EXPLANATORY.

Aphelion-The point of a Planet's orbit farthest from the Sun.

Apogee-That part of the Moon's orbit farthest from the Earth.

Astronomical Day is reckoned from noon to noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h, is 9th A of July 21, and July 21, 15h, is 3h m of July 22.

Conjunction-A Planet directly between the Earth and the Sun is said to be in Inferior Conjunction with the Sun. A Planet with the Sun directly between it and the Earth is said to be in Superior Conjunction with the Sun. Planets are said to be in conjunction with each other, or with the Moon, when they are in the same sign and degree.

Declination—The distance of a heavenly body from the Equinoctial, measured north or south, in degrees or minutes, on a Meridian.

Ecliptic-The plane of the Earth's orbit, so called because Eclipses can take place only when the Moon is on or near it.

Elongation—The distance of a Planet from the Sun as seen from the Earth. Equinoctial—The circle in the heavens traced by the Earth's Equator.

Node—That part of the orbit of a heavenly body which intersects the Ecliptic. If the body is passing from south to north, it is called the Ascending Node; if from north to south, the Descending.

Opposition—A Planet with the Earth directly between it and the Sun is said

to be in Opposition to the Sun. Penumbra—That portion of space around the shadow of the Earth passing through which the Moon diminishes in brightness, in consequence of a part only of the Sun's rays reaching her surface.

Perigee—That part of the Moon's orbit nearest to the Earth. Perihelion—That part of a Planet's orbit nearest to the Sun.

Quadrature—Two heavenly bodies are said to be in Quadrature when they are distant from each other by one-fourth of the Zodiac, or three signs apart. The Sun's Declination and fast or slow of clock are given for apparent noon, or time of passing the Meridian of St. John.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical time for the Meridian passage at St. John; and her Declination, when on the Meridian.

The Rising of the Moon is given from Full Moon to New Moon; and the Setting, from New Moon to Full Moon.

The Tides in the Calendar are the Morning and Afternoon Tides at St. John and Charlottetown. In the Tide Table (page 13) will be found Constants for finding the approximate time of High Water at each of the places given in the Table.

It will sometimes be found that when a Constant is added to the time of High Water at the Port of reference the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case subtract 12 hours from the sum and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required Port on the succeeding afternoon or morning, seconding as the Tide at Port of reference was a Morning or Afternoon Tide.

It will sometimes be found that a Constant to be subtracted, is greater than the time of High Water at the Port of reference: in this case add 12 hours to the Time at the Port, subtract the Constant and the remainder will be time of High Water at the required place, for the previous Morning or Afternoon, according as the Tide at the Port of reference was an Afternoon or Morning Tide.

FORECASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of its great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature and prevent those losses to the Farmer and the Sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the moon, but an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets like Moore, Zadkiel and Vennor claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area, he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading; and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

[Sea Coast Lights are distinguished from Harbor Lights by the latitude and longitude being given. Sailing Directions are also given, not true naulical, but according to general compass courses and bearings.]

West Quoddy Light. Latitude 44° 48′ 54″ N; longitude 66° 57′ 1″ W; tower of brick, painted with red and white horizontal stripes, connected with dwelling house by white building; fixed white light, visible 16 miles; situated on the west side of the entrance to Eastport and the St. Croix River, via Lubec Narrows. Fair anchorage in West Quoddy Bay 1 mile N N W from the entrance. The Narrows have lately been dredged to a depth of 12 feet at low water, the Channel being 200 feet wide; but strangers should not attempt to pass through without a pilot. There is a Steam Fog Whistle at West Quoddy Head, giving a blast of 8 seconds duration at intervals of 52 seconds.

Little River Light, on an Island at the mouth of Little River Harbor; tower white, attached to Keeper's dwelling; fixed light varied by white flashes 1m 30s; visible 11 miles; seen from NE by E½ E, via eastward to south. Also, fog bell, struck by machinery twice a minute. Latitude 44° 39′ 45′′ N; longitude 67° 12′ 5′′ W. Good anchorage for a small number of vessels just inside the Island. To enter harbor pass to eastward of the light.

Libby Island Light, on S W end of Libby Island, at mouth of Machias Bay and River; latitude 44° 34′ 5″ N; longitude 67° 22′ 2″ W; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Island is divided in two parts, with the Light situated on the S W end of the western part. To enter the harbor via eastern entrance, get Avery's Rock Light to bear N by E and run for it, leaving it handy on starboard hand, then N by E ½ E, to a high, bluff, woody Island, which leave not less than ½ of a mile on the port hand, then N ½ W half a mile and anchor. In using this Channel, keep a sharp look out for the eastern end of Libby Island, which runs low, and extends 1 mile E N E from the Light, and for Cross Island Ledges, which make off from Cross Island on your starboard, and off which is a red can buoy. The Channel here is about a mile wide. To enter via western entrance: Pass Libby Island Light a fair berth on your starboard hand, and get it to bear S S W half a mile, then run N E by E until Avery's Rock bears N by E, then continue as via eastern entrance.

Avery's Rock, in Machias Bay, near mouth of River; tower built from the top of Keeper's dwelling, painted white; fixed red light, visible 12 miles.

