THE PREMIER HAS RESIGNED.

THE STATE OF HIS HEALTH COM-
PELLED HIM TO DO SO.

Mr. John Thompson has been requested
by the Governor-General to form a
New Cabinet, and he has accepted
the duty - An Official Statement.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.-The long suspense
with respect to the resignation of Sir John
Abbott is over and an expected change
of leadership has come.

Although this change has been partly ex-
pected and looked forward to, still as the
last it came rather suddenly and it is not
even generally known, as the resignation
was made shortly after 1 o'clock
it was kept very quiet for a while and the
evening papers did not get it in time for
publication.

His Excellency came to his office in the
eastern block about noon, as he usually
does on Fridays, and shortly after his ar-
rival his secretary called on Sir John
Thompson, who at once accompanied him
to his Excellency, with whom he had
been in conference over a number of days
the following statement was given out by
Major St. Aubyn, His Excellency's secre-
tary, for publication:

The Governor-General has received
with great regret a letter from Sir John
Abbott, intimating that he is compelled,
by the state of his health to resign his
office.

Acting upon the advice of Sir John
Abbott, His Excellency requested Sir John
Thompson to form a new Cabinet. Sir
John Thompson has accepted the duty and
it is probable that a few days will be re-
quired before an accurate list of the minis-
ters can be given.

After this statement was
made public the representative of The
World called on Sir John Thompson,
but could get no information from him
beyond the fact that the end
of next week would be the end
of the present Cabinet.

They were 20 hours without food, the
freshest having been left at the mine. On
account of their exhausted condition
they were unable to get to the transport to
obtain a new supply of food.

Keith and Edgington are the only men
out of 50 miners who started from Nohomish.
It took them four days to get in,
the others dropping along the road from
lack of food.

The survivors had scarcely any clothing
when they started, and with the
pinch of a winter they were left with the
trush of their hair.

A famine is likely to occur among the
miners, both among men and
beasts, unless some means are devised
of getting supplies from the east to the
mountains.

TO BREAK UP THE MEETING.

OR CAUSE IT TO FAIL IN ANY
DEFINITE RESULT.

This is the Charge Made Against the
British Delegates at the Monetary
Conference. Their Intention Was to
Obtain Continuous Sitings and a
Short Session.

LONDON, Nov. 25.-Before the English
delegates to the International Monetary
Conference started by Sir William Verelst
Chancellor of the Exchequer, to Sir
Minister, and Sir C. Rivers Wilson were to
deliberate on the monetary conference to
sitings daily, with the exception of
Saturdays and Sundays, so as to bring the
conference to an end within a few weeks.

Sir William Verelst has learned that
the American delegates contemplated

their opponents as would enable them to
present exhaustive statements.

This course, involving as it did an ad-
justment over Christmas, neither met
with the approval of the English minis-
ter nor certain of the English delegates, who
are strong single-standard men.

On the other side of the delegates
started for Brussels the representative of
the Associated Press learned from a high
official of the conference that the
delegates proposed beyond three weeks
the leading English representatives
would be in London, and that the
delegation to watch the proceedings.

INCREASED MARKET FEES.

City Commissioner, Coatsworth's Proposal Discussed by the Committee. City Commissioner Coatsworth's proposition to increase the market fees, as outlined in yesterday's World, created a good deal of discussion when submitted for the consideration of the Commission on Markets and Licenses yesterday afternoon.

For horses he proposes to charge 30c instead of 25c as at present, cattle 15c instead of 10c, sheep, calves and swine 6c instead of 5c, provision baskets 7c instead of 5c. In the weight fees he proposes these increases:

Load of hay or straw from 15c to 20c; slaughter meat 10c; other articles under 100 lbs from 2c to 5c; do., over 100 lbs and up to 1000 lbs 5c to 10c; do., over 1000 lbs, from 10c to 15c; live animals (other than sheep or pigs) per head from 2c to 5c; sheep or pigs of more than five, per head from 1c to 2c; do., if less than five, from 1c to 4c to 5c.

"You understand the fees are fixed by statute," remarked the speaker, "and we ask in permission to seek legislation to give us power to increase the fees."

Ald. McMurich: "Don't we derive benefit from having the market here?" Chairman: "Yes, of course we do."

Ald. McMurich: "Then why do you propose increasing the fees?" It seems to me we ought to knock them off."

Chairman: "But if you increase the accommodation, should we not be paid for it?" Ald. Bailey supported the proposition and pointed out that the citizens had to pay tolls if they wanted to go outside the city.

Ald. Stewart opposed. "If you increase the fees it will be a serious thing for the city. Why not ask for power to decrease the fees and make everybody offering produce for sale pay?"

Ald. Foster said there was strong opposition to an increase in the fees, and he wanted it postponed for a couple of weeks and a special meeting called to consider it.

The Mayor: "You have expended \$17,000 on St. Lawrence Market and several thousand dollars on the Western Market. A question whether you have taken in enough money at the Western Cattle Market to pay for the improvement of the market is not a question on the market, where the fees are so low in comparison with the facilities offered. The markets are almost for the benefit of the farmer."

The scheme was eventually approved of by a vote of 21 to 10. It will now have to run the gauntlet of the Executive Committee and the council before it reaches the Legislature.

Ald. Foster moved for power to compel all pedlars to pay market fees whether they go to the market or not.

The Chairman: "This will all come to the market if this is passed. The farmers stay away now in order to escape the market fees, but if this is passed, they will be forced to pay them."

Ald. Foster pointed out that it was not proposed to compel the city to do the slaughtering in the city.

Medical Matters in Brief. The Medical Health Officer has recommended the construction of a new sewer in Shaw-street from College to Bloor. Sanitary grounds in the rear of the property.

County Solicitor Robinson wrote the Mayor that he is instructed by the council of the County of York to give notice that the county is not, by reason of not having taken steps to prevent it, to be assumed to be a consenting party to the construction of the electric street railway now being laid down in Queen-street between Dundas-street and Bloor-street.

These Fifty Pits. It has taken the Medical Health Department two or three years to remove the 1000 privy pits which cluttered up the city and were a nuisance to the public. At this time it will take the city a long time to do away with the 15,000 that are estimated to exist.

"But give the necessary power," remarked an official of the Medical Health Department, "and you'll see how soon they'll vanish, particularly in certain districts of the city."

Will Report as to Cost, Etc. The City Commissioner and the Medical Health Officer have been instructed by a sub-committee of the local Board of Health, with a view to the city undertaking the removal of night soil, to report showing (1) an estimate of the quantity of material to be removed, (2) the cost of the necessary apparatus and plant, (3) the annual cost of operating the same.

Who Has It? The firm disclaim possession of the building and state that the contractor was erecting it for John Pugsley and was the defendant in the case.

The case of Skinner & Co. v. The Connecticut Fire Insurance Company, in which the plaintiffs claim that the defendants have refused to pay their portion of insurance money as apportioned by appraisers for the damage caused by fire on the premises of the plaintiff, has been traversed to the next court.
