Domestic Bye-Election Campaign Inaugurated By a Large Gathering at Bowmanville.

MISSING FOR FIRST SEEN IN THE PIER

Father of Henry O'Loughlin of St. Catharines Thought to Have Been Drowned.

St. Catharines, Dec. 10.—The sudden and mysterious disappearance of the sternard O'Loughlin from his home in causing much excitement around the city and considerable worry to his friends. It is feared he is dead. Mr. O'Loughlin has been suffering from dizziness brought on by indigestion, and yesterday at noon left for a trip to Port Dalhousie, on the Electric Road. He reached his destination, crossed the canal by the ferry and walked out on the pier. He did not return last night, but his wife, Henry O'Loughlin, thought he had stayed in Port Dalhousie with a friend. Today, becoming alarmed at his absence, he made a search all over the city and messages were sent to other towns. No trace of him can be found since he was seen on the pier. One man claims to have seen him coming off the pier, but it is thought he was with a dizzy and fell into the canal and was drowned. There is just a possibility that he went aboard the steamer Beta, which sailed for Toronto yesterday afternoon. He was well acquainted with Captain Sullivan of the Beta. Mr. O'Loughlin was an old and much respected resident and was several years ago a prominent and wealthy business man.

31 KILLED, 17 WOUNDED, 352 MADE PRISONERS

Lord Kitchener Gives Details of His Goody Weekly "Bag" of the Enemy.

LEADER MARITZ SEVERELY WOUNDED

Boers Are Still in Force in the Extreme West of Cape Colony.

London, Dec. 10.—Lord Kitchener, in a despatch from Pretoria, dated Monday, Dec. 9, reports that the result of the week's work is 31 Boers killed, 17 wounded, 352 made prisoners, 35 surrendered and quantities of supplies captured. By advancing the line of blockhouses in the eastern part of the Transvaal Lord Kitchener is now able, for the first time, to carry out systematic and continuous operations in the vicinity of Ermelo, Setaon and Carolina. BIG PLEDGE-SIGNING METHODIST REVIVAL

May Be Conducted in Ontario, Concurrent With the Campaign for Provincial Prohibition.

A proposition is being considered in Methodist General Conference circles for the inauguration of a great pledge-signing temperance revival, to be conducted in every Methodist Church in the province, to be concurrent with the campaign for provincial prohibition. Rev. Dr. Brotherton, secretary of the Methodist General Conference Prohibition Committee, returned to his home at Niagara Falls today. When seen by The World Dr. Brotherton said that from the correspondence which reached him in connection with his position as secretary of the Ontario section of the Prohibition Committee, he was in a position to state that it was the determination of the Methodist body to hold the Ontario government strictly to the pledges given to enact provincial prohibition. "What will you do if the government refuses at any rate, is what was asked. "The committee will call upon the nearly 900 Methodist circuits of Ontario to support such legislation," Dr. Brotherton responded. "If the government fails to satisfy four conditions, we will withdraw." "In that event," said Dr. Brotherton, "we shall repudiate the whole thing, and I can assure you that the withdrawal of faith would be fatal to the administration."

HENRY CABOT LODGE ON THE CANAL TREATY

United States Will Control in Time of Peace and Also in Time of War.

BRITAIN'S IMPORTANT CONCESSION

Bill Introduced Providing for Construction at an Aggregate Cost of \$180,000,000.

Washington, Dec. 10.—In executive session of the Senate, after a number of nominations had been confirmed, Senator Henry Cabot Lodge called up the Hay-Pauncefote treaty and made a brief statement regarding that convention. Mr. Lodge contended that the new treaty does away with all the objectionable features of the treaty of the last Congress and enumerated the particulars in which the revised agreement conforms to the action of the Senate in the last Congress, when the old treaty was before it. He analyzed the new treaty from beginning to end, showing that in specific terms it abrogates the Clayton-Brewster treaty of 1850, which, he said, had been the basis of the treaty of the last Congress. The construction of an isthmian canal. The abrogation of this treaty was a most important achievement, and he did not believe that the United States should or would lose an opportunity to make secure that concession. Senator Lodge said further that practically Great Britain had agreed to turn the entire management of the canal over to the United States, not only in time of peace, but also in time of war. "The United States," he said, "will be called upon to-morrow."

RAAGNON GREETS LORD CURZON.

Viceroy Speaks of the Marvellous Increase of Trade in Barmah.