Moosepeak Light. Latitude 44° 28′ 27″ N; longitude 67° 31′ 57″ W; white tower, white flash light, 30 seconds between flashes, visible 13 miles. Mistake Island is to the northwest side of entrance to Bay of Fundy. For entrance in Moosepeak harbor, leave the light a fair berth on your port hand, and steer about a N W course 1 mile, keeping midway between the shores on either hand, and as soon as passing through the Narrows haul towards the N E a few lengths and anchor. There is another small harbor about N N E, 1½ miles from the light, called the Cow Yard. From Moosepeak Light, Libby Island bears N E by E ½ E, 9 miles.

Moosepeak Automatic Buoy, in deep water, off Moosepeak light; works by action of the sea; often heard 4 miles; Bearings—Moosepeak light bears N by W 2 miles, Petit Menan Ledge W 4 3 15 miles, Petit Menan light W 15

miles, Libby Island light N E 3 E 9 miles.

Nashe's Island Light: white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles. To enter Moosepeak Reach, west entrance, leave light on starboard hand; also, a guide to Pleasant River.

Narraguagus Light; in top of a white dwelling house; fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Located on Pond Island, entrance to Narraguagus Bay and

Millbridge. Bell struck by hand to answer signals in thick weather.

Petit Menan Light; on Petit Menan Island. Latitude 44° 22′ 2′′ N; longitude 67° 51′ 51′′ W. Tall grey tower; white light, varied by a flash once in two minutes, visible 17 miles. This light is a warning against dangerous shoals, of which Petit Menan Ledge, or South East Breaker, bears S S E 3½ miles, on which is 6 feet at low water, (Iron Nun Buoy) painted vertically red and black stripes. Sims' Rock bears S½ E 2 miles; 9 feet at low water; (Spar Buoy). Tibbett's ledge bears E by N 3 miles, 9 feet at low water; no buoy. On Petit Menan there is also a steam fog alarm giving two blasts a minute; intervals between blasts 8 and 42 seconds; heard 8 miles. A dangerous neighborhood for strangers.

Prospect Harbor Light; on the eastern side of entrance to Prospect Harbor. White tower, showing a flashing red and white light, visible 11 miles. In running for the Harbor, bring the light to $N_{\frac{1}{2}}$ E. But it is a dangerous locality for

strangers.

Winter Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles. On south point of Mark Island, western entrance to Harbor, leave on port hand;

also, guide to Mosquito Harbor.

Egg Rock Light; on Egg Rock, in Frenchman's Bay. White tower, rising from the middle of a square white dwelling. Fixed red light, visible 12 miles. Fog bell struck by hand for passing vessels. Bearings—Bar Harbor bears N W ½ N 4 miles; Baker's Island bears S W by S ½ S 4 miles.

Baker's Island Light; latitude 44° 14′ 27″ N; longitude 68° 11′ 56″ W; white tower, connected with Keeper's house; white light, varied by a flash every 90 seconds; on Baker's Island, off Mount Desert; a guide to Cranberry Island, north east and south west harbors. North East Harbor Light; tower painted brown, with black lantern; fixed white light, visible 14 miles, on Bear Island; a guide to N E harbor by leaving it on starboard hand.

Mount Desert Rock; latitude 43° 58m 7s; longitude 69° 7m 42s; grey tower; fixed white light, visible round entire horizon 14 miles; on Mount Desert Rock, Maine; a bell struck by machinery. Bearings—Baker's Island bears N ½ E, 18 miles; Petit Menan light bears N E ½ E, 23 miles; Moosepeak bears N E by E ½ E, 38 miles; Matinicus light W ½ S, 33 miles. Vessels bound to St. John will run E N E straight up between Grand Manan and the American shore.

Burnt Coat Harbor Light; has recently been changed from two lights, to a single white light, visible 11 miles; on south end of Swan's Island. To enter harbor, bring the light to bear N E 3/4 N, and run for it until quite close aboard, then haul to E by N about 3/5 of a mile to anchorage.

Eggemoggin Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 9 miles; on Green Island, at entrance to Eggemoggin Reach; also, guide to Ellsworth.

Saddle-Back Light; tower, upper part, grey; lower part, white; on an Islet near S W end of Isle au Haute; a guide to Isle au Haute Bay, and to East Penobscot Bay; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; leave on port hand fair berth and steer N $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

Mark Island Light, on an Island at the western entrance to Deer Island Thoroughfare, or to Merchants' Row; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Grindel's Point; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; on the north side of entrance to Gilkey's Harbor, on Long Island, Penobscot Bay.

Negro Island Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; at south side of entrance to Camden Harbor.

Indian Island Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; east side of entrance to Rockport Harbor, Penobscot Bay.

Brown's Head Light; white tower, attached to Keeper's dwelling; fixed white light, but showing red between the bearings S W by W ¼ W and W by S ¼ S, visible 11 miles. In entering Fox Island Thoroughfare from the bay; keep in the red light to clear the Fiddler and the Bay Ledges. Situated on western side of Fox Island, and at east side of western entrance to Thoroughfare. Is extinguished when Thoroughfare is closed by ice.

