

## Ashfield.

OBITUARY. - Another landmark gone. It is my painful duty at this time to chronicle the demise of a much esteemed resident of this township, Mr John Sullivan, whose death occurred on the 19th ult., efter a very short illness. Short illness, tis true, furnishing another evidence of the uncertainty of human life. On the morning of that day deceased partook of breakfast and seemed to be partook of breakfast and seemed to be in his usual health; both he and all the members of his family were quite oblivious of the momentous change which was soon to follow, a change which deprived the family of its head and removed for ever a good neighbor and a genial warm hearted friend. Cramps, which constantly increased in severity, set in and became, at last alarming to the sufferer and so to his stricken family. Father Boubat, the parish priest, and Dr Carsi dy, were summoned to the bedaide with all possible expedition, and the melancholy fact was but too clear, that acute inilamation was doing its fell work, and that the case was a most serious one. It that the case was a most serious one. It is needless to say that the consolation of his church was administered to him, for this is the first concern of the Catholic church under such circumstances; but no medical science could avert the dissolution which was soon to take place, and John Sullivan breathed his last about twelve o'clock that same night.

A few words from me in regard to the character and life of the departed are but a small tribute to the memory of so good a man. He was among the early settlers in Ashfeld; hence among that class of men who have largely con-tributed to make this country what it is today. With great cheerfulness and animation, he used to relate incidents of early life in Ashfield, the many difficulties and hardships the people had then to contend with, and with all the plea-sure they enjoyed while hewing them-selves a home out of the dense for st. With what glow of pleasure did he of en refer to the love of neighbor which actuated every one at that time, and as an outcome of that great virtue, how cheerfully each one helped the other. It is true that in some instances, as the country advances and individual circumcountry advances and individual circumstances change, rivalry and envy displace that admirable disposition, love of one's neighbor; but no such change took place in the mind of the subject of these few sentences. Attention to the wants of others, liberality towards every good cause, rejoicing in the prosperity of his neighbor, were his characteristics to the wery last. In fact his soul was too pure to entertain unworth motives or prompt. to entertain unworth motives or prompt him to perform an unworthy actions, as

Last summer he finished a commodious brick house, no doubt expecting to enjoy its comforts for some years to come, for he was yet in his 59th year; but forcibly the line which we so often wrote in our copies in former days, comes to mind, "Man proposes but God disposes." In his demise the church in Ashfield has lost a good friend and liberal supporter; but it is hoped that he enjoys to-day the the fruits of his liberality, "Bread cast on the waters." Father Boubat cele-brated the Requiem Mass on the funeral occasion in the presence of a large assembly composed both of Catholica and Protestants; but the majority were excluded ewing to the wapt of room. One hundred and fitty vehicles formed a part of the funeral procession, and not-withstanding the suddenness of the occasion the attendance was very large, marking in some degree the estimation in which the deceased was held. The scene in the cemetry was very affecting; both priest and people were visibly over-come by emotions of deep serrow on consigning the remains to their last resting place, and fervently was the prayer ut-tered, and fervently will it coatinue to be uttered and thought, for his memory will long remain green in the mind of his acquaintances. 

## Household Hints.

SPONGE CAKE. - This is an excellent plain sponge cake for charlotte russe or triffles. Beat four eggs very lightly, the whites and yokes together; add cups of granulated sugar, the juice of a lemon and a little salt; add, putting in a little at a time, one cup of flour and finally another with which two spoonfuls or good baking powder has been mixed by sifting, and finally a cup of boiling water. Do not put in any more flour. Bake in a moderately quick oven in shallow pans.

BATTER PUDDING .- Beat the yokes of nine eggs with twelve tablespoonfuls of of flour. Add a quart of milk gradually and finally beat into the batter th whites of nine eggs beaten to a stiff When this mixture is smooth turn it into

STRAWBERRY SAUCE. - Beat to a cream half a cup of butter, add gradually two cups of powdered sugar and finally a large cup of strawberrys which have been thoroughly mashed. This is a delicious sauce for batter puddings, for popovers, and other delicate hot puddings. Strawberry sauce No. 2.—Set a bowl of strawberrys well sweetened in the sun or a cool oven till they are near by covered with juice. Pour this off and use as a sauce with strawberry short-

GRAHAM BREAD. - A correspondent asks for receipes for graham bread. give one tried receipe and would like others.
