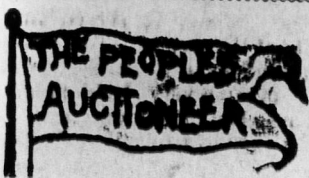

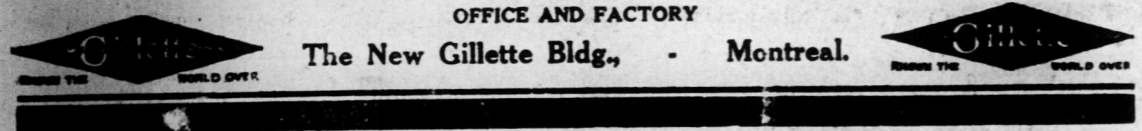

## What Kings Eat

By the courtesy of the secretary of the Geneva International Association of Hotel Employers, in Shaftesbury Ave., London, Eng., the writer was permitted to inspect their collection of menu cards, which is the largest collection of its kind in the world, and has never yet been described in print.

The collection numbers some 50,000 menus, which are kept in 60 enormous leather books. Two books contain the menu cards of the House of Hanover, dating from the reign of George IV. Previous to the reign of Queen Victoria the menu cards at Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle were written on plain foolscap paper by the head chef; only one copy was made out and laid beside the sovereign at dinner. The royal dinner in these days began with entree, followed by soup; then came a joint, and then fish and sweets. A favorite dish of George IV was boiled mutton, and it appears almost every day in the menu of his time.

When Queen Victoria came to the throne the menu cards were printed for the first time. They were headed with a gold crown, underneath which are the letters "V. R. and I." Poached eggs on toast and hashed mutton were very favorite dishes of Queen Victoria, and appear very often on the menu cards during her reign.

The items on the menu cards became much more numerous when King Edward came to the throne. Caviar, the real Russian article, has figured as the first item frequently on the royal menu cards since, and now is a very favorite royal dish. It is served at the royal table with black bread and lemon. It used to be served with toast. It costs about \$15 a pound.

The menu of the Derby Day dinner at Buckingham Palace is practically always the same, here it is Clear Turtle soup, whitebait, trout, quails, venison, lamb, ortolans, chicken, roast, asparagus, peaches, ices.

The best wines in the royal cellars are served on the occasion of the Derby dinner. These wines include: Garden Hook 1875, Sillery 1865, Claret Lafite 1875, Port 1812. These wines are almost of priceless value, and would fetch probably from \$100 to \$500 a bottle if sold in the open market.

On the occasion of some of the great banquets at Windsor Castle, when a foreign sovereign was a guest at the English court, the rare item, "Cygnets a la Windsor," appears on the menu, in plain language is roast swan. It is a favorite dish of the Kaiser.

On ordinary occasions the royal menu cards are plain white edged with gold, with the royal crown on top and the letters "V. R." underneath, but on the occasion of any special banquet the cards are elaborately designed and exquisitely hand painted.

The menu cards at the German court are nearly five times the size of the English Royal menus, and are headed with a picture of the exterior of the royal residence at Berlin. Two favorite dishes at the German court are salmon cutlets and jugged hare, and they appear in the menu more frequently than any other items.

The menu cards at the Russian court are printed in gold and are headed with the royal arms. The names are of course, in Russian characters, and a frequent item on the menu is beef-teak."

Apart from the royal menus, this collection contains menu cards of dinners and banquets in all parts of the world. For example, there is the menu card of a banquet given at a hotel in the Fiji Islands, dated June 24, 1895. It is printed on linen, and begins with "sharks' fins." Other items are "birds' nests" and snails.

The wine list contains "English stout and beer."

There is a very interesting card giving the list of dishes served at a banquet in Peking. It is written in Chinese characters on a leaf of some tree. Li Hung chang was present at the banquet, and it is supposed to cost \$15,000.

A strange history attached to one of the menu cards that came from Chicago. In one side of the card is a hole made by a bullet. At the dinner which was given in the hotel, a dispute arose among the diners and ended in a free fight, in which revolvers were used, and one of the diners was killed. The menu card in question was shot through and was afterward secured by one of the waiters. The waiter went to San Francisco shortly afterward and was drowned in the harbor. When his body was recovered the menu card was found in his pocket, and was subsequently sent to the Geneva Association.

