SCHOOL CHILDREN'S TICKETS NICE LINE FOR ARGUMENT

What is Age Limit at Which Company Can Refuse—Bunch of Interesting Opinions.

What does "school children's tickets" mean on the street railway? There is latitude for lots of open discussion on the question, and it all hinges on the definition of the expression, school children.

Day in and day out there are arguments on the cars between pretty well grown up young people and patient conductors as to whether the pink ticket should be taken as fare. This disposition of the street railway people seems to be to regard the "school children's ticket" as legal tender for half fare, as it applies to children generally by the rules of the company, and older children who have the tickets must be regarded as entitled to them in the judgment of the conductor or they will not be honored.

The cause in the agreement, however, leaves it pretty well open for all attending a school to be so-called school children. There is nothing whatever in the agreement limiting the age no matter what the intention might have been. There is a very large demand for school children's tickets, and perhaps the privilege is abused, but here is the agreement: "Children under nine years of age and not in arms shall be entitled to half fare, and infants in arms are to be carried free. SCHOOL CHILDREN ARE TO TAKE SCHOOL TICKETS AT THE RATE OF TEN FOR 25 CENTS, only to be used between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., and not on Saturdays."

What Mr. Fleming Says. On every hand where the matter comes up for discussion there are different opinions. Chatting about it yesterday General Manager Fleming said: "The company is in a most generous spirit. You can quote me as just saying that it is a question of the largest benefit to the school children, because the judgment of the conductor, because there is no doubt about it that the privilege is abused. On the other hand, the matter is to give a good wise scope to the school riders," further remarks the manager, who insisted that the company should make things a lot more uncomfortable if they want to.

Mr. Chisholm Does Not Like It. The thing is one upon which the city solicitor declines to give the benefits of any of his doubts until he can look into the matter and one of the arguments which lawyers can find to prove that a child is not a child, or is twinned, or anything else, Mr. Chisholm says it is a question that would need careful consideration. This is not by any means the first time it has been raised. Only recently there was an irate citizen who complained that his children pink tickets during vacation. The matter was left to the engineer, who drew Manager Fleming's attention to it. In a letter in reply Mr. Fleming stated that the instructions to conductors were to accept school children's tickets, any time, any day, and from all children during school hours, and that the conductors had not been instructed to exact the full company was entitled to.

Might Make Regular Age. Trustee Smallpiece thinks it would be reasonable if an age limit of 14 to 15 be set for regular tickets. "It is a school child," said Mr. Smallpiece. "Other school trustees think all pupils are entitled to the reduced fare regardless of their age. It is a wide open question, too, as to whether students at the university and other colleges could not continue to have the scope of the privilege. Such an authority as Ephraim Parsons Roden can only say that school children's tickets are for children attending school, whether it is vacation time or any other time, and that pupils attending school between the ages of five and 21 years are, he would think, entitled to the privileges of school children. Any child between the ages of 5 and 14 he would look upon as a school child.

John Burns, for years an employee of the city education department, takes a similar view to that of Mr. Roden. "The Ontario department of education asks us to provide them with the names of our pupils between the ages of 5 and 21 years, and I presume we must look upon the youngsters as children," he says. "I have seen Inspector Hughes' right bower for many years. 'I would think anyone going to our school should be honestly classed as school children, and could come within the citizens' rights under the clause in the street railway agreement.' It is a very good experience for the school officers to receive complaints regarding trouble over the children's tickets."

Inspector Hughes' View. Anyone going to a public school or a high school is in my opinion a school child, said Inspector Hughes. "How much more the case for the street railway to apply to those attending educational institutions I cannot say. I have had no complaints made to me as inspector."

The Men Who Know. The men to say a few things to about it are the conductors. "Our instructions are to give and take as well as we can, not only in regard to the school children's tickets but all tickets. We have some peculiar people to deal with very often, and the conductor who knows his business will be a fragment but sooner than have the trouble of a scrap, for if complaint is made it's a case of going to the courts, and if you are in the right it doesn't do you too much good as far as advancement on the road or the ease of your job is concerned to have to continually face Father Nix, who is the man that tells you to tell him all about it. There isn't so much suspension business now as there was in the old days, and the last year or so there is a better show for the fellow who is doing his level best, as may be you will notice by a few promotions made in the different systems adopted a couple of years ago in running the cars.


The company knows that the school kids' tickets leave it open to a lot of young people who don't go to school to use them, but unless it is a fragment of time, they are not supposed to take school children's tickets on Saturday. It says so on the back of the ticket, but we do take 'em and give to get them. I for one don't mind having children on the cars. Some of the mischief fellows might get a pink ticket from one of the school children because you think he or she is too old, you might be bumped, and if you are any way, the company knows it, and it is left to the conductors to do the best they can."

