



Bourassa Calls for Repeal of Navy Law.

Montreal, Feb. 2.—In a signed article which occupied a large part of the front page of Le Devoir, this afternoon, Henri Bourassa, the Nationalist chieftain, calls on Premier Borden to repeal the Laurier naval law and takes him to task for not having taken the matter up before now. His argument is that Lord Bessborough in his book "The Betrayal" has declared the British navy to be in a badly disorganized condition, and that, therefore, Canadian people should not have anything to do with it. He says that the only course to be followed is the repeal of the law. "Why does the Federal Government and the majority which supports it hesitate to repeal this law?" He concludes: "The election of the Premier himself, the verdict of September 21st, condemned the naval law no less than the Reciprocity agreement. If the treaty had been signed, would the Government have hesitated in demanding its annulment? What does it fear, then, in repealing this absurd law which no one wanted—sincere Imperialists no more than ardent Nationalists."



The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON

"The hurried restless pace at which we live, each day filled to the brim with things which are hardly as important as we think them, and which have cost us the old, rich hours of leisurely thought and inaction."

—Agnes Repplier.

In the world of science and invention there are many lost arts. For instance, the other day an antiquarian showed me a beautiful vase of ruby glass, in which the colors had been colored all the way through. The art of doing this has been completely lost. Nowadays, glass is merely colored on both sides. Again, everyone knows that the art of making the fascinating, old-fashioned lustre ware has long since slipped from the minds of men into impenetrable oblivion.

Now it seems to me that in the world of living, there are also many lost arts. And the chief of them is the art of having time.

This is pre-eminently an age of time saving devices. And yet it is an age of time starvation. Why is it? There is no room for doubt that our ancestors had more time than we for many good things. If you have any skepticism on that subject, look up a packet of your grandmother's letters. Or, if you don't keep such things, accept my assurance that, if she were like her contemporaries, those letters were many pages long and probably crossed. In an old trunk in the garret, we have my grandmother's diary. It is written in a fine handwriting and a year of it occupies a good sized volume. And yet my grandmother was the mother of four children and the hard worked wife of an underpaid Methodist minister who, according to the laws of the Church, changed parishes every year or two.

Look at the books people used to read. Compare a novel of Dickens, Scott or Thackeray in length with one of our modern novels. Go back a little further and glance at Clarissa Harlowe in seven volumes or Tom Jones in six.

Think of the visits people used to pay. In our grandmother's day, a visit cut shorter than a week would

have been thought almost an insult, and in Jane Austen's works, the heroines and their friends think nothing of a six weeks' visit.

Compare all this with the customs of to-day. Our letters are notes, our diaries—in the rare cases in which any are kept—are line-a-day books, our reading is mostly magazines and our visits are chiefly "week-ends."

And yet the twentieth century is the age of time saving devices. There's the telephone, the limited express, the automobile, predigested housekeeping, the fountain pen, and a thousand other devices to save us seconds or hours, many of which have become such an accustomed part of our living that we scarcely recognize them as time savers.

Again I ask, why is it that with all these devices to save time, we still seem to have so much less of that precious commodity than our grandmothers did?

I have an answer to my question. I don't know that it will appeal to you, but it is the only answer I have been able to formulate after very much thought on this subject.

It seems to me that this generation is just like a man whose income has increased at a rapid rate and, who has felt so delighted and expansive at this increase, that he has allowed his wants and his expenditures to increase just about twice as fast.

For every hour we've saved, we've tried to use two. Grandmother made soap and her mother spun the wool to make the family clothes. The woman of to-day does neither and should save that much more time. Instead she uses up that time and much more in extra burdens which she imposes upon herself. She has bread and butter plates to wash and three courses to prepare and clear away at dinner, and many other things to do, which grandmother never thought of.

That is but one example of the way in which we habitually overspend a continually increasing income. Dickens makes one of his characters say something to the effect that if a man has an income of two pounds and spends one pound nineteen shillings, he is rich, but if he has an income of four pounds and spends four pounds, one shilling, he is poor and unhappy.

It seems to me that some of the discontent and restlessness of this generation, of which we hear so much, may be due to the fact that it never lives within its time income.

A Rich Field For Investigation

On Wednesday next, St. Valentine's day, the Legislature will meet for the despatch of business.

