ALLIED ARMS TAKE THE INITIATIVE

Powerful Counter-Attacks Delivered by French Troops, Who Regain Bulk of Ground Lost—British in Ferocious Battle in Ypres Section, Where Decision is in Balance, But Ground Must Be Retaken—Footing is Secured in Hangard Wood.

IMPORTANT GROUND RETAKEN NEAR VILLERS-BRETONNEUX

French Troops, Despite Fierce Resistance by Important Enemy Forces, Regain Large Part of Territory They Had Lost.

Paris, April 26.—Counter-attacks against the German lines from Villers-Bretonneux to the south of the Luce were launched this morning by our troops, who succeeded, despite the fierce resistance of the enemy who had brought up important forces, in retaking a large part of the ground which had been lost in that region, says the official statement issued by the war office tonight.

The statement reads: "Our troops counter-attacked the German lines this morning from Villers-Bretonneux to the south of the Luce River and have succeeded despite the fierce resistance of the enemy, who had brought up important forces, in retaking a large part of the ground which was lost yesterday. We have retaken the position at the monument south of Villers-Bretonneux, penetrated into the wood of Hangard-en-Santerre and captured a part of the western portion of that village. The battle has been going on all day and is continuing with exceptional violence. The Germans have tried to arrest our advance at any price and have suffered great losses which were inflicted by our artillery. The German resistance was most notable north of the wood of Hangard-en-Santerre where the enemy seven times launched their assault battalions against our lines, without forcing our valiant troops to give ground.

The combat was no less fierce in the village of Hangard, which has changed hands twice during the day. South of the Luce River we have retaken positions which have held in the assault of the Ypres-Comines Canal. There have been intermittent bombardments on the right bank of the Luce River and at Harimans Wellerkopf.

The British Report. London, April 26.—The Germans have captured Kemmel Mountain and hills and also are in possession of Dranoutre, according to the official communication sent by Field Marshal Haig from headquarters in France tonight.

The communication says that north of the Luce River the battle is continuing fiercely along the whole front from the neighborhood of Dranoutre to the Ypres-Comines Canal. The text of the field marshal's communication reads: "North of the Luce River the battle is continuing fiercely along the whole front from the neighborhood of Dranoutre to the Ypres-Comines Canal. The enemy has gained possession of Dranoutre, Kemmel Village and Mount Kemmel.

"The enemy's attack yesterday was made in great strength by nine German divisions. The French and British counter-attacks and succeeded at first in making some progress, capturing a number of prisoners. Later in the day the enemy renewed his attacks, directing his assaults with particular insistence against the positions from Loers to La Clytte and outside the Ypres-Comines Canal. In the neighborhood of La Clytte and Scherpenberg all the enemy's attacks have been held, but after severe fighting in the course of which a series of determined attacks were repulsed with heavy losses to his troops, he succeeded in pressing our line back in the direction of Loers. On both sides of the Ypres-Comines Canal the enemy also made some progress.

"Early this morning the French and British troops attacked the enemy positions south of the Somme in the neighborhood of Hangard and Hangard wood and have carried their line forward at certain points by heavy fighting.

"On the remainder of the British front the situation remains unchanged."

ENEMY ARMS NATIVES ON COAST OF TRIPOLI. Washington, April 26.—German submarines have been landing guns, food and munitions on the coast of Tripoli, according to an official despatch today from France. The despatch quotes Gen. Nivelle, formerly commander-in-chief of the French army and now commanding the north African troops, as saying that the situation in the section open to German-Turkish attack on the Tripolitan coast is well controlled against attack from the allied tribes who have been co-operating with the Germans and Turks.

French recruiting of friendly natives continues, and these men become good soldiers in six months.

CANADIAN NORTHERN BUILDS NEW SHOPS ON SITE AT LEASIDE

New Yards Being Installed There Forecasts Move Up From Rosedale.

LEAVE UNION STATION

Other Big Changes in Railway Operation in Toronto Are Coming.

The C.N.R. has its own tracks from North Toronto west to the Hamilton and will join with the C.P.R. in the use of the new double track system to the east of Yonge street, thru the tunnel at Donlands station, one mile east of Leaside, the new cut-off to Duncan breaks away and goes due north toward Winnipeg and Vancouver via Sudbury.

The cut-off from Donlands to Duncan, two miles long, was graded and railed last fall and will be ballasted as soon as the new interlocking junction plant is installed, some time in May.

