



### **DISHONESTY** IN BUSINESS

**Gross Adulteration of Foods--**Milk, Butter, Lard, Pork Products, Spices, Etc., Impure.

NEW HAVEN March 12—Doctor E. H.
Jenkins, director of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station, and who has elso been employed by the federal government, publishes the results of analyses of food products made by the station experts. Somewnat sypecialized attention was given to milk, of which 362 samples, bought by an agent from milk wagons, were tested. Of these samples 104 were below the 21 per cent. standard for total solids, 194 below the 8 1-2 per cent. standard of solids not fat, and 26 below the 3 1-4 per cent. standard for fat. Nine samples were watered, and some quite unfit for sale. Two samples contained boric acid, the use of which is strongly condemed. Out of 116 samples sent in by health officers of cities 60 were watered, askimmed, contained a preservative, or were below standard.


Of 16 samples of "butter" tested 3 were natural butter, 3 renovated butter, and 10 oleomargine, or butterine. Out of 115 samples bought for lard from grocers and but these, 34 proved to be "compound" lard and are classed as adulerated and fradulent. Of 20 samples bought later, 8 were pure lard, 9 compound, and 3 were marked compound.

The station condemns its use as conceasing incipient putrefaction,, and giving a normal color to meat which is "swarming with bacteria." 
