Endorses Water Power Development

Fredericton, N. B., March 12—This forenoon's session of the N. B. Labor Federation passed a resolution of condolence with Past Vice-President and Mrs. Frank Lister on the loss of their daughter.

The Federation resumed at 2.30. The publication of the Union Worker by A. D. Colwell in St. John was approved and recommended to the favorable consideration of labor.

President Melanson reported from the interview with the Government on ways and means, 10 cents per capita was defeated. The constitution was amended making per capita tax payable semi-annually.

The officers to consist of President secretary-treasurer, two vice-presidents at large, these four to be the executive and one vice president from each city and county represented.

Secretary-Treasurer to be bonded for five hundred dollars. Thanks were tendered Mayor Reid for civic welcome, Fredericton Labor Council, the Press Committee and Press, Workers' Compensation Board for advice and assistance, International officers Cameron and Livingstone, Hon. P. J. Veniot for passes to opening of Legislature and Mayor Reid and Thomas Peeney for cigars.

The Federal Government was asked to continue public employment bureaus.

The following resolution was presented on behalf of the Miramichi delegation by J. E. Tighe and adopted:—Whereas the Provincial Government has under consideration water powers in the Province of New Brunswick; and

NINE C. N. R. EMPLOYEES SIX MONTHS IN JAIL
Fredericton, N. B., March 12—Nine of the employees of the Canadian National Railways who had pleaded guilty to the theft of liquor from a car loaded with Kentucky Rye whisky at Napadogan on the Transcontinental division, were sentenced by Police Magistrate Limerick in the police court here this afternoon to serve six months each in the York County Jail. Another prisoner whose wife is in a delicate condition at Moncton was admitted bail for one week at the end of which time he is to return and be given a similar sentence. The other of eleven prisoners, who were arrested pleaded not guilty and was sent up for trial at the York County Court next week. Chief H. J. Page, of the C. N. R. investigation department has been here from Toronto in charge of the case.

Pure Bred Versus Grade Dairy Cattle

The old question "would you advise me to start into the pure bred dairy cattle business", is being asked as frequently these times as ever before and is receiving just as many negative replies as formerly. There are so many factors which enter into the problem that one has to study the question from every angle. Good pure bred cattle of either sex are selling for such good prices now that men who have proven themselves successful with grade stock, cannot afford to continue without pure breeds. We all know of certain grade herds making more money for the owners than some pure bred herds in the same locality, but every community has examples of men in the pure bred business who never should have invested money in live stock.

The most economical and the most satisfactory way for the average farmer to start into pure-breeds is to purchase good females to start with. Care should be taken to see that they are good. They should be healthy, of the proper type, and either proven producers or with proven ancestors. It is better to have only one good cow than several medium quality animals. A comparatively small outlay is necessary when starting in this manner.

It is remarkable how quickly a herd can be built up from a few foundation cows. The dairy herd on the Agassiz Experimental Farm was started by the purchase in December 1911 of twenty-eight grade cows and the following year three pure bred cows. Then in the fall of 1915 two pure bred heifer calves and the next year a pair of two year old heifers also pure bred were purchased. Today there are forty-two pure bred females in the herd including the above and their descendants. As the pure bred herd increased in size we have gradually decreased the number of grades until at present only twenty-one are on hand.

A yearly comparison has been made during the last three years of the five most profitable pure bred cows and the five most profitable grade cows. In each instance the pure breeds have been the more successful from a commercial standpoint. On the average the pure breeds produced 4,476 pounds more milk and 153 pounds more fat per cow per annum, and yielded an average profit over feed cost of \$27.64 more per cow than the grades. After a pure bred herd reaches a suitable size the most money is made by selling the surplus stock for breeding purposes. The Holstein bull, Inka Sylvia Beets Posch 5563, was used as senior sire in the

Do Not Neglect The Bees

The present high price of sugar reminds us that Canada produces natural sugars that are still more valuable than the product of the refineries. Fortunate are those who not only possess bees at this time, but understand them and have supplied their needs.

The early spring months are the most critical period of the year in the life of the bee colony. At the same time, the pressure of spring work of cultivating, seeding, etc. on every fine day on the farm too often leaves the bees forgotten.

There are several reasons why the bees are more liable to be neglected than other things on the farm. Hidden away in their hives they do not require daily feeding like other animals. Such attention as they need is in the nature of a surgical operation, and the opening of the hive is not always anticipated with pleasure on account of the risk of receiving stings. Yet on many farms, the bees have been found to pay better than anything else, considering the small amount of capital and labour expended.