Removal of Leaside means the removal of a lot of the yards and plant in the valley at Rosedale to the upper level of Leaside to the north and east. Big developments in connection with the line down to the Esplanade, where extensive freight sheds and sidings and carage plant are already under way, and still greater improvements in the way of docks, coal yards and a system of car carries across the lake to the American shore.

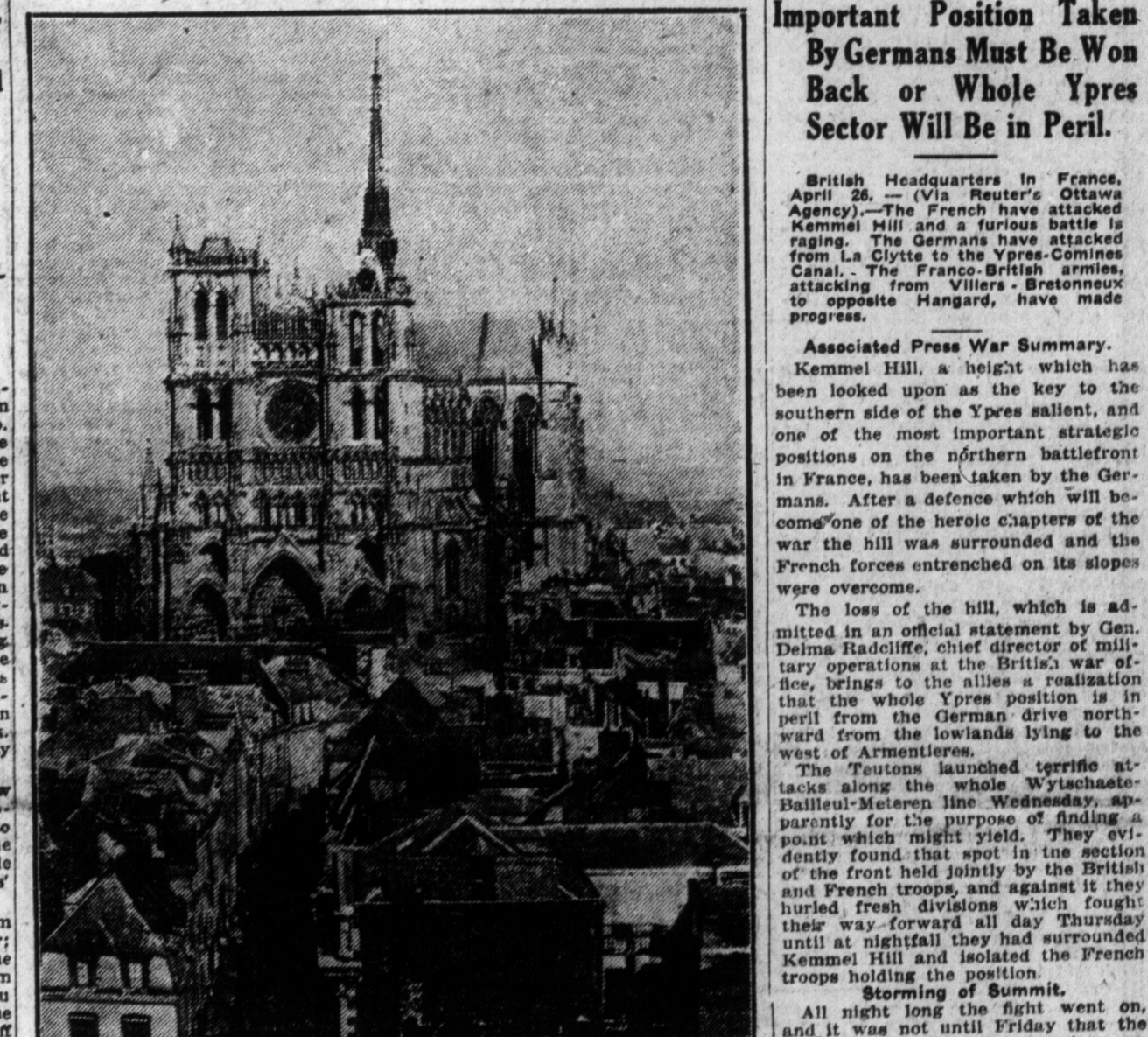

FRENCH MAKE FURIOUS STRUGGLE TO RECAPTURE KEMMEL HILL

ALLIED ARMS NOW ON THE OFFENSIVE

British and French Troops Begin Counter Operations Against Heavy Odds.

SOME PROGRESS MADE

Intense Conflict is in Progress and the Situation is Nebulous.

With the British Army in France, April 26.—The allied arms today were taking the initiative on both the northern and southern ends of the battlefield.

