Half Number Born in Canada in a Year Died Before They Were 25.

The census figures showed that \$1,000 persons were born in Canada in the year 1901. With the air, sunshine and water, Canada anould be the healthlest country in the world, and yet of these \$1,000 persons, 21,823, or more than a quarter of them, died before becoming a year old, and 10,019 cided within the next four years, making 31,347, or over three-eighths, who died within the first five years after birth.

The record was a shocking one, but the census figures showed that while \$1,000 persons had been born in that year, there had in the previous 25 years been 43,595 deaths of persons who did not reach the age of 25. Three score and ten was the allotted span of man, and it was a tragic thire to think that over half the people born in a single year in Canada should die before they had passed the 25th year. Conditions should be improved by law so that life would be lengthened. Most of the children who died under the age of 3 years were murdered through the ignorant administration of deadly soothing syrups, which were freely sold by every drug store in the country.







AS IN THE OLDEN DAYS

Once Waged Campaign Against Deal-Who Cheated by Short Weights and Measures.

Detroit, Nov. 29 .- "The telephone largely responsible for the present high cost of living," declared Fred W. Cham-bers, formerly connected with the New York department of weights and meas-York department of weights and measures, while visiting friends in Deroit.

Mr. Chambers was one of those who were active in the metropolitan crusade against dealers who resorted to cheating their customers by short weight and measure in order to increase their profits.

"I venture to assert that if the telephones were removed from the houses of most families, the butcher's and corner grocer's bills would show a marked deserved.

most families, the butcher's and corner grocer's bills would show a marked descrease at the end of the month," continued Mr. Chambers
"Why would this result? Because the housewives would be compelled then to do their own marketing. With the telephone handy the housewife calls up the butcher or the grocer and gives him a general idea of what she wants, leaving the selection to his judgment or discretion, and she seldom inquires the price of the commodity ordered. The result of this kind of marketing often produces bills that stagger the head of the family when the time for settlement arrives.

Rush to Department Stores.

"It is a puzzle to me," said Mr. Chambers, "why some women will rush to the department stores to take advantage of bargains in dress goods and notions, when they probably could save two or three times as much by shopping in person at the establishments which provide the family eatables. In the olden times our mothers and grandmothers never thought of ordering a steak or a roast for dinner

family eatables. In the olden times our mothers and grandmothers never thought of ordering a steak or a roast for dinner without first inspecting it on the counter at the butcher's and inquiring very particularly about the price. They also saw their purchase weighed.

"Nowadays the housewife, especially if she lives in an apartment or flat, where the little telephone is at her elbow, will send her order over the wire. Thus she depends entirely upon the honesty of the dealer or his clerk for quality, weight, and, in some instances, price.

"How many homes have a weighing scale in the kitchen or a measure that will show whether the peck or bushel of potatoes really measure a full peck or bushel? A small percentage, I venture to say, and then, if there is weighing or measuring done at home, it is left generally to a hired girl, who has not the interests of the family purse at heart.

"You may consider this a small matter, but you have no idea what full weight and measure means to the average American family in the course of a single year.

"There is the item of čoal. Of course,

"There is the item of coal. Of course, it is manifestly impossible to weigh coal, as it is delivered to most families by the ton or ten-ton lots. Still it is a fact that nearly every retail coal dealer in New York has been prosecuted within the past three years for short-weighting customers. We weighed ten loads of coal supposed to weigh 2,000 pounds that were 400 and 500 pounds short; the New York retail coal dealers had got into the habit of delivering tons that contained only 1,600 or 1,700 pounds.

"I would advise every Detroit housewife who has an eye to management and economy personally to visit the markets and see her purchases weighed and wrapped up, and to install in her kitchen a scale that weighs accurately, and a set of measures that will tell instantly if the supplies from the market are up to standard measure."