The principal danger to avoid at this time of year is starvation. If each colony went into the winter strong, with a good fertile queen and a plentiful supply of stores in the combs, the first examination of the hive had better be deferred until the weather is warm and nectar is being gathered. But if the stores are running short, a cake of bee candy or a comb of honey laid over the combs if the bees are still in the cellar, or if spring is opening, a superficial examination of the hives on the first favourable day, combs of honey from heavy hives being then given to those that are light, may save the loss of colonies and increase the value of the honey crop by many dollars.

A bulletin on the care of bees may be obtained on application to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

Winter Hard On The Partridge

This winter has been a very hard one on the partridge, which during the close season of the past two years, have shown a wonderful increase. Forest wardens estimate that about half the number of partridge in this area will be killed off this winter as a result of the bad weather conditions. The birds suffered most during the second week in February, when for several days the twigs were covered with a hard coating of ice, and they could not get at the small leaf-buds which form their staple article of diet. A few, also burrowing into the snow to spend the night, found themselves the next morning trapped under the crust. A good nesting season would do much to make up for the troubles of the partridge this winter.

We constantly hear it said that "this is the twentieth century—superstition and all that sort of thing died out long ago." Yet there is hardly a person in the country without his pet belief—that misfortune follows stooping over a baby or spilling salt, or that a black cat brings good luck, for example. Hence, too, the universal practice of wearing mascots "for luck."

These, however, are not very serious beliefs, being merely personal fads. Superstition of a deeper rooted and more unpleasant type is still common in the more backward rural areas, however. Only a few weeks ago an old dame in the Fen country was boycotted by the whole countryside because she had the reputation of being a witch and of throwing spells over people's children, stock and crops. No one would go near her or let her have food or clothing, and she nearly starved to death.

The cold, legal atmosphere of the courts would be thought unfavorable to belief in witchcraft, and one of the eggs produced as proof of guilt. In the face of such evidence the rooster's case was hopeless. He was convicted and he and his miraculous eggs solemnly burnt at the stake in the town square.

A sow and six young pigs were accused of witchcraft towards a child, and were brought, protesting loudly, before the "beak." Amid great sensation, the sow was found guilty and publicly executed, but the porkers were acquitted on the ground of extreme youth. As late as 1749, a cow was accused of possessing a "devil," and, after a long hearing, was found guilty and condemned to death. "Rats and mice and such small deer" have been summoned on numerous occasions, but almost invariably failed to put in an appearance at court.

In the fifteenth century, the peasants of a village in the south of France took legal proceedings against a plague of locusts which trespassed on their fields and devoured their crops. As late as 1749, a cow was accused of possessing a "devil," and, after a long hearing, was found guilty and condemned to death. "Rats and mice and such small deer" have been summoned on numerous occasions, but almost invariably failed to put in an appearance at court.

Another action was brought against a pest of leeches swarming in the ponds and streams of another country district of France. The judge issued a decree against the leeches trespassing further on the disputed territories, but history is silent as to whether the injunction was obeyed or ignored, with resultant punishment for contempt of court.

Animals have even been admitted as witnesses in the courts. It used to be considered no offence to kill a burglar trying to break into a house. There arose the difficulty that one man living alone might ask another to his house, and then murder him, pretending that he was a robber. To get over this, it was decided that any domestic animal, such as a cat or a dog, present at the time might bear witness. If the animal, on being questioned, satisfied the court that his master had acted in good faith, the killing was held to be justified. There are not many instances of acquittal.

What Happened at Kut.
Speaking at Newport, England, at a fête organized by the Comrades of the Great War, Gen. Sir Charles Townsend said that he wished he could live long enough to see what history would have to say about the defence of Kut. He was ordered to go forward the case against the men. Instead of having 13,000 men at his disposal he should have had 113,000. He had warned the authorities of what might happen if he was asked to go on with only a limited number of effectives, but after having given the warning his duty was done. Any orders he received afterward had to be carried out. With a sufficient number of men he could have guaranteed not only to take Bagdad, but also to hold it. The Turkish army could have been thrown into the river. He very nearly accomplished that as it was, but under the circumstances which hampered him, if Bagdad had been taken it would have had to be evacuated the next day. He had found almost as many enemies when he came home as he had beaten in the field. He decided to halt at that place (Kut) to give the Government time to send out more troops from overseas, but without the necessary number of troops he was forced to surrender. Owing to starvation men were dying at the rate of 25 a day, dying of hunger, but at the same time, he remarked proudly: "I did not surrender even then until I was ordered to do so, and told that no relief could be sent to me."