Owl's Head Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; guide to Rockland harbor; also to vessels bound up or down western Penobscot Bay.

White Head Light; latitude 43° 58m 42s N; longitude 69° 7m 28s W; grey tower, connected with white dwelling; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; at western side of western entrance to Penobscot Bay; also a steam fog alarm, giving a blast of 4 seconds duration, followed by interval of 26 seconds.

Matinicus Light; this has recently been changed from two white lights, to a single fixed red light of the 2nd order, which proves to be more a source of annoyance to navigators, than a benefit. Also, a 12 inch steam fog whistle, sounding blasts of 5 seconds duration with intervals of 25 seconds. Located on Matinicus Rock. Latitude 43° 47′ 0′′ N; longitude 58° 51′ 18′′ W. Monheigan Light; latitude 43° 45m 52s N; longitude 69° 18m 57s W; grey tower; white flash light, visible 19 miles, flashing once a minute; on Monlieigan Island. Bearings—Matinicus bears E by S, 21 miles; Seguin Light bears W ¾ N, 20 miles; White Head Light bears N E ¾ E, 18 miles. Also, on Manancus Island, near Monheigan, a steam fog alarm, giving a blast of 15

seconds duration, at intervals of 40 seconds.

Bearings—Halfway Rock light bears W $\frac{1}{2}$ N, 13 miles; Pond Island light bears N, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles; Cape Elizabeth bears W by S, 22 miles; Monheigan light bears E $\frac{1}{2}$ S, 20 miles.

Half-Way Rock Light; latitude 43° 38m 21s N; longitude 70° 2m 13s W; grey tower; fixed white light, varied by red flashes, flashing red once a minnte; on Half-Way Rock, Casco Bay. Bearings—Seguin light bears E, 13 miles; Portland Head bears W, 8 miles; Cape Elizabeth bears W S W, 9

Portland Harbor. Also, a Daloll's air trumped giving blasts of 8 seconds duration once in 40 seconds.

Portland Breakwater; white tower; fixed red light, varied by a red flash every 40 seconds, visible 8 miles. This is a harby light, and stands on the end of the granite breakwater extending out from the south side of the har-

bor; to be left on the port hand in passing up the harbor.

Cape Elizabeth Lights; latitude 43° 33m 50s N; longitude 70° 12m 9s W; two white towers, 900 feet apart, and ranging N E by E and S W by W; easterly light white, fixed; westerly light white, varied by white once a minute, visible 18 miles. Also, a fog trumpet, giving two blasts of 5 seconds each with an interval of 8 seconds between them, then a pause of 42 seconds. Bearings-Boon Island Light bears S W 1 S, 30 miles; Thatcher's Island bears S W 1 S, 62 miles. These lights are a warning against dangerous shoals, of which Alden's Rock is mostly to be feared, bearing S E by E 21 miles, on which is 6 feet of water at low water; the others range from 14 to 18 feet at low water. Bearings—Cape Elizabeth lights bear N E by N, 30 miles; Matinicus lights bear E by N, 80 miles; Cape Ann lights bear S by W 4 W, 30 miles; Isle Shoals light bears S W 1 S 12 miles.

Automatic Buoy; a whistling buoy is placed just off Boon Island ledge; it is painted red and black in horizontal stripes, with "BIL" painted in white on the middle black band. Is often heard 6 miles. It bears E by S 31 miles from Boon Island light. The ledge is a wash at low water.

Cape Neddock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 15 miles. Also,

a bell striking one blow every 30 seconds.

Portsmouth Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; on left side of inner entrance to Portsmouth harbor. To enter Portsmouth harbor get Portsmouth light to bear N 1 W, and run for it until Whale's Back light bears S E by E and you are abreast the southern end of Wood Island, then steer N ½ E until past Fort Point, and Portsmouth lighthouse bears W by S ½ S, then steer N W until the light bears S by E, and anchor; or, when Portsmouth light bears S by E, steer S W 3 S, and anchor close in shore in the cove to the westward of Fort Constitution in from 21 to 6 fathoms. Those lights, in range, guide across the bar, in best water; bar constantly changes; outer bar buoy is in range with inner bar buoy and both lights; the beacon is moved as the channel changes. This station is on the north end of Plum Island, and on the south side of entrance to the Merrimac River, Mass. (Strangers should not attempt to enter.)

Newburyport Upper Harbor; two lights (beacons); outer beacon, black tower, fixed red light, visible 10 mls.; inner beacon, red tower, fixed green light, visible 12 mls.; both on Bailey's wharf, and to be left on port side passing up the

Ipswich Lights; on Castle Neck, south side of entrance to Ipswich River; a main light, with a range light in front; main light fixed, white, varied by flashes, visible 11 miles, flashing once in 1½ minutes, shown from a white tower; range light, fixed, white, visible 8 miles, shown from a black tower; the lights are 625 feet apart, N E ½ E and S W ½ W; in range, they guide to entrance of channel across Ipswich Bar in the best water.

