

#### FLOCK TO PALESTINE FROM ALL OVER WORLD

The Jews Now Compose Nearly Four-Fifths Population of Jerusalem.

Constantinople, Feb. 8.—The proclamation of the constitution of Turkey has thrown open the doors of Palestine to the incoming of Jews from all parts of the world. In Jerusalem also four-fifths of the population (100,000) now belong to the Jewish faith, while at Jaffa, Tiberias, Safed, and Haifa (Mount Carmel) Jews are reckoned by tens of thousands.

Almost the whole of the extensive plain of Esdraelon has been bought up by them. Their prosperous colonies spread from Dan to Beersheba, and even farther south to the outskirts of Egypt. Thousands are escaping from Persia to find shelter and protection in the Holy Land, while every ship from Odessa carries hun-Ontario Loan dreds of them.

The Jordan valley, once the property of the ex-Sultan Abdul Hamid. being eagerly sought after by Jewcapitalists and syndicates. Zionists, whose agents are distributed all over the land, are buying up the rich properties of the Mahommedan to have Mr. Baker secretary of the Effendis, whose incomes since the revolution have considerably lessened. The whole city is essentially a

Jewish town, Banking, as well rade and commerce, is monopolized by Jews. The Government has found it necessary to organize a company of Jewish gendarmes. Hundreds of thousands of pounds are annually sent from Europe and America to enable the colonists to build homes, hospitals, schools, and invalid homes. Over one hundred Jewish schools already exist in Jerusalem alone. Synagogues are rising up

The value of land has risen fourfold. The ignorant and poverty-strickfellaheen (peasants) are being ousted from their homes and villages ov the sharp European Jew settler, modern agricultural implenents and methods have made the land produce harvests never before dreamt of by the natives. The Anglo-Palestine Company, a Zionist banking and commercial enterprise, is pushing the cause of Israel with splendid de-

Clauses in the workmen's pensions bill granting facilities for the payment in advance of pensions at the age of 55 years on a proportional basis, and providing for aid for widows and orphans of affiliated workmen, have been adopted by the French senate.







#### THE HEAVY ROADS MAKE SMALL MARKET

Hay Sold Readily, Going as High as \$15—Lamb a Little Dearer.

There was another small market this morning, due largely to the very heavy condition of the roads, which prevented many of the farmers from making their appearance.
There was quite a supply of hay, which

sold very readily, as there has been somewhat of a scarcity for the past few weeks. The prevailing price was about 14 50, though a number of loads went as

Oats were comparatively short in supply, though the demand and the price were both very good; \$1.28 was the highest figure offered, and some poorer stuff went as low as \$1.20, but the majority went at the higher price.

Little Dairy Produce. Dairy produce was very little in evidence today, though there was a very pronounced demand. Roll butter sold at

25c to 26c per lb, and crocks at 24c, while fresh eggs remained firm at 32c to 35c a dozen.
There was very little poultry offered, and even the small quantity for sale did not find a very brisk market. The prices remained practically unchanged.
Vegetables, too, were very little in evidence, and there was only a small sale,

there being no change in the prices asked.

In the meat sheds there was very little change in price, the only noticeable difference being the increase in the price of lamb, which sold for 12a to 14a row the lamb, which sold for 13c to 14c per lb.

The most severe penalty which could be visited upon a licensed company was the cancellation of its license, thereby putting it to death. However, the fifteen per centiclause would allow such a company, after being expelled and officially burled by the cancellation of its license, to come into Canada and continue business.