The aggressors at the time of the filing of this despatch have made some progress, but they were battling in the face of great odds, and heavy fighting was continuing with the enemy holding the advantageous high ground in strength.

South of the Somme the allied forces launched a combined drive against the German positions between Hangard and the southern outskirts of Villers-Bretonneux. The latest reports received some advances, but an intense conflict was in progress and the situation was nebulous.

Yesterday Villers-Bretonneux had been cleared of the enemy, who overran the British by a brilliant counter-attack. The British held their original positions.

The main interest from the military point of view today centered in the northern sector, where the Germans have been making such determined efforts to gain control of the chain of hills, of which Kemmel is one, and thereby threaten the allied positions to the north.

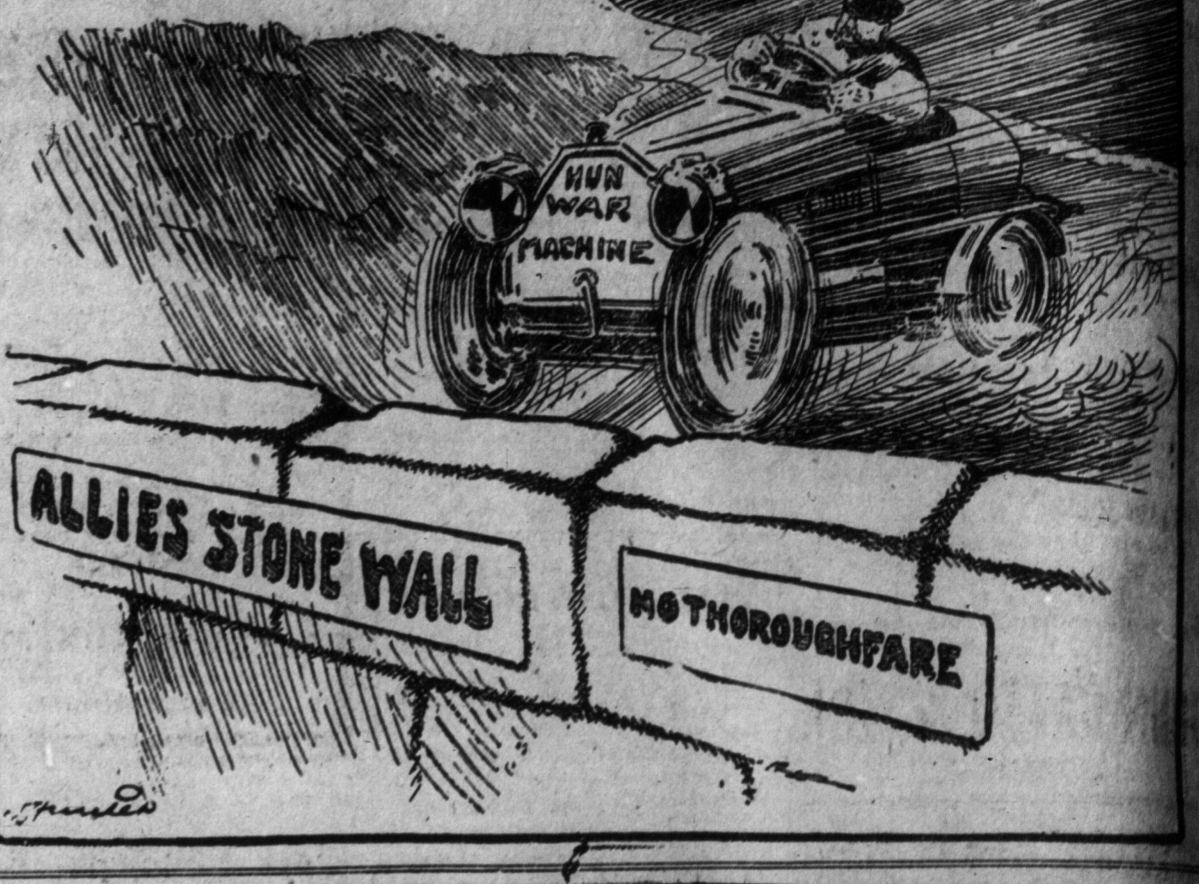

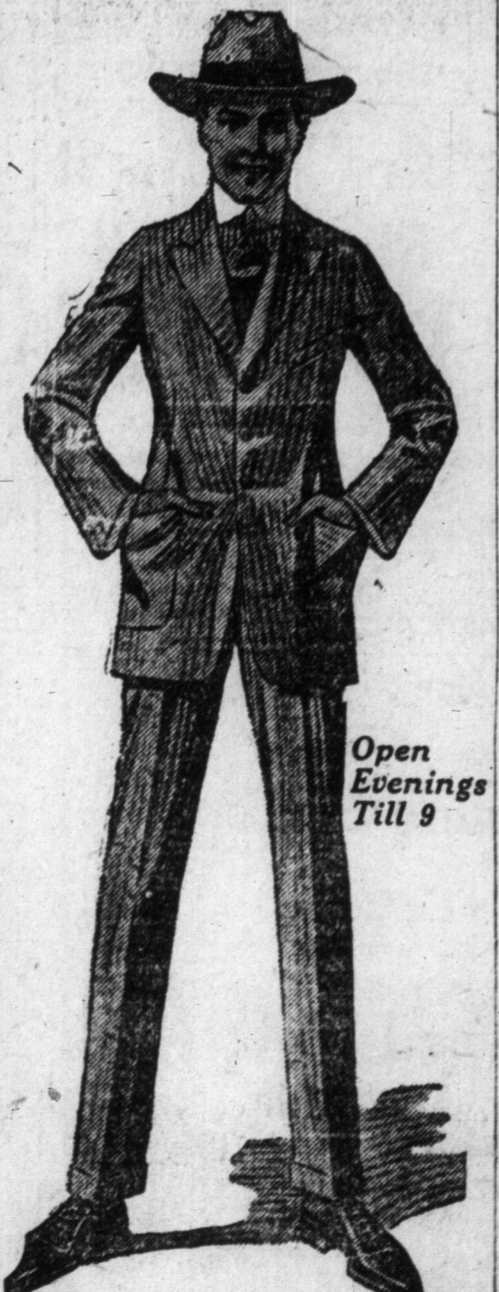

WILD FLOWERS

By Rachael R. Todd, M.D.

THE MARSH MARIGOLD.

Caltha Palustris.

"Where the marigolds gleam in the fringe of the marsh, Enamoured, star-gleaming in green glow of leaves.—The Lily Pool.

The Marsh Marigold is one of the first, early blooming wildflower of the marshes, river banks, swamps, and other like moist places. So common is it, and so well known that a description of these "Stars of the Marshes" would almost be out of place here.

No one can fail to recognize this "flower that blooms in the swamps" as the Indian name for it, Oronogaga, the large single and double yellow hollow succulent vivid green stems, shining leaves of the wonderful living green so peculiar to all aquatic, and the large single and double yellow blossoms are in hue like the richest gold. The blossoms are not unlike those of the buttercup, to which it is closely related, save that they are rather larger, and that they are both texture and appearance, and of a more brilliant yellow.

