.

A British officer was torpedoed at sea, and a patrol ship circled round the boat, endeavoring to sight it at night. After a quarter of an hour an object was sighted through the thick mist on the starboard. The patrol promptly altered its course and rammed the U-boat, which exploded and vanished. Two men were seen struggling in the water, one of whom was made prisoner.

The officer commanding a motor launch sighted a drifting mine while a heavy sea was running. Attempts to sink the mine by gunfire failed. Darkness was approaching, after which the mine would have been lost to sight and then was visible as a wave broke in front of the launch.

BLONDIN'S BATTALION IS SAFE IN ENGLAND Montreal, Oct. 22.—The 25th French Canadian Battalion, whose safe arrival at an English port is announced from Ottawa, is commanded by Lieut.-Col. the Hon. P. E. Blondin, postmaster-general of Canada, by whom the battalion was raised.

An area of high pressure, accompanied by unseasonably cool weather, has come into the western provinces from the north. The weather is fair in Ontario and Quebec, and heavy rain is falling in the Maritime Provinces.

JAP LINER IS SUNK EN ROUTE TO AFRICA BY MINE OF GERMANS

S. S. Hitachi Maru Reported Lost With All Hands Aboard. Tokyo, Oct. 22.—The Japanese steamer Hitachi Maru, due at Delagoa Bay, Portuguese East Africa, October 1, is missing, and is believed to have struck a mine, with the loss of all aboard.

The Hitachi Maru, a vessel of 6,555 gross tons, sailed from Yokohama for Liverpool on August 23. She touched at Colombo, Ceylon, on September 24, but since then nothing has ever been heard from her.

ASYLUM IS ORDERED TO DELIVER INMATE TO MONTREAL COURT

Attorney Wants to Know On What Authority Client is Detained. Montreal, Oct. 22.—The Sisters of Charity in charge of the Asylum of St. Jean de Dieu at Longue Pointe have been ordered by Mr. Justice Bruneau in the practice division of the superior court here to bring Charles Auger to the court, when it must be shown under what authority he is being detained in the asylum.

NEWFOUNDLAND SPUDS Island's Crop This Year Will Exceed 2,500,000 Bushels.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—Newfoundland's potato crop will exceed 2,500,000 bushels, according to a report received by the department of trade and commerce from W. B. Nicholson, Canadian trade commissioner in St. John's, Nfld., Mr. Nicholson, writes, is equal to a supply per head per year of as much again as is ordinarily consumed.

DETACHMENT OF AMERICAN MARINES SEROT, T. J. NAVIN, who went overseas recently with the Canadian Mounted Rifles of Hamilton, Sergt. HAIG AND PELOUZZI TOGETHER RAM AHEAD IN FLANDERS AND CARRY ALL OBJECTIVES

French On Third of Mile Front Advance On British Left—Haig Attacks Successfully On Both Sides of Railway.

London, Oct. 22.—Local attacks were made by the British this morning on both sides of the Ypres-Staden railway, the war office reports. The statement follows: "Early this morning we made local attacks on both sides of the Ypres-Staden Railway. The progress of these operations is reported as satisfactory. French troops co-operated on our left."

Paris, Oct. 22.—French troops adjoining the British in Belgium attacked this morning on a front of one kilometer. The war office announces that all objectives were attained.

The announcement follows: "The British army on a front of one kilometer. Our troops attained all their objectives making appreciable progress north of Veideke, a certain number of prisoners remaining in our hands."

London, Oct. 22.—The British destroyer Mary Rose fought single-handed against the German cruisers in the convoy action in the North Sea, according to a story ascribed to a British officer rescued off Bergen, and transmitted by the Christiania correspondent of the Times.

London, Oct. 22.—The new newspaper regarding the attack on the convoyed merchantman in the North Sea, according to one that no foresight or vigilance could avert, and although regrettable in every way, cannot exercise any decisive effect.

This does not necessarily mean that he is either wounded or killed. We will notify you of further particulars."

