Every-Day Money.

No twenty-cent silver pieces have been coined at any of the United States coinage of this piece went on for five years only, and the weight of the co.n was seventy-seven grains. There are now of them outstanding about one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Since February, 1887, no trade dollars of silver have been coined, and the total amount of these in existence, though not in circulation, is now thirty-five million dollars. The coinage of the trade dollar was begun in 1873, to compensate in part for the effects of the "crime of 1873," so called by the silverites, and it was not until fourteen

years later that it was adopted.

An old coin of silver very rare nowadays is the silver salf-lime of twenty grains, the coinage of which was originally authorized by act of Congress in April, 1792, more than a century ago. The coinage of half dimes was continued until 1873. There are now of them nearly one million dollars' worth in expiece, first authorized in March, 1851, but not coined since February, 1873. The weight of the three-cent silver piece was twelve and one-half grains whereas the legal weight of the three grain nickel pieces, still in occasional use, was thirty grains. There are outstanding one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars worth of three-

cent silver pieces. The coinage of gold dollars was discontinued in 1890. Prior to that time nearly twenty million gold dollars had been coined, and many of them are still in active circulation. The first of them were coined under a law passed in 1849 two days before Zachary Taylor was inaugurated. 

Carnegie believes in letting trusts alone, and in the May Century in a paper called "Popular Illusions About Trusts" he explains his atti-

Every attempt to monopolize the nufacture of any staple article caries within its bosom the seeds of failure. Long befo e we could legis-late with much effect against trusts there would be no necessity for legislation. The past proves this, and the future is to confirm it. There should be nothing but encouragement for these vast aggregations of capital for the manufacture of staple article. As for the result being an increase of price to consumer beyond a brief period, there need be no fear. On the contrary, the inevitable result of these aggregations is finally and permanently to give to the consumer cheaper articles than would have been otherwise possible to obtain, for capital is stimulated by the high profits of the trust for a season to embark against it. The result is very soon a capacity of production beyond the wants of the consumer and as the new works erected are of the most improved pattern and cap able of producing cheaper than the old works the vulnerable trusts are compelled to buy and capitalize at two or three times their cost. There thus no danger ahead to the comunity from trusts nor any cause