Annisquam Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; a harbor of refuge for small vessels; on Wigwam Point, east side of entrance to Annisquam harbor; 6 feet of water on Squam Bar at low tide. To cross the bar, bring the light to bear south and run for it, leaving it on the port side; then run for the Lobster Rock Beacon, and leave it on the port side also.

Straitmouth Island; on south side of Sandy Bay, entrance to Rockport harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to be left on port hand in going to Rockport. Bad ledges lie off this light. Strangers should keep the north shore of Sandy Bay best aboard on entering Rockport; shelter only

for a few small vessels.

Cape Ann Lights; latitude 42° 38m 15s; longitude 70° 34m 30s W; two grey granite towers, 165 feet above sea level; fixed white light, visible 20 miles; the lights are 900 feet apart, in range at SSW and NNE; located on Thacher's Island off Cape Ann, and the northern limit of Massachusetts Bay; to be left on the starboard hand in going towards Boston. Bearings—Isle of Shoals bears N, 17 miles; Boon Island N N E, 30 miles; Gloucester Light S W by W & W, 6 miles; Long Island Light S W by W, 24 miles; Cape Cod Highland Light S by E & E, 43 miles; Londoner Ledge S E by E, 2 mile; Salvage Ledge N N E, 13 miles. Also, a 10 inch steam whistle, giving

Gloucester Light, on Eastern Point; on east side of entrance to Gloucester harbor; white tower; a revolving red light, showing once every 5 seconds, visible 9 miles. When coming from the Eastward, bound into Gloucester harbor; give the light a good berth to clear Eastern Point Ledge (spar buoy); then, when the light bears N E \(\frac{3}{4} \) N, run N W \(\frac{1}{2} \) N until the upper harbor light bears N E by N \(\frac{1}{2} \) N, then run for it, and anchor \(\frac{1}{2} \) mile S by W from the light. Also, a bell on Eastern Point, alternately giving a double and single blow, then an interval of 30 seconds, then a single blow followed by an interval of 30 seconds.

Gloucester Harbor Light, on Ten Pound Island, east side of entrance to inner harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to enter harbor, bring this light to bear N E by N ½ N, and run for it until Eastern Point Light bears S S E, and anchor in channel way or continue until Eastern Point light bears S, then steer E N E until Ten Pound Island light bears N, and anchor in S E harbor, in from 4 to 6 fathoms—hard mud; or, from this point steer about N W by N between Ten Pound Island Ledge buoy and Ten Pound Island, (giving the point of the Island a good berth) until the light bears E, then steer N ½ E until the light bears S by E, and anchor in western harbor.

Baker's Island Lights; latitude 42° 32m 10s N; longitude 70° 47m 10s W; two white towers, ranging S E and N W; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; located on the north end of Baker's Island, south side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbors. In coming from the southward vessels bound to Salem, keep the lowest light open to the east of the high light, and run for it; this guides to the eastward of the South-east Breakers and Searl's Rock. Give Baker's Island a berth of not less than half a mile, leaving it on the port hand, then run for Hospital Point Light, bearing about W by N½N, until Derby Wharf light is in range with Fort Pickering light, when Salem harbor will be to the WS W of you, and Beverly harbor W by N½N. Also, on Baker's Island a bell which strikes two quick blows each half minute. For better information, a lens panel has been placed in "Hospital Point" Light, which makes a more brilliant light in the line of the ships' channel from Baker's Island, then on either side, and serves to keep vessels from danger on either side.

Hospital Point; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; on Hospital Point, north side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbor.

Fort Pickering Light; red tower; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; on Winter Island, north side of entrance to Salem harbor. On entering Salem harbor from near Hospital Point, get Derby Wharf light in range with Fort Pickering light to clear the Haste Shoal; good anchorage half a mile S W by S from this light, with Derby Wharf light bearing W by S.

Derby Wharf Light; on the end of Derby Wharf, Salem upper harbor; red

tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles.

Marblehead Light, on Marblehead Neck, south side of entrance to 'arclehead, and to Salem South Channel; white tower; fixed white light, visible 1! miles; good anchorage half a mile W by S from this light. To enter harbor, bring the light to bear N W, and run for it until within two miles of it, then bring it to bear WeN W, and run for it, leaving Marblehead Rock (a high rocky Islet with beacon at top) 150 yards on your port hand, and when it bears S W run N W ¾ N until the light bears S by W, then run S W ¾ W into the harbor, and anchor between the light and the town.

Egg Rock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; guide to Swampscot anchorage and to Broad Sound. Leave it 13 miles on the starboard

hand on entering Broad Sound.

Minot's Ledge Light; latitude 42° 16m 9s N; longitude 70° 45m 34s W; entrance to Boston Bay; granite tower, natural color, 100 feet high; fixed white light, visible 17 miles. Davis' Ledge Buoy bears E by S; Boston light bears N W ½ W, 7 miles. This course must be kept good, northerly, to pass Bell Boat, off the north side of the Hardings Ledge (about 4½ miles from Minot's Ledge Light). A good mark to clear the Hardings Bell Boat, after passing Minot's light, is to keep Long Island Head light (fixed white) just

open to the north of the Narrows light, which is a red light.