119 GIRLS FOUND HAVEN LAST YEAR IN SALVATION ARMY RESCUE HOME. 24 OF THEM BEING FROM THIS CITY

Work for Those Who Have Misplaced Trust Explained to St. Andrew's Congregation by Officer, Who Commends the Y. W. C. A. Institutions as Great Safeguards of Young Women.

"This is practically Christianity, the kind that counts in the sight of God," was the comment made by Rev. D. C. MacGregor, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, at the close of an address on "The Rescue Work of the Salvation Army," given by Adjutant Martin at the morning service on Sunday. In the course of his remarks, the speaker stated that during the past year, 119 girls were rescued from various homes and placed in the Salvation Army's rescue home on Riverside avenue. He stated that these girls were rescued from various causes, including prostitution, drug addiction, and general immorality. The rescue home provides a safe haven for these girls, offering them education, training, and a chance to start a new life.

Neglect To Knit Empire Together One Cause.

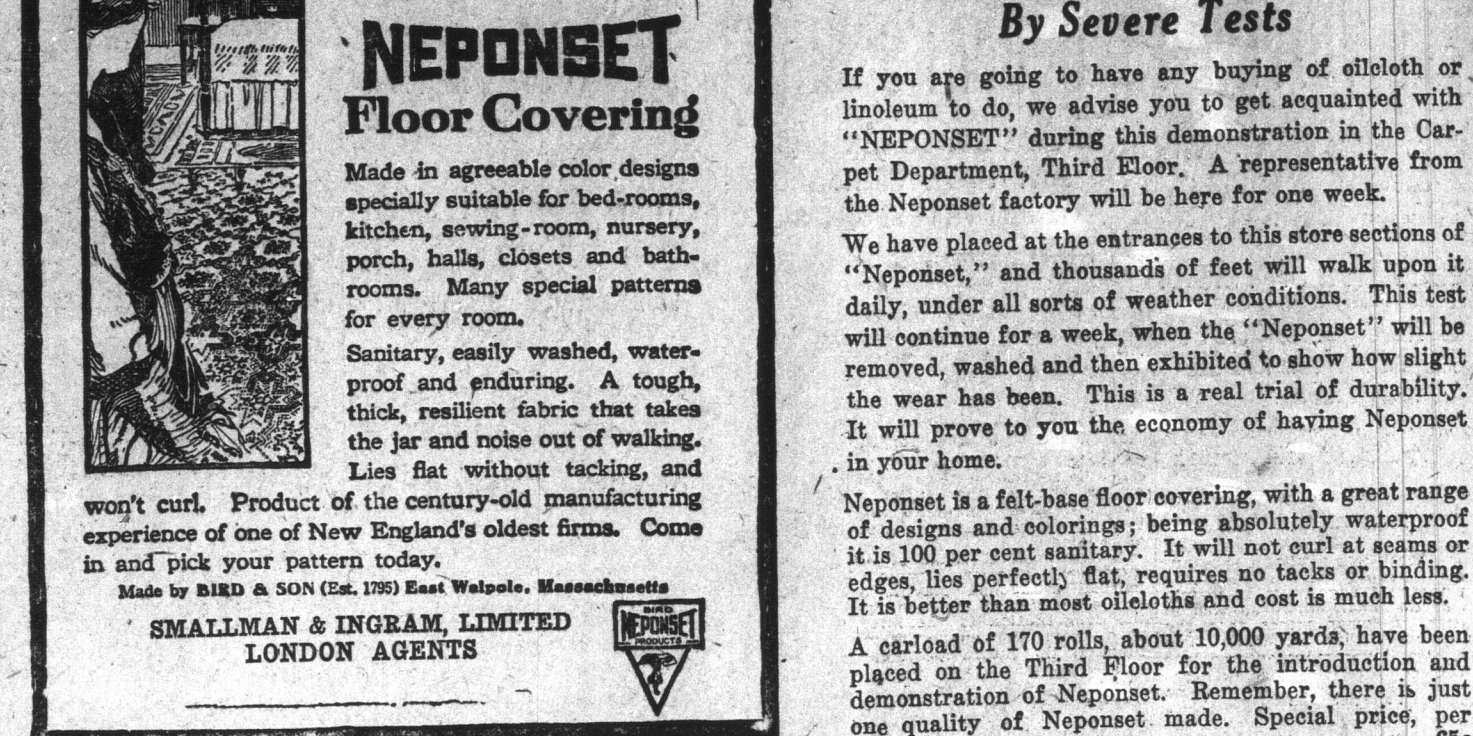
DEMAND VOICE IN AFFAIRS

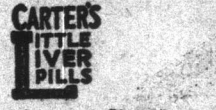
DECIDE ON PARTY FIGHT

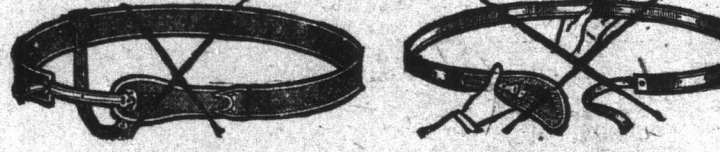

Seven of Party Just Returned Are From District.

Although a party of eight wounded and invalided soldiers which arrived here Saturday night was the smallest to reach the city since organized welcomes were in order, they were received in a manner that was fully as cordial as that in which the largest party ever was welcomed home. The pipe band of No. 1 A.M.C. Training Depot was on duty, as well as a guard of honour. Plenty of automobiles were provided by the members of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, who were there to greet the men for the citizens.

Only one Londoner was in the group. He returned from the front with the 10th Battalion and was invalided from England. Sgt. E. G. Miller, an original 10th Battalion man, and Sgt. W. F. Cole, an original 10th Battalion man, were with the party. Before entering the city they were met by a party of London boys and were welcomed at the start, and saw everything there was to see until he was wounded at Ypres in 1916. Another member of the party was Sgt. R. McNally of Hillsburgh. He trained here with the 7th C.W.B. in 1914, and went to France with his unit, was twice wounded, in the two biggest battles in which the Canadians participated—the Somme and Vimy Ridge. Sgt. J. B. BORDEN GOVERNMENT LAMENTABLE SIGHT, DECLARES E. T. ESSERY

