



HOW MCCONKEY'S LOOKS UNDER ITS

George S. McConkey, the well-known confectioner, is always on the look out for something new to add to the brilliancy and convenience of his palatial luncheon and refreshment parlors on Yonge street. His latest improvement is the electric light. Mr. McConkey sometime ago visited New York, and walking round that great city at night he observed the various electric lighting systems in operation there. He selected what he thought were the best ones. and inquired who was the maker. In every case he was told it was the Fuller system. He then visited Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago and found the Fuller machine giving the greatest satisfaction. Two weeks ago he closed a contract with with Geo. R. Morse (an old Toronto boy) of Rochester, agent for western New York of the Fuller electrical company, for a three-light machine. This has been put in and gives every satisfaction. Two lights have been placed in the store and one over the sidewalk, illuminating the streets for hundreds of feet away. Messrs. W.

H. Elkins and W. N. Pierce, experts from the Fuller company, have the placing of the lights in position. There is no finer opportunity for display than Mr. McConkey's store, and the light, which is soft, steady and opalescent, fills the place in every part. Mr. McConkey has decided to discard the gas, and now the crystal chandliers are silent indicators of the departing glories of the age of gas. Each of the lights is of 2500 candle power. The two lights inside are in patent globes, covered with wire guards, and every other precaution has been taken to prevent fire. Some of these

nachines are always dropping sparks. Another good feature of Mr. McConkey's lights is the freedom from noise. There is no "frying," as the electricians call the sputtering sound that some lights make. The power is supplied by the engine in the asement. The machine is very small-a three-light one-and two of them could be put in a soda biscuit box. For each light in the twenty eight machines about half a horse power is needed. "How is it," said a World reporter to Mr. Morse, as they inspected the apparatus,

that so small a machine can use up two horse power of an engine and on so small a wheel ?" "The best example I can give you is that of a pump.
