

HOW AN EMPIRE HAS BEEN RE-DEEMED BY INDIAN TREATY.

Dominion and Ontario Commissioners Traveled Hundreds of Miles On Foot, By Boat and By Canoe In Accomplishment - Territory Which Comes Under Scope of the Treaty Comprises 90,000 Miles.

In the making of "The James Bay Treaty No. 9" the commissioners representing the Dominion Indian Department and the Province of Ontario traveled many hundred of miles on foot, by boat and by cance during the summers of 1905 and 1906. In the first year they were not able to see all the Indians necessary to the completion of the treaty, a number of pletion of the treaty, a number of them being away on hunting jour-neys, hence the work was continued last year. The Indians who are par-ties to the treaty represent the Ojib-way, Cree and other tribes, and the ties to the treaty represent the Ojib-way, Cree and other tribes, and the territory which comes under the territory which comes under the terms of the treaty comprises some 50,000 square miles. Roughly speaking, the area is bounded on the south by the height of land, on the north by James Bay, east by the eastern boundary of the Province and on the west by the height of land west of Lake Superior. The development already in progress in northern Ontario and steadily pressing still farther north, and to which the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific will give a tremendous impetus, made it es-

Reserves are allotted to each band of Indians to the extent of not more than 640 acres of land for every family of five persons. In addition the Dominion undertakes to construct school buildings and to pay for their equipment and the salaries of teachers. A bounty of \$4 per head per year is also to be paid to the Indians. This bounty will come from the funds of Ontario, but the Dominion Government undertakes to bear the cost of its distribution to those entitled to it. The commissioners were Messrs. Duncan Campbell Scott and Sam Stewart of the Indian Department, for the Dominion, and Mr. D. G. Mc-Martin, Perth, for the Province of Ontario. They were accompanied

throughout their journeys by two members of the Northwest Mounted Police force, a surgeon and officials of the Hudson Bay Company, the latter having arranged for the transport of the party.

A recent number of Scribner's Magazine contained an article by Mr. Duncan Campbell Scott on "The Last of the Indian Treaties," in which a graphic account was given of the experiences of the commission. From that article the following extracts are taken:—

#### SLIPS OF NOVELISTS

LEGAL MISTAKES THAT HAVE BEEN MADE BY GREAT AUTHORS.

Bardell Versus Pickwick-The Trial Scene In Reade's "Hard Cash."
Trellope's Dip Into the Law.

"Legal fictions," says one of Gilbert's gondollers, "are solemn things." Yet it is curious how seldom a novelist ventures into a law court without driving his quill through acts of parliament and rules of law alike.

That Dickens' knowledge of law, like Mr. Weller's of London, was "extensive and peculiar" is amply demonstrated by the famous case of Bardell versus Pickwick. Students of that report may have been struck by the fact that neither plaintiff nor defendant apneared in the wifness box. The explanation is that at that time parties 'upon the record" were not competent witnesses, their interest in the case be ing regarded as too strong a tempta-tion to, shall we say, maccuracy. But had Dickens beer a lawyer Mr. Winkle and his friends might also have been spared the ordeal of cross examination and their friends and admirers deprived of many merry moments.

In his anxiety to satirize the abuses of cross examination Dickens over-looked the legal rule that the counsel who calls a witness is not permitted to cross examine him at all, but, on the contrary, is bound by his answers; had Serjeant Buzfuz permitked the Pickwickians to be called as witnesses for the plaintiff (which he would have known better than to do) their version of the words heard through the door "on the jar" must have been accepted, and at the first attempt to badger either of them it would been the learned counsel for the plaintiff who received his lordship's ininnction "to be careful."

