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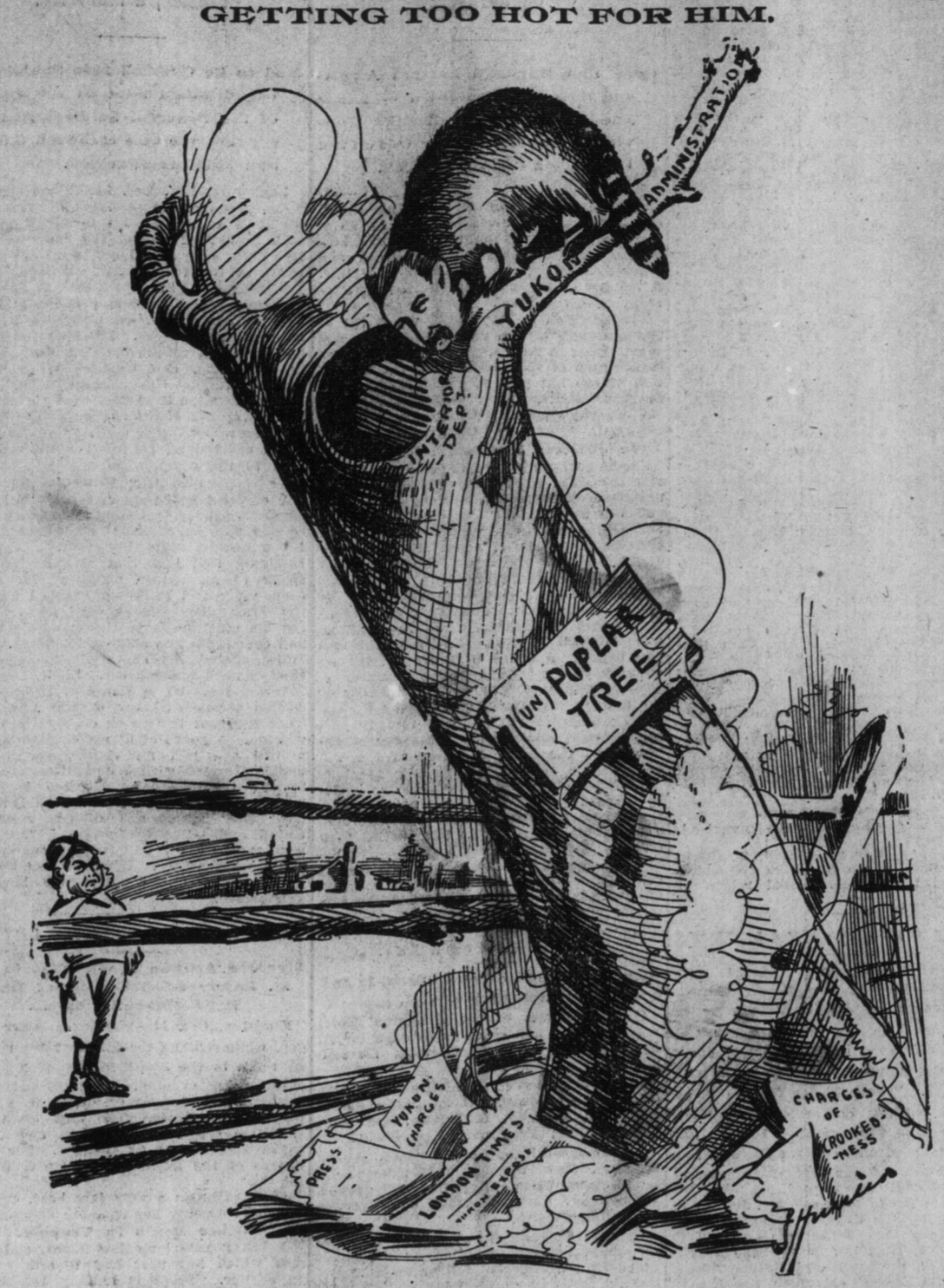

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FOR BURNING BLOODY MURDERS

Killing of Missionaries in Africa Will Be Avenged.

Over One Hundred Natives Awaiting Trial at Freetown—Large Number of Chiefs Already Convicted—Massacre Grew Out of the Imposition of the Hut Tax.

Sierra Leone, West Africa, Oct. 11.—Native chiefs to the number of 100 have been arrested and are awaiting trial at Freetown, capital of the British colony of Sierra Leone, for the murder of American and other missionaries at Kweilin, in May last.

The rebellion in May, 1898, which led to the massacre of the missionaries of the West Coast of Africa, grew out of the imposition of the hut tax and spread through the Sherbro district, where the headquarters of the American missionaries, members of the United Brethren Church, was located.

