Atrocious Crime.

Hamilton, May 16.—The police received information to-day which may possibly lead to the disclosure of one of the most atrocious crimes in the annals of Ontario, and which may result in revelations revealing a chain

of murders to prevent rightful heirs from obtaining possession of valuable estates in England.

Twenty years ago the body of Dr. James Douglas, an army surgeon, was found in the Thames River, a short distance from London, Ont. At the request a verdict of death by drowning was returned.

To-day the local police were informed that a prominent man in London sat on the bank of the river and watched two men row up and lift the body of Dr. Douglas from the bottom of the boat and throw it into the water.

For a number of reasons the man who sat on the bank did not tell what

he had seen to the authorities, but some time ago he spoke of it to a friend.

It is charged that the motive for the crime was to get possession of papers Dr. Douglas had that would have given a valuable estate in the Old Country to people who are now residing here. All the information the

police will divulge about their informant is that the party claims he can show proofs of direct descentancy from one of the oldest houses in England and that he is the rightful heir to the estate.

The New Red Cross Liner Stephano

A description of the new Red Cross liner Stephano has been received in the city. The vessel was named by Mrs. A. W. Taylor, of Perth. She has three steel decks, extending fore and aft, and a promenade deck from foremast aft. Special facilities have been provided for loading through hatches and side cargo ports by means of double derricks and winches. The passenger accommodation is on two decks, and is arranged for about 180 first class in cabins de luxe, and in two berth-rooms and 60 second class. The dining room, extend the full breadth of the vessel. It is tastefully panelled in oak and tapestry, and the roof is finished in ornamental Tyne-cast canvas. A spacious hall and music room occupy the fore part of the sheltered deck house. These are lighted by large rectangular windows and an ornamental skylight. The machinery, which has been constructed by Messrs. David Rowan & Co., Glasgow, consists of triple expansion engines, with steam from four high pressure boilers. The construction of hull and machinery has been carried out under the supervision of the owners' consulting engineers, Messrs. G. S. Goodwin & Co., Liverpool.

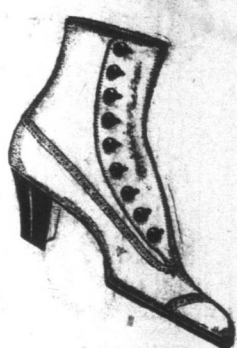