But all lovers of Dickens will rejoice at his ignorance of the rule which forces counsel never to call a hostile witness. Who could bear to be deprived of the evidence of Mr. Samuel Wel-

Exactly the same mistake is made by Anthony Trollope in his well known novel, "The Three Clerks." There the hero, Alaric Tudor, is placed upon his trial for misappropriating trust money and defended by that famous leader, Mr. Chaffanbrass of the Old Bailey. Tudor's Mephistopheles, the Hon. Undecimus Scott, is called, much against his will, as a witness for the defense, cross examined by the celebrated Chaffanbrass, forced to confess his misdeeds and dismissed covered with ignominy, to be subsequently expelled from his club-poetic justice which would have been defeated even by a

chairman of quarter sessions The great theoretical and practical knowledge of law possessed by Charles. Reade saved him from this error, as from many others. Yet the famous trial scene in "Hard Cash" would have been ruthlessly deprived of its most dramatic moment by any judge of the high court. When the hapless Alfred Hardy, who has been wrongfully imprisoned in an asylum by his wicked father, comes at last to establish his sanity before a jury, his case is closed by the reading of a letter from his dead sister. Writing at the point of death, she solemnly denies his insanity and begs him to show her words to his aloud by the judge himself, her letter reduces a crowded court to tears and goes far to secure her brother a triumphant verdict, with heavy damages.

"Hard Cash" is termed "a matter of fact romance;" but, as a matter of fact and law, no such letter could have been received in evidence. Knowing that under ordinary circumstances, such testimony would be inadmissible, Reade is careful to establish that the writer knew herself to be dying; but he was unaware that a "dying declara-tion" is only admissible in evidence upon a charge of murder or man-slaughter of the person who has made it, and cannot be laid before the jury

in any other case whatever.

Numerous and entertaining are the trial scenes which adorn the works of Mrs. Henry Wood, but they hardly profess to be strictly accurate. Let me point, rather, to an interesting slip on the part of that most careful of novelists, David Christie Murray, who shares to some extent the popular confusion on the subject of the law of libel and slander. His powerful story, "A Capful o' Nails," has for its hero a working nailer, who becomes an agitator on behalf of his much oppressed class. In consequence of a speech denouncing an unscrupulous employer he is prosecuted on a charge of criminal libel; but, thanks to a faithful friend and a smart lawyer, he emerges triumphantly.

No fault can be found in this case with the way in which the villain is cross examined to pieces. The diffi-culty is that no such prosecution could have been instituted at all. You may slander a man by defamatory speech, but to libel him you must "write, print or otherwise permanently record" your defamation of him, and, though slander and libel alike may expose to to an action for damages. It is libel alone that can bring you within the grasp of the criminal law

It is difficult to uphold this distinct tion. A libel is regarded as a public crime as well as a private wrong be-cause it tends to provoke a breach of the peace, but one would think as much might be said of slander. Utill the distinction exists, and the ag-gressor who confines his attack to words may suffer in purse, but not in

the novelist is liable who unwarily trespasses upon legal preserves.—Pearson's Weekly.

AUTHOR OF "SAM SLICK" WAS PROGENITOR OF "UNCLE SAM."

Birthplace of the Alert, Worldly-Wise "Uncle Sam" Hardly to Be Credited Except By the Very Contrast-How the Scene Appeared In the Days When Judge Haliburton Lived Down By the Sea.

A journey to Halifax, a ride across country, skirting for ten miles the picturesque and romantic Bedford Basin, past the Lily Lake, the Rocky Lake and numerous other gem-like pends with equally pretty pasture lands that form the backbone of Nova Scotia, to the place where the River St. Croix flows out into the broader estuary of the Avon, brings one to the settlement known long ago to the French and Indians as "The Meeting of the Waters," and later to the English as Windsor, the settlement in which it is supposed the Uncle Sam we are familiar with first saw the

light.

The tide is out, and only two or three narrow streams of water are creeping through the deep, shining, mad-lined channel of the Avon. The train has come and gone, and utter listlessness settles down upon the two rows of low, brown buildings, which form the street of Windsor. It seems hardly credible that the alert, worldly-wise "Uncle Sam" could have sprung into being here except by very contrast.

From so much duliness of the present one turns instinctively to the past for some sign of life, and an easy tank is found on the high hill overlooking the station in the green mounds that once formed the ramparts of Fort Edward.

The fort, named for the Duke of Kent, was constructed for the protection of the whole country round about the Basin of Minas after the English gained possession of it. Its building was doubtless a wise precaution, for the village at the base of the hill was one of those flourishing Acadian villages depopulated at the time of the expulsion, and the one which served as the last rendezvous of Coulon de Villiers and his band after their long winter march, and from which they set forth on snow-shees in a blinding storm for the massacre of the English forces at Gaspereau.

