The result is always the same—a toll levied on the cost of living through special privileges.

Active Service Flags.

The Active Service Flags have been designed to honor the absence of our men and women on military duty. They should be displayed in a conspicuous place, in the home from which the person has gone. The flag is of red and white, and on the center field of white is placed the number of people on active service from that home. Blue leaves represent those who are on Active Service, and gold leaves are for those who have made the supreme sacrifice. Those families who have members on service or returned are proud to display their Service Flags.

The Service Flags may be obtained from the Civil Service Bureau for seventy-five cents, and are of regulation size and pattern. Societies, Lodges and Churches desiring Service Flags communicate with the above Society for prices.

"The Ghost At Chateau Du Mont."

Lieut. Leon Archibald, in Philadelphia Ledger. In an area of the British Front honored by the presence of our division in the earlier stages of the war, on the one prominent feature of the landscape, and in close proximity to the firing line, was situated a handsome old French chateau, which for the sake of convenience may be called "Chateau Du Mont". The censor, in this instance, deems it advisable to withhold the name by which it was known on French ordnance maps, just to be on the safe side.

For months it was the Chateau du Mont had been weathering the ravages of the battle, when one day, for tactical reasons it was considered necessary to erase it from the landscape. The removal of this fine old pile was by no means decided upon rashly, nor in haste. Every conceivable plan had been considered where by it might be left to grace its beautiful grounds, but to no avail. The only action which could correct a very grave evil was to level the structure to the ground, thereby removing from the German artillerymen a highly valuable aiming mark, as, on account of its nearness to the front line, and prominent situation, the German gunners could get "direct alights" or it and by carefully observing their "burefs", then switch on their adjacent targets with unerring precision in "aiming" and "range." Chateau du Mont must be rased, and our instructions with regard to the matter were designed to accomplish this desirable result, and in due time it was done.

Procedure of Registration

On June 22nd every person residing in Canada, male or female, British or alien, of sixteen years or over, must attend one of the registration booths located in his or her district, and there observe the procedure explained below.

Where to Register
Every person required to register has the privilege of registering at any of the public places provided for that purpose. The location of all such places will be specified in proclamations posted conspicuously and fully.

How to Register
The procedure of registration is simple. The questions upon the registration card can be answered very easily, but they must be answered truthfully and fully.

The card shown in the illustration is a facsimile of the registration card for males. An advertisement showing the card for females appears in another paper.

Study the questions carefully so that you will be able to answer them promptly when registering. If you have any special qualification, or feel that your services would be more beneficial to the country in some other line of work, say so.

While all are compelled to register on Registration Day, it is not contemplated by the Government to force the sick, feeble and aged to turn out. If such persons will notify the Registrar prior to June 22nd of their inability to attend at a place of registration, an effort will be made to register them at home, provided the request is reasonable and justified.

Remember the Day—June 22nd—Remember the Hours—7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Register early and get your Certificate for your own protection.

St. John's Church Centenary.

A hundred years is a long period in the history of a young country like this and the hundredth birthday of a local organization is an event well worth recognition. The esteemed Rector of St. John's church and his Wardens, therefore, did well in arranging for the celebration of the centenary of their church on Sunday and Monday of this week. The congregation are to be congratulated in the successful manner in which all the arrangements were carried out.

There were three services on Sunday all of which were well attended. The weather was favorable and a goodly number from neighboring sections attended the congregation in the limit of the seating accommodations.

The pretty little church which was opened first for worship on June 10th 1818, presented a fine appearance, many beautiful floral decorations being prominent.

At the 11 o'clock service the sermon was preached by Archbishop Waite. His Lordship is a practical and pleasing speaker and his address was full of interest. His text was Psalm 20, verses 9 and 10, and the general theme of his sermon was that God always honors those who honor him. He referred briefly to the present war and the part played by the different nations engaged in it; and the assurance that both sacred and secular history gives us of ultimate victory. Referring to the occasion of his visit he gave a short history of the work of the Anglican church here, which dated from 1762. He made mention of the kindness of the Baptist congregation in early days giving the use of their church for services. For many years the Wolfville church was under the supervision of the church of Cornwallis and only in 1892 did it become an independent church. Since then there have been two rectors only, Rev. K. C. Hind for seven years, and the present popular Rector, Rev. Mr. Dixon for nineteen years. The Arch-bishop made a feeling reference to the death of the late Archbishop Macmillan. He also referred to the pioneers of the church here making special reference to the late Rev. John Storrs, father of Mr. E. W. Storrs of this town, formerly the esteemed rector at Curnutt.

