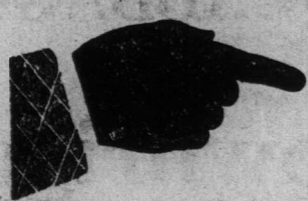

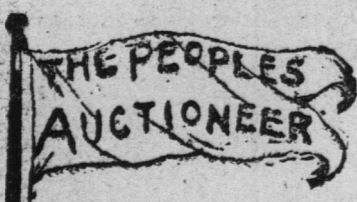

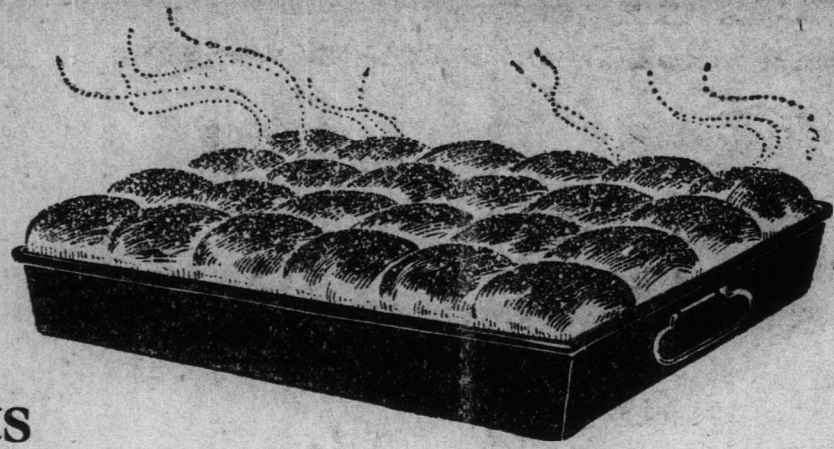

"He who backbites others does not whitewash himself." — German proverb.

The following very interesting true story has recently been going the round of business circles in a certain city.

A young clerk in the office of a very large and prosperous concern, by a clever bit of work, gained the favorable attention of the senior member of the firm. He was a fine looking young man; he had a good presence and was always perfectly groomed; moreover, he had plenty of brains, and he easily held his favourable attention, and soon became a great favorite with the senior member who was, by the way, inclined to be eccentric. From a small clerkship this fortunate young man was advanced with startling rapidity. He was given a position of high authority and his salary was trebled within a year. At the end of this time his patron was due to make his annual trip abroad, and he still favored the young man by inviting him to go with him. His position was nominally that of a private secretary, but he was given a magnificent suite on shipboard, and in every way treated by his employer as a friend and companion.

It had been planned that he should stay the full two months, travelling all over Europe, so everyone was much surprised when he came back by the next steamer.

They were still more surprised

when he was followed by a cable from the senior member ordering his discharge.

The secret of the sudden change in his fortunes leaked out into the office later. It was just this: He had taken that golden opportunity to knock his fellow workers, especially one or two of his superiors whose positions he thought he would like to hold. His employer listened without a word, which ought to have warned the young man. But he was success-drunk, and he kept it up during the whole voyage, while in the heart of his employer who hates a back-biter above anything on earth, admiration rapidly turned to disgust.

The Dutch have a proverb which goes one step farther than the German saying I quoted at the beginning. They say, "Slander flings stones at itself."

It's very true, isn't it? Nothing arouses distaste and distrust in the heart of an honorable man any more than back-biting.

The fifteenth psalm has been aptly called "the gentleman's psalm" because it describes the qualities a gentleman should have. The "honorable business man's psalm" wouldn't be a bad name for it either, and one of the qualifications is, "He that back-bith not with his tongue." Evidently King David felt the same distaste for a back-biter as the 20th century business man does.

There are times when honor and expediency give a business man different counsel. This is one of the times when they agree. Don't back-bite; it isn't honourable and it doesn't pay.

From the last issue of the N. Y. Fishing Gazette, we learn that the Booth Fisheries Co., are erecting a \$300,000 cold storage plant at Minneapolis. It is expected that a part of the building will be ready by next fall. The building will be constructed of concrete and will be 138 by 100 feet, and eight or ten stories high. We would like to know what has become of the Booth Cold Storage project in Newfoundland, which the Morris Government boomed so much a year ago. Then again there was the earlier move with Trefethen and Lord, who were in so great a hurry to start that one of them was most unfortunate in his enquiries from "Friend Morris" as to the meeting of the Legislature. Assemblies have opened and closed since then and several years have passed, but the project never materialized, but vanished into thin air, as all the industrial schemes, boosted by the Morris Government have done.

their eyes on the unofficial detectives.