Features of Windsor.

If by this time the tide is rushing in under the two bridges of Windsor, bringing the boats that make this town the third shipping port in all the Dominion, the place but now so dull may exhibit an enterprise sufficient to satisfy even Uncle Sam's enterprise services.



## CANADA FOR CANADIANS

Resolution To Limit The Preference On British Goods

LAURIER SAYS WAIT

Ottawa, March 8.—The House upon assembling yesterday went into committee upon the tariff, and Hance Logan (Liberal, N. 81) asked that the British preference be confined to goods imported through Canadian ports. He offered a resolution so limiting the preference after May 1, 1908. At present, of the \$69,000,000 of imported goods entitled to the preference, \$13,000,000 came through United States ports. He pleaded for a fast Atlantic service, which, incidentally, would contribute to the prosperity of the P. C. R. Respecting the Canadian railway service from the Maritime ports, the all-round freight schedule was the best in the world.

Freight Schedules.

Mr. Kemp (East Toronto) said all favored the principle underlying the resolution. He paid scant respect, however, to his freight schedules. As a matter of fact, in some cases, it required a fortnight to move a carload of freight from Toronto to Montreal. The great bulk of imports, under the preference, came by the St. Lawrence route, he said. There was a strong feeling among the people to exploit Canada for the Canadians, and in time this problem would adjust itself. Meanwhile it must be remembered that many steamship lines charged, for the same freight, twice as much from Liverpool to New York. The railway companies charged a rate that equalized these differences. He was satisfied that all the Canadian railways would oppose Mr. Logan's contention.

For Canada's Benefit.

W. F. Maclean said he intended to give the proposal, not only his sympathy, but his vote. He had no great belief in a measure of trade based on a preference where the Government offering it asked for nothing in return and where the Government receiving it did not see the propriety of giving anything in return.

"If we wish to build up Canadian ports and keep them national ports and connect them with railway systems in the West, let us concentrate everything we can in that direction, and not abandon this national policy for a temporary consideration. I am ready to disturb the U. S. or the bonding privilege any day if it is to the

Premier Says Wait.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that the principle involved in the resolution had been approved by every speaker except the member for East Toronto (Mr. Kemp). A more difficult question was this: Is the time now opportune for its application? Since confederation, our national policy had been to build up Canadian ports and harbors. That policy would not be abandoned. That ultimately the policy embodied in Mr. Logan's resolution would be adopted every one would admit. It was not, however, feasible to adopt it immediately. Mr. Logan had recognized this in proposing to make his resolution effective a year hence. It would be all right, say, in 1911, when the G.T.P. was completed.

He proposed an amendment providing that "on and after a date to be fixed by the Governor-in-Council the British preference shall apply only to imports brought directly to Canadian reports."

Fielding's Position.

Mr. Foster stirred up the Minister of Customs, and a brisk debate ensued, in which R. L. Borden participated respecting the attitude of the Government in 1904, and the linaction of the tariff commission in not investigating this question.

Dr. Sproule pointed out the inconsistency of the Premier and the Government upon this question, and Dr. Daniel (Conservative, New Brunswick) urged the Minister of Finance to define his position.

Mr. Fielding said that a resolution corresponding to the Logan resolution had passed the House in 1904 without

corresponding to the Logan resolution had passed the House in 1904 without division. Both parties had supported it. He regretted that after forty it. He regretted that after forty years we were not commercially independent. He was satisfied, however, that the facilities were sufficient even now to carry out Mr. Logan's resolution. However, he declared his adhesion to the substitute suggested by the first Minister.

W. F. Maclean wanted to know why the clause was dropped. He had heard that the Minister of Railways had insisted on it. No answer was given by the Minister or the railway. The bill was reported.

Adams Jury Disagrees. Wallace, Idaho, March 8.—The jury in the trial of Steve Adams for the murder of Fred Taylor, last night announced it was impossible to agree on a verdict, and was discharged.

France Not Fighting Vatican. Paris, March 8.—The Foreign Office has authorized a denial of the reports from Rome that France is trying to prevent the Vatican from being represented at The Hague conference.

