IMPURE ICE AND TYPHOID

A Matter that Requires Early Attention.

Further investigation shows that the present outbreak of typhoid fever in the district surrounding Toronto, Ontario, is due to the use of impure ice. The Health Department is notified of new cases. The Medical Health Officer has made an attempt of ascertaining, if possible, the cause of the disease and has come to the conclusion that the impure quality of ice that is being supplied for domestic use is largely to blame.

Ice dealers now procure their supply from any source they wish and usually fill their stores-houses with ice from the Toronto Bay, Ashbridge Bay, the Humber, the Don-in fact, almost every convenient pool about the city.

It is reported that 4,000,000 gallons of every kind of ice, the drainage of streets and the drainage of paint factories, the refuse from kitchens and slaughter-houses, are used in the melting of ice.

Was the result? The germs of every infectious disease are carried into the places from where a part of the ice is melted. The result is that the water, and in fact become a part of the ice, which in time is delivered for domestic use.

THE HOG EPIDEMIC

It has been an Annual Visitor for Many Years.

Further investigation shows that the present outbreak of hog cholera is not the first in the district surrounding Toronto. Every summer for the last four years, thousands of hogs have had serious losses, but for some reason or other thought it to their advantage to conceal the presence of the epidemic.

One farmer told a World reporter yesterday that in one week two years ago he had lost four valuable animals by the same disease. There are many other men in the same district who have also had losses, two, three and four years ago.

About a month ago a butcher on the market was about to buy two dressed hogs from a farmer who lives on Don Mills-road, and noticing a peculiar redness in the skin asked the reason. The reply was that the hogs jumped into the boiling water before they were quite dead. The hogs were bought, cut up and sold for food.

The name of Mr. David Smith, who lives in the Don Mills-road, appeared among those who had lost animals by the disease. Mr. Smith told the reporter that the day after the day that he had lost his animals, he had a few hogs that were quite dead. He examined them microscopically and found that they were infected with the disease.

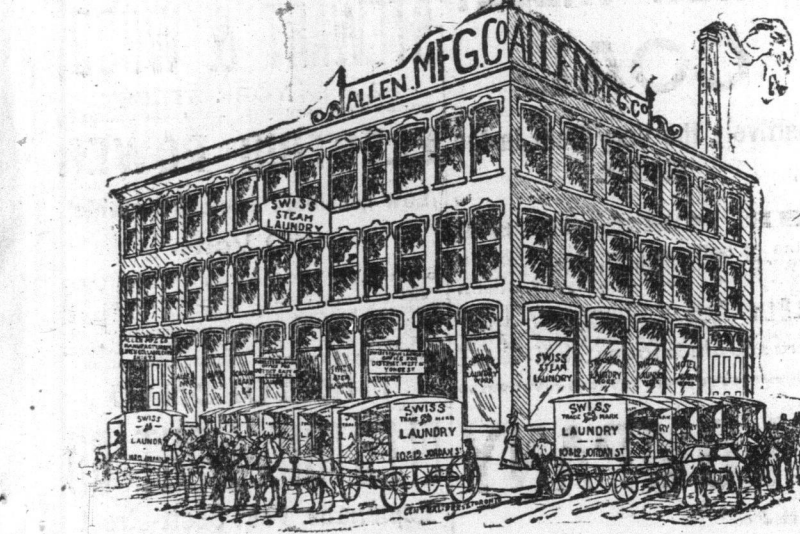

Visit to The Swiss Laundry's Headquarters.
MOST COMPLETE EQUIPMENT AND LARGE BUSINESS
Branch Offices and Agencies Throughout Canada--Employment Given to Hundreds of Hands--Two Complete Laundries in one--Old and New Ways of Turning Out the Work--Mr. Allen's Business Career.

The large yellow building on the corner of Melinda and Jordan streets is a prominent feature of these lesser business thoroughfares. It has recently been decorated by the painters and the lettering on every window tells the story of the business carried on inside. This building is the head office of the Swiss Laundry, the largest establishment of the kind in Canada, and the third largest on the continent. It has about 60 agencies throughout Canada, two branch offices outside cities, and carries on a business of an extent such as only a perfectly equipped laundry could possibly handle.



ing each article with numbers corresponding to the numbers given to customers, whose names are entered alphabetically in a book for the purpose. This part of the work is reduced to such a perfect system that mistakes very rarely occur in the matter of articles of different patrons becoming mixed and this is indeed no small task when it is remembered that 800 parcels and all over are handled each day. The sorting consists of dividing the articles into colored and white, solid and clean, flannels and linens. The next rooms to enter are the wash rooms, two in number. In the first 13 wash-cylinders that consist of enlarged perforated cylinders revolving at a high speed, but so constructed with a reverse action that the danger of tearing clothes is reduced to a minimum. Two starchers, four centrifugal dryers that do away with the old style of wringing and that dry in about two minutes, three mangles of enormous capacity, one of which is the Hamilton-Smith's. This last-mentioned machine is a most expensive piece of mechanism. So much so, indeed, that laundrymen, before purchasing, always require an agreement that they alone shall have the right of purchase and of use in a district. The machine is, however, immensely superior to any other mangle in the market in that it irons direct from the dryer, and from these goods without cutting the seams. Between the two wash rooms is the storeroom filled with barrels, soap, starch and carboys of blue, and to one side of the storeroom is a small chamber where is manufactured the gas used in bleaching. The secret of manufacturing this gas, which does away with the use of chlorine, is in Canada only known to Mr. Allen, who supplies it to other laundries at a cost of one cent per pound. A soap that is used in the washing of flannels and in conjunction with the rapid system of drying is proof against all shrinkage. The drying rooms, four in number, situated in the basement and top story, are heated by coils of steam, are so constructed that the moisture passes off and only occupies from 20 to 30 minutes in drying. Before entering the drying room, however, the lines have to pass through the starching room. In the starching room are found starching machines of recent invention. From the drying machine a band runs into the dampening room and dampened with sprinklers attached to rubber rollers, the goods which pass tepid water. Then it is placed in large presses, and from these is subbed into the ironing room to ready it for finishing. In the ironing room are a great number and a great variety of tools, and the ironing is done for shirts. Those that the collar passes through are the dampening machine, the ironing machine and the shaper. Before going to the shaper gizzards and water is used to soften all the starch. The shaper is turned down. In fact, every precaution against damage in any way is taken, and it is to be mentioned that only a visit to the steam laundry is necessary to banish the erroneous idea that machines are doing destructive to clothing. Machine laundrying does away entirely with the sweating,