Local Conservative Flays the Inaction of Partisans.

Premier Dickered For Power Instead, Says ex-Mayor In Sunday Address.

Little mercy was shown to Premier Borden, his Government and his policies, by E. T. Essery, K. C., ex-mayor of London, and a prominent London Conservative, in his address on "Canada and the War" delivered before the Men's Club of the Latter Day Saints Church Sunday afternoon. "We have party politics here in Canada," said Mr. Essery, "and a man votes one way because his grandfather voted that way, while another votes the other way because his grandfather voted the other way. Around election time they will kick each other's dogs, and even take a slap at the children, because they happen to have different political leanings. But after the election is over, the men that get in don't think any more of those who voted for them than the aristocrats did of the serfs of Russia before the revolution there.

"When you send men to Parliament," he added, "remember that they are your servants, and that the common people are the masters. For this reason, a man should do his duty or resign. In the old country they do that. If they are dissatisfied with the action of the government, they quit and they go to their constituents and tell them to elect a new government. The United States does that. They have quit, and the electors send them back again stronger than ever.

"Here they go into party caucus, and when they come out they are as flat as a piece of sheet-iron. They will do nothing but what they are commanded to do in the caucus, and as long as we tolerate that kind of thing, this country will not prosper as it should. We should back any party that will do its best to win.

"For five months past the Government of this country has been a lamentable sight, Premier Borden, instead of saying, 'The men in the trenches must be backed up, and I demand that the militia act be enforced, and that every soldier and man must be put into the conflict,' five months ago, instead of dickered for power—if he had done so the trenches would have been five months nearer the help they need today. It is a dishonor to every man that has been dickered for five months. Now that they have conceded, if they put their shoulders to the wheel it will be much better than the zig-zagging of the past," he declared.