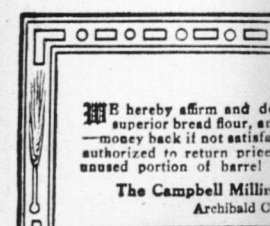

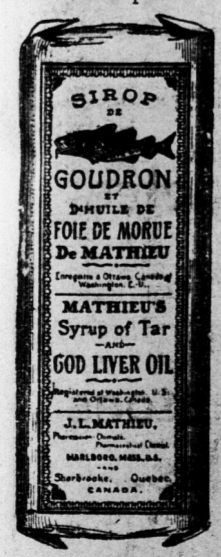

Special Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, Sept. 13.  
The War Office has issued a memorandum on the employment of air-craft in war. It points out that it cannot be doubted that airships and aeroplanes are invaluable in locating the enemy, and in obtaining information which otherwise could only be obtained by force, and that all the powers are expending money and energy in the development of an air service which is certain to have an important effect on the future of European wars. It deals with details, and instructions for the use of air craft during the coming manoeuvres. The memorandum, which emphasizes the fact that employment of these machines is quite experimental, points out that the present war in Tripoli, although it has given an impetus to aviation, has afforded no test because the Italians had the air to themselves.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 13.  
That Canada shall without delay proceed with the execution of a strong naval policy on the lines launched by Laurier, but further developed and expanded by the creation of an efficient Pacific unit, is British Columbia's expectation, according to Premier McBride, in McBride's opinion the Asiatic menace to Western Canada is much more serious than the German peril to England. He regards the German war scare as an exceedingly unfortunate and ill-advised exploitation. McBride says if the emergency arose and the Canadian Government voted thirty, forty or fifty millions of dollars to meet it, the people would approve of his action.

DRESDEN, Saxony, Sept. 13.  
The manoeuvres in Saxony of the German Imperial armies which began on Sept. 9th, ended to-day with victory for the invading army. The result indicates, in the opinion of military officers, the difficulty of conducting war with the German army presenting two fronts. Emperor William, who was chief umpire of the military operations, will now proceed to the naval manoeuvres in the North Sea. His Majesty will review a parade of the fleet off Heligoland on Monday.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.  
A cable from London says that after years of almost complete paralysis, Joseph Chamberlain, whose mind has remained alert until now, is sinking fast, and the end may come any day. During the last five weeks he has ceased to take any interest in political events, lying in his bed, mentally and physically helpless.

The United States Government is about to intervene at San Domingo. Warships will be dispatched at once to the island. Revolution has broken out which threatens foreign interests.

### Morris is Raging Like a Mad Bull.

Sir Edward Morris has completely lost his head, not that he had much in it to lose, but what little sense he had, left him at Bonne Bay. Like a mad bull he raged at us. He is completely demoralized by the exposures we had made of his lack of statesmanlike efforts and his resort to the petty tricks of the American politician. As John Alexander Robinson used to say in regard to him, there is a great gulf fixed between the partisan politician and the statesman, and Sir Edward Morris has been unable to bridge it. There are grains of truth unwittingly uttered amidst the monstrous mass of chaff he put off at Bonne Bay. We say unwittingly uttered, for it is evident that even at the time he first opened his mouth he had not enough wit to address the electors of Bonne Bay, for his opening words are incorrect. But St. Barbe had no faith in the Electors of the District of Bonne Bay instead of the Electors of the District of St. Barbe.

We propose to give Sir Edward the benefit of these grains of truth, not that he deserves it, but because they bring out the pith of his present unpopularity. He told the people of Bonne Bay, "You elect us not together for any special fitness on our part." &c. "I say we drew a very large draft on your faith in us, but you honoured the draft." This in part is true. But St. Barbe had no faith in him. The Tory party, however, never had any special fitness to rule the country. The country proved their unfitness again in 1894, when the Bank Crash brought their miracle to a close. They proved their unfitness again from 1897 to 1900 by their squandering of poor relief, huge timber grants on the Labrador, and the stripping of the country of its railway and telegraph assets, and were turned out ignominiously in 1900. The Tory party "drew a very large draft" on the faith of the country in them, and

the country "honoured the draft," but how badly the country found itself sold when it came to spending the draft.

