



The Advantages of a Board For the Buy-ing and Seiling of Future Options Ad-mitted—Further Opinions of These In-terested—It is Not Cambling.

Since the appearance of The World's first article on the future option business on our Toronto 'Change, it has been discussed pretty, thoroughly in all its bearings by those interested therein. And those who are interested are not those in the grain business only, but their bankers and business friends outside. Stock brokers and farmers are alike interested as are also wholesale dealers and everyone else who has money invested in Ontario and wants to see the capital of the banner Province of the Dominion made also the metropolis. Among others who discussed the articlew as Mr. T. W. Gibbs, who represents in Toronto Manitoba or the Northwest Territorie Said he, "The present state of trade in Ter onto and in Ontario demands that some prompt action shall be taken, and the sooner we have it the better for us. As I am situated now, I dare not sell any flour for future delivery. As soon as I get the order and send it into the mill, I must send shipping instructions for it. As soon as the mill gets shipping instructions, the stuff is sent out, and unless I can arrange with my customer to take im-

it into the mill, I must send shipping instructions, the stuff is sent out, and unless I can arrange with my cutsomer to take immediate delivery I have to put flour in store and besides having to pay storage and insurance there is the money locked up till I can send out the stuff to my customer. The future option business would give me a means of preventing this and I could then do about three or four times the business I do now, and that without one-quarter the risk."

Mr. John Brown of the Citizens Milling Company was outspoken in his opinions in reference. He saw in the tuture option business amore than was done at present, and if the scheme were systematically taken up he would favor it and encourage it as far as able.

No Pretection in Chicago.

Some men out of the business, but yet interested, have asked the question. "If you were to have future options selling here you say you would protect yourself in case of a sale of flour by buying the amount of wheat in the future option selling here you any you would protect yourself in case of a sale of flour sold, and you argue, if wheat goes up you make your profit on the wheat, and if wheat goes down you make a profit on the flour.