Go After Criminals. "There is no thing for which we must give the United States credit," he added. "They go after their criminals there. You never see a Canadian senator called here for neglect of duty, or member of Parliament or legislator. When a man goes wrong there, they treat him the same as anyone else. When they found members of the German diplomatic service working against the United States, they even arrested them, they indicted them.

"There is no reason on earth," declared Mr. Essery, after a pause, "for a strong tribute to the women of the Empire. Why our loyal women should be placed on a level with the enemies of this country. We owe more to the women of the Empire than to anybody else. I always remember my mother as one of the finest women that ever created any man's destiny. RASPUTIN - DEVIL OR SAINT

"THE one extraordinary thing about Rasputin is that he was not murdered sooner. He was so entirely despised and so universally detested all over Russia, that it was really a miracle that he could remain alive so long a time after it had been found impossible to remove him from the scene by other than violent means."

German Intrigue, Ever Present Throughout the World, Has Linked Rasputin's Name With the Fairest and Highest of Russia's Court Circles—But These Rumors Are False, the Princess Radziwill Insists.

The "Black Monk" Appeared on the Scene at a Psychological Moment When the Russian People Had Drifted Away from the Church and Were Ready for Any Strong Appeal to the Mystical Side of Their Character.

As a rule the general public knows very little concerning these sects, but I shall quote here a passage out of a book on Russia by Sir Donald Mackenzie Wallace, which is considered to this day as a standard work in regard to its subject. "Among the 'Khlysty,'" he writes, "there are men and women who take upon themselves the calling of teachers and prophets, and in this character they lead a strict, ascetic life, refrain from the most ordinary and innocent pleasures, exhaust themselves by long fasting and wild ecstatic religious exercises and abhor marriage. Under the excitement caused by their supposed holiness and inspiration, they call themselves not only teachers and prophets, but also Saviours, Redeemers, Christs, Mothers of God. Generally speaking, they call themselves simply gods and pray to each other as to real gods and living Christs and Madonnas. When several of these teachers come together at a meeting they dispute with each other in a vain, boasting way as to which of them possesses most grace and power. In this rivalry they sometimes give each other lusty blows on the ear, and he who bears the blows the most patiently, turning the other cheek to the smiter, acquires the reputation of having the most holiness."

"Another sect belonging to the same category and which indeed claims close kindred with it is the Jumpers, among whom the erotic element is disagreeably prominent. Here is a description of their religious meetings, which are held during summer in a forest and during winter in some outhouse or barn. After due preparation prayers are read by the chief teacher, dressed in a white robe and standing in the midst of the congregation. At first he reads in an ordinary tone of voice and then passes gradually into a merry chant. When he remarks that the chanting has sufficiently acted on the hearers he begins to jump. The hearers, singing likewise, follow his example. Their ever-increasing excitement finds expression in the highest possible jumps. This they continue as long as they can—men and women alike yelling like enraged savages. When all are thoroughly exhausted the leader declares that he hears the angels singing, and then begins a scene which cannot be described."

I have quoted this passage in full because it may give to the reader who is not versed in the details of Russian existence and Russian psychology the key to the circumstances that helped Rasputin to absorb for such a considerable number of years the attention of the public in Russia, and which, in fact, made him possible as a great ruling, though not governing, force in the country. In some ways he had appealed to the two great features of the human character in general and of the Russian character in particular—mysticism and influence of the senses. It is not so surprising as it might seem at first sight that he contrived to ascend to a position which no one who knew him at first ever supposed he would or could attain.

At the same time I must, in giving a brief sketch of the career of this extraordinary individual, protest against the many calumnies which have associated him with names which I will not mention here out of respect and feelings of patriotism. It is sufficiently painful to have to say so, but German calumny, which spares no one, has used its poisoned arrows also where Rasputin came to be discussed. It has tried to travesty maternal love and anxiety into something quite different, and it has attempted to sully what it could not touch. There have been many sad episodes in his whole story of Rasputin, but some of the people who have been mentioned in connection with them were completely innocent of the things for which they have been reproached. Finally, the indignation which these vile and unfounded accusations roused in the hearts of the true friends and servants of the people led to the drama which removed forever from the surface of Russian society the sectarian who unfortunately had contrived to glide into its midst.

