PROGRESS OF THE WAR

[January 4 to January 10]

THE week under review was one of great activity on most fronts, the losses on the western front being particularly heavy.

In the Western campaign no great drive was attempted by either side, though there were several tactical operations.

The week was without news of any developments in the Egyptian campaign, the only news published of the East African campaign was that of an encounter between British and German troops on the river Rufiji.

Very little news transpired concerning the Balkan campaign, there having been very little fighting in Macedonia. The situation in Greece seemed to be in a fair way of being adjusted to the satisfaction of the Entente Allies.

The Austro-Italian campaign was continued under severe winter-weather conditions. No important changes were effected. Italian aircraft raided Trieste during the week, and did some damage.

The week was pregnant with political events and diplomatic developments. A change was made in the Russian cabinet, consequent on the resignation of Premier Trepoff.

News of the Sea

London, Jan. 6.—Lloyd's Shipping Agency to-day announced that the Greek steamship Thriopias had been torpedoed and sunk. Twenty-five men of the crew were landed. The vessel measured 3,015 tons gross.

London, Jan. 6.—The Politiken, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen, states that the Danish steamer Albatross from Sunderland to Boston, with pulp and iron, has been captured by German warships and the cargo seized.

London, Jan. 6.—The Norwegian steamer Fama is believed to have been sunk, Lloyd's announces. The Norwegian steamer Eros, erroneously declared sunk, has arrived in port, says another Lloyd's announcement.

Baltimore, Jan. 9.—A Cape Henry to the Maritime Exchange from a dispatch says the British steamer Keltinabro, from Glasgow for Baltimore, passing in the capes to-day, signalled she had on board the captain and six men of the crew of the Newfoundland schooner Edward Harris.

London, Jan. 9.—Lloyd's announces that the Norwegian steamer Borgholm, 1,719 tons, is believed to have been sunk. Lloyd's announces. The Norwegian steamer Eros, erroneously declared sunk, has arrived in port, says another Lloyd's announcement.

London, Jan. 7.—Lloyd's shipping agency announces that the British steamer Corby, and the Danish steamer Neosberg, have been sunk. The crews were saved.

London, Jan. 5.—The torpedoing of the Greek steamer Stripiras by a submarine is reported in a Havas dispatch from Corunna, Spain. Twelve men of the crew were saved by a fishing boat.

Vigo, Spain, via Paris, Jan. 5.—The Norwegian steamer Thyra, of 3,742 tons gross, has been found afloat by fishermen. Bombs were placed on board but failed to explode, and the vessel was abandoned.

London, Jan. 4.—An admiralty announcement another case "of callous disregard for the lives of non-combatants at sea," says that nothing further has been heard of the British steamer North Wales, proceeding in ballast from Hull for Canada, which a German wireless dispatch on Nov. 10 reported as having been torpedoed.

London, Jan. 8.—The sinking of one neutral steamer and two schooners flying the flags of Entente nations was reported to-day. They were the Norwegian steamship Langbar, of 1,407 tons gross, and the British schooner Brenda and the Russian schooner Seamed.

London, Jan. 4.—The British transport Iornia has been sunk. It was officially announced to-night.

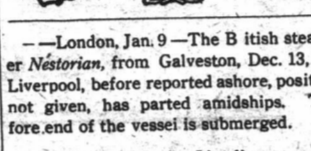

Chihuahua City, Mexico, Jan. 5.—Villa was defeated at Jiminez yesterday by General Francisco Murguilla, with a loss of 1,500 rebel dead, wounded and captured. The rebel leader, Martin Lopez, and another Villa general are among the slain.

Quebec, Jan. 6.—Senator J.B.R. Fiset, of Rimouski, died at that place yesterday at the advanced age of 74 years and eleven months. He was one of the oldest Liberals in the House of Commons.

Wrangell, Alaska, Jan. 8.—John Finlayson, an explorer, for whom Finlayson River and Finlayson Lake, in Yukon Territory, were named, died to-day, aged 105 years.

Tokio, Jan. 6.—Three hundred persons have been killed and many injured in a disaster which broke in Central Formosa, according to special dispatches from Tappoku, the capital of Formosa.

Ottawa, January 8.—The seventh change in the Quebec representation in the cabinet since the Borden government was made this afternoon. The cabinet vacancy, caused by the death of the late Hon. T. Chase Casgrain, was filled by the election of Hon. Albert Veinvinger.