Old English and Middle English.
The "Old English" period, as generally understood, ended about 1150, the "Middle English" period about 1500, when the period of "Modern English" began. The term "Old English" is popularly applied to the language of the Anglo-Saxons, and the term "Middle English" is often used vaguely for the language of the Middle Ages, or for the language of the early Middle Ages.

Trapper And Guide Found In Camp

Word has been received that Robert Hunter of Parker's Ridge, and a companion, located Henry Braithwaite trapper and guide, of Frederickton, after a search on which they started last Tuesday. "Uncle" Henry was found at the first camp called Hunter's camp. The snow was too deep for him to attend to his traps and he was sticking close to camp in the best of health and enjoying himself.

Mr. Braithwaite was eighty years old in last January and probably the oldest professional guide and trapper in active service on the continent of America. His relatives came some time ago, but their fears were groundless. He will come out of the woods in about a fortnight. The camp in which he was in is some twenty-six miles from Holtville. Two years ago while in the woods trapping, Mr. Braithwaite had a severe attack of pneumonia and had to treat himself as no one was near him. His prolonged absence this season made his relatives think that a similar misfortune had overtaken him.



THE FOREIGN EXCHANGE SITUATION

There are no undoubted signs pointing to an early and substantial recovery in the position of Sterling Exchange which lead us to the conviction that before the spring of 1921 Sterling Exchange will again be established at practically normal, pre-war levels. New York Funds will automatically move in sympathy with this anticipated process of readjustment in Sterling Exchange.
Great Britain's ready response not only to the call of her European Allies, recently in desperate straits but also to that of enemy countries in similar stricken plight, has left that great international trader in unique position to retain her command of world commerce and finance; and the rapid recovery which already has been effected in Sterling Exchange, must be accepted as a definite indication of anticipated further recovery in the volume of Great Britain's export business, which, in the last analysis, is the crux of the whole exchange situation.
Canada's foreign trade position, on balance, is all that we might confidently wish it to be; and with the expected recovery in Sterling Exchange, and the consequent reduction in Great Britain's financial obligations to the Dominion, the recovery of New York Funds will assuredly keep pace with that of Sterling Exchange.
When Sterling Exchange again is approximately at normal, it may be said that the last of after-the-war problems will have disappeared, with the world once more engaged upon the routine constructive efforts characteristic of peace days.

The subscription to the forward movement thank offering thus far reported in the presbytery amounts to \$25,426 which is 125 per cent over the \$20,340 reported in the previous year.

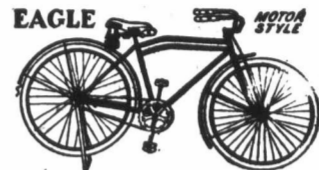

MUSICAL TALKS

By C. C. Laughier, Mus. Bac. Bowmanville.

Bach and Handel were the greatest musicians of the day. In some respects they were similar to each other and in others very much different. They were born in the same country. Bach married twice having 20 children born to him. Handel never married. Bach was born in a family that was said to be the most musical known in history. Handel was born to a family that was not musical at all. Bach remained in Germany and was devoted to home life. Handel travelled much and finally made England his home. Both Bach and Handel in later life became blind.

Bach J. S. Bach was a great representative of a wonderful family of musicians. He not only had a long line of musical ancestors himself, but he is also said to have been the direct ancestor of about 60 well-known organists and composers of Germany in the town where the Bach's lived they were known as the town musicians. They held their family meetings exchanging musical knowledge and gave musical performances.

Johan Sebastian Bach was born at Eisenach March 21, 1685. He became a pupil of his brother, but he soon absorbed all of the teacher's knowledge and still longed for more. Christoph, the older brother, has been accused of jealousy and kept from J. S. the fine collection of manuscript organ music which he owned and which Sebastian longed most ardently to study. So great was the boy's eagerness to possess the music,

that he got hold of it by stealth at night and copied it all by moonlight, only to have it destroyed by his stern elder brother when discovered. This copying took 6 months and the strain on his eyes caused, it is said to have resulted in the blindness which came upon him later in life. In 1703 Bach was appointed Violinist in the court Orchestra of Prince Johan Ernst of Helder. He was appointed organist of the new church at Arnstadt. In 1706 he applied for and obtained the position of organist at the Church of St. Blasius at the salary of \$35 a year together with certain quantities of corn, wood and fish, to be delivered without charge at his door. Upon this salary he was able to marry.