Rasputin a Master of Corruption.

The one extraordinary thing about Rasputin is that he was not murdered sooner. He was so entirely despised and so universally detested all over Russia that it was really a miracle that he could remain alive so long a time after it had been found impossible to remove him from the scene of the world by other than violent means. It was a recognized fact that he had had a hand in all kinds of dirty money matters and that no business of a financial character connected with military expenditure could be brought to a close without his being mixed in it. About this, however, I shall speak later on in trying to explain how the Rasputin legend spread and how it was exploited by all kinds of individuals of a shady character, who used his name for purposes of their own. The scandal connected with the shameless manner in which he became associated with innumerable transactions more or less disreputable was so enormous that unfortunately it extended to people and to names that should never have been mentioned together with him.

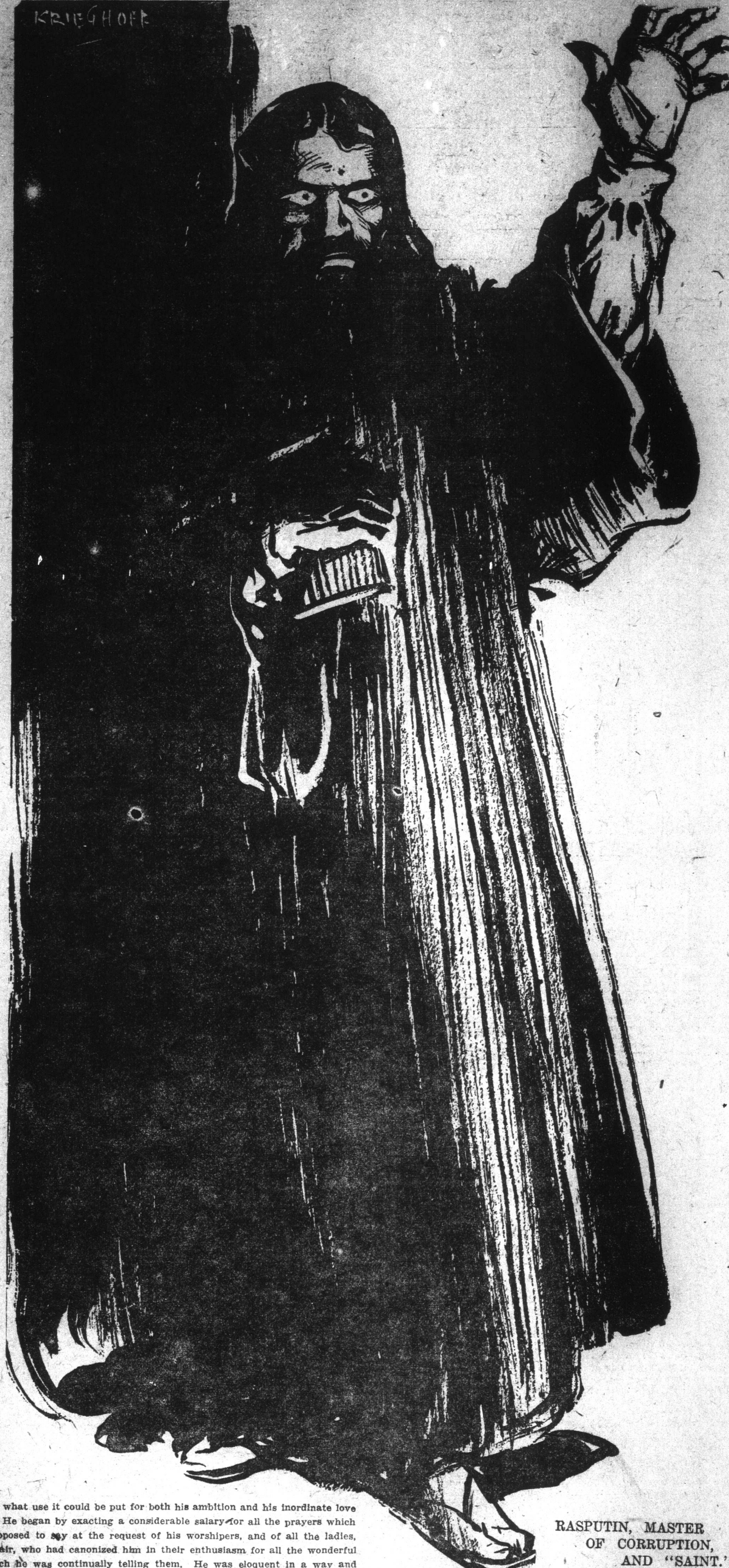
It must never be forgotten, and I cannot repeat this sufficiently, that Rasputin was a common peasant of the worst class of the Russian moujik, devoid of every kind of education, without any manner and in his outward appearance more disgusting than anything else. It would be impossible to explain the influence which he undoubtedly contrived to acquire upon some persons belonging to the highest social circles if one did not take into account this mysticism and superstition which lie at the bottom of the Slav nature and the tendency which the Russian character has to accept as a manifestation of the power of the divinity all things that touch upon the marvelous or the unexplainable. Rasputin in a certain sense appeared on the scene of Russian social life at the very moment when his teachings could become acceptable, at the time when Russian society had been shaken to its deepest depths by the revolution which had followed upon the Japanese war and when it was looking everywhere for a safe harbor in which to find a refuge.

