avoid calling the attention of farmers to it again, it is so much better to have good fruit than poor, and good fruit may be had with so little care, that indifference is most surprising. The most certain mode of securing good fruit is by grafting ; and the latter part of this month is an excellent time to select and cut scions. It is an excellent plan to remove the grass for a few feet from the fruit trees, and with a spade to loosen the earth in the spring of the year. Sometimes the snow disappears in Feby., and leaves the wheat fields and meadows bare-it is not uncommon at such times to see on some farms, such fields covered with cattle, sheep, or geese, trampling or feeding down the young wheat, and the roots of grass-keep your fences up, and all your creatures where they should be, until the proper time for turning them out arrives. Look to the drains in your fields, and see that the water courses are clear-water flowing over, or standing on Winter Wheat, is very sure to kill it.

The Kitchen garden will require much attention this month; as all plants which are not liable to suffer from spring frosts secure two or three crops of many beginning in season, we may season, even where no hot or forcing beds are employed. Salads, radishes, cabbages, potatoes, peas, \&c., may now be planted on sown, the earliest varieties of each should of course be selected for the first planting-asparagus and strawberry beds should be cleaned off, dug over, and manured-none but compost manures of the best kind should be used for such purposes. Farmers are generally too negligent as to the kind of cows they keep-there are many cows which do not pay to the owner the expense of keeping them, and occasions an annual loss--it costs no more to keep a cow that will average 9 or 10 quarts a day, than one that will average only 6 or 7 ; and the difference in amount would in the course of a year be a handsome profit. The great trouble with a clay soil, is its tenacity-the compactness of its particles, keeps, in wet weather, too much water on the surface, and in dry weather it bakes, and becomes so hard that it absorbs but little moisture, and cannot be penetrated by the roots of plants. Thus, on clay soils, vegetation is very likely to suffer in turns, both from an excess, and a deficiency of moisture. To guard against these difficulties, the first object should be to break this obstinate tenacity by a thorough loosening. To keep the vegetable matters near the surface, where, espe-
cially on such soils, they of plants, turn a-rather thin most effective in aiding the growth

follow with a sub-soil plough, running it as deep as the implement and the strength of the team will permit-this would allow the surplus water to pass readily into the earth, the routs of plants would easily find their way in search of food, while, in time of drouth, the exhalation of moisture from below, as well as its absorption from the atmosphere would be facilitated, and the growing crop would thus be protected from the evils of too much moisture at one time, and too little at another It is proper to observe, that if draining should be necessary, that should be the first object of attention; the lonsening of the soil as above mentioned, will operate as a considerable drainage ; but actual observation only can determine whether it will be sufficient. Continue to drive your haying and harvesting-rake stubble with a horse rake and save the scattered grain.

Guano.--This Article is now making a considerable noise in the world, and attracting the attention of Agriculturists in Europe and America. Baron Humboldt first introduced it to the notice of Europe, he considered it the excrement of sea-fowl, that has accumulated on the shores of certain islands on the Coasts of Peru and Western Africa-it is found upon analysis that about one third of the whole mass of guano is salts, of which ammonia is the base; one-fifth is phosphoric salt, and one-fifth a salt of which lime is the base ; and that all the other ingredients, (potash, soda, \&c.) are considered highly valuable and even necessary ingredients of good soils-but the ammonia of which so

As to the value of Guano as a manure, all who have published the results of their experiments in England, concur in the opinion that it is very great. The manner of applying it in England, appears to be various-some mix it with pulverized charcoal, some with wood ashes, gypsum, \&c. The quantity generally applied to an acre, was 2 cwt . of guano and 2 cwt . of gypsum, or 2 cwt . guano and 3 times its bulk of wood, charcoal, or coal ashes, but some considered that a larger quantity would have yielded more profitably. It is frequently the case that animals are neglected in the fall, the cold weather comes on, the ground freezes, and the snow falls, still the sheep or cattle are allowed to run at large, shivering in the open air, and gleaning as they best can from the frozen earth, something to satisfy their hunger. All animals, and man himself, feels the necessity of protection more on the first attack of frost, than after the system is accustomed to its action ; and there is no time in the year when care and attention to she stock is better rewarded than in the flrst setting in of winter-providing

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proper sheds or stables for stock of all kinds is indispensable, when the comfort of the animal, and the profit of the breeder is at all consulted. It cannot be too firmly impressed on the mind of every farmer, that it is much easier to keep an animal in good condition, and will require much less food to do it, by not allowing him to fall away, than to restore him after he once becomes poor -than to keep the fodder until March to raise the animals after the flesh is nearly gone, endeavour so to manage them that from the first cold weather, there shall be no falling off in their food or flesh. A good farmer is characterized by benevolence to his animals, not less than by the general management of his tillage, or crops-he will keep no more than he can keep well, and find his profits rather in their excellence, than in their numbers.

Lay in full feed for all your animals, that they may have a ful! supply through the long hungry season of spring-waste no fodder -provide racks and feeding troughs, that cattle may not tread their food under feet-shelter all animals, it will save food and flesh-see that cattle have water and salt at all times-let all stables be well littered-a dirty animal cannot thrive-a dirty hide will waste a cow's flesh faster than food will add to it. Chop up with a straw cutter all your corn fodder-thresh grain early, and thus cheat the rats, the only kind of fraud admissible with honest farmers. See that cows are milked very clean; more so than most boys and hired men can be coaxed or compelled to do
