When a public man disappears you recall the place where you last saw him, and the inspression which he made upon your mind. I remember Lord Beaconsfield, at the height of his authority, entering the city in a triumphal procession. I stood in the front line of the crowd, and when his carriage appeared, I was thrust forward with such force that my head nearly bounced through the window. Lord Beaconsfield showed no emotion at this intrusion. His profile remained impassive; but the eye which looked out of it was so strange and uncanny that I recoiled upon the enthusiasts who were pressing behind me. There was no speculation in that eye; you might have stared at it for a year without discovering any expression whatever. I thought of one of the most famous Disraelian sayings—Youth is a folly, manhood a blunder, old age a regret. Here was old age, honored, powerful, full of gratified ambition; but there was no regret in its aspect. Nothing so human! At this meeting Senator Addison G. Foster presided and favored a reduction of 20 per cent. in the tariff on iumber, provided the tariff on that article was made a part of the treaty with Canada.

E. G. Ames, who was present at several of the meetings of the high joint meeting in Washington City, made an official statement on behalf of the lumbermen. Like a half dozen other leading mill operators who spoke, Mr. Ames insisted on protection for American lumber, but agreed with Senator Foster, provided the tariff on lumber was fixed permanently as a treaty obligation, that a reduction of 20 per cent. would be acceptable and preferable to the uncertainty of political influences and tariff tinkering by those unacquainted with the necessitaties and conditions of the trade.

The U. S. Ultimatum.

The U. S. Ultimatum. Mr. Ames, in conclusion, said: "I think I voice the sentiment of the lumbermen of Washington, Oregon and California by suggesting that the reduction of 20 per cent. on rough lumber be considered the ultimatum of the American members of the Joint tum of tum

"I am informed that the United States sell to Canada annually about \$80,000,000 worth of goods, wares and merchandize, simply because conditions favor our markets; and that we buy of them about \$45,000,000 worth annually for the same reason, leaving a balance of trade in our favor of \$35,000,000. On account of this balance of trade, and a desire to offset it with lumber, etc., instead of cash, the Canadian lumbermen ask the American people to remove its protection from its greatest industry, and open our great market to Canadian competition. Is not this a great hardship on a single industry, with \$5 per cent, of the cost of its product, labor, particularly when the Canadians have everything to gain and we all to lose?

"I have heard it strongly intimated that the Canadian position is 'free lumber or no treaty.' If that is so, let it be 'no treaty.'"

American Farmers Show No Inclin-Corn Markets Easy - Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock-Notes and Gossip.

Liverpool wheat futures advanced %d to %d per cental to-day. Paris wheat futures were unchanged to lo centimes of to-day.

Chicago's wheat was heavy again to-day, partially owing to the arrival of the first cars of new wheat at St. Louis, and partly because of the farmers' free deliveries of old wheat, which would seem to indicate little fear on their part of any failure in the incoming crop. The July and Sept. options fell off a cent a bushel. The July delivery, however, recovered half, and the September delivery three-quarters of the loss before the close.

Liverpool maize advanced 1/2d per cental to-day.

Danubian wheat shipments the past week 272,000 bushels, against 32,000 bushels the corresponding week of 1808. Corn shipments 1,520,000 bushels, against 512,000 bushels, Agentine wheat shipments the past week 1,006,000 bushels, against 264,000 bushels the corresponding week of 1898. Kansas—The officials of the Santa Fe Railway have revised their estimate of the wheat crop of that state, and now calculate on a crop of 35,000,000 busheis.

St. Louis—Reports that Hamburg and London were buying flour in that market, for the first time in some time past.

Chicago—Reports that the Northwest has been seiling neavily in that market, and that Minueaponis wires that the outlook for spring wheat continues good. Both Kansas and St. Louis predict large receipts there.

The Washington Weather Bureau reports that at the cud of last week, the harvesting of winter wheat was generally in progress in the Southern States, some having been cut as far north as Tennessee, the yields generally being light. Harvesting would commence this week in the Central Mississippi and Lower Onio valleys. Some improvement in lilinois; wheat doing fairly well in Kentucky; no improvement in shissouri; wheat maturing showly in fudiana; wheat in Onio generally affected favogrably by recent weather, but considerable complaints of fly, grub and rust, Mienigan, wheat continues in very poor condition and is suffering from insects; nearly all reports from spring wheat states very promising, with occasional complaints of foo much rain.

Ocean freights—There is an improving demand for ocean room for corn and oats from New York to Liverpoot, at 2d for corn, and 1½d for oats. Enquiry for wheat room is light at 2d.