At the beginning of his career and when he was introduced into the most select circles of the Russian capital, thanks to the caprices and the fancies of two or three fanatic orthodox ladies who had imagined that they had found in him a second Savonarola, and that his sermons and teachings could provoke a renewal of religious fervor, people laughed at him and at his feminine disciples, and made all kinds of jokes, good and bad, about him and them. But this sort of thing did not last a long time and Rasputin, who, though devoid of every kind of culture, had a good deal of the cunning, which is one of the distinctive features of the Russian peasant, was the first to guess all the possibilities which this sudden "engagement" of influential people for his person opened out before for him, and being very religiously inclined, with strong leanings toward mys-

ticism, he allowed herself to be persuaded more by the people who surrounded her than by Rasputin himself. She believed that the monk, of whose holiness she was absolutely persuaded, could by his prayers alone obtain the protection of the Almighty for her beloved child. An accidental occurrence contributed to strengthen her in this conviction. There were persons who were of the opinion that the presence of Rasputin at Tsarskoye Selo was not advantageous for many reasons. Among them was Mr. Stolypin, then minister of the interior, and he it was who made such strong representation that at last Rasputin himself deemed it advisable to return to his native village of Pokrovskoye, in Siberia. A few days after his departure the little grand duke fell seriously ill, and his mother became persuaded that this was a punishment for her having allowed the vagrant preacher to be sent away. Rasputin was recalled, and after this no one ever spoke again of his being removed anywhere. From that time all kind of adventures began to lay siege to him and to do their utmost to gain an introduction.

Rasputin and the "Fair Ladies."

Russia was still the land where a court favorite was all-powerful, and Rasputin was held as such, especially by those who had some personal interest in representing him as the successor to Menschikoff under Peter the Great, Biren under the Empress Anne and Orloff under Catherine II. He acquired a far greater influence outside Tsarskoye Selo than he ever enjoyed in the imperial residence itself, and he made the best of it, boasting of a position which in reality he did not possess. The innumerable state functionaries, who in Russia unfortunately always have the last word to say everywhere and in everything, and

RASPUTIN AND THE RUSSIAN CHARACTER.

