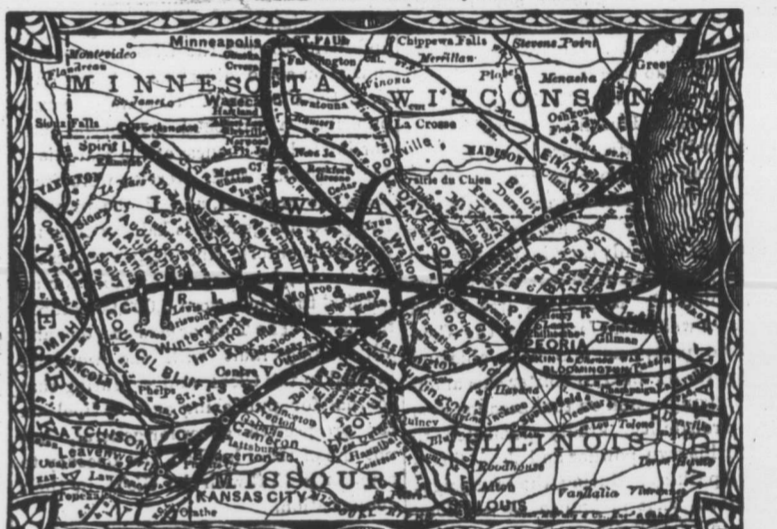

THE QUEEN'S HEALTH. A Remonstrance of Abolition from Washington Her Majesty said to be a Mild Believer in Spiritualism.

Washington, June 11.—A paper published here says that an ambassador of the great powers telegraphed to his sovereign on Wednesday last that the abdication of the Queen was impending. The reasons given for this course are her Majesty's fast falling health and increasing unwillingness and sometimes inability to perform duties incident to the government. It is said that the Queen is a mild believer in spiritualism. She thought that the spirit of her dead husband used to assist her in working out questions which perplexed and annoyed her and at her last visit to Baltimore she seemed to feel the actual presence of the dead Prince and talked as though he were by her side. This and other occurrences alarmed the Princess Beatrice greatly, and she insisted that some other member of the family should come down at once. Her condition is very serious.