London, Dec. 10.—A correspondent of The Times, writing from Raagon, says Lord Curzon arrived there yesterday and was heartily welcomed by all classes of the community during his triumphant progress through the streets. Among the addresses of welcome from the several races, that of the Chinese was noteworthy in its assertion of appreciation of the advantages of freedom, equality and justice under the British flag.

PRACTICALLY ABOLISH THEM.

Belief That Emperor Intends to Suspend Parliamentary Government.

Vienna, Dec. 10.—The prolonged deadlock in parliament seems at length likely to be terminated by exceptional measures. It is believed that the Emperor will generally put on the utterance of Dr. Koerber, President of the Council and Minister of the Interior, in the Reichsrath today. In reminding the House of the serious results likely to attend continued obstruction, he said that a government which would deal with the constitution would have to regard as the favour of the State, and the responsibility would fall on the Emperor.

COUP D'ETAT IN AUSTRIA.

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MAY GO TO SOUTH AFRICA.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—The Record-Herald says that Dr. H. W. Thomas, late pastor of the People's Church, may go to South Africa to investigate conditions in the reconcentrated camps. He has been asked to make the journey by persons interested in Boer rescue work, and the funds for his expenses have been promised if he will undertake the mission. The matter was laid before Dr. Thomas yesterday, and he would visit as many as possible of the camps, and his mission would probably require about three months.

HOW IT WILL BE BUILT.

Washington, Dec. 10.—Senator Morgan today introduced a bill providing for the construction of the Nicaragua Canal. The bill provides an aggregate of \$180,000,000, of which \$5,000,000 is immediately available, and of which aggregate sum such amount as may be necessary are to be appropriated by Congress from time to time. The control of the canal and of the canal built is vested in a board of eight of whom the United States will appoint five. The Secretary of War, who is to be president. The members of the board are to be paid a salary of \$8,000 a year each, and they are to be appointed for a term of five years.

PRINCE HENRY FOUGHT HABOR WARRIORS TETS FELL

Duel Took Place, and Consort, The Challenger, Insisted on Choosing Pistols.

New York, Dec. 10.—A special to The World from The Hague says: Here are the facts regarding the duel between Prince Henry, the husband of Queen Wilhelmina, and G. J. Van Tets, one of the personal attendants upon the young sovereign. Notwithstanding the official denial that actually took place, it is believed that the result of the duel was the death of the Queen's consort. Van Tets was wounded in the stomach. The duel was a surprise, a surgical operation was found to be necessary, and it was successfully performed.

PAVEMENTS OF GLASS TO BE TRIED IN PARIS

If Successful After Six Months, Will Be Placed on the Boulevards.

Paris, Dec. 10.—The Paris Bureau of Paving believes that it has at last discovered an ideal street pavement in the form of "devised glass blocks," with which two main thoroughfares are now being laid, after the manner of the pavement of the boulevards of France. The chief of the Paving Bureau explained the process to-day, as follows: The glass is first ground to a fine powder, heated till it becomes a paste, and then moulded into rectangular blocks. Our experience leads us to believe that no other kind of pavement is so strong, durable, clean and impervious to atmospheric changes. We have placed it in the crowded streets of Paris, and it has already proved itself to be the most perfect pavement yet devised. It is cheaper than the old system, requires only half-yearly repairs, and is easy to maintain. It has already been used in the Swiss cities, Geneva and Zurich, but it is not believed that it will be adopted in any other city of metropolitan France. The Municipal Council of Paris has already ordered every form of pavement yet invented with out satisfaction.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL.

Dr. Graham and Miss Kilbourne Formally Committed.

London, Dec. 10.—Dr. Alex. Graham and Miss Emma Agnes Kilbourne appeared in Police Court this morning and were formally committed to stand trial on charges of conspiracy to murder the infant child of Miss Kilbourne. The charge is that the two defendants conspired to murder the child of Miss Kilbourne, and that they actually did so. The trial is expected to take place in a few days.

GOES DOWN FOR LIFE.

Long Sentence for Montreal Man for Attempted Murder.

Montreal, Dec. 10.—This morning's session of the Court of King's Bench was not a lengthy one, but it was one fraught with terrible importance to those concerned. In less than twenty-five minutes Amable Barile had been sentenced to imprisonment for life for attempt to murder. The charge was that Barile had conspired with another man to murder the child of Miss Kilbourne. The trial was a sensational one, and the sentence was a surprise to many.

ADVICES FROM THE ORIENT.

Prince Tuan Planning Rebellion in Mongolia and Capture of Peking.