There is a change in the membership of both branches. The Legislative Council has lost the ability, the experience and the geniality of the late Hon. D. J. Greene. The late Councillor was in many ways a free lance. His position has been taken by a keen supporter and partisan of the present Administration. A change of a somewhat similar nature has taken place in the personnel of the House of Assembly. Mr. Edward Davy passed to his rest at the end of the session of last year, and his place has been taken by Mr. Le Focure, whose candidature for the Burn District was unopposed at the bye-election last fall. This gives an additional supporter to the Government on the floors of the House of Assembly. This is of no importance whatever, as everybody realizes that the standing of the Government in the Island has been undermined by their carnival of grab and extravagance. There has never been an administration in charge of the affairs of the Colony which has directed so much of its energy to divide patronage and fees among its supporters and which has mixed up the private advantage of members of the party with public business.

Second Hand Govt. Cable.

The editor of the Chronicle yesterday essayed a defence of the Government's second hand cable, shipped to Gaultois by the Portia. In answer to the strictures of our morning contemporary we stated that the cable was

the "bunniest" thing in cables we ever had seen, and we adhere to the assertion. We would put the same question to Mr. McGrath as we put to his brother editor, Mr. Robinson, "Did he see the cable?" We opine he did not, in fact we know he did not; therefore, what does he know about it, anyway? As a joker, who read the Chronicle's article yesterday, remarked, "That the cable is about as useful to the Government as P. T. McGrath's book is to the country." This pretty nicely sums up the value of the Government's latest "bargain" in "second-hands," and the Plenicians have already received the added title from several of the "Second-Hand Government."

Not a Bad Batch.

The following batch of libel suits have been instituted as a result of the late civic elections in Montreal:—
1.—The majority and aldermanic candidates have thrown caution to the wind, and as a result Marcell has two actions, each claiming \$50,000, for alleged libel, one against Lavallee and one against La Presse; Editor Fournier is suing Lavallee and La Patrie for \$15,000 each; ex-Ald. Giroux is after the Star for \$10,000, because of a cartoon; Trenholme, candidate for Council, is suing an opponent for \$10,000, and it is reported that Mayor Guerin will claim \$5,000 from La Presse.

Giroux is the recognized leader of the "23," and the biggest point brought against him in a charge that he is the owner of premises for years used for disorderly purposes."

Hurt at Messrs. Shea & Co's.

While taking freight from Shea & Co's sheds to-day a young man who acts as steamer for McCarthy Bros. had his knee dislocated. As he worked, a pile of sacks toppled over and struck him, throwing him to the ground. The handle of the truck he was using was broken by the weight. The injured man was taken to a doctor and treated, and was then driven home.

A warm debate took place over a proposal of Councillor Ryan to increase the salaries of Messrs. Focure, Farrell increased to \$50 and \$45 respectively. The Mayor said that "minutes" would not permit doing just now. Councillor Ryan thought that the increase might come from estimates of the Water Department. Councillor Mullaly said that amounted to the same thing, as money all came from the same purse. If these men were to get the increments they would be seeking it, and Council had decided yesterday no increase would be granted. Councillor Myrick thought that both plaintiffs were deserving of this increase. He believed that Councillor Mullaly opposed the resolution out of ill feeling towards an employee. After a stormy altercation between last two speakers, Councillor Ching suggested that only Parroth's salary be increased, as he was an exceptionally competent official. (N. T. A. Journal.)

We regret that owing to ill-health the Rev. Bro. Ryan was compelled to resign his position on the N. T. A. Executive, Jan. 15th, and to leave for Ireland on the Carthaginian a few days later.

No one was prouder to be a member of the N. T. Assn., no one was more in sympathy with its work, and no one endeavoured more to promote its interests from its earliest days right up to the present time.

Rev. Bro. Ryan, for twenty years a most painstaking and devoted teacher in the schools at St. Patrick's Hall, was very greatly appreciated and most highly honoured by pupils and teachers alike.

On the eve of his departure the Executive of the N. T. A. presented the rev. gentleman with an address—a testimonial of the great esteem in which he and his services to the cause of education were held by them.