IT would be impossible to explain the influence which Rasputin undoubtedly contrived to acquire upon some persons belonging to the highest social circles if one did not take into account this mysticism and superstition which lie at the bottom of the Slav nature and the tendency which the Russian character has to accept as a manifestation of the power of the divinity all things that touch upon the marvelous or the unexplainable.

whose rapacity is proverbial, hastened to put themselves at the service of Rasputin and to grant him everything which he asked, in the hope than in return he would make himself useful to them.

A kind of bargaining established itself between people desirous of making a career and Rasputin, eager to enrich himself no matter by what means. He began by playing the intermediary in different financial transactions against a substantial consideration, and at last he thought himself entitled to give his attention to matters of state. This was the saddest side of his remarkable career as a pseudo-Cagliostro. He had a good deal of natural intelligence, and while being the first to laugh at fair ladies who clustered around him, he understood at once that he could make use of them. This he did not fail to do. He adopted toward them the manners of a stern master, and treated them like his humble slaves. At last he ended by leading the existence of a man of pleasure, denying himself nothing, especially his fondness for liquor of every kind. At that time there was no prohibition in Russia, and, like all Russian peasants, Rasputin was very fond of vodka, to which he never missed adding a substantial quantity of champagne whenever he found the opportunity.

I shall abstain from touching upon the delicate point of the orgies to which it is related that Rasputin was in the habit of adding himself, the more so because I do not really believe these ever took place in those higher circles of society where it was said they regularly occurred. That strange things may have happened among the common people, who in far greater numbers than it has ever been known used to attend the religious meetings which he held, I shall not deny. It must always be remembered that Rasputin belonged to the religious sect of the Khlysty, of whose assemblies we have read the description, and it is quite likely, and even probable, that the assemblies of these sectarians at which he presided were not different from the others to which these heretics crowded. But I feel absolutely convinced that as regards the relations of the adventurer with the numerous ladies of society silly enough to believe in him and in his gifts of prophecy, these consisted only of superstitious reverence on one side and exploitation of human stupidity on the other.

I must once more insist on the point that the apparition of Rasputin in Russian society had nothing wonderful about it, and that the only strange things in that such a fuss was made. Before his time people belonging to the highest social circles had become afflicted with religious manias of one kind or another out of that natural longing for something to believe in and to worship, which lies hidden at the bottom of the character of every Russian who has the leisure, or the craving, to examine seriously the difficult and complicated problems of a future life and of the faith one ought to follow and to believe in.

In 1817 there was discovered in the very heart of St. Petersburg, holding its meetings in an imperial residence (the Michael Palace), a religious sect of most pronounced mystical tendencies, presided over by a lady belonging to the best circles of the capital—the widow of a colonel, Madame Tatarinoff. In her apartments used to gather officers, state functionaries, women and girls of good family and excellent education who, with slight variations, practiced all the religious rites of the Khlysty. One of the ministers of Alexander I., Prince Gallitzine, was suspected of having honored these assemblies with his presence. Thanks to a letter which accidentally fell into the hands of the police, the Government became aware of what was going on, and Madame Tatarinoff, the Russian Madame Guyon, exiled in a distant province of Siberia the ecstasies which she had practiced and which she had allowed others to practice under her roof. Some of her disciples were prosecuted, but the greater number escaped scot free. The authorities did not care to increase the scandal which this affair had aroused in the capital.

Uplifting the Cab Drivers.

Much later, in 1878, after the Russo-Turkish war, which, like the Japanese affair, had been followed by a strong revolutionary movement in the country that culminated in the assassination of the czar, Alexander II, another prophet, this time of foreign origin, appeared on the social horizon of St. Petersburg society, where he made a considerable number of converts. This was the famous Lord Radstock, whose doctrines were taken up by a gentleman who up to that time had been known as one of the gayest among the gay, a colonel in the Guards—Mr. Basil Paschkoff. He was enormously rich, and put all his vast fortune at the service of the religious craze which had seized him. He used his best efforts to convert to the doctrine of salvation through faith only not alone his friends and relatives, but also the poorer classes of the population of the capital, devoting in particular his attention to the cab drivers. All these people used to meet at his house, where they mingled with persons of the highest rank and standing, such as Count Korff, and a former minister, Count Alex. Bobrinsky. Later on the whole Tcherikoff family, to which belonged the famous friend of Count Leo Tolstoy, associated itself with them, and, indeed, displayed the greatest fanaticism in regard to its participation in the doctrines of the new sect.