Victoria, Dec. 10.—The steamer Empress of India brought advices that Prince Tuan and Gen. Tang Tsang are planning a rebellion in Mongolia and the capture of Peking. It is believed that they have already gathered a large force of men and arms in the region. The Chinese government is expected to take strong measures to suppress the rebellion. The situation in the Orient is becoming increasingly tense.

MUST NOT BEAT CONSORTS.

Drill Sergeants Forbidden to Swear at Them Hereafter.

Copenhagen, Dec. 10.—The War Office has issued detailed orders for the more humane treatment of conscripts. No swearing nor bad language will be permitted on the part of drill sergeants. Whipping recruits "by mistake instead of their horses" will be severely punished. Drill must henceforth be conducted in the same spirit as instruction is imparted in the State schools.

JULIA ARTHUR'S PRESENT.

Her Xmas Gift Will Be the Second Largest Blue Diamond.

New York, Dec. 10.—The Herald says: Every blue diamond known to history will hang from a branch of an American Christmas tree if current gossip among jewelers is true. The second largest blue diamond in the world is now in New York and sold to wealthy Americans as ornaments for their holiday displays of generosity. Benjamin F. Cheney of Boston is the only known purchaser. He has just bought from J. Dreyer & Sons the second largest blue diamond in the world known to history. It is a Christmas gift to his wife, who was born in New York and is a native of the city. The diamond is a beautiful one, and is expected to be a great attraction at the Christmas season.

MONTEAL'S QUOTA COMPLETE

Thirty-Five Men Accepted of the Eighty-Three Presented.

Montreal, Dec. 10.—The thirty-five men in Montreal's quota to the third contingent were selected to-day at the drill hall after a very severe examination. Over one hundred presented themselves before the board of officers, and the quota was filled. The men selected are a fine looking lot of soldiers.

TRANSALASKAN RAILWAY.

Washington, Dec. 10.—Representative Sibley to-day introduced in the House a bill authorizing the construction of a railroad across Alaska from Cook's Inlet to Behring's Strait, a distance of 800 miles, by the Trans-Alaskan Railroad Company. The bill provides for the construction of the line, and for the appointment of a board of directors to manage the line. The bill is expected to pass the House in a few days.

WATERLOO HUNTSMAN DEAD.

Waterloo, Ont., Dec. 10.—Mr. John Devitt died at the hospital last night. He had been suffering from an attack of pleurisy for some time. He was a well-known huntsman, and was much respected in the community. He was born in England, and came to Canada in 1850. He was a member of the Waterloo Hunt Club, and was a successful hunter. He was a devoted family man, and was much loved by his wife and children. He died at the age of 70.

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THEY HAVE SPENT THE MONEY.

It was a mistake, therefore, to say that the government had spent out of all proportion to preceding governments. Had they been afraid to make the expenditure necessary for the opening up of the Yukon they would probably have lost him out of the country. They had spent the money, and the people of Canada had already received full returns. AUSTRALIA'S NEW LABOR LAW. New South Wales, the wealthiest and most important of the Australian States, has taken the lead in regard to the settlement of labor disputes by arbitration. The passage of the industrial arbitration bill has placed the matter in such a shape that the bill means to work both ways, and under its provisions strikes and lockouts will be out of the question. The whole industrial world will watch the operation of this law with eager interest.

THE FARMER AND THE COST OF LIVING. According to Dun's Review, the living expenses of the average family have increased 30 per cent. since July 1, 1897, to July 1 of this year. The increase has been in almost every article, and includes practically everything necessary for the maintenance of a family, divided under the headings of breadstuffs, meats, dairy and garden produce, clothing, metals and miscellaneous articles.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE PRIVY COUNCIL. A British parliamentary paper has just been published giving a resume of the doings of the conference on the proposed establishment of an Imperial Court of Appeal. Mr. Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, has been speaking on the subject of the proposed changes in the Privy Council.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF TELEPHONES. Ottawa Free Press: There are those who seem to think that public ownership of telephones and telegraph lines would enable the general public to obtain them for half price, and that they would be better off than they are now. CONTEMPT OF COURT. A Chicago judge the other day delivered an important judgment, the subject matter of which was the right of judges to punish individuals for contempt of court. The case came up before Judge Dunne under habeas corpus proceedings, instituted on behalf of The Chicago American, who were serving sentences of 30 and 30 days respectively, imposed by Judge Haney for contempt of court in writing and publishing criticisms and cartoons which reflected severely on Judge Haney's independence and impartiality as a newspaper assistant publisher.