#### LATE SIR WILLIAM HINGSTON.

'Canada's First Great Physician' Title Often Applied Him-How He Deserved the Honor.

He Deserved the Honor.

"Canada's first great physician" was a description often applied to Sir William Hingston, who has died in Montreal. On the principle that great men lived before Agamemnon, the popular idea of Sir William may have been unjust, but it is undoubted that he was the most famous medical man Canada had produced up to the time Prof. Osler became so widely known. His career has been no longer than it has been distinguished, both in public life and in his profession. In the latter he stood quite abreast of the most successful American doctors for the latter he stood quite abreast of the most successful American doctors for a quarter of a century, and hardly a week went by without bringing to him some patient from the United States who believed that in his own country there was no physician quite as capable as the doctor at Montreal. Although 78 years old at the time of his death, Sir William's standing among the medical men of the country remained what it had been for a generation.

Won Honors Abroad.

Won Honors Abroad.

He was born in Montreal in 1829.
His father had come to Canada as adjutant of the famous Hundredth Regiment and fought through the War of 1812. After the disbanding of the regiment, in 1819, Col. Hingston took up his residence on the Chateau-guay River. He died when his son was only 18 months old. William received his early education in Beauharnois, and then, at the age of 15, entered the Montreal College. His first year there gave a promise of a brilliant future, for he captured three first and two second prizes out of a possible five. His first intention, after leaving school, was to become a chemist, and he spent two verse in brilliant future, for he captured three first and two second prizes out of a possible five. His first intention, after leaving school, was to become a chemist, and he spent two years in preparation. At the end of this time he had concluded to become a doctor, and entered McGill, graduating in 1861. Afterward he proceeded to take a post-graduate course at Edinburgh, and continued his studies in several European countries. Of honors he won in Europe one was membership in the Imperial Leopold Academy, and he was the first Canadian to se distinguish himself. Then he returned to Montreal and began the serious business of his profession. For surgery he had a peculiar aptitude, and it is recorded that in 1867, on a visit to Edinburgh, he performed a most difficult operation at the request of Sir James Simpson, one of the greatest surgeons living, and a keen admirer of the Montreal doctor.

The First In Canada.

The First In Canada.

As surgeon of the Hotel Dieu Hospital, he was able to practice his art over a wide field, and soon his skill was known far and wide. It was when filling this post that Dr. Hingston had the honor of performing for the first time in Canada a number of difficult operations, removal of the kidney, excision of the knee, and excision of the tongue and lower jaw being among them. He was one of the organizers of the McGill University Society, and a resuscitator of the Medico-Chirurgical Society of Montreal, the first secretary of the Dominion Medical Society, and afterwards its president. When Bishop's College Medical School was organized he was appointed professor of surgery, but soon resigned. In 1876 he was chosen by the International Council to represent Canada at the Philadelphia Medical Congress, and in 1887, when the congress met at Washington, he was again offered this honor. So one might continue the list of professional honors, concluding with knighthood in 1885. There is hardly any distinction open to a Canadian medical man that he had not received.

As a public man Dr. Hingston first came before the people of Montreal as a candidate for the Mayoralty in 1875. He received about ten votes to his opponent's one, and, as he stated at the time, "without having spent one moment of time or one shilling of money to obtain a position which no one should seek, but which, coming as it did, no one was at liberty to decline." He was re-elected by acclamation, but declined a third term. The period of his Chief Magistracy was one of unusual importance, especially at the time of the Guibord affair. For the wise and moderate manner in which he discharged his duties Mayor Hingston received the thanks of the Governor-General, Lord Dufferin.

He has been a frequent contributor to the medical integrals and retired.

He has been a frequent contributor to the medical journals, and not infrequently his papers interested a far wider field of readers than the medical profession. For example, a well-considered essay on the climate of Canada and its relation to human life was a step in removing an ignorant prejudice that is now fast disappearing.

#### TRAINING FOR WAR.

Haldane, Secretary for War, on

Mr. Haldane, Secretary for War, in a recent speech upon economic study said that idealism was the source of power, whether in religion, war, science, or organization. There was nothing to be done on a complete scale apart from large views, and applied economics entered into every sphere of public life.