Boston Light; latitude 24° 19m 39s N; longitude 70° 53m 25s W; on Little Brewster Island, north side of entrance to main ship channel to Boston; white tower; white flash light, flashing once every half minute, visible 17 miles. Also, an air trumpet, giving blasts of 7 seconds, followed by interval of 43 seconds. From Cape Cod highlands the course for Boston Light is N W by W & W, which well clears Minots Ledge and the Hardings; then, when well past Minots, bring Boston light to bear W by $N \ge N$ and run for it until within $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile of it or until the Beacon light bears about W by N, then run W $\frac{1}{4}$ S until the Beacon light bears W N W, then run W by N leaving the Beacon light 100 yards on your starboard hand, then steer N W 1 W (keeping the middle of the channel) for the Narrows between Galloups and Lovell's Islands, then about N W 3 N for the bell buoy off Nix's Mate, which leave on port hand, then run W by N 1 N for Fort Independence, leaving the lower middle buoy, red can, No. 6, a good berth on your starboard, and State Ledge buoy, red, Nun, No. 8 close aboard on your starboard; then run about N W 1 N for the upper middle buoy, black, Nun, No. 9, which, leave on your port, then the course to Long Wharf or to good anchorage is about N W W. It making Boston ship channel from Cape Ann, get Thatcher's Island fight to bear N N W from 2 to 3 miles, then steer S W 1 W until Boston light bears W by N 1 N. Then proceed as before given.

Narrows Light; brown house; fixed red light, on the right hand side of

Narrows, in ship channel entrance to Boston harbor.

Long Island Light; on the N E end of Long Island and southern side of entrance to Boston inner harbor: white tower; fixed white light, visible 16 miles. In coming up ship channel, and after leaving Nix Mate buoy on the port hand, and Long Island Light bears W by S \(\frac{1}{2} \) S, run W by N \(\frac{1}{2} \) N for the south end of the Castle until the Castle North Wharf bears N W by W \(\frac{1}{4} \) W, or abreast of the State Ledge Buoy (red, No. 8), then N W \(\frac{1}{4} \) N to the Upper Middle Buoy (black, No. 9), which leave on port hand, then the course to Long Wharf is N W 1 W. But it approaching Boston from Cape Ann, via Broad Sound, bring Long Island Light to bear S W by W, and run for it until Deer Island Point Beacon bears N W by N 1 N, three-eighths of a mile distant. then W by N 1 N up the harbor. Strangers should bear in mind that in the middle of Broad Sound there is by 8 feet of water at low tide; but by keeping on the southern side of the Sound, leaving the Graves Automatic Buoy half a mile on the port hand and the Devil's Limb Buoy (black can No. 1) a mile on port hand, and running straight to Ram's Head Buoy (black can buoy No. 5) about W S W, passing Aldrich's Ledge Buoy (black can No. 3 1 mile on port), then leaving Ram's Head Buoy 50 yards distant on port, and run about W 1 S to clear Deer Island Point Beacon, you can carry 12 feet safely. From the Beacon you will steer W 3 N for lower middle buoy, then W by N 1 N for State Ledge buoy, when proceed as before given.



The Act also authorizes the appointment of a Clerk for each Court, who sall be an Attorney. The sittings of the respective Courts shall be held at or near the County Court House in the shire town.

The County Courts have not cognizances of any action—1st. When the title to land is brought in question; or

2nd. In which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed,

except as hereinafter mentioned; or

Subject to the above, the County Courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant, and assumpsit, when the debt or damages do not exceed the sum of four hundred dollars; and in all actions of tort, when the damages claimed do not exceed two hundred dollars; and in actions on bonds given to a Sheriff or otherwise in any case in a County Court, whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

Sittings of the County Court.

The Courts hold Terms every year in each County, which Terms annually commence as follows:—

Charlotte County—On the second Tuesday in the month of June; on the fourth Tuesday in March and October.

Carleton County—On the second Tuesday in March and December, and the second Tuesday in July.

Victoria County—On the fourth Wednesday in June, and the third Wednesday in November; and on the first Tuesday in December for return of executions only.

York County—On the second Tuesday in January, third Tuesday in March and first Tuesday in June and October.

Sunbury County—On the third Tuesday in the months of January and June and on the Wednesday next after the second Tuesday in October.

Queen's County-On the fourth Tuesday in January and June, and on the third Tuesday in October.

King's County—On the first Tuesday in January, April, July and October.

St. John County—On the fourth Tuesday in the months of January, April, July and October.

Albert County-On the third Tuesday in June, and on the second Tuesday in November.

Westmorland County—On the first Tuesday in June and the second Tuesday in September and December, and on the first Tuesday in March; the September Term only for return of executions.

Kent County—On the third Tuesday in January, on the last Tuesday in April, and on the first Tuesday in July, and fourth Tuesday in October.

Printed and published in Canada, and posted from the office of publication, or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents in Canada and the United States, resident elsewhere than at the place of publication are free—if otherwise addressed the rate of postage is one cent per pound. Such newspapers and periodicals must be issued not less frequently than once per month.

Newspapers posted for City Delivery will not be delivered by Letter Carriers, unless prepaid by &c. stamp.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals Addressed to Places in Canada, Newfoundland, and United States.