"A Chronicle reporter, on Friday night, interviewed some of the strike-breakers. Ten of the thirty belong to the Thiel Detective Agency and have had considerable experience. They were in the Porcupine strike and passed through many trying experiences. They one and all, say that the Halifax mob is as likely as any they have met. The ten detectives have been in Halifax for the last three days in order to get in touch with the situation."

The Canadian Government has a bill before the Dominion Parliament to appropriate ten millions of dollars for the promotion of agricultural instruction. Canada has learned by experience the value of Agricultural Colleges and schools, so has England, Denmark and the States. It remained, however, for the Morris administration to destroy the foundation of such a policy, laid down by the last Liberal Administration, and to inaugurate a giving-out policy in which some \$10,000 or more has been wasted. What is the use of Morris talking of an agricultural policy when he has negated the only policy which can ensure success? What advantage has Newfoundland reaped from the retaining of three members of the Tory Party as an Agricultural Commission? They were in no sense scientists or experts in agriculture. Some \$6,000 a year has been wasted, in paying salaries and expenses for work that was in no way commensurate with the money spent on it. These men were provided with jobs. These jobs had good salaries attached to them. Such were the main uses to which the money spent on the Commission was put. The money formed golden chains to bind members to an extravagant and reckless leader.

This forenoon, His Excellency Governor Davidson and suite visited the Christian Brothers' Schools, St. Patrick's Hall, and were conducted through the class rooms which they inspected. The distinguished party were received by the Superior, Rev. Brother Ryan, and also by Brother Kennedy. His Excellency expressed his pleasure at what he saw after inspecting the schools, and congratulated the teachers and pupils on the great excellence evident in the work of both teachers and pupils. HALIFAX, To-day.
The tram strike situation remains the same. Not a wheel has been turned by the company since the riot of Friday afternoon.

BORGHESIA, Tripoli, To-day.
The Italian losses in the recent engagements with Arabs at Sidi Garba, numbered 79 killed and 259 wounded. The Italians captured the entrenchments of the camp of the Arabs after a hard battle.

LONDON, To-day.
British Columbia is about to have a big building in London and has purchased a capital site at corner of Regent and Charles Streets. The construction of the new edifice will be commenced on June 24.

ROME, To-day.
Prolonged fighting between Italians and Arabs near Derna, Tripoli, in which both sides suffered heavy losses. At times it was necessary to send out reinforcements of Italians. The Arabs were finally routed and fled in disorder towards the interior.

KIEL, To-day.
Five year volunteer soldiers of the German Army and three German marines who accompanied them were, it is feared, drowned yesterday afternoon near here in a sailing boat they had hired, which has not since been seen.

NEWPORT, R. I., To-day.
The torpedo boat Vesuvius was struck by one of its own torpedoes yesterday and beached at Pope Island, Narraganset Bay, when the lives of those aboard seemed imperilled by the waters which rushed through the two inch hold astern. Last night the Vesuvius worked herself off the beach and proceeded to the torpedo station under her own steam.

LONDON, To-day.
King George and Queen Mary started to-day for Berlin to attend the wedding of Princess Victoria Louise, daughter of Emperor Wilhelm. They will embark on board the yacht Victoria and cross to Flushing, Holland, to-morrow morning and be escorted by British warships. When the British Sovereigns arrive at midnight across North Sea a flotilla of German torpedo boat destroyers is to meet them and convey their yacht to the Dutch Coast.

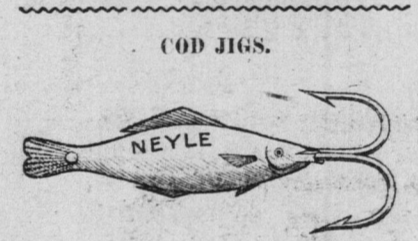

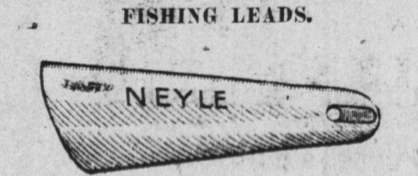

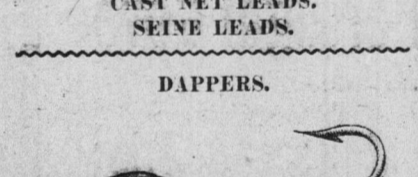

The Kyle Here.