History has repeated itself in regard to the Morris Administration; the country has completely lost the faith they placed in Sir Edward Morris and his administration in 1909. People now deplore that they did honour the draft Sir Edward Morris made on them. It is true they agree with another grain of truth uttered by Sir Edward and that is that "there never was a period in the history of the country when statesmen were required." That expressed precisely what the country feels. The country has found out from its three and a half years' trial of Morris that he is not a statesman, and they want Bond back again. They have tried Morris and found him wanting. They agree with John Alexander that there is a gulf fixed between a statesman and a politician, and they know now that Morris was not the "brains" of the Bond Administration, and that he cannot cross the gulf. His chief colleague is great only in obtaining big interests in timber limits. Morris is not even a politician, according to Morris. Here is Morris's opinion of Morris:

"Mr. Morison is not a politician, and I can best illustrate this when I tell you that in October 1902 he was prepared to contest the District of Trinity in the interest of the Bond Government if the Premier was prepared to give him a seat in his Cabinet and the portfolio of Minister of Justice. The Premier's refusal has converted Mr. Morison into an out and out Tory."

Morris, however, is a politician of the most pronounced type, and he has swallowed Morison and Morison has swallowed him. Morris did put him in the Executive and did make him Minister of Justice, and the country has been suffering from the combination ever since. Their administration was to be a business government, and they have shown their inability to run a bull's eye shop. There has been great giving-out to teachers. A body of office-seekers has been brought in to beque. Agricultural and other offices have been created for them. We venture to assert that there have been more offices made to try to satisfy greedy office-seekers during the past three years and a half than for a generation before that time. Politicians have been feathering their nests by plucking the public in a wholesale manner. The Morison scandal staggered even the Governor. Yet Morris has condoned and excused. Morris has shown an utter incapacity to finance the railway building economically; witness his flotation of a second loan, after making the country believe that the first loan would pay

for his branch railway projects.

Because we have exposed this incapacity and mismanagement, Sir Edward Morris made a most vicious attack on us at Bonne Bay. He pretended to be not disturbed by the exposures of his mal-administration, and gave the lie to his pretence by making his attack on us the most sensational feature of his speech and by his publishing it in the Daily News in such a form as is evidently meant for distribution in pamphlet form broadcast. He taunts us with defeat at the polls, yet he had on the platform as his candidate Mr. Mott, who has been defeated twice, as often as we have. He taunts us with being a paid editor, yet he had with him the man who became editor and proprietor of the Daily News by means of money subsidies from Mr. W. D. Reid, and who had the unrequered career set forth in evidence in the Daily News mortgage case. And Mr. Mott was Speaker of the House of Assembly at the time subsidies were made. He taunts us with receiving fees for work done for the Government, yet Mr. Mott is receiving by the influence of Sir Edward Morris more money a year than we receive for our work done for the Government. We go from the Government in fees during our whole connection with the Bond Administration, and he, Sir Edward, has received a hundred times more. He is vicious with us because we have criticized him, yet he exhibited Mr. Mott on the platform at the time he was denouncing us, although Mr. Mott published editorially of him the following:

"Morris never in all his life did anything beneficial to the working man. He is a trickster of the worst description. He sold the Liberal Party in 1898. He deserted the freemen who went on strike from Reid's steamers. He voted down the \$125. He is pulling thousands of dollars yearly from the taxpayers of this country. He boasts that he's got the West End in his pocket. He did the temperance people on their petition. He threw two native women out of the positions in the Lunatic Asylum and filled their places with aliens. Is it not time to let Boss Morris, &c., know that the people of St. John's are sick of them? Then come to the polls till your thousands and wipe them out of existence."

There is no doubt that to-day the whole country is sick of the Morris and Morison combine. People wanted to wipe them out this fall. But Morris reared to go to the polls this fall. He is in such a bad odour to-day that he had to put off the elections till the fall of next year, and he is moving heaven and earth in an effort to save himself by beginning his campaign fifteen months before the elections and hoping by lavish expenditure of public monies to keep the Government. But he feels the exposures we have made of his administration. Hence his special attack on us. We thank him for it. It is a most flattering testimonial of the success of our efforts, as we have cut his administration to the quick, and what remains is the happy despatch which the electors will not fail to administer when the General Elections come round.