The insurgents burned the mission houses and murdered a number of the missionaries, including Mr. and Mrs. Cain and the Misses Archer, Hatfield and Schenck. Other of the missionaries, including Mr. and Mrs. Cain and the Misses Archer, Hatfield and Schenck.

Cattle Market Removal Mooted Civic Scheme. Property Committee Let Guess for Themselves of Former World Editor Shaw is Dissatisfied.

Passed at Meeting of the Council. It was known that the council claimed all along that the proposed improvements would be adequate for at least yet this purpose of a chair on the part of the council.

WHAT THEY WOULD COST

Cattle Market Removal and Other Mooted Civic Schemes.

Property Committee Left People to Guess for Themselves What Cost of Former Wood Be and Mayer Shaw is Disastrous With Them Accordingly - The World Has "Hearing" the Council, Now Scaring the Taxpayers.

The Property Committee, it will be remembered, was last week committed itself at the last meeting to a policy of cattle market removal. When the report got into the hands of the Board of Control it is likely that the Mayor will insist that it be referred back. His own reports, or rather those of the "Big Four," have been sent back upon occasions "for more information," and it is this that the Property Committee, it will be remembered, did not bother itself with the little detail as to what it would finally cost to establish in a new market. They asked no report on this subject, neither did they go into the details as to how they would have the new cattle pens built, floor, or drained. It now appears that the Commissioner, Coatsworth, was misinterpreted when he was quoted as saying that the present site was inadequate.

Passed at Meeting's End. It was known that the commissioner had claimed all along that the present site would be adequate for at least five years and yet this purpose of a change of front on his part was quipped down with the utmost credibility on the part of all but Aid Sheppard. It was all done at the far end of a meeting, the opportunity having already been deemed favorable by the Leakeites.

World, in this connection, enjoyed the carping of two evening contemporaries, for estimating, among other things, that it would cost \$200,000 to move the cattle market. The News figures this way: The figures as to the cost of removing the cattle market are also absurdly high. The whole curley in connection with the removal will not exceed \$75,000, and the city will still possess the present site, which cannot be worth less than \$75,000 for railway or factory purposes. But suppose we allow a depreciation of 33 1/3 per cent., we should still have a property worth \$50,000. That would reduce the expenditure in connection with the removal to \$25,000 and knock another \$175,000 from The World's swag-bag.

Will Cost at Least \$200,000. Just how The News reduces the total cost to \$75,000 is scarcely clear. The Leakeite seems to meet with most favor just by those who prefer removal. It will cost just \$30,000. This would leave \$25,000 for roads, pens, drainage, etc. City Commissioner Coatsworth and Assessment Commissioner Fleming Jolly reported last week when the Union Stock Yards Market was after the control of the market, that the improvement would cost \$100,000. This was on a site of less than 11 acres in all. The whole site is 20 acres in extent. At the same time, the cattle pens on it should cost nearly double. But the market is to be improved, with better flooring, proper drainage, etc. This should make the cost of the improvement at least double that of those on the present site. This would mean \$200,000 cost for steading buildings. To be well located, they should be on the present site. The News estimates that the old site ought to be worth \$50,000 for factory purposes. This is indeed optimistic. The News forgets that for 30 years the city tried to sell the property immediately adjoining the market for the same purpose, and finally in despair turned it into Stanley Park. The present site must, therefore, be for some years a white elephant on the city's hands. It would depreciate at The News' estimate of 33 1/3 per cent. in value, and therefore, actually add to the cost of removal by \$15,000. The News estimates that \$75,000 is sold for factory sites, retaining \$75,000. The News' estimate of net cost of removal is not \$100,000 or less. But the fact that such a mistake idea as the News has entertained is possible, speaks for the wisdom of the demand for its official report to the Property Committee as to what it should cost.

In the course of the same article, in which The World is charged with "bearing the brunt" of the News' approach to the World's estimate that it will require \$250,000 to finish the new market, the News says it pins its faith on the fact that the News' estimate that \$10,000 will do it. It is not necessary to reply for the benefit of taxpayers, who have seen the architect's estimate before. It will be remembered that the last time it was published it promised that \$200,000 would finish it. Over \$400,000 has been spent since. What would the architect's estimate be if he had threatened lawsuit?

St. Lawrence Market \$150,000. The News again, in the News' estimate, is charged with the figures for removing St. Lawrence Market to \$80,000, forgetting the fact that this is the amount which Aid Sheppard, Market Improvement Commissioner, estimated for cost of the section between Front and Spadina alone. The city certainly cannot undertake this work and leave it half-done. And to do it, the News estimates it must cost \$150,000. His is the only official estimate before the aldermen. It should be remembered here that the World said nothing of the merits of each or any of the schemes. The strong advocate of this paper is too well known to have it hurt the publicity. It was intended as a paper that it was not a "bogie," as per The Star, but simply a quiet, well-considered estimation.