BEAUTIFUL SHIP FOR LABRADOR SERVICE—MARKS SPLENDID RUN.

The s.s. Kyle, Capt. Stephenson, the new ship built for the Reid Nfld. Co. at Newcastle-on-Tyne to run between St. John's and Labrador ports, arrived here at an early hour this morning. The ship left Newcastle on Saturday week at 5 p.m., and had very fine weather until Saturday night and Sunday past, when a hurricane of wind from the S. E., veering to N.W. with a heavy sea, was experienced, and last evening and night in making in for the land she had it very thick and hove up off the port all night. The ship proved herself to be a splendid sea boat, did 12 knots on the run out, and captain and crew are enthusiastic over her qualities as a sea boat and first class steamer. The purser and Marconi operator, Messrs. March and Baxter, of the Reid Nfld. Co., kindly showed a Telegram representative through this splendid specimen of marine architecture this forenoon. The boat is undoubtedly a beauty in every respect and her creation seems to have reached the climax in all that is handsome, luxuriant and staunch in vessels of her class. It is almost enough to say that she is a replica of the excellent Lintrose, though she is in length 35 feet shorter. The first place visited on board by our reporter was the music room, forward on the ship. This beautiful apartment is done in birch and maple, polished in the natural color and as most luxuriously furnished, a feature in it being a grand piano of the same wood. The upholstery, carpets, etc., are in the same uniform color and the place is well worth a visit. Just aft of the music room is the main saloon, an apartment surpassingly beautiful and like that of the Lintrose, done in polished mahogany. The doors are paneled in rare colored plate glass, the fantastically tinted windows light the room and 40 persons can be accommodated at table at one sitting. The settees, chairs, etc., all splendidly upholstered and the wood work conforms with that of the walls and other parts. The pantry is off the saloon and just forward and over the saloon is the smoking room, a place which one can enjoy the weed in the most comfortable and beautiful surroundings. The captain and chief officer's rooms are excellently furnished and beautifully wrought are off this room and above this is the wheelhouse, flag room, etc. The wireless room is aft in the upper deck and is fitted with every appliance and furnished neatly and with an eye to the comfort of its official. The ship's wireless has a radius of 150 miles. Below on the second deck are the wash rooms, toilets, bath rooms for ladies and gentlemen and these display every comfort and convenience. The state rooms are veritable miniature palaces. They contain from 4 to 6 berths and are painted dead white on the ceilings the rest enamel white. Each room has its own wash basin, and a cunningly devised little ladder to take one to the top berth without the necessity of climbing up by the lower berth. There are also state rooms to accommodate parties of 6 on either side of the ship. The ladies' cabin amidships is also an apartment fitted in a sumptuous way with mirrors set about, handsome furniture and oak and cloth carpets. The men's quarters (very comfortable and airy) are forward and the stowage which is aft is a fine place containing good berths, beds and furniture and capable of accommodating 120 men and 40 women. The ship is well ventilated and lit throughout with electricity. In the Marconi room is a Morse lamp and telephones run right through the ship. Her lifeboats are well built to suit the Board of Trade requirements and can carry 31 persons each. The ship is built with particular attention given to strength of structure for contact with ice. She has 5 water tight bulkheads and her gross tonnage is 1,055, net 548. She is 220 feet long, 32 feet beam, depth of hold 24 feet. Her engines are reciprocating three cylinder 1,580 horsepower. The ship will take up the Labrador service early in June. Today numbers of people inspected her and expressed the pleasure they felt on viewing such a fine boat.

He brought the ship to port and handled everything in such an able manner, in the engine room, that for her maiden trip she did good work and averaged 12 knots. The ship can do 13 1/2 and Mr. McParlane speaks in glowing terms of the excellence of the engines with which the ship is fitted.

BRUTAL ASSAULT CASE

A case of brutal assault was heard in the Magistrate's Court to-day. A 26 year old carman named Noseworthy was charged with maltreating his wife. The latter (the complainant) on being called to give evidence, presented a mass of cuts and bruises. Her two eyes were badly blackened, whilst her nose, mouth and ears were battered as the result of being buffed by her husband. The woman testified that she was also kicked unmercifully about the legs and body, and was unable to walk owing to receiving a kick in the hip. His Honor Judge Knight strongly denounced the brutality of the worthless husband. He said it was the worst case of ill-treatment he ever saw, and sentenced the prisoner to six months imprisonment.