### Another Libel Suit.

Acting on the instructions of the F. P. U., Messrs. Kent and McGrath issued a writ against the Chronicle to restrain the publication of the following statement yesterday:

"NOTES FROM FOGO."  
"The Coakrites have suffered a 'rude shock' since it was learned that 'some of those who put their money in the Union Trading Company' (meaning thereby the plaintiff Company) 'could not get it back and said stock' (meaning the shares of the said plaintiff Company) would not command fifty per cent. of their 'value when placed in the market.' 'rather pity those who have invested their hard earnings in such a wild 'nest scheme' (meaning thereby the undertaking of the plaintiff Company). The plaintiff Company claims \$10,000 for damage to its credit, reputation, trade and business."

### Board of Trade

**COMPLAIN OF BAIT SERVICE.**  
At the weekly meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade held yesterday, the matter of Absentee Landlords was again brought up for discussion; the Committee appointed to collect information on this subject, and will present their report as soon as possible.

It was reported to the Council that the S. S. "Fiona" had been again taken off the Bait Service for the past three weeks, and would probably be off for another week. The Council, on receiving writing to the Government strongly urging that the Bait Protective Service should not be left in abeyance for one day, and that whenever it is necessary to take the "Fiona" off another steamer should take her place. Three candidates were admitted to membership.

Neal was a man of commercial standing, a bona fide dealer in hay and feeds, and one that had already given the city satisfaction. Mr. Grant he did not know from a commercial viewpoint, and for this reason he was not prepared to support the motion that his tender be accepted.

Councillor Ryan held the same views as Councillor Mullaly. He was not prepared to support Councillor Myrick's motion. He did not know who Mr. Grant was, or what his standing in the community might be.

The Mayor thought the Council should accept the lowest tender, which had been the custom at all times. Mr. Grant, so far as he knew was a big importer of hay, supplying the lumber camps in winter, and if a guarantee were given, as to delivery, the Council should accept the offer.

Councillor Channing said it was unfair competition to the local dealers to have Mr. Grant or any other person who had such a large field, as the Mayor pointed out, tender. While he was prepared to save every cent possible for the city, he had yet to learn who Mr. Grant was, and to be convinced that the acceptance of his tender would be a saving. For these reasons he moved that the tender of Mr. G. Neal be accepted. The amendment to Councillor Myrick's motion was seconded by Councillor Ryan and carried, Councillors Myrick and Martin opposing.

### Cabmen's Tariff.

A deputation of the city cabmen attended, and several amendments to the present tariff were offered by Councillor Ryan.

Councillor Myrick, while not opposing the suggestions of Councillor Ryan, said the latter should have at least had courtesy enough to have the proposed amendments printed, so that the Councillors would be able to intelligently discuss them.

Councillor Ryan replied that the remarks of the last speaker came with poor grace, as for over a year the cabmen's tariff had been before the Council and nothing definite had been done. He (Councillor Ryan) had given notice in the ordinary way, and it was for the Council to act.

Councillor Martin agreed with Councillor Ryan, and held it was in order to have the proposed amendments considered.

Councillor Mullaly opposed the consideration of the proposed amendments on the ground that even if in order, the Board should have been supplied with copies, and not have them filed at them.

Mayor Ellis agreed with the last speaker, and asked Councillor Ryan to defer consideration until next meeting, the members to be supplied with copies in the meantime.

Councillor Ryan, while not disagreeing with what the Mayor suggested, believed ample time had been given the Board by the fact that he had given notice of motion at the previous meeting.

A heated argument between Councillors Ryan and Mullaly followed, in which the former charged the latter with cowardice and inconsistency. Councillor Mullaly retorted that he was not elected to teach "dunderheads" parliamentary etiquette, and it was about time that some people would try and adapt themselves to what was expected of them.

The interference of the Mayor brought the scene to a close, and the matter of discussing the amendments was deferred.