Take warfare, for instance. In the days of Frederick the Great a commander gave his instructions definitely, and so they were carried out for better or worse. Moltke changed all that by giving only general instructions, leaving those under him the responsibility of subordinate leadership.

In devolution of responsibility lay the key of good administration. That was a good working theory; but, unfortunately, it was not the theory of Parliament, off of the British Constitution. The general idea was to watch and check and interfere with the Government departments at every turn.

The War Office took the right course when it determined to try the effect of giving military officers a training in administration. He was sure they had taken a step forward in the direction of producing subordinate leaders.

Canadian Immigration.

Canadian Immigration.

In recent years there has been a great change of opinion and feeling in Britain regarding emigration from there. Not so long ago all classes were decidedly opposed to it, but now all are rather in favor of it, and consider it a good thing, both for those who go and those who remain. On this account several agencies have been formed by philanthropists and others to facilitate emigration, particularly to Canada. The only economic difference of importance between Canada and Britain is, the accessible area of unused and waiting land possessed by the Dominion. That improves conditions in every occupation, for wages will not remain permanently below the level corresponding to the standard of living which can be obtained in the open opportunities presented by Canada's vacant land. A man will not work for a farmer for little or nothing when he can so readily get land on which to work for himself. This effect is not confined to farm labor, but has been felt, and is still felt, in all branches of industry. While free land thus invites the industrious wages and industrial conditions cannot continue low.

During the latter half of last year the immigration into Canada amounted to 82,326, being an increase of 26,930, or over 48 per cent., compared with the corresponding period of the preceding year; while for the whole of 1906 it amounted to 215,912, against 144,613 in 1905, a gain of 71,294, or 19 per cent. From these figures it would seem that there is now a universal haste to Canada; but it need not cause any alarm, for it will be many years before even at this rate it 211, fill up the Dominion, or exhaust the free agricultural land in Canada.

THIS HONORS THE CREATOR

We Should Study Our Personal Appearance—Avoid Slovenly Habits—Develop the Mind, and Use the Intellect In the Master's Work—Make the Home Attractive For the Good of Our Children.

Is defined at the outset to ugliness and deformity. It is said that George Villers, the most powerful personality in all James I.'s kingdom, got his start in life on account of the beauty of his physical personality. And there are many men and women who have been fearfully handicapped in Christian work because they did not use their reacre enough and kept their shoes unblackened and did not have their linen clean and because they were not careful to keep their skin well washed and their hair properly combed.

And yet how many men there are who are neglectful of their personal appearance. How many wives and mothers there are who, though they are very particular about the neatness of their homes, seem to lose all desire for neatness and attractiveness in their personal apparel. They were very careful how they dressed before they were married. When they were engaged to be married they always had their hair prettily arranged and donned their most attractive garments when their future husbands called in the evenings. But now that they are married they do not seem to care how they look in the kitchen or at the breakfast table or in the sitting room. And the sad fact is their slovenly habits of life, like all other evil habits which we allow to fasten themselves upon us, grow worse as they grow older. Oh, my friends, never allow yourselves to lose your physical charms! If God commanded King Solomon to adorn the doors of the inner sanctuary with cherubim and palm trees and flower blossoms he wants us to make our temples of the Holy Spirit just as winsome and attractive as possible.

In other words, as the lapidary takes his precious stones just quarried from the mines and cuts them and polishes them and harmoniously arranges them in the most beautiful settings, we should cut and polish and blend our thoughts as precious jewels for the service of Jesus Christ. We should develop our thoughts as sthetically in order that they may be the spirit. develop our thoughts aesthetically in order that they may better spiritually serve our Divine Master and King. We should engrave our mental doors with cherubim and palm trees and flower blossoms.

