OME time ago a special appeal was made in these columns on behalf of a small child whose mother was dying of an incurable disease, and whose father was having a desperate struggle to make ends meet on his insignificant wage.

Fearing that Christmas might be too late to give help in this instance, we took upon ourselves to send food and baby clothes

to that home over a week ago. Yesterday that little mother was buried, and we feel that you will be glad to know that her last hours on earth were cheered by the thought that "someone cared.

Thus, the "Goodfellows' Christmas Cheer Fund" has already begun its good work. All this week personal investigation is being made of the homes whence appeals for help have come, Saturday night will see every parcel of Christ-

cheer, warm clothing and food delivered. Yesterday was bitterly cold-so cold that the ittle army of investigators, who went forth from The Advertiser office, were almost turned back by the icy lash of the air in their faces, the numbness of their fingers, and the chill which crept through even their warm clothing.

But they did not turn back. First of all, because they had given their pledge to the people of London that the money subscribed to the "Goodfellows" Fund" would go only where it was really needed. And, secondly, because they did not are complain of their discomfort in the face of the nisery which they saw in so many homes of the cary, a misery made still more intense by the closing in of the cold weather.

Yesterday's experience enables us to bring you an appeal for help absolutely first-hand. We have actually seen the homes which need your help so badly. And in the light of what we have seen, we beseech you to give of your money and your prayers that the suffering humanity in your very midst may have some measure of relief.

Yesterday we personally visited over one hundred homes. In some cases we found that help was not very badly needed, and we passed on. But in many, many instances we came upon whole families, without fuel, and with but a few pieces of dry bread to eat. We found them frantic in their fear of the cold which was closing in around them. They knew not from whence the next meal should come, and their poor bodies were almost numb with cold.

Some families are living in mere one-room shacks, the children sleeping on the floor, with threadbare coats as their only covering. Others are huddled into old and dilapidated frame houses, through which the wind rushes, icy cold. All are making a frantic struggle for food and fuel.

Investigation is being continued today and tomorrow, so as to be in readiness for distribution on Saturday.

'MARSE HENRY' WATTERSON DIES IN SOUTH

Courier-Journal III Only Few Days.

SUFFERS HEART ATTACK

Served in Confederate Army During Time of American Oivil War.

Watterson, one of the best known journalists in the United States and former owner and publisher of the Louisville (Kentucky) Courier-Journal, died at a local hotel this morning.

Col. Watterson's death was unexpected, though it had been known for some days that he was ill. Death resulted from heart failure, superinduced by congestion of the lungs, according

to physicians. He was conscious for a few minutes at intervals and thirty minutes before his death called his wife into the room and conversed with her. After a few words with Mrs. Watterson, the son and daughter were summoned. Mem-bers of the family said his death was peaceful.

Present Institutions Give Merely Literary Knowledge, Canadian General Claims.

LONDON, England, Dec. 21. — (By Canadian Press)—Does the native African want education? Is it necessary to educate him? Why not leave agency of sanitation and the medi-African want education? Is it necessary to educate him? Why not leave him alone, when he is perfectly happy? These questions were answered by Brigadier-General F. G. Guggisberg. governor and commander-in-chief of the Gold Coast, at a recent meeting of the African Society in this city. The African Society in this city. The African Society, of which Lord Buxton is president, has been formed to enable its members to hear something about the African colonies by asking the governors of the colonies to be the governors of the colonies to be the ociety's guests.

Brigadier-General Guggisberg born in Toronto, July 20, 1869. He is a graduate of the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, and has served with distinction in many fields as a British military officer, having been mentioned in dispatches several times in connection with his military career. He is a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor. His experiences in Africa in clude his employment under the colonial office on a survey of the Gold Coast and Ashanti, and services as surveyor general of Nigeria. He has been gov-ernor and commander-in-chief of the fold Coast since 1919. Natives Seek Education.

Answering the questions as to the need of educating the native African, the questions having been propounded by himself, General Guggisberg said that if you could provide that the native races should not come into contact with civilization, they would remain happy under their old conditions, but the mind of the raw, untutored man would aspire upwards when once he was brought into the zone of modern civilization.

The Provincial Advisory Committee on Unemployment considered the industrial situation and endorses the following statement of proposals:—

1.-That Manufacturers should be asked to take a price for goods on hand equal to the cost of replacement having regard to decreased cost of raw material and of labor used in manufacture.

That Wholesalers should be asked to sell goods on hand at replacement prices.

3.-That Retailers should be asked to sell at replacement prices.

4.-Knowing that the costs of building at the present time have been considerably reduced, those desiring to build should be encouraged to ask for new tenders on their proposed work; and that building contractors and builders supply people should make a special effort to reduce prices to a minimum in order to restore this

important key industry. 5.-That Banks and financial institutions should be prepared to co-operate to the utmost with all productive enterprise by allowing all reasonable credits and by decreasing rates as rapidly as conditions may allow.

6.—That Farmers should be asked to maintain reasonable production, and in the event of a proportionate reduction being reached in other lines, should be prepared to make needed improvements and betterments.

7.—That Labor shall be asked to take willingly a

reduction in wages proportionate to progressive decrease in cost of living, in so far as such a reduction has not already taken place. The above statement has been submitted to and endorsed by the following interests—manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, building industries.



TARIFF QUESTIONS ARE COMPLICATE

U. S. Opinions Divide Widely On Harding's Flexible Plan.

ress.)-New complications surround e tariff question as the outgrowth of President Harding in his recent message for a flexible tariff.

The president has urged congress to expedite passage of the bill for tariff evision, called the permanent tariff ill, as distinguished from the existing emergency tariff measure passed last session to protect certain agricultural and other products. When the present regular session opened the indications were more favorable to quick action

a distinct clashing of opinions and terests in regard to the Harding idea a flexible tariff. The Harding plan changing conditions of exchange and aid to be strongly bent on getting the

flexible tariff plan put through. On the other hand the high tariff leaders congress and in the country have always opposed allowing the executive to control tariff rates, and they do not like the idea now any more than hey did before, but are not disposed o fight the administration openly. A hard struggle is forecasted in the senate over adoption of the Harding plan. The high tariff leaders purpose in the first place to restrict the pro-posed law all they can before it is

put through.

After it is enacted, the charge is made by the low tariff advocates that made by the low tariff advocates that the high tariff leaders and influences intend to control the tariff commission. In other words, it is charged the purpose is to see that the commission is in the grip of the high tariff supporters, and thus the president will have largely to depend on advice, counsel and guidance given him by men whose predilections are in favor of keeping duties up to a high favor of keeping duties up to a high level. It is easy to see that a great deal will depend on the views and temper of the tariff commission. The high tariff leaders have no intention whatever of allowing the commission to be controlled by low tariff men, or to allow it to be headed by a low tariff man. Commissioner Thomas Marvin, the prospective chairman, is a leader of high tariff thought in

Soston.
It is obvious that much will depend on whether the tariff commission is disposed to keep the flexible tariff at the highest level possible or to keep the duties as low as they can be with afety to American industries.
