There is a great deal of "human nature" about this confession of Charles Orton's, and it bears marks of truth on the face of it. The gist of the confession is that Charles Orton knew all along that the man claiming to be Sir Roger Tichborne, was in reality his own brother Arthur Orton, that the latter bribed him

So, fluding that he didn't take any notice of me, I wrote to him, getting his address at Croydon from Mrs. Tredgett. I addressed him as Sir Roger Tichborne, and put it to him in this way. Says I, "I hear that you know where my brother Arthur is, and that you know him to be a rich man. Will you kindly send me his address, as I should like to write to him asking if he can give me a little assistance?" Well, no answer came to this. I was very hard up at the time, and after thinking about it, and of what I had by this time heard as to what it way my brother was doing, I took advice of my partner as to why I shouldn't make a move towards getting a little money out of the matter. I didn't like to go about it for fear I might injure my sisters, who, I knew, were receiving their £5 in a regular manner.

It was my brother's Arthur's writing. Amongst ourselves—my sisters and myself, I mean—there never was the shadow of a doubt who it was who was sending us the money. When we talked about it and about those words we were spoke of him but as Arthur, though so many at that time were beginning to call him Sir Roger Tiehbourne.

Charles continued to receive \$25 a month regularly, and changed his residence once or twice at the bidding of the same unsigning writer. He was told "that the money I was receiving was quite enough for me to live on at present, and that, if I was careful as to what I was about, when the 'case was over there would be no lack of money, and if I wanted a thousand or two, why I should have it.'" It seems that the fat rascal Arthur was to be very liberal with other people's money—if he got it, Charles felt curious to see his brother, and managed to get a glumpse of him at his Croydon house.