Rev. Bro. Ryan in an appreciative reply paid very high compliments to the promoters and work of the N.T.A. Teachers' Association.

Let us all hope that his native air may be the means of bringing about a speedy recovery, and that very soon we shall find him at his usual post in his wonted health.

On the same Carthaginian there went Arthur Barnes, Esq., who has the special charge of the training of the pupil teachers for C. of E. Institutions. Mr. Barnes, a constant student, an experienced teacher, having a thorough knowledge of conditions here and in the United States, has now gone to England and Germany to study conditions and methods over there.

The Superintendent of the C. of E. Education is to be congratulated on this new departure; we believe that he has struck the best idea since the institution of the C. of Higher Education.

May he keep it and further develop it.

The greatest assets of a colony are not its railways, roads and public institutions, but its children. And no question is more important than that they should have the opportunity to be trained physically, morally, and intellectually, in such a manner that they may have the highest possible value in their relation to the state.

This cannot be accomplished apart from well-trained, highly-educated, and experienced teachers. Therefore, we advocate the establishing of a good Normal School, where teachers may receive special instruction, obtain special Diploma, and thus go forth to their work with such a knowledge and special qualification that they may be regarded in their profession as the equal of the lawyer, doctor, or other professional.

Churchill Says Navy Shall Be Supreme.

Special to Evening Telegram.
GLASGOW, To-Day.
 The speech delivered by Churchill yesterday at a luncheon of the Clyde Navigation Trust was received with enthusiasm. After referring to the naval resources of the Clyde, Churchill said it was superior to that of any other power. The latest 13.5 guns were some of the finest weapons which Britain possessed. He believed the Navy was in a high state of preparedness for a sudden call. The rumors of unpreparedness last year were absolutely baseless, and he hoped the creation of a navy which was already working would render such rumors impossible. Continuing, Churchill affirmed that Britain never had any thought of aggression, but attributed such a thought to other powers. There was, however, this difference between British naval power and that of a great friendly Empire which he trusted would remain a great friendly Empire, viz., Germany, that the British navy was necessary, while from some points of view the German navy was in the nature of a luxury. What was existence to us was expansion to them. We could not if we wished menace the peace of a single hamlet, but on the other hand the whole fortunes of our race and Empire, the whole treasure accumulated by centuries of sacrifice and achievement would perish, would be utterly swept away, if our naval supremacy were in danger. The Government had resolved to maintain the naval supremacy which the country enjoyed. There was no need of raising excited panics or disparaging the resources of the country. They might face situations with great composure. At every point, in every detail, they had it well in hand. There was no need of any anxiety as to our shipbuilding capacity, and it was sufficient to say that it was unequalled in the world. There was no chance of our being overtaken in naval construction while money for shipbuilding was left, and no occasion for alarm in regard to the personnel. There were 15,500 trained long service men, and also a naval reserve, of which more use would be made in future. Whatever might happen abroad there would be no whining here. No signals of distress, no cries for help would go up, we would face the future without fear or arrogance, but with a solid and inflexible determination. Britain, said Churchill, will be the first power to welcome a retardation or slackening of naval rivalries. She would meet any such slackening not with words, but with deeds. If there were to be an increase on the Continent she would have no difficulty in meeting it. Even if naval competition became more acute, Britain could not only increase the number of her ships but also the ratio of her naval strength to that of other great naval powers. Thus Britain's margin of superiority would become larger and not smaller as the strain became greater and greater. Let them build their great dock on the Clyde, the Government would provide no lack of great vessels to fill it. Glasgow would know she was aiding and supporting the British Navy, which enabled the nation to pursue her path through the world, seeking no quarrel and fearing none.

Before being purchased by her present owners she ran between ports in Italy and Mexico. She is lit by electricity, we hear, and is equipped with every modern improvement.

Church Union by 8 to 1.

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN REPORTS.
Overwhelming Majority Cast in Favor of Amalgamation—North River, N.S., Votes 163 For and 0 Against.


By an overwhelming majority the proposed union of the Methodist, Presbyterian, and Congregational Churches of Canada, is favored according to the vote taken so far by the different Presbyterian congregations. In the first batch of reports received, only three churches voted against the union, while those favoring the amalgamation run the majority up to 1296.

