Board of Trade.

Last Wednesday afternoon in the Horticultural Room of the School Building a meeting was held with a view to forming a Board of Trade for Kings County according to announcement in last week's ACADIAN.

Present—W. H. Chase, Vice-Pres.—S. C. Parker, Secy.—J. H. Eaton, Counsellors—J. W. Caldwell, B. H. Dodge, H. H. Wickwire, M. G. DeWolf, F. F. Mitchell, Wm. Band, W. E. Roscoe, Ralph S. Eaton.

The following regulations for the proposed Board were adopted by a vote of the meeting:

- 1. That the name of the Board be The Board of Trade of Kings County.
2. That the Board shall consist of members residing in the County subject to the conditions of the Act.
3. That the Board shall deal with all matters of trade and commerce relating to the welfare of the County.

4. That the officers shall be President, Vice-President and Secy-Treas.
5. That there shall be a Council of not less than sixteen, looking to representation from each ward and incorporating as far as possible the varied interests of the County.

6. That the annual meeting be held on the second Wednesday in January at such place as shall be decided on by the Council.
7. That the fee for membership shall be fifty cents per annum.

A committee consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, W. E. Roscoe and J. H. Eaton were appointed to draw up by-laws for the Board of Trade, to be presented at first regular meeting.

A vote of thanks was tendered to J. W. Bigelow, W. H. Chase and R. W. Starr the committee who issued the circular letters calling the meeting, for this and for all the labor they had expended with a view to forming the Board.