Painful Accident.

People who arrived here from Branch yesterday say that Edward Conway, of that place, met with a painful accident Thursday last. He went out to the s.s. Portia in a dory while a big log was running, and in trying to board her his hand was jammed between the boat and the ship's side. The top of one finger was completely severed and the other fingers were broken, some in two places. Men took charge of his boat and he had to proceed to Placentia on the ship for treatment from a doctor.

HOME'S REPORT.—The s.s. Home, which left Lewisport at 10 a.m. yesterday, returned again at 6 a.m. to-day and reports getting to North Head of Fortune Harbor. Here the bay was blocked with ice and no water was visible from the hills.

SACRAMENTO, May 20.

Governor Johnson signed the Allen Bill to-day.

EDINBURGH, May 20.

Seven British bluejackets starting on a holiday trip, were drowned on Saturday, when the naval boat which they were in, was swamped by a heavy sea.

CORUNA, Spain, May 20.

A Mexican delegation arrived here to-day on the steamer Iporanga, for the purpose of trying to persuade General Porfirio Diaz, Mexico's former President, to return to Mexico and undertake the Government of the country.

VANCOUVER, B.C., May 20.

At the first session of the Methodist Conference, Saturday last, a resolution commending the proper celebration of the centenary of peace between Canada and the States was passed. Dr. Chown, General Superintendent, proposed that the history of the text books of Canada and the States, be revised so that the rising generation might be brought up on facts instead of fiction.

LONDON, May 20.

Some confirmation of the hint that militant suffragettes are hiring women of the lower class as members of the arson squads, was received early this morning, when Nellie Robinson was arrested outside New College Chapel at Hampstead, in N. W. London. The woman described herself as a servant and said she was awaiting the arrival of the suffragettes, and with them was going to set fire to the church. The police magistrate remanded her, remarking that she seemed to be taking a course of training for a professional petroleum incendiary from miscreants worse than herself.

BERLIN, May 20.

A woman making a trip in a Swiss balloon, met a terrible death near Munich, Sunday. When the balloon was close enough to the ground for the occupants to alight, one of the aeronauts fell out and the balloon shot upward. The woman had begun to climb out of the car as the balloon ascended, and was unable to get back owing to the car swaying. Another aeronaut grabbed the woman and tried to pull her back, but was unable to do so. He held her until the balloon was 600 feet from the earth, when his strength failed, and the woman dropped to death.

AQUASC ALIENTIS, Mexico, May 20.

John Walker, British mine owner, and his wife, fighting shoulder to shoulder, recently killed five men and wounded three out of a band of eleven employees at their mine near Villa Garcia, Seacabesca. Mr. and Mrs. Walker arrived here under an escort squad of troops. The employees attacked Walker's office because he was unable to raise money with which to pay their wages. The attackers used knives and clubs, and Walker had been seriously cut and beaten when he opened fire on them with an automatic revolver. Mrs. Walker reinforced her husband with a rifle. After the battle, Mrs. Walker made her escape from the building.

PHILADELPHIA, May 20.

All the great battleships of the Atlantic reserve fleet stationed at the Philadelphia navy yard are being stripped and prepared for instant action for the first time since the Spanish war. All the big ships are being put in fighting trim, and this very quickly, and with much secrecy. The officials of the navy yard deny they are taking unusual action in preparing the fleet for sea, but private investigation proves the contrary. The most significant part is the fact that several old cruisers, including the Minneapolis, which have not seen service for years, are being overhauled, repaired and outfitted for sea-going. The Ohio is being repainted, the Alabama is being overhauled. Commander Grant, who has been appointed to the new battleship Texas, building at Newport News, absolutely refuses to discuss activities, and simply said: "We are always preparing for war." Sea stores and ammunition are being put aboard the ships at night.



Columbus.

This is the 40th anniversary of the untimely death of Christopher Columbus, who discovered America when there was nothing worth discovering here except the unbathed red man and the lithe form of the cholera morbus.

Columbus couldn't have chosen a poorer time to discover this country. Nobody knows why he didn't wait until somebody had opened a hotel or a saloon, where he could be received with pomp and tendered a rising vote of thanks, but when Columbus made up his mind to discover anything he went right out and hung the Spanish flag on it.