While at Weimar as Court Organist to the Grand Duke, Bach became not only the finest Organist of his time, but the greatest composer for the Organ the world has ever known. In 1717 Bach accepted the position offered by Prince Leopold of Anhalt as conductor and director of his chamber music. While at Carlsbad, on one of his trips with Prince Leopold, Bach's wife died very suddenly no news could be gotten to him and on his return he found her buried. Bach was left with a family of 4 children but about 18 months after married Anna Wulkin, a young woman of 21, a soprano singer. In 1723 Bach was appointed Cantor, a position he held until his death. In 1747, after repeated invitations, Bach visited King Frederick the Great, at Potsdam. He was received by the king with the greatest courtesy, was taken through the palace, where he played on Frederick's collection of pianos, about 15 in number. Bach was also invited to play on all the principal organs of the city and shown all the sights. About

one year before his death Bach's eyesight began to fail, and after two operations became totally blind. He died on July 25, 1750, at the age of 65. Bach was an able performer on stringed instruments and wrote much orchestral music, and as one writer says of him: "That without Sebastian Bach and his matchless studies for the piano, Organ and Orchestra, we could not have had the varied musical development in sonata and symphony from the great masters that followed." No one man has left so deep a mark on the history of music nor has exerted so strong and far-reaching an influence upon the subsequent development of the art as he. Sebastian Bach is the great source and fountain head from whom well nigh all that is best and most enduring on modern music has been derived. Bach's works include Oratorios and instrumental work for all solo instruments also many Cantatas and Chorales, etc.

Handel One of the world's most gifted musicians, born at Halle, Iqwer Saxony, of a family that possessed no musical talent. His father was a Surgeon-barber and was 63 years of age when his son was born. George was to be trained in law, consequently the father discouraged the early signs of an aptitude for music, even keeping him from school for fear of learning the musical scale, and for bidding the visits to the homes where music might be, yet during this time he was practicing upon the harpsichord in secret. A little later the father had an occasion to visit the Duke of Saxe-Weissenfels; little George begged of his father to take him along. The Duke was a great patron of music and young George having been specially selected as the piano accompanist the Duke at his wonderful talent. The Duke expressed to the older Handel and urged to encourage such extraordinary

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ary genius. George was therefore placed under the organist Zachare for instruction. George made fine progress studying Singing, Organ Clavier, Violin and all the other instruments used in Orchestral playing. When eleven years of age he composed several numbers that showed great skill and feeling. He continued his studies, using the Organ as his favorite instrument, for he was also great on improvising. In 1698 he went to Berlin. He entered the University to study law, thus carrying out his father's wish, but his natural inclination conquered for music was his passion. He visited Italy and travelled much. He returned to Germany in 1710, was appointed chapel master and accepted it on condition that he be granted leave of absence for one year to visit England. In London he produced his opera "Rinaldo" and he appeared at the theatre night after night for weeks. When he returned to Hanover he continually longed to get back to England where the opportunities and the musical people were plentiful. In 1712 he again obtained leave of absence on condition that he return in a reasonable time, but only as a visitor did he ever return to his native land again. Handel was appointed Musical Director of the Royal Academy of Music, London. During this period Bononcini was brought over from Germany to oppose Handel. These circumstances ultimately led to the dissolution of the society.

In 1733, broken financially and all but in health, a stroke of paralysis lamed one of his hands, but in a few months was restored to partial good health. He now set to writing Oratorios of which "The Messiah" is credited as his masterpiece. In 1753 Handel was stricken with blindness and he continued to write successful compositions until he died at a performance of "The Messiah" on April 6th, 1759. He was then eighty

ed with a deadly faintness and never again left his bed, he died April 14. Handel was buried in Westminster Abbey before a vast concourse of people of all ranks. Handel was tall and robust but his movements were somewhat clumsy, his features were animated and dignified. He was very outspoken and occasionally his temper got the best of him. He was naturally a wit yet he was sincerely devout, and had a high sense of honor, and his fidelity to his mother was beautiful. He was generous to all institutions, always ready to offer help. His life may be divided into three parts, from 1685 to 1720 was preparatory, from that year until 1737 he was devoted to opera, and from then until his death he was occupied with his real life work, his Oratorio. Handel composed the great "Messiah" in 21 days and it is recognized as the greatest work in Oratorio. Handel said of the Hallelujah Chorus, "I did think I did see all heaven before me and the great God himself" for the tears fell upon the paper as he wrote. The Messiah was given in Dublin in the year 1742, for he dedicated this great work to the Irish people. The Messiah was next given in London in 1743 and the audience was quite carried away with its beauty and when the Hallelujah chorus began with the "For the Lord God Almighty, King of Heaven they all, the King included, sprang to their feet and remained standing until the chorus ended. This incident originated the custom of standing during this chorus.