On all Newspapers and Periodicals other than those specified above, the postage rate will be one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published not less frequently than once a month and weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, if prepaid by postage stamp one half cent each.

Newspapers and Periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and brought by mail to Canadian Booksellers or News Agents, may be re-mailed by such Booksellers or News Agents, FREE of postage.

Parcels cannot be transmitted by Post to any place beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

Parcels for British Columbia and Manitoba, via the United States, will not be forwarded if over 2 lbs 3 oz each in weight; for Winnipeg they may now be sent weighing 5 tbs.






HACKNEY CARRIAGES.—Rates of Fare.

The prices or rates of fare to be taken and recovered by and paid to the owner, driver, or other person having charge of any licensed Hackney Carriage shall be as follows; that is to say: for conveying one passenger from any public stand to any other part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, the sum of thirty cents, and for every additional passenger of the same household, each twenty cents; other passengers, not of the same household, each thirty cents. When detained at any place by any passenger, there shall be an additional fare of fifty cents every half hour de-When agreement for hire is made by the hour, the fare shall be the sum of one dollar for each hour, and in that proportion for each division by the quarter of the hour. In case any driver shall be required to cross the ferry of the harbor to or from Carleton, he shall, in addition to the above fare, receive twenty cents additional rate for one passenger, or more than one of the same household; but if not of the same household, then twenty cents such additional fare for each passenger; and also in addition to the fare, he shall receive the ferriage charge for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning. Every owner, driver or person having charge of any Hackney Carriage shall when requested so to do, carry with each passenger one trunk and also an additional valise, carpet-bag, portmanteau, bundle, basket, or other article used in travelling, without charge or compensation therefor; and for every additional trunk or other article more then hereinbefore provided, he shall be entitled to demand and receive the sum of five cents.

And 30 cents additional for every 50 tons such steamer shall measure over 400 tons.

It being understood if a steamer drop two anchors in the harbor on arrival,

she is considered moored, and any removal is a transportation.

The Ball will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sunday excepted) at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be hoisted its full length; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer keeping correct Greenwich time should then show 5h 24m 15s, and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. At the above hour of one o'clock when the Ball drops, represents 5h 24m 15s at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained, no matter where the ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at Saint John should compare their Chronometers by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45° 16' 42'' North. Longitude in Time 4h 24m 15s West of Greenwich.



SIMPLE RULES IN BUTTER-WAKING,

As Recommended by Professor Sheldon, of the College of Agriculture, Downton, Salisbury, England, and Demonstrated by Him at the Working Dairy in the Centennial Show, St. John, N. B., October, 1883.

It appears to me that good butter can be made almost anywhere by almost any person, providing natural facilities are at hand, proper utensils are provided, and ordinary attention is paid to the details of the process. I do not say that the finest butter can thus be produced at ease, for to specially excel seems to be the reward of genius in butter-making as in everything else; but good batter, butter that will win approval wherever it goes, can certainly be produced where now only an inferior article appears, if due care be taken. And I may say, further, that the volume of care required is not by any means difficult to learn or irksome to practice, but that, on the contrary, !' is just as simple and easy as the careless ways of unsuccessful people. Butter has to be made somehow, by every one who makes it, and the difference in the "how" makes all the difference in the butter. Bearing in mind that the work has to be done, it is well to remember that everything that is worth doing at all is worth doing well, and specially is this true when to do it well is just as easy as to do it badly, and far more satisfactory.

It is a slight on good milk that bad butter should be made from it; it is an insult, too, to the cow that gives the milk—the cow who has done her part of the contract well; it is anything but complimentary to the public who are invited to eat the butter, as if to say they have no such thing as delicacy of taste; it is, also, anything but creditable to any one to turn out such stuff, and a loss to the producer as well as to the consumer. Many butter-makers wonder how it is that they realize poor prices for the butter they have to sell; yet it is at the same time true that the public never object to pay good prices for a good article.

The best butter-makers in America command 70 to 100 cents a pound all the year round; the worst of them are down in the 'teens, or in the twenties at most; and the difference is the reward of the eareful man, or the eareful woman, as the case may be.

The first thing to do is to take proper care of the milk. Assuming that it is cleanly taken from the cow into a clean pail, it should be put into clean pans, in a clean room, whose temperature should not vary beyond reasonable limits the year round, say from 50° to 70°. The room should be clean, I say, and it should be outside the influence of impure odors; the last because milk absorbs such odors and reproduces them in the butter. I may mention here that cows should have food which does not communicate an unpleasant taint to the milk they give; should there be any such taint in the milk or odor in the room, a pinch of saltpetre in the milk will go far to checkmate them. But in any case, taint or no taint, odor or no odor, it is of the first importance that milk-rooms should be kept clean, should be lime-washed occasionally to sweeten them, and should be swilled tolerably often to remove dirt and other "matter out of place" from the floors. The utensils should be scalded each time after being used for milk, scalded with boiling water, rinsed with a solution of soda, and afterwards with clean, pure water. The room should be well ventilated, and only with pure air, and the windows should be screened so that no strong ray of light shall fall on the milk - this last because light



develops the fermentive organisms which lead to the che nical decomposition of milk. Thus in milk-rooms cleanliness, ventilation, an regulation of light,

are matters of importance.

