Mr Beattie read the report of the Committee on County Roads, as follows:—They have examined the accounts of the Superintendents, Mr Grain and Mr Cooper The account of the former, \$115-50, for services connected with the Fergus and Donglas Road, and Glenallan Road, they recommend to be paid, but have struck out the items for letting gates; this is part of their ordinary duties, covered by the fixed salaries of the Superintendents. Your Committee cannot recommend that any increase of the salaries of the Superintendents should be made. There is no evidence that their duties have become so onerous, or so increased beyond what was clearly contemplated by the appointment, as to warrant any increase. They recommend that Mr Jas. Abel's petition for a remission in the termis of his contract, viz: that only ten per cent be kept back of the work done, be granted, provided that his sureties agree thereto, and he pay the expense of an agreement underseal, signed by them, respecting them.—They recommend that Mr Stone's claim for gravel used on the Brock Road be sixbitrated on. Your Committee recommend that \$30 be paid Chas Bye, in full compensation for loss of tolls caused by fencing up road during repair of roads. Resignation of the Guelph Victoria Fire Company,

We have been requested to publish the ollowing correspondence and proceedings a reference to the resignation of the Fire Engine Company:

To the Mayor and Council of the Town of Guelph:

GENTLEMEN,—At a special meeting of the Victoria Engine Company, held at their hall on Tuesday, 15th inst., for the purpose of taking into consideration the present state of the engine and hose, the following resolution was carried unani-

Moved by F. B. Skinner, seconded by James Pendleton. "That in consideration of the almost useless state of the Engine and Hose belonging to this company, rendering our best efforts as a Fire Company, In time of need, futile and unavaling, we deem it necessary to send a plain statement of our condition to the Town Council; and that the following members be a committee to draw up such a statement embodying this motion, and present it to the Council, viz: B. Fairly, captain; G.H. Skinner, treasurer; and Wm. Beck."

Said committee having met according to appointment, beg leave to submit the following statement:—In the first place the Engine was never anything but a third-chase engine; it has been in use now about seven or eight years; it has been overhauled a number of times, without making any improvement in the working of it; and at the present time, with all the men that can be put on the brakes, it is not capable of throwing a stream more than ten or twelve yards. It requires double the power to work it that it would to work a good engine, owing to the position of the cylinders, as any one can see by examining it, or by working on the brakes for five minutes. As for the hose there is about one hundred feet, such as it is: It has been in use some six or seven years, and it is rotten. It has been repaired a number of times, but it is so rotten that it always bursts out again the next time it is used, so that it really is unfit for use any longer. In fact the condition of both engine and hoes is such that the Company have come to the conclusion that it is useless trying to do any more with it. If there is a Fire Company needed in this town, they must have an engine to work with, or the Company cannot be of any use. If the tank system of water supply is adopted, by getting another engine with, say, seven hundred feet of leading hose, and using the present engine as a feeder for the other, a supply of water would be almost sure to be found within reach of any fire that might occur in town.

The Commercial Bank and the Church of Scotland.

Mr. Paton, Chairman of the Temp ities Board of the Church of Scotland in Canada has issued a letter, in which he states that the suspension of the Commercial Bank has occasioned serious embarrasement to the Synod's Temporalities Board. To what extent the invested capital may ultimately suffer it is impossible at present to determine; that the stock will be greatly depreciated in value is certain. The Church's pecuniary interest in the institution is represented by 1,264 shares, amounting to \$126,400; and the present loss to the revenue available for supplementing the stipends of ministers is the large sum of \$1,584 per annum. After stating the position in which the ministers who have a claim on the fund are placed, he says that the Board came to the conclusion that the only practicable alternative is to make an effort to provide, at least for file first year's deficit of revenue, by throwing themselves on the sympathies of the Church at large—and apppealing to the adherents everywhere to stand by them and thus to aid these thirty-seven ministers and their families, who, in an unlooked for hour, and in a manner that could not have been foreseen or provided for, will otherwise be deprived of a considerable portion of their already scanty incomes. While the Commission of Synod and the Board alike recommended a personal canvass in each congregation, for the purpose of raising such a sum of money as will be required in order to keep faith with every minister on the Synod's roll, it is for the Kirk sessions to determine what method will be most efficient in their several congregations for this purpose should be sent before the 20 December next, to Mr. James Croll, Morrisburg, Ontario, the Secretary of the Board. The Press of Canada almost without a single exception have condemned in the strongest terms the clause in the new Postal Bill, making it obligatory on the part of publishers to pre-pay the postage on newspapers. Among all the articles we have perused on the subject, we have seen none which puts the matter in a clearer light than the following from the Cobones World:

***And even if it be not desirable to abolish the tax, we wonder what is the object of making it imperative upon publishers of papers to pay the postage of all their subscribers in advance. It is not emplained that any loss has been sustained by allowing subscribers to pay their postage at the office where taken out. If such a loss could arise by papers not being called for, we think it must be trifling in the extreme. The postage is always sure to be paid; though the poor publisher may beg his bread for want of the subscription, which experience has taught some people, is not so sure to be paid. And under the proposed new arrangement, the publisher would lose more than ever; for while many are willing to pay the postage but neglect the subscription, they would then pay neither, while the publisher paid both. Those, therefore, who sometimes refuse a paper at the office because they do not like to pay the postage, would continue to patronize it so long as the man at the lever was willing to make them a present of the sheet, postage free. The injustice, therefore, becomes the more manifest.

"A little calculation will make the matter plain enough. Suppose a publisher of a weekly paper issues 1000 copies a week, or of a daily paper, 1000 copies a day. The former, if obliged to pay his own postage in advance, would be burdened with a tax of \$3.33 a week, or \$173 a year, and the latter with a tax of \$20 a week, or \$1000 a year. There is still a strong feeling against continuing Ottawa as the seat of Government. The Minister of Militia stated, the night previous, that there were reasons of State why these resolutions should be passed at once. Did these reasons exist on the 20th of November? If not, the House ought to be informed of the reasons that had arisen since that time. He held that the resolutions were sprung upon the House, and then proceeded to argue on general grounds against them. He denied that the Government was prepared to admit the right of the Company to that portion of the Territory fit for settlement. He argued, moreover, that the true policy was not to leave any portion of that country under the sway of monopoly. He dreaded the effect of delay; and, as to expense, he held that the incorporation would prove to be a profitable thing for Canada.