It had not been for Queen Isabella of Spain, who pawned several of her wedding presents in order to buy ships for Columbus, America would never have been discovered up to the present writing and the people of foreign lands would still believe that the earth is constructed on the order of a graphophone record. The American invasion would also have been postponed for several years with great unanimity.

As not many people cared at that time whether America was discovered or not, Columbus had to hire a lot of sailors who were not enthusiastic about getting anywhere in particular and who mutilated a number of times in a fervent and unbiased manner, making it necessary for Columbus to bury a few of the ringleaders in order to promote harmony. The shotgun with which Columbus pacified the mutineers is now on exhibition in several Spanish museums, and can be seen by tourists who have the price of admission.

Columbus made several trips after striking this continent, but did not succeed in discovering anything that afterward got into the geographies. King Ferdinand did not like Columbus because he had never redeemed Isabella's jewelry, and one time when Columbus was chasing around South America looking for the tree of life and running up a big hotel bill Ferdinand had him handcuffed to one of the Spanish militia and sent home. This broke the proud spirit of Columbus, and made him an easy prey to the Spanish gout, which foreclosed on him in 1506. Thus died one of the best discoverers that ever came to this country, but one of the poorest financiers outside of the treasury department.

Extract of letter from DAVID JAMES (Master), of the late barque "Colorado," of Glasgow. "Having lost our ship on Staten Island, on the 5th of July, and having saved neither effects nor provisions, we were then compelled to travel over the island for ten days, subsisting on nothing but shell-fish and seaweed. On the 19th of July we came across another shipwrecked party of seventeen, the surviving part of the crew of the British ship "Dunkeld," of Glasgow, fourteen having perished through exposure. We are glad to note that the Select Vestry and Wardens have turned their attention to the Rectory and surrounding grounds. The fences have been newly white-washed and the Rectory is now receiving a coat of paint.

Mr. Churchill was here on Friday and chose the site for the new public building. This is a thing badly needed, and we hope the Government will push the work and get it completed as quickly as possible.

The first cargo of coal for the season arrived on Saturday to Mr. J. F. Sheppard. It received a quick despatch from the vessel, being stored in twenty-one hours. Mr. Sheppard's facility for landing coal is an up-to-date one and the arrangement saves time and labor. A cargo of firewood, from Trinity Bay, has also arrived to the same firm.

Capt. Blandford, late of the s.s. Diana, has purchased a vessel and will prosecute the Labrador fishery the coming season.

Two motor boats were built here during the winter; one for Mr. L. Noseworthy, the other for Mr. Geo. Gosse. Both will be used on the Labrador the coming season.

The Agricultural people have purchased from Frost & Wood, Canada, the following farming implements: Four plows, one spring harrow and one scuffer. They are now being used on the farms and are giving every satisfaction.

We are glad to see Mr. Heber Gosse, son of our esteemed wheelwright, about again. We hope that within a week or two he will be able to resume his work as Principal of Island Cove High School. —COR.

The Road Board and wharf builders and such like tells us they get their rules from St. John's to do what they like with the money. Spend it where they like or give it all to one man to work out if they like. What do we want a member for? I am writing the plain truth now. Let them do it if they can. Now, Mr. Editor, you will not hear from me again very soon as I am not plying my vocation here at the fishery. I will be leaving here in a short time. You can see our money wasn't spent fair, as Mr. Newhook said himself.

Smallpox Spreading.

The disease seems to be spreading, and no doubt the health authorities will do everything possible to stamp it out.

Poor Outlook.

At present the fishery at Quid Vidi looks anything but promising. Herring have not struck in there yet. The fishermen are on the fishing grounds every morning and so far have not handled enough for their own consumption. Salmon are exceptionally scarce and not one of these fish has been taken for the season. When cod strikes in there will be a shortage of bait unless herring makes their appearance very soon. The outlook for a successful fishery looks gloomy.

Died at Glace Bay

The death took place yesterday morning, of James Vey, aged 65, at the residence of his son, Bruce Street, Glace Bay. He had been in poor health for the past twelve months and on Tuesday, was attacked by a stroke of paralysis. He was a native of Bay Roberts, Nfld., and has been a resident of Glace Bay for the past 15 years. He is survived by a widow and one son, William. He is also survived by three sisters, two of whom are in Newfoundland, the other in Winnipeg, and one brother in Newfoundland. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, interment at No. 4 cemetery. —Sydney Record.

