



UNIONIST MEMEBERS HOLD PRI-VATE MEETING.

LONDON, Dec. 14. Sixty Unionist members of Parliament. Henry Chaplin, member for the camps, said Lord Robert | Wimbledon Division of Surrey, presiding, met privately last night and decided to discuss and criticize the improvements, though even Bill extending the duration of Parliament for a year, when it comes to its second reading. ENGLAND.

It was announced in the Commons o-day that the number of Alien encmies interned in England is: Civilians, 32,274; Naval and Military, 13, 475. Besides these prisoners, there are now in England a total of 21,205.

FROM BERLIN.

LONDON Dec. 14. The Daily Mail's Copenhagen correspondent telegraphs the following basing it on information received from Berlin: More than 10,000 machine guns have been completed to strengthen the German eastern front. The Bulgarian and Turkish armies have recently been plentifully supplied with machine guns from Germany. All trains from Germany to Constantinople since the railway has been repaired have been used in transporting ammunition and machine guns as well as great quantities of rails for Palestine.

GREECE AND THE ALLIES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14, The London correspondent of the Herald cables that the Daily Telegraph this morning published a despatch from Salonika, which reports that the Commanders of the Greek forces there, in addition to despatchng troops to other vital points, are assisting in every way to transform the port into a formidable base for the Allies. LONDON, Dec. 14. Germany, apparently, has no intenon of permitting Greece to grant any further concessions to the Allies my at the front." without vehement protest. Reuter's orrespondent at Athens says that derman diplomats already have taken steps which are likely to add coniderably to the difficulties of the sitation. It is announced unofficially at Athens, the correspondent contines, that Germany has asked Greece whether the new facilities afforded o the Allies compromise Greek neurality in any way. No official comunication has been issued thus far at Athens regarding the exchange of views between German and Greek diplomats, but Greek officials admit that the situation is becoming more

ATHENS, Dec. 14. The Nahellas prints a telegram from Berlin stating that it is becom ing known there that, in view of their heavy losses, the Germanic powers will find it impossible, in case pres sure is brought to bear against Greece by the Allies, to reply by military action. The correspondent affirms that, according to plans before the German Government, any permanent blockade of Greece with consequent exhaustion of Greek food supplies will be met by reduction of the rations of all prisoners in German should be bombarded by the Allies warships, the Germans are prepared to raze every French and Serbian

LONDON, Dec. 14. Then again, there is the statement that the Greek Government has commandered Greek shipping in British and American ports to carry cargoes, purchased by the Greek Government. This is a good sign that the Greek Government does not consider hostility with the Entente Powers im minent, as such ships and cargoes could not reach Greek ports for a considerable time and they would be seized as prizes by the British and French warships, if war should break out within the next week, and there is every appearance that the attitude of Greece will be determined within

that time. News was received in the city last evening which points at least to some modification of the strict exclusion of Newfoundland fish from Greece. The news was curious, in view of the official declaration that the Imperial au thorities in view of the needs of general policy were unable to raise the embargo against the entry of our fish into Greece. One of our merchants informed us that he had received a cable that his vessel, loaded with fish for Greece, which had been detained at Gibraltar, had been allowed to proceed to Patras. This place is a port

of Greece in the Gulf of Corinth. It has been suggested to us that this does not mean that the embargo has been raised, but that the fish has been allowed to be sent to a British consignee, who will be under bonds to prevent it reaching the enemy. It however suggests that the authorities are not tightening the restrictions under the embargo. Canada Is Now Making Twenty Million Shells.

Ottawa, Dec. 3.—Some idea of the stupendous proportions to which the munitions industry in Canada has grown was given to the members of the Ottawa branch of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers at their monthly luncheon here to-day by General Alexander Bertram, of the Imperial Munitions Board.

At present nearly 100,000 persons are employed on orders amounting in all to 20,000,000 shells. The steel required for the industry from now till the end of next year is eight hunfor Christmas just now, and in a day dred million pounds, which will tax the capacity of the Dominion steel

plants to the utmost. Nearly forty-five million pounds of opper and brass are used and 102, 000,000 pounds of lead. This is more than Canada can produce of these metals and the surplus must be in ported.

Fifteen hundred thousand pounds of tin and ten million pounds of rosin are also required.

The value of the shell orders up to now has been \$20,000,000, with additional orders of about \$180,000,000 making \$375,000,000 in all.

The number of shells shipped to England so far has been 3.500.00.







Germany Tried to Destruction of Senlac. Embroil U.S.A. in

New York, Dec. 8 .- The United steamer and her entire cargo were evidence tending to show that Germany, through its secret agent, Franz was on her way here from Charlotte- von Rintlen, spent a huge sum of money in order to embroil the United States and Mexico, so as to divert the flowing of munition manufactures such an event the United States would need all the munitions manufactured in America for the use of its own armed forces.