PROHIBITION. The Christian Guardian in this week's issue says that the prohibitionists in this country are those who wish to make out the strongest possible case against prohibition, and that it is fairly enforced outside of large cities. Such an admission shows the possibility of enforcement.

STUDENTS' JOLLY EVENING

Annual Banquet of Faculty and Arts Undergraduates of Toronto University.

COL. DENISON ON FAVORITE THEME

Advocates Tax on Foreign Imports to Form Basis of Imperial Defence Fund.

The faculty and the undergraduates in arts of Toronto University held their fifth annual banquet last night. The function compared favorably in every respect with its predecessors, and was as lively as a couple of hundred or more undergraduates could make it. Short speeches, plenty of good music, and last, but not least, a good dinner made a happy and effective combination, and the students saw that the best was made of it.

Some of the guests, and to his immediate right and left sat the Minister of Education, Hon. Richard Harcourt and President London. Others present were:

Prof. Ramsay Wright, Principal Sheraton, C. Wade, Col. G. T. Denison, J. W. Elliot, Capt. Leitch, Prof. G. W. Brown, Principal Maurice Hutton, Chancellor Hurlstone, J. J. Coy, M.L.A., Mr. W. Brown, W. K. George, Prof. Young, Prof. McCurdy, Prof. Squair, Dr. J. H. Cameron, Dr. Revere, Dr. Thompson, Prof. Fletcher, Prof. Alexander, Prof. Milner, Dr. Smale, T. A. Husell, J. Brebner, J. E. Hill, Prof. Coleman, Not Appreciated.

In proposing the toast to the Empire, Capt. Leitch said the people of the other side of the Atlantic failed to realize what the colonies really were, and what a progressive people lived in them. Col. G. T. Denison responded to the toast in a ringing patriotic speech. A few years ago, he said, annexation and independence were talked about, and he thanked God that those two contingencies were now out of sight. [Cheers.] The development of the spirit of unity during the last fifty years was remarkable, and it was necessary for the very life of the Empire that it should be solidly united. It was not until now, there was no organized method by which the great forces of the Empire could be brought together.

Canada is the Lead. However, it was coming about, and recent events showed clearly that Canada had taken the lead in the movement. It was almost certain that there would be an Imperial conference in London next June, and if something was not done there for both parties and trade, the results would be serious. Let the Canadian representatives, the speaker advised, go to the conference with some clear plan, and advocate it with all the energy they could. The principle should be laid down that Canada, if the other colonies were willing, would levy a tax of 10 or 15 per cent. on all foreign imports, the money thus collected to form a defence fund. "Why should the British people try to carry away their resources in building up foreign and even hostile nations?" asked the speaker in conclusion.

Goes Back a Long Time. Mr. John Young, professor of law at "Alma Mater," and President London responded. It was 42 years ago he said, when he first heard this toast proposed. Since his long connection with the University had seen many changes, but there had been no changes or improvements that were more satisfactory than those that had taken place during the last 10 years. He had no hesitation in saying that he did not wish on the present occasion to advise the University, that it was considering the tax on foreign imports as good work as any in the world in scientific subjects.

Happened by Lack of Funds. Mr. George and F. C. Wade, in a happy speech proposed the toast, "Our Guests," coupling with it the names of J. J. Coy, M.L.A., W. K. George and F. C. Wade. He said as a great national institution, and commands the admiration of the public.

Mr. F. C. Wade raised a great laugh when he remarked that the growth of New Ontario was wonderful. In fact, it was so rapid that the government had to keep up with it. Mr. Wade also spoke incidentally about the progress of the Dominion was making.

WANT TO EXCLUDE CHINESE

But Labor Federation Did Not Vote to Keep Out Other Asiatics. Scranton, Pa., Dec. 10.—The exclusion of Chinese, Japanese and other Asiatics from America, ticket scalping legislation, and advisability of adopting a universal label for union-made goods, were the principal questions that claimed attention of the delegates at today's two sessions of the American Federation of Labor.

The resolutions advocating the exclusion of the Chinese were adopted by the convention with considerable flourish, but in this part of the anti-Mongolian agitation and other Asiatic lands a snag was struck and the matter of excluding natives of Japan was dropped. The burden of the remarks of those opposed to the Japanese resolution was that Chinese immigration was the greatest evil of the two and that to insist upon some restrictive law to prevent a Japanese invasion might endanger the passage of Congress of the Chinese Act.