The members of Bayfield Church voted against union by 38 ballots to 29. Woodstock Church in New Brunswick voted as opposed, and also did Knox Church in St. Catharines, but the latter congregation has decided to take another vote.

It is thought that, on a whole, the church members will follow the advice of the pastors, who are explaining the proposed basis of union. The Presbyterians of the Dominion voted by a considerable majority in favor of union.

BOSTON.



Boston is a large city where all the culture of the country heads in and ties up for repairs. There is more square inch in Boston than anywhere else in the civilized world, the principal crops under cultivation being the fine arts and the coarse baked bean. They cultivate a bean in Boston which is rapidly retiring the ordinary house bean from circulation, as it is built on the order of the Early Rose potato and is generally served with the champagne and nuts on the wasty courses. It is a very difficult thing for a man who is not on speaking terms with the dead languages and the overhead dimensions of all the poetry from the Song of Solomon to "Female of the Species" to get around Boston without committing a solecism, and in Boston this is looked upon as a greater crime than committing petty larceny on somebody's suitcase. It is no uncommon thing to hear a Boston barber speak of Hank Ibsen as if he had drawn that gentleman to school on his sled, and there isn't a cab driver in the city who can't repeat Marc Antony's oration over the remnants of J. Caesar during the process of making change. There is a great deal of high society in Boston, and the higher it is the faster it locates on the Back Bay, where there is plenty of pure air and pre-digested grammar. Nobody can float around the drawing rooms of Boston in company with such expressions as "I seen him" or "these kind" without being sat upon by an outraged society or a coroner's jury. The streets of Boston are full of jokers, and nobody pretends to get around the suburbs without a surveying outfit and a mariner's compass. The inhabitants live a simple and retired life, subsisting mainly on the uncomplicated codfish and the memory of Bunker Hill.

Murders, 148; Convictions, 13.

New York, Jan. 31.—Police Commissioner Rhinelander Waldo's annual report to Mayor Gaynor, made public Saturday at police headquarters, shows that, while the police in the year that ended Dec. 31, last arrested 125 persons charged with murder, only 13 of these persons were convicted, and as yet not one of them has been put to death. There were 148 murders committed in the city in the year, for which 125 persons were arrested. Seven committed suicide.

In the same period sentence has been suspended and convicted men freed by judges in 611 cases of felony, 11,370 of misdemeanor, 1,863 cases of juvenile delinquency, or a total of 13,844 suspended sentences, as is shown in the tables submitted to the Mayor by Commissioner Waldo.

"In one case," the Commissioner says in his report, "a young man arrested three times within eight weeks in the act of burglary, in the first instance with a revolver in his possession. In the first two cases he was found guilty and paroled. In the third case he was sentenced to the house of refuge.

"One man who was convicted of a most revolting murder, after a lapse of 20 months, has not yet been executed.

"A man who forcibly entered the apartment occupied by an aged broker and murdered his victim was sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment.

"A policeman arrested a man at night who was driving away with a horse and cab which did not belong to him. The policeman was obliged to fire several shots in the air before he could make the fugitive stop. He charged him with grand larceny. The magistrate directed that the charge be changed to one of disorderly conduct and fined the man \$5.

"In one instance a magistrate refused a warrant on the ground that the evidence had been obtained by a policeman who merely saw the act by looking through a window, but was not in the room.

"In almost all other cases where roulette wheels and other gambling apparatus have been seized in raids, court orders were obtained requiring the returning of the property to the gamblers."

A gas company in Pennsylvania is drilling a well that will be the deepest ever sunk in the State. The well is being sunk on a farm between McDonald and Candor in Washington County. It will be drilled to a depth of 6,000 feet, the company desiring to find out what is in the earth at that depth. It will take more than a year to complete the sinking of the well.



A Terrible Railway Wreck

Many Well Known Men Killed in End Collision in Illinois—Severely Injured—Famous Panama Limited Illinois Central Florida Flyer—ing 50 Miles an Hour, Crashes

Centerville, Ills., Jan. 22.—J. T. Harahan, a former president of the Illinois Central Railway; F. O. Melcher, second vice-president of the Rock Island Railway, and two others were killed at one o'clock this morning when the "Seminole Limited" of the Illinois Central Railway, running fifty miles an hour, crashed into the rear of passenger train No. 25, which was taking water at Kimmswamy, 10 miles north of here.