Do you suppose that Robert Burns would have his influence upon Scottish life unless he had been able to sing his songs of love and patriotism with a sweeter or a more clarion note than ever bard had sung before or since his time? Do you believe Cardinal Newman's "Kindly Light" would to-day be leading the Christian world through encircling gloom unless the words of that hymn were as soft and limpid as any ever written by a master of English? Do you believe the gospel messages of a Munkacsy, a Millet, a Raphael or a Da Vinci would be teaching the love of Jesus Christ as they are doing unless each one of their messages had been painted by the hand of a master? Do you believe that Bunyan's allegory would be read by the hundreds of thousands and the millions unless, like Christ's parables, it was the wonder of all literary critics? These men were not crude men. They took the precious jewels of their minds and cut them and polished them and gave them in service to Jesus Christ. The more those mental jewels sparkled the more service they were able to perform for their Divine Master. The very best possibilities you have in your mind you should reach for and grasp and then harness for your larger developed intellect in the Master's work.

"But," you say, "what does that mean? Are you asserting that only intellectual geniuses are fitted for gospel work? Do you affirm that the illiterate and uneducated can do but literate and uneducated can do but little or no good for the Master?" No, no. I am not asserting that. You had better teach your children to love good pitures, for, mark me, if you do not teach them to love good pictures when they are beyond your control

It is important to have a beautiful It is important to have a beautiful home in which our children shall live. Is it not also important to have a beautiful temple and a beautiful church service with which we shall worship God aright on the Sabbath day? Shall not the door of our earthly sanctuaries be engraved with cherubim and palm trees and blossoming flowers? Shall not the songs we sing from the choir lofts be sung by the most beautiful voices? Shall not the sermon which is preached be something more than an old-fashioned camp meeting exhortation? Shall not thing more than an old-fashioned camp meeting exhortation? Shall not our organs be deep throated organs and our church windows whenever possible have in stained glass pictures of Jesus as a good shepherd caring for a little lamb, or Jesus as a tired, wornout traveler talking by the well of Samaria with a social outcast, or Jesus as an ascending Lord disappearing among the clouds while his disciples are prostrate at his feet? #### PECULIAR RELIC.

utiful Carved Head of a Woman to Tell of Ship Wrecked on Hudson Bay Shores.

a certain house in Fort Frances Ont., there is an object which at once excites curiosity. The beautifully carved head of a woman, of Grecian mould, with gilded necklace and other ornaments untarnished, looks down wonderingly upon her strange surroundings. Last summer she lay upon the shores of Hudson Bay, and for two winters, storms and snows have drifted over her. Those who may find, in years to come, the decapitated body of the Figurehead Lady may wonder, indeed, over the peculiar there is an object which at once ed body of the Figurehead Lady may wonder, indeed, over the peculiar sight. Three years ago the gallant ship Lady Head, foundered on the Gasket Shoals, 150 miles north of Charlton Island. Last summer Mr. J. A. Osborne and a party of explorers came upon the figurhead of the wrecked vessel, in a perfect state of preservation. The body was garbed in flowing robes of a classical period. The find was a little too bulky to carry away entire, but Mr. Osborne could not resist the temptation to take away at least a part of it. Summary decapitation was accordingly decreed for the unfortunate lady, and her head now graces his den.

ate lady, and her head now graces his den.

Mr. Osborne is editor and proprietor of The Fort Frances Times. From May to September he traveled 1,100 miles by cance and portage north of the height of land. His party ran 42 rapids, and made 17 portages. At Moose Factory a boat was obtained and the adventurers sailed to Fort George and Great Whale River, the latter being the last Hudson Bay post on the east side of the bay. At this place there is only one white man.

"From there," said Mr. Osborne to a Standard interviewer in Winnipeg, "we journeyed for 200 miles north, pushing our way through immense fields of ice, from the middle of July to the 1st of August, which made it extremely dangerous. We were finally driven ashore by the ice. At this point we found the remnants of the wreck of the Lady Head, which foundered on the Gasket Shoals, 150 miles north of Charlton Islands, some three years ago. The pieces we picked up are the only relics of the ill-fated vessel that have ever been found.

Sir William says:—

Regina, Sask., March 8.—The University act, introduced by the Provincial Government for the purpose of establishing and incorporating a university, which has received its first reading, establishes a body politic and corporate consisting of a chancellor.

No religious tests will be required of either professors or students, though the right is given to any affiliated college to make such provisions in regard to religious instructions and worship for its own students as it may deem proper.