The Paschkowites, as they came to be called, had nothing at all in common with the Khlysty. Their morals were absolutely unimpeachable, and what they preached was simply the necessity to conform one's existence to the teachings of the gospel, which they explained and commented upon, each person according to his own light. They were Protestants in a certain sense, inasmuch as their views were distinctly Protestant ones. But they had much more in common with the nonconformists than the real followers of Luther or of Calvin. They were a kind of refined Salvation Army, if this expression can be forgiven me; though they never acquired the importance, nor did the good which the latter has done, perhaps because they could never make any practical application of the principles and of the ideas which animated them. But at one time the Paschkowit craze was just as strong as the Rasputin one became later on, and Lord Radstock and Mr. Paschkoff were considered just as much prophets among their own particular circle as was Rasputin among the fanatical ladies who had taken him up.

These crises of religious mania are regular occurrences in Russian higher social circles when unusually grave circumstances arrive to shake their equanimity. Seen from this particular point of view, the apparition of Rasputin and the importance which his personality acquired in the life of the Russian upper classes present nothing very wonderful. Before him other so-called prophets had kept the attention of the public riveted upon their doings and their actions.

What distinguished his short passage was the fact that it was made the occasion by the natural enemies of the empire, consisting of the discontented at home and of the Germans outside the frontier, to discredit the dynasty as well as those whose life was spent in its immediate vicinity and to present this figure of the vagrant half-monk and half-layman. He preached a new religion to those foolish enough to listen to him as being one of almost gigantic importance, who could at his will and fancy direct the course of public affairs and lead them wherever he wanted.

My object in this study will be to show Rasputin for what he really was, and in retracing the different vicissitudes of his strange career not to give way to the many exaggerations, which, in familiarizing people abroad with his person and with his name, have made out of him something quite wonderful, and almost equal in power with the czar himself. It is time to do away with such legends and to bring Rasputin back to his proper level—a very able and cunning, half-cultured peasant, who owed his successes only to the fanaticism of the few, and to the interest which many had in dissimulating themselves behind him, in order to bring their personal wishes to a successful end. It is not Rasputin who performed most of the actions put to his credit. It was those who influenced him, who pushed him forward and who, thanks to him, became both rich and powerful. Directions for Employers

Who Purpose Claiming Exemption for Class One Men in Their Employ

THE following course is recommended for employers who have in their employ any number of men—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before Jan. 1st, 1917, and who propose claiming exemption for any of these men, to continue in work which is deemed to be in the National interest:

First, it will simplify matters for you and for the exemption tribunals if you instruct Class One men in your employ to go up for medical examination at the nearest Medical Board Centre.

Only Class One men, who upon medical examination are placed in Category A are liable for immediate service under the Act. Class One men placed in Categories B, C or E satisfy immediate requirements if they attach their medical report to their claim for exemption.

Employer's Statement and Schedule Second, prepare a full statement of the total number of your employees grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility or otherwise of replacing the labour of Class One men with the labour of those unavailable for military service, or outside the statutory class called up; the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reason for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the National interest, and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

Append to this general statement and classification, a schedule of the names, ages and occupations of all men in Class One, indicating as to those who have been medically examined, the medical Category in which they have been placed, noting against each name whether or not you propose to claim exemption on behalf of the man.

Where exemption is claimed employer should state his opinion whether such exemption should be conditional on the man's continuing to follow his present occupation and whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two or more months, as the case may be.

A copy of both statement and schedule should be prepared for each man for whom the employer is applying for exemption.

Forms for Exemption These forms may be obtained on request from any Post Master, who will transmit the forms when filled in, to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.
