SUNDAY, JUNE 20TH, 1897.

PARADE SERVICE of H. M. Forces, Societies and Citizens at Beacon Hill.

The Services of the day will commence in the Colonies of New Zealand and Australia, where Services have been arranged, afterwards in South Africa, and so follow the sun westward. Upon the sun having crossed the ocean and reached the continent of America, the brethren in St. Johns, Newfoundland, will re-commence the anthem, which will then be taken up in succession, across the continent through Canada, as the precise time reaches each, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The Citizens at Victoria, British Columbia, will send it across the Pacific, back to the place of beginning, having kept company with the hours and traversed the world in one unbroken line through the Colonies of the Empire of the Union Jack.

This continued anthem and prayer will be the loyal and affectionate tribute of Britains Sons to their gracious Queen upon the Diamond Jubilee of her accession to the Throne.

The Service shall commence at 3.30 p. m. by singing.

Opening Hymn.

Tune: "Old Hundredth."

"All people that on earth do dwell, &c."

To be followed by the "Lord's Prayer," and a short address by the Chaplain, Rev. C. E. Sharp, M.A.

At 4 p. m. precisely, according to Astronomical time, being the time at which the sun passes over each locality, the bugles will sound and the Royal Standard will be run up to the Mast-head.

The Assembly will sing the National Anthem during which the District Deputy of the Sons of England will deliver the Union Jack and the Canadian Ensign (bonded together) to the Chaplain.

The NATIONAL ANTHEM, to be sung at 4 o'clock, sun time precisely.

The Chaplain will then say the two special Collects, after which the Choir will sing the hymn.

"O, God, our help in ages past."

Tune: "St. Ann's."

During the singing a collection will be taken up by the Committee in aid of the B. C. Benevolent Society.