The foregoing paragraph refers to dairies in which the centrifugal creamseparator has not yet found a place, and to the shallow-pan system of milksetting particularly. To the deep-can system, and specially to the Cooley system, they refer only generally, as I would have them refer to any dairy whatever. I may say here that the best of butter may be made on any of the three systems of cream-raising — the shallow-pan, the deep-can, or Cooley, and the centrifugal separator — providing care and intelligence are employed. Annexed are cuts of the Cooley Creamer (p. 180) and the Centrifugal Separator.

The Separator is, of course, adapted only to large dairtes of fifty cows or so, or to creameries; and it requires either steam or water as the motive power. A horse will drive it, and I have seen one drive it, but a horse is not to be depended on for a stendy, sustained, and regular supply of power. The chief advantages of the Separator are that the cream can be got from the milk while both are new and sweet, that less of it is left in, and that fewer utensils are required in the dairy. Perfeetly fresh butter from perfectly new milk may be thus obtained, if desirable; but the best authorities now consider that we get better butter from cream that has had time to mellow and ripen, rather than from fresh cream, because the latter is more or less insipid. But in any case, cream should be skimmed whilst it is quite sweet, and, no matter how long it is kept before churning. it should not be allowed to go sour. To let cream go sour is to injure the flavor and quality of butter, if not to diminish its quantity. To churn it

most tasteless butter; vet will such butter improve in flavor by keeping, though the flavor is better secured by keeping the cream to ripen — keeping it at a temperature of 50° or 52°, putting in a bit of saltpetre or glacialine to prevent acidity, and stirring once or twice a day to have it all exposed to the air, and to prevent the formation of a crust on the surface. Glazed earthen ware crocks are as good as anything to keep cream between skimming and churning; while pans of the same material, or the seamless ones of enamelled iron answer well for milk-setting.



by opening at the end, affords great facility for taking out the butter, as well as for seeing that the interior is perfectly clean. I do not say that those churns are better than any other, but I do say that they are good enough for anybody, and that the finest butter can be made in them.

Assuming that the cream has remained free from sourness during the time it has been kept for ripening, and that it is not more than a week old, I may say that the principle of acidity, artificially introduced when the cream is put into the churn, will be found to do good in helping the cream to relinquish its butter, and in making the butter firmer in body and brighter in tint. ing to coalesce together, it is a good thing to drain the buttermilk out of the churn through a fine sieve, and to pour in clean, cold water; the churn should then have a few turns, the water be taken out as the buttermilk was, and fresh water put in: this process should be repeated

of its volume of sour buttermilk from the previous churning. The cream of different days should be all mixed together an hour or two before churning, so that it may all be old alike, as it were. Fifty-seven to sixty degrees Fahrenheit is the normal temperature which it is best to have the cream when it is being churned, but it may well vary from 55° to 65°, according to the time of the year and the temperature of the room. These points set right, the churning should be done at a regular speed, which is slowest at the start.


and most effectual that can be adopted: and as it is of the utmost importance to the keeping quality of the butter that all the buttermilk should be got out of it, so is it necessary that it should be carefully got rid of. Butter that is ridded of its buttermilk, which to a great extent is composed of caseine - nitrogenous matter which is addicted to early decay - will keep well for some time, providing the other pre-

liminaries I have mentioned have been properly attended to.

The butter well washed in the way described requires little or no purification from buttermilk after it is taken from the churn, simply because there is little or no buttermilk left in it. But it requires to be worked in order to compress and consolidate it, to compact it into a solid and coherent body, and

to mix with it the proportion of salt which is thought to be desirable. If, however, the butter has not been well washed, or has been only partially washed, inside the churn, it must be washed outside of that machine; and for this purpose, as well as for compacting the butter, and for mixing the salt with it, it is always desirable to use a butter-worker, and not to touch the butter with the hand. The butter-worker, properly used, does its work much better than the hand; it does not soften the butter as the

hand does, and it does less injury to its grain and texture — matters which are of no little importance to the appearance of the butter. During the process of working the butter, pressure, not friction, should be employed, for friction injuries the grain of the butter. The quantity of salt to use will be governed by taste, and by the length of time the butter has to be kept, but it will vary from one to five per cent. of the weight of the butter.

The points, then, to be attended to in butter-making are these: cleanliness, temperature, and regularity in the performance of details, especially with regard to washing the butter in the churn.

Ensilage.

The value of Ensilage as a desirable food for cattle has been clearly established, and large numbers of silos have been filled during the past season.

The writer, on the 4th of September last, visited the farm of Theodore A. Havermeyer, situate about thirty miles from New York, and there found silos capable of containing eighteen hundred tons of corn fodder. They were then being filled at the rate of ninety-three tons per day; the corn fodder was hauled to the barn, cut to the length of one half inch by an Ensilage Cutter driven by steam, which carried the material when cut to the top of silos, where men were stationed to rake it in; after the silos were filled, planks were put over the fodder, and barrels containing about three hundred pounds of gravel rolled on top, nothing further is required until the ensilage is to be used, when the barrels will be rolled off and the folder taken out as required. During my visit ensilage that had been put in in September, 1882, was taken from a sile and fed to the Jerseys; it was eaten with great relish.