Firemen Meet.

The Firemen and Stokers' Union held a meeting last night which was largely attended. Some new regulations were adopted for the betterment of the Union, and for the benefit of the ship owners. The following officers were elected: President, Martin McAllister; Vice-Pres., Moses Baldwin; Asst. V.P., P. Lundrigan; Secy., W. King; Treas., P. McGrath; Delegate, Wm. Whalen. Mr. Frank Woods the former President, who resigned, received a hearty vote of thanks.

Had Narrow Escape.

People who came in by yesterday's express and who were in Channel when the boat and dories were driven off Saturday, say that had the Invermore not been in port the four men on-board the boat, a jack of 16 tons, would have been lost. The boat was fishing four miles off Fox Roost when the wind suddenly veered to the N. E. and blew a hurricane. The first blast tore the boat's sails into shreds and in the sea which ran her rudder became smashed and she was driven helplessly before the storm with the dories alongside. The light keeper at Channel notified the Magistrate of the men's predicament and the Invermore was despatched to the rescue and overtook them many miles off the land. The boat, unmanageable as she was, could not live much longer in the weather which prevailed.

The Redeemtorist Mission at St. George's

The mission for the men and the children began on the last Sunday in April. The children's mission continued until Wednesday, April 30th, when they received Holy Communion; they formed in processional order at the school hall the little boys in the lead followed by the little girls dressed in spotless white, veiled like the virgins in the Apocalypse; then similarly robed, bearing the banners of their sodality, came the children of Mary; the church was thronged by the parents and other relatives of the little ones.

After mass, Father McAndish closed the children's mission with a most impressive address, showing them the favors and graces they had that day received, by making their little souls, for the first time, the temples of our Redeemer in the Blessed Sacrament; a miracle which would make the vigil of Ascension 1913, ever memorable, ever blessed, the most perfect day in all their lives. He then pledged the boys to total abstinence until their twenty-first year, and the girls to keep from walking the streets at night until the same age, and both boys and girls to say three Hail Marys morning and night, in honor of the purity of the Mother of God.

The men's mission closed Sunday at 7 p.m. Every man in St. George's and Sandy Point attended, no matter how the weather, crossing by boat from Sandy Point, at 5 o'clock in the morning and at 10 o'clock at night; coming by land from Flat Bay, from Muddy Hole, from Barachois, the crippled and partially crippled hauled along the way in carts by their neighbors, sights most admirable and never to be forgotten in St. George's.

The effects of the men's mission is plainly to be seen in St. George's, a congregation of men pledged to total abstinence for twelve months, the hasty oath, the rude jest, the foul word, is unheard on the lips of any; courtesy and hospitality, virtues for which our people were already renowned, have increased an hundred fold, and during the days of the mission, one's house was not held to be so much his own as his neighbor's; it was an example of that wide hearted hospitality, sung by Longfellow: Long may the spirit and the grace of the mission sway the hearts of our citizens.

The women's mission began on the first Sunday of May, and on Thursday, the 7th inst., confirmation was administered by His Lordship Bishop Power, to two hundred and eighty-eight children; after the figure of the Babe of Bethlehem was borne on the shoulders of four little boys, in processional order around the church grounds; the sodality, all the newly confirmed and the tots not old enough to receive that sacrament taking part. The children were then dedicated to the Infant Jesus and were blessed at the altar rails; this was one of the most pleasing and beautiful of the day's ceremonies.

On Sunday, the 11th, mass was celebrated on a hill three-quarters of a mile from the church; the spot that had been selected for the erection of the mission cross.

The procession of the whole congregation to Holy Cross Hill was a picture to linger long in the memory. The Star of the Sea Society and the men of the Cathedral Parish formed up on the road toward the Court House, these then broke rank and the acolytes, the boys, the girls in their white confirmation garb, the Children of Mary, and Rev. Father Holland, who was the celebrant of the mass, in a carriage, accompanied by the Bishop and the other clergy, completed the procession. There were over six hundred people in line.

When the acolytes came within a few yards of the hill, the procession divided through its whole length, to allow the Bishop and clergy to be first at the spot where the cross was to be set up.

Father Holland vested with alb and stole, performed the impressive ceremony of the blessing of the cross, after which it was kissed by the people.