Our common marsh marigold is that same plant, ever wild as it is ever beautiful, of which so much has been sung, both in history and in poetry. Wordsworth, Keats, Shelley, Bryant, Lowell, and many other of the great number of nature poets have one and all immortalized the happy blossoms, under various names. "Kingscups," "Marybuds," "The Meadow-gown," "The American Cowslip," are some of the names under which we may find the Marsh Marigold, singing her song all down the long way of English poetry.

Marsh Marigold can be used for what slices she blooms, provided that those slices are sunny, and a moist spot be near into which she can wade undisturbed.

SERIOUS NEED OF WOMANHELP

Agricultural Sub-Committee Claim There is Shortage of Men in East.

Ottawa, April 26.—The commonsense opinion of agriculture met this morning to receive the report of the special sub-committee appointed on Friday last to make a report on the labor situation and more particularly the employment of labor in non-essential industries. The findings of the sub-committee were submitted by Fred Davis, member for Neepawa, Manitoba.

The report stated that owing to the long open spring there is no great need of men for seeding but there is a great need of women help. For the harvest season from August 1 to November 15, probably 50,000 men would be required.

Chairman Henderson suggested that the committee should offer some constructive policy, rather than complaint. Mr. John Best, Dufferin, believed that more information could be collected as to labor conditions thru the provincial authorities and two weeks later the registration board will secure in six months.

It was finally decided to receive the report of the sub-committee, which was instructed to elaborate its report more particularly in regard to non-essential industries and to prepare a list of industries in which women may be employed to replace men of military age.

Other statements made in the report as submitted today were that the consideration of the Military Service Act would seriously affect the railways which would require from five to ten thousand men to replace brakemen and firemen between the ages of 20 and 25 years who will be called out. From 3000 to 6000 men would be required for maintenance of way service. The opinion was expressed that for all essential industries including agriculture, and mining from fifty to seventy-five thousand men will be required.