In the fall of 1882 Thomas J. Hand, Esq., of Sing Sing, New York, made

an experiment with ensilage, which proved during that season entirely satisfactory, and he has adopted the same plan this year. His method is to put the corn in the silos just as it comes from the field, and should be prove that the fodder corn can be preserved without being cut in small pieces—as is the universal custom—a great saving will be effected not only in the cost of machinery for cutting the fodder, which is quite expensive, but also in cost of

filling the silos, and in the time used in cutting the fodder.

It is claimed that an acre of land under good cultivation will produce twenty-five tons of fodder corn.

Jersey Cattle.

We clip the following from an Essay on Jersey Cattle, written by Richard Goodman, Jr., who acted as Judge of the Jerseys at the Dominion and

Centennial Exhibition recently held at St. John, N. B.

"We claim then that the Jersey is the most profitable butter producer. She makes more butter than any other cow; this butter is of a better quality than that produced by any other cow; she is as long-lived as the cow of any other breed, and she comes into profit earlier; she is as economical to feed, as easy to "handle," and more easy to make butter from, giving more butter in her milk in proportion to the other elements, making, in particular, a great saving in the amount of water to be milked from the bag, to be carried to the milkrooms and to be provided with pan surface—this is no unimportant characteristic, from a practical point of view; no small amount of time, labor and material is thus saved in the course of a year.

"The Jersey not only gives richer milk, but in her milk the "globule" is larger than in the milk of other breeds; in consequence of this larger globule the cream rises quicker, and hence is exposed a shorter time to injury from

fermentation, from odors, and from dust and insects.

"The larger globule, with its thinner envelope, churns more quickly and more satisfactorily, and is better adapted to all varieties of churns.

"It may also be said that cream cheese from the milk of this breed are highly esteemed; and Jersey veal brings a high price in the market.

To sum up:

"First.—The Jerseys are a thoroughbred and well established race. As far as there is anything of value in systematic breeding with a particular end

distinctly in view, purity of blood and a long line of worthy ancestors, and favorable conditions with respect to food and climate, the Jerseys compare

favorably with any and all other breeds.

"Second.—They possess as fully as any breed the power of transmitting their desirable qualities to their offspring. They are thoroughly responsive to in-and-in breeding when intelligently carried on for the purpose of intensifying and perpetuating their peculiar powers as butter-producers. The leading Jersey cows in America to-day show in their pedigree much close breeding among their ancestors, and they are better than any of their ancestors.

"Third.—Having smaller bodies than any of the other leading breeds, they require less food to build up and develop these bodies while they are growing. and they require less food for the repairs of their bodies when they have

reached their full size.

"Fourth.—They come into profit at least a year earlier than other breeds, and thus make a saving to their owners of a year's food, handling and housing. This is no small item considering the labor, the expense and the risk attending the younger years of valuable stock.

"Fifth.—They have shown a power unequalled by any other breed of adapting themselves to the various climates and to the varieties of foods of

all parts of the United States.

"Sixth.—No cattle in this country are more quiet, gentle, hardy, prolific, or

long-lived.
"Seventh.—They are the most persistent milkers of any breed. They seldom go dry for more than six weeks; many instances are on record of cows giving half a dozen calves in as many years without ever ceasing to give a good yield of milk.

"Eighth.—They make more butter from a given annual of feed than the cows of any other breed. Two pounds and a quarter of butter a day is not an uncommon yield for a cow in the Winter receiving a dozen pounds of dry hay and two pounds of corn-meal mixed with two pounds of wheat shorts.

"Ninth.—They will make more butter in twelve running months than will the cows of any other breed. Several cows in this country made in 1880 over seven hundred pounds of butter, two of them nearly eight hundred pounds, and none of these cows are believed to have yet reached the full limit of their powers. Records for herds of 300, 350 and 400 lbs, are to be found in many States.

"Tenth.—Their butter has a higher color in Winter, as well as in Summer,

than that of any other breed except the Guernsey.

"Eleventh.—The milk, the cream, and the butter of the Jersey has a richer taste, and a more lively and agreeable flavor at all times of the year than that of any other breed.

"Twelfth.—The butter of this breed, in texture and grain, has no equal. Its firmness, its freedom from salvy character in the heats of Summer, is par-

ticularly noticeable.

"Thirteenth.—There is no breed which has been crossed upon the common stock of the United States with more immediate or more satisfactory results. It is an important fact in cross-breeding that the most favorable results are obtained where the bull belongs to a race whose bodies are smaller than are those of the race to which the cow is allied, and the same is true where the male represents a race older and better established than that to which the female belongs; both of these favorable conditions exist in the case of the Jerseys and our common stock.

"Fourteenth. - The Jersey breed is surpassed by no other in respect to the opportunities it offers for the efforts of the practical or experimental breeder." rs, and ompare