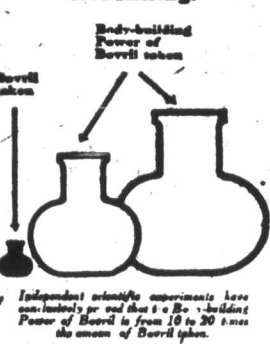

STUMBLING ON FORTUNE.

Scotch Sailor Went Through Many Vicissitudes, But "Struck It Rich."

Although some of the richest gold and silver mines in the world have been found by men who were prospecting for the precious metals, other mines have been discovered quite by accident in the most curious ways imaginable, says Spare Moments.

It was in 1867 that Donald Ross, a young Scottish sailor, and two companions deserted their sailing ship at San Francisco and started for the new gold fields on the mountains at the head of the Kern river. They failed to strike anything there, however, and so they crossed the passes into the Mojave Desert to try their luck there, only to again be unsuccessful. Then they went to Arizona, making their way to the source of the Little Colorado river. Here they met with fair success, but the apaches were on the warpath, and forced them to fly to the nearest fort, from whence they reached Hardyville.

They started again without compass, map, or trail to guide them across the 200 miles of scorching desert, for Owen's Lake. In their little search for water the prospectors' way was blocked by the edge of Death Valley. Their mule died, and the next day one of the men died, and the other became raving mad and fled into the desert. Ross, quite mad, wandered on until he fell unconscious. He was picked up by an Indian nurse who brought him back to life, and guided him to the San Joaquin Valley, pointed out the way to civilization. Within an hour of leaving his guides Ross found himself in the bed of a rocky stream. He walked half way through the icy waters, when he pressed his hands to his eyes, dreading that his reason was again giving way. He looked again. "Gold!" he shouted. And it was. Half the sands at his feet were gold. Within two months he had made \$300,000, and he arrived back in Glasgow some weeks before the sailing ship from which he had deserted.

Criminals Like Smart Clothes.

A world upside down, or, at any rate, not certainly right side up, offers continual surprises. Nothing is quite like it used to be and much is shockingly different. So you read that in the dock at the Central Criminal Court in London one frequently sees the latest fashions in men's and women's wear.

"It is," says a writer in the London Daily Mail, "a sign of the times. Twenty years ago the average criminal was ill-educated, ill-mannered, and slovenly in appearance. Today many thieves, men and women, are intelligent, punctilious in behaviour, and dressed in the height of fashion.

"Recent a notorious West End sharper, confident that the jury would acquit him, ordered his motor-car to be ready to take him home! It was a sad blow to his dignity and prestige when some one else ordered Black Maria for him.

"The modern criminal who infests the West End craves for the best of everything. He dines in the best restaurants, drinks the most expensive wines, smokes the choicest cigars, and makes love to pretty women. His clothes are faultless in material and style.

"And among the women 'crooks' are just as fastidious. Parisian gowns cover them; rare jewels adorn them; sparkling eyes and a ready wit carry them anywhere. They all spend money as freely as a war profiteer. One woman—a clever jewel thief—appeared in the dock wearing a dress for which she had paid 70 guineas. Her \$200 fur coat had been stolen by another thief, otherwise, no doubt, she would have worn that in court.

"Thieves have been making enormous profits. Furs, clothes, cigars, and jewels to the value of hundreds of thousands of pounds have been stolen during the year, and they have been sold again at practically their full market value. Receivers—the people to whom thieves dispose of their booty—willingly pay high prices for all kinds of wares. Apparel because, although vast quantities have been recovered by the police, the risk of detection is comparatively small and there is always a generous return on the money expended.

"Motor Cars, of which many hundreds have disappeared, have also a ready sale, but there is a greater danger in dealing with them, and consequently the thieves themselves get only about a tenth of the actual value."

Reduced Calibre.

A good story is told concerning Bishop Gore, whose outspokenness at the recent Church Congress created considerable comment.

Soon after his translation to his present episcopate a rather fresh young lady remarked to him at a social function that she supposed he must now be considered to be "quite a big gun."

"Not at all, my dear young lady," was the reply. "Not as big as I formerly was, in fact."

Then, seeing the puzzled look on the face of the fair one, he added quizzically:

"I was formerly a canon, you know."