The choir rendered pleasing music, the anthem, with solo by Mr. Batesman, being particularly good. Mrs. Nicholson presided at the organ most acceptably.

At the evening service a most helpful sermon was preached by Rev. J. Woodruff, Rector of Cornwallis. A beautiful vocal solo was rendered by Miss Mildred Harvey.

The preacher's text was from Joshua 4-6. "What mean ye by these stones?" He spoke first of the importance of the study of the history of the nation of God's people in general, and of the study of the history of our own people in particular. He sketched the history of God's people at an important crisis when a memorial of what occurred with the making of the living faith—that the nation could repose in God. He then spoke of this district as a district of memorial, and of the living faith as a memorial of the living faith.

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HUSSEIN KAMEL

The Man Who Helped the Reconstruction of Egypt.

For many years before the British Government called upon Hussein Kamel to assume the difficult position of the first Sultan of Egypt, he had been one of the best known Egyptian public life. A keen agriculturist, and a strong believer in the benefits of education, he devoted all his energies to raising the standard of both. Thus, the hard lot of the Egyptian farmer made special appeal to him, and he did much to make it easier. He gave evidence of true statesmanship in that he recognized the impossibility of his country ever rising to any worthy position as long as its women remained uneducated. He was himself, of course, a man of liberal education, and spent a great deal of his time, as a young man, in Europe. After attending various schools in Egypt, he went, in 1867, to Paris to complete his education. There he became the guest of Napoleon III., and two years later, when the Empress Eugenie visited Egypt, at the opening of the Suez Canal, Hussein returned to the Suez Canal, as one of her chamberlains. Later on, after having, in the meanwhile, returned to Egypt, he was appointed to the post of first secretary of the Suez Canal, and he went back to Egypt and there he met his wife, Hasmia Pasha, appointed him Inspector-General of the Province of Upper Egypt, and after various appointments, in 1872 to 1878, he held many important ministerial posts in the country, this position, that is, in the course of affairs which was to be put to good use later on. Then when Ismail was deposed, Hussein went into exile with his family, but after the suppression of the Arabi rebellion, returned once more to Egypt, and once more devoted himself to his agricultural interests.

Hussein Kamel was a firm believer in the British occupation, and was never tired of insisting that the project of the British authorities for co-operation with the occupying power, maintaining that this might, as a result, be the best way of bringing Egyptian ideals. And so it came about that he was ever the trusted confidant of the British authorities. Lord Cromer made him his friend, as did also Sir John Gorst, whilst Lord Kitchener never failed to take counsel with Hussein Kamel on every occasion on any one of the many great schemes for the betterment of the Egyptian people. 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Fishing On Vancouver Island

ALTHOUGH I had always looked upon British Columbia as one of the very best trout fishing countries in the world, it was not until I came to Vancouver Island that I fully realized how superiorly good it was.

Sport which would be considered excellent in the best district of Eastern Canada, may be had at a point on this island, and that, too, without being incumbent on the fisherman to travel more than a few dozen miles from the railroad, which by the way, is now a branch of the Canadian Pacific system, although still retaining its original title of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway. At any one of a dozen points on this line, the sportsman who is not ambitious to overcome some of the really big fellows, can find excellent trout accommodation within walking distance of water, which, for the reasonably skilful fisherman, may be relied upon to yield daily baskets of from three to six dozen speckled beauties, ranging all the way from 3/4 of a pound to 1 1/2 pounds in weight, and withal full of fight and as game fish as can be found anywhere in the world.

There are many camping places where the best of accommodation can be secured, and the ardent fisherman who is looking for sport can make no mistake if he starts out from Victoria by train and drops off at any station on this line. He should desire a somewhat more elaborate outfit with an even greater diversity of sport in him than the simplest of camp equipment will suffice for such a trip. It will be experienced in obtaining frequent and ample supplies of gasoline. This is really a land-locked arm of the sea, and provides splendid sport for hundreds of fishermen from Victoria. Just a little further along one reaches another fine stretch of salmon and grise water known as Tod Inlet, and here also excellent sport is to be had for the asking. Leaving the inlet behind and travelling one half a dozen miles further up the line one comes to the Shawigan Lake station, from whence it is but a short ride to the lake itself.