### The Union Salt Vessel.

The English vessel, Wm. Pritchett, arrived at Fogo on Saturday after a long voyage from Cadiz with a load of salt for the Fishermen's Protective Union which will be discharged at Fogo, Change Islands and Twillingate, at \$1.20 per hhd. to Union members. It was feared the vessel had been lost. The Wm. Pritchett will proceed to the Labrador Coast and load fish for Gibraltar.

We notice the Plaindealer of Saturday asserted that Mr. Coaker had been bluffing the Green Bay men by promising salt that never arrived, insinuating that the load of salt had never been ordered.

Councillor Martin asked for a light to be placed on Brien Street; will be considered.

Mr. J. H. Thomas Alandale Road, asked for water service; referred to Engineer.

Mr. D. M. Browning asked that repairs be made to hydrant at Richmond. The Engineer said all it was good for was garden sprinkling, and suggested that it be condemned.


Permission was granted P. Costigan to build annex to house; referred to Engineer.

Councillor Mullaly had a different opinion. He did not know if the city would save a cent, or lose a thousand dollars. He did know that George

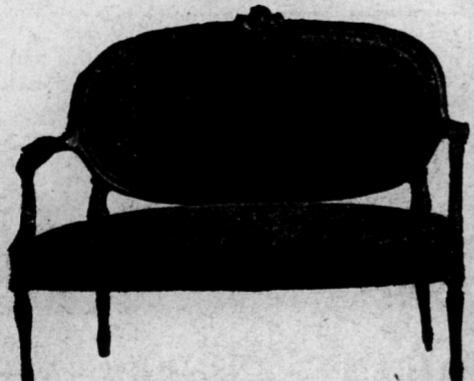

Dear Sir,—I notice in the daily papers an advertisement from the Agricultural Board calling off the Agricultural Fair here and other Districts this Fall. This is altogether against the will of the Harbour Main Agricultural Society, as a few Sundays ago a general meeting was held and decided to hold the Fair. The Government must be getting heartily ashamed of its Agricultural doings in the old farming district of Harbour Main to make such a cowardly and inglorious back-down after all the big things we have been promised from the Agricultural givings-out here by an army of Government heeled. Indeed, Mr. Editor, we were expecting great things from the big show this fall, but we are sadly disappointed.

We were joyfully expecting to behold on exhibition Messrs. Mallowney's and Hawco's pigs and broods, P. Hannon's ram and young lambs, and O'Toole's mule and foals; also the big potatoes, the stacks of peat and the three-bladed grass and numberless other things which were in course of preparation to exhibit. But, alas! we were again doomed to disappointment. Yes, I had almost forgotten the phantom of Parsley's ram but therein hangs a tale.

Mr. Parsley, a Liberal, was maliciously prosecuted for having broken the rules of the Society. A case was brought against him (so says a listener) and in a really and ideally Star Chamber manner he was convicted and fined. Others—Torjes—have evaded and broken the rules of the Society but their offences have been winked at. Did the holder of the Sable Island Pony strive to propagate its species? If so, how many baby mules are in Conception? Rather is the pony used to strut and drive around the different settlements day after day at the Government expense.

The busy dame rumor is grumbling loudly that the stock imported by the Government and intended to improve the general stock and breeds throughout the country has in numbers of cases been devoted to private ends only. Be that as it may the results of the Morris Agricultural Policy are barren and disappointing and nothing I could write shows this more forcibly and clearly than their inglorious back-down from holding the Fair after all the trouble we had gone to prepare for it. Even Messrs. Woodford and Murphy came here and held a public meeting to give us some pointers on farming but it appears all the crops

have withered except Murphy's timber crop for the Government wharves and bridges.

But, sir, there is a day of reckoning near at hand when these things will be changed and the Government, too, by a suffering people.

They performed various exercises of Swedish drill which evoked much applause from the large audience as well as the admiration and enthusiasm of all present.

Following this exhibition Lieut.-Col. Rendell read a message received from the Adjutant of the Methodist Guards regretting their inability to be able to participate in the parade, but on behalf of the Guards congratulated the Newfoundland contingent. Hearty cheers were then given by the brigades for the squad and the affair was brought to a happy termination by the rendition of God Save The King.