In addition to Mr. Harahan and Melcher, E. B. Peirce, general manager of the Rock Island, and E. F. Wright, son of former secretary-war, Luke E. Wright, of Memphis, Tenn., are numbered among the twenty passengers were more or less seriously injured.

Harahan, Melcher, Peirce and Wright were asleep in their room aboard Mr. Melcher's motor car, which was attached to the rear of train No. 25.

The engine of the heavy ploughed straight through Mr. Melcher's car and jammed into a man coach directly ahead before coming to a stop. The terrific impact of the collision drove brake-lockets No. 25 two hundred feet down right of way.

Cries of more than a score of injured arose above the hissing steam from the splintered wreckage. Trainsmen fought desperately to reach those who had been Mr. Melcher's car. The engine's fireman of the limited, only slightly injured, were removed first, taking them out rescuers stumbled the bodies of Mr. Harahan and Melcher. The bodies of Mr. Peirce and Wright were found minutes later. All had been crushed in their berths without a chance of escape.

For more than two hours passengers from both trains and residents of the little town of Kimmswamy were to care for the injured before arriving from outside points.



Many Well Known Men Killed in Rear End Collision in Illinois—Scores are Injured—Famous 'Panama Limited,' Illinois Central Florida Flyer, Going 50 Miles an Hour, Crashes into Passenger Train.

Centralia, Ills., Jan. 22.—J. T. Harahan, a former president of the Illinois Central Railway; F. O. Melcher, second vice-president of the Rock Island Railway, and two others were killed at one o'clock this morning when the 'Seminole Limited,' on the Illinois Central Railway, running fifty miles an hour, crashed into the rear of passenger train No. 25, which was taking water at Kinmundy, thirty miles north of here.

In addition to Mr. Harahan and Mr. Melcher, E. B. Peirce, general solicitor of the Rock Island, and Eldridge F. Wright, son of former secretary of war, Luke E. Wright, of Memphis, Tenn., are numbered among the dead. Twenty passengers were more or less seriously injured.

Harahan, Melcher, Peirce and Wright were asleep in their state room aboard Mr. Melcher's private car, which was attached to the rear of train No. 25.

The cause of the wreck has not been explained, and trainmen seem reluctant to express an opinion. Both trains, however, were late. Train No. 25 was due at Kinmundy at 11:52

o'clock last night, but did not arrive until nearly one o'clock this morning. The limited, which does not stop at Kinmundy, was scheduled to pass through at 12:30 o'clock. It was running half an hour late.

Efforts to discover the flagman of train No. 25, who was sent back to flag the limited, were unavailing up to several hours after the wreck had occurred.

And ever following in her train Come two glad figures fair as she. One with his foot on vanquished pain. And one the foe of tyranny.


Where'er the sons of men are found. And hearts aspire and deeds are done. There Courage walks on holy ground With joy attained and Freedom won.

Rhodes Scholars in Many Lines

London, Feb. 2.—What becomes of young men who enjoy the Oxford scholarships that the late Cecil Rhodes, the "uncrowned King of Africa," provided? has often been asked. This week the answer came in the shape of an official tabulation of the careers of two hundred and fifty of these graduates, men who left Oxford between nineteen hundred and six and nineteen hundred and ten.

Of this total eighty-four took up educational work, sixty-six are lawyers, nineteen went into various kinds of religious work, thirteen into the German civil service, eleven are doctors of medicine, nine are classed as scientists, eight went into business, five into journalism, five into mining and engineering, three into agriculture, three in the German diplomatic service and two in the diplomatic service of the United States.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—Sir Wm. Mackenzie, Sir Donald Mann, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, C. M. Hays, and Hon. Frank Cochrane have had new honors heaped upon them. They have become honorary lieutenant colonels in Hon. Sam Hughes' forces. The reason is that they have consented to become members of the Minister of Militia's new Advisory Council on transportation and mobilization.

Col. Hughes in carrying out his reorganization of the Department is arranging for various Advisory Councils on the different branches of Military organization. The heads of the three big railway companies and the Minister of Railways have been requisitioned for the transportation and of the Minister's advisers.