More Inside Information. "If a passenger makes a complaint to the management, does the conductor get a fair show before suspension?" the reporter asked the transfer puncher. "That isn't as much as you would expect, as there used to be," answered the conductor. "In fact, as far as I know, there isn't any. It's first, they say you are wrong, and if you are not wrong Nix isn't so bad. He listens with a leaning toward the company, and he isn't going to fire a good man because some crazy citizen makes a kick which doesn't hold good."



40 MEMORIALS TO THRONE CONDEMNING PEACE TREATY

Tokyo, Sept. 22.—The number of direct memorials to the throne from different associations and individuals condemning the peace treaty and asking that it be not ratified exceeds 40, among which is an address signed by six professors of the Imperial University. This memorial strongly urges the necessity for refusing to ratify the treaty and condemns it as an attempt to annul the purpose of the war as set forth in the declaration of hostilities. It also stated that indisputable reasons existed for refusing to ratify the treaty, which is deemed to be tantamount to a national insult.

East Toronto.
East Toronto, Sept. 22.—An special meeting of the town council was held to-night to consider the request of the Calmar Foundry Company for an extension of time for the fulfillment of their contract to install pumps of sufficient capacity to supply the town with the required quantity of water as specified in their agreement.

A letter was read from Mr. Ashworth, manager of the company, stating if the time were extended to Nov. 1, the company would use every effort to make good their contract, and if by the 15th of November they shall have not done so, that any temporary pumping plant which they have been using would be left in possession of the town until the latter had installed pumps from other sources.

After much discussion of the merits of "turbine" pumps and other kinds of pumps, a resolution was passed agreeing to the extension of time provided that in addition to the five dollars per day penalty for non-fulfillment a further penalty of \$1500 be imposed in the event of the company being unable to have pumps with a capacity for pumping 400 gallons of water per minute installed, and in complete compliance with the order of the council.

A deputation from the Dunlop Tire Company was present, and asked permission to use Dunforth avenue as part of the course for their annual road race on Sept. 30. In view of the town bylaw against scorching the council could not officially give the desired permit, but the deputation was given to understand that the road racers would not be interfered with, and everybody was satisfied.

MONEY FOR MISSIONARIES.
Foreboding Figures Show How the Ladies' League Help.

The activity of the members of the women's auxiliary of the Church of England in Canada was further evidenced in a remarkable manner yesterday when the meeting was resumed in St. Luke's school house. The report furnished by Miss Halton, general secretary, showed that 2411 bales of clothing had been sent out during the last three years, an increase of over 400 bales since the last year. The expenditure amounted to \$48,850.56, an increase of \$10,987.73. All but 75 bales had gone to the Northwest Indians.

Miss Amy Gaviller, the general junior secretary, reported concerning the work of the junior secretaries. The address was afterwards given by Canon Cody, Church and foreign missionaries formed the subject of an interesting speech by Canon Pollard, of Ottawa.

At the afternoon meeting Miss Edith Carter, the treasurer, reported that \$35,423.18 had been raised, \$30,238.27 of which had been expended. The editor of The Leaflet, Mrs. Willoughby, also reported on the changes which had taken effect last October in the size and appearance of that magazine. The effect of the changes had been to increase the circulation from 829 to 11,904. The exchange list had been extended to 400 copies per month, and each month showed a surplus. The receipts were \$1942.23, and the expenditure \$1894.22.

Mrs. Webster spoke of "Our pledges and how to meet them." These, she pointed out, were of three kinds: personal, diocesan and parochial. Individual members to fulfil these pledges were adopted. Miss Gaviller's closing prayer of missions was systematic effort to spread missionary knowledge. Mrs. Sage of Huron well set the best example in her promotion of missionary zeal in the smaller branches.

St. James' school house was crowded last night on the occasion of a missionary meeting. In the unavoidable absence of Bishop Scadding, the Rev. Canon Welsh presided. Archdeacon Penreath of the diocese of New Westminster presided over the women's auxiliary to work in a hundred and one ways.

The funeral will take place from the family residence, 74 McMurray avenue, on Monday morning at 10 o'clock, officiated by Rev. Father Gallagher, at 8 o'clock, after which the remains will be conveyed to Mount Hope Cemetery for interment.

Mrs. Johnson's husband also promised Mrs. Johnson a life annuity in the new building as soon as completed. She has come here a few weeks ago from Toronto and were in desire to return to her home in Detroit. Her son is a bank messenger in Toronto.

Fakirs at Stirling.
Belleville, Sept. 22.—The chief of police of this city today received a notification from Mr. Cowan of the department of agriculture, asking him to inform the county authorities that, according to information received, a number of fakirs had done considerable business in the vicinity of Stirling yesterday, where the annual fair was held. The fakirs, it was said, were put off by the fair, and ran their games, etc., in the village.