Victoria-Square to the Fore. The News further strikes off the item, \$25,000 for Victoria-square, alleging as a reason therefor that this is outside the range of "practical politics." The events of the past few years have shown that there have been, and will be, a sufficient answer to that.

So that The World's estimate that works now presenting themselves in some tangible form would cost over \$500,000, is not far from the mark. The News' figures are a disposal problem, the Don diversion and the tunnel are mentioned as being yet to be considered.

HOME FROM KLONDIKE. Cornwall Man Tells How He Found Things in the Golden North - Plenty of Wealth There. Cornwall, Oct. 11.-(Special).-F. S. Campbell, of Dawson, Yukon Territory, says that the region just as he expected. His knowledge of land experience in mining had placed him in a position to use his judgment to the best advantage. He had seen as rich veins of gold as he had ever seen in Colorado, Canada, or Arizona. He had seen ground worth \$25,000 a running foot, but it was not all like that. In the Klondike there were banks, as well as elsewhere, but on the whole it was the best mining camp he had ever known for places of this size. In order to fully participate in the wealth, a man should stay there and wait until the country was developed. He and his partner, ex-Reeve McDougall, left Dawson on Aug. 11 on a river steamer, a distance of 1900 miles, in six days. After laying off for four days at St. Michaels, they took the ocean steamer Bonhook for Seattle, arriving in eight days and four hours, covering a distance of 2500 miles. On the way coming down from Dawson to St. Michaels, they rounded 40 river steamers, laden with provisions for the Yukon District. There is not the slightest fear of a shortage of provisions, supplies, outfit, tools, etc. Mr. McDougall was in excellent health when he left Dawson, but fell ill on the trip. His many diseases, however, he pleased to learn that he is now recovering. Mr. Campbell left his brother, John S. Campbell, in Dawson. While there he met many of his old Klondike acquaintances.

IMPORTANT ART SALE. At Roberts' Gallery, 70 King-Street West, 20-Day-One Hundred Pictures to Be Sold. Owing to the inclement weather yesterday a sale of English paintings Roberts' Art Gallery had to be postponed until today. This course being decided upon after some 30 pictures had been sold. There will be offered, therefore, by Mr. D'Arcy, today at 2:30 sharp, about 100 important pictures, every one of which must positively be disposed of. The catalogue contains many names well known to Toronto art-lovers, and great bargains may be expected, as the pictures will be offered entirely without reserve.

The City in a Suit. Michael McCreedy, a Queen-street west butcher, sued the city for damages for injuries sustained by him through being thrown out of his butcher cart on Nassau-street on Aug. 12. His spine was injured, and he will be laid up for some months. Judgment was given in his favor for \$750 and costs. Mr. E. E. Forster and S. B. Woods appeared for Mr. McCreedy, and Corporation Counsel Fullerton and Mr. Chisholm for the city.

All were intoxicated and the boat drifted into the Galopps rapids and capsized, and three of the men were drowned, the other two being rescued in an exhausted condition. Two of the lost men were known as Paquet and O'Hugh, residence unknown. One of the survivors was Joseph John of Montreal.

LIVERPOOL CABLES EASIER,
But Chicago Options Rose Nearly a Cent.

Large Northwest Receipts Were a Bearish Factor, But Were More Than Offset by the Advance in the Cash Article at All Points—Local Grain, Fruit and Cattle Markets—Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, Oct. 11.

The lower cables and large Northwest receipts this morning caused a weak feeling to pervade the Chicago wheat market. Later, however, good clearances, a fair export demand and an advance in cash prices at Minneapolis and St. Louis, improved the situation, this month's delivery rising 1/2c, the December option 3/4c, and the May option 1/2c per bushel over yesterday's final figures. The close was at top prices of the day.

On the Liverpool board to-day, this month's wheat delivery eased off 3/4c, the December option 3/4c, and the May option 1/2c per cent. Spot wheat was 3/4c higher for the day.

Paris wheat closed 5 centimes lower to 4 centimes higher to-day. Antwerp wheat rose 2 1/2 centimes.

Chicago corn advanced 3/4c per bushel to-day. On the Liverpool board to-day, spot maize advanced 3/4c per cent, and futures 3/4c to 1/2c.

Chicago provisions advanced to-day in sympathy with grain.

Peas advanced 3/4c at Liverpool.

Chinese roses 6d at Liverpool.

December wheat puts at Chicago, 63 1/2c; calls, 65c; Corn puts, 32c; calls, 29c.