The morning had been cloudy and cold, but now the sun came forth gloriously and there in the middle of half an acre of land roughly cleared with an axe, surrounded by the gently swaying firs, which seemed to be offering incense, the mass was sung, the congregation joining in the chanting of the kyrie and credo and the responses and kneeling reverently on the rugged, and in parts, be-mired ground, regardless of their spotless attire, this ever memorable mass came all to swiftly to an end.

Then the word was given by Capt. Albert Garnier, to the waiting men and slowly the great cross, the symbol of our salvation, rose, while at the same moment, led by Father McAndish, poured forth the prayers of the congregation; slowly it arose and strong men wept as the memory of Calvary's glorious sacrifice struck home more forcibly than e'er before to their souls; slowly it arose, away, towered upright, slipped into its place, and the mission cross of St. George's erected to the honor of our Blessed Redeemer and the Most Holy Trinity was set.

The following inscription in English and Latin, was sealed in the cross:—

"The greater Honor and Glory of the Most Holy Trinity and the Most Holy Redeemer, as well as to the memory of the mission preached with great fruit by Fathers Holland and McAndish of the congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, founded by St. Alphonsus, this Cross having been solemnly blessed and erected on Pentecost Sunday, A.D., 1913. Plus the Tenth Pope happily reigning, George the Fifth being Emperor of Great Britain, Davidson, Newfoundland, Vice-Roy, Most Rev. M. F. Howley, Metropolitan, Most Revs. Bishops March, of Harbor Grace and Power, of St. George's, Suffragans; Sir E. P. Morris, Colonial Premier, M. G. Sears, Rector of the Cathedral, Father Joy, Master of Ceremonies, R. McDonnell, Magistrate, A. J. O'Reilly, President and J. A. McLellan, Secretary of the Star of the Sea Association, in the name of all the Catholic people by the above named Mission Fathers, was dedicated."—Com.

Co-operation is the Only Hope.

Earl Grey Says This Principle Must Be Applied in Labor.

London, May 12.—Several manufacturers interested in the question of profit-sharing co-partnership attended a meeting in London to hear the views of Sir William Lever, whose fortune has been estimated at \$2,000,000. His model town, Port Sunlight, where the employees of his firm live in the happiest conditions, is the most successful co-operative establishment of the kind in England, probably in the world.

Sir William Lever said that the most important point in considering a co-partnership scheme was not to fetter the management. The first requisite was high-class management. The policy of the business should be free from any control of the rank and file. His experience was that if this was not guarded against the system of co-operation might eventually prove a source of great weakness in business. Without long experience, he continued, the rank and file could not partake in the management, but some, if they entered into the spirit of co-operation with a loyal manager, stood to benefit immensely, and it was only right that their loyal co-operation should find a reward in some share of the profits of the business in which they were engaged. In a scheme of that kind, however, there must be no maudlin sentiment. No faddist ideas must be allowed to govern the business.

Earl Grey, who was present, said that the hope of the industrial future of this country, the hope of industrial peace, the hope of the worker, the hope of the country, depended upon the application of the co-partnership principle to the industrial enterprise of the United Kingdom.

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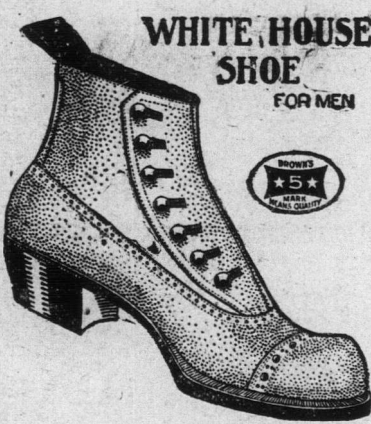


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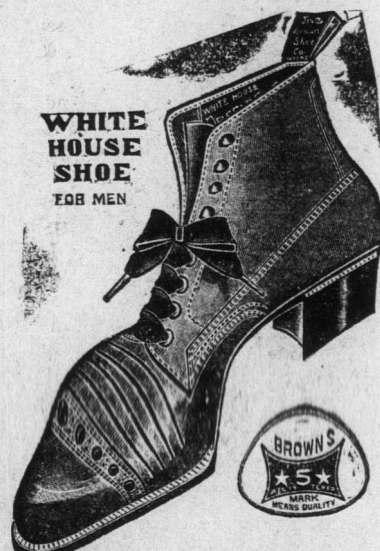