Count von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, has officially denied several times that there was any truth in the story that an effort was made by Germany to start a revolution that would make imperative the armed intervention of the United

Despite the denials, information has come to the Government that the bringing about of this clash was one of the purposes that brought von Rintelen, reputed friend of the Kaisser and Prince Henry of Prussia, to this country last spring.

The failure of von Rintelen is ascribed in part to the fact that he was unable to get together in this country a staff of secret service experts such as would have been possible in almost any country in Europe. Instead, he had to depend upon men who were amateurs in secret service activities, and these men "let the cat out of the bag."

Funds Were Unlimited.

The money that von Rintelen had at his command is declared to have been practically unlimited, the figure has been placed as high as \$30,000,000 for the Mexican venture alone Great sums were expended by the German agent. The Government has traced much of the money and knows how it was expended. There was one item of \$500,000 deposited with the Trans-Atlantic Trust Company, the disposition of practically every cent of which is known to the Federal authorities. Practically all of this half million was used in the effort to bring about trouble in Mexico.

During the three months that vo Rintelen was in the United States there was only one German official here who outranked him, and that was Count von Berstorff, the Ambassador; Capt. Boy-Ed, the German naval attache, and Capt. von Papen, the military attache, both consulted with von Rintelen as subordinates. Immediately upon his arrival in New York von Rintelen set about es- ED. tablishing the Mexican connections

into effect his orders. He was introduced to two men familiar with con ditions south of the Rio Grande, men who had lived many years in Mexico. One was a banker, the other a contractor. One was a German subject, the other an American, and they had offices in the same building in the

At the same time that he was tryng to bring to a successful conclu sion the German scheme to embroil this country and Mexico, von Rintelen was busy directing another plot, the purpose of which was to "purchase strikers," as United States District Attorney Marshall has described it. One of the first men he met in connection with that part of the conspiracy was David Lamar, known as "The Wolf of Wall Street." 

NEW BATTLE EXPECTED ON THE GREEK TERRITORY.

LONDON. To-day. The next big battle will in all probability be fought in Greece, despite the efforts of the Hellenic King and Government to save the country from French forces have made good their retirement down the Vardar Valley and are now approaching Salonika where reinforcements are being landed. While reports in Paris and Rome say the Bulgarians have crossed the Greek frontier in pursuit, the reports of such action by the Bulgarians come somewhat as a surprise, as it had been thought such a move by them would provoke the Greeks and that consequently if the Entente Allies are followed at all, the task would be allotted to the Austrians and Germans. The Greek situation has diplomatic ally been complicated by the request of Germany to know whether the Athens Cabinet does not look upon the retreat into Greek territory by the Entente Allies as a breach of her neutrality. The inquiry is considered to foreshadow German participation in the pursuit. However, it is not believed here that the Germans have many troops in that part of the Balkans, their main forces having been diverted to Rustohuk, when the Rus sian threat of an invasion of Bulgarit seemed likely of fulfillment, and that therefore the Entente troops for the present only have to fear the Bulgars, as the Austrians are still being occupied in Montenegro and Albania where Montenegrins and Serbs are keeping up a stubborn resistance. It has again been reported that the Italians have landed an army on the Albanian coast to go to the assistance of the Serbs and Montenegrins. The Turks claim to have repulsed an attack again on their left wing at Seddul Bahr. The Turkish official accounts say nothing new has occurred at Kutelamara, where the Turks are operating against the British, who re-tired from Bagdad region. This is

"When the old fourteen knot steam ship finally rounded Sandy Hook and dropped anchor off quarantine, and the reporters came aboard with the coar of America in their ears, I was surer than ever that this greatest of world wars means a vast deal more to us than trade or charity or polit. It means the form which our national character is to take. The German peril is already in our midst, not so much at work blowing up ammunition plants as insidiously at work in our hearts. 'Well,' a great many Americans seem to be saying, 'if the Germants put it over,' what of it? I can't hurt us much! Perhaps it shows that they have the real goods, are the Lord's chosen people for this little world of ours after all. As for broken treaties, atrocities, submarines, Edith Cavelle, rough work over, and all that -well, it's all war, and the man who does things is usually criticized by the other fellow who can't do them. The public will forget the German crimes all right, once Germany has put herself on top. Nothing succeeds like success. Which shows that al-

ready that we are well Germanized. "But do we Americans want a Germanized world? Not in art and language and customs-heaven preserve us from that fate, too!-but Germanized in soul? Are we strong enough to resist a 'peaceful penetration' by successful Germany into our minds and hearts? I am afraid not. No amount of big guns and superdreadnoughts and submarines and continental guards-or peace talk-can keep the German peril out of America if we surrender to the temptation now when Germany seems to be putting it over in Europe. The dirty little poilus in the front trenches are indeed fighting our battle for us, though we do not know it."




