New York, Jan. 31.-Police Com issioner Rhinelander Waldo's annual report to Mayor Gaynor, made public Saturday at police headquarters, shows that, while the police in the year that ended Dec. 31 last arrested 125 persons charged with mur der, only 13 of these persons were convicted, and as yet not one of them 148 murders committed in the city in the year, for which 125 persons were arrested. Seven committed sui




