



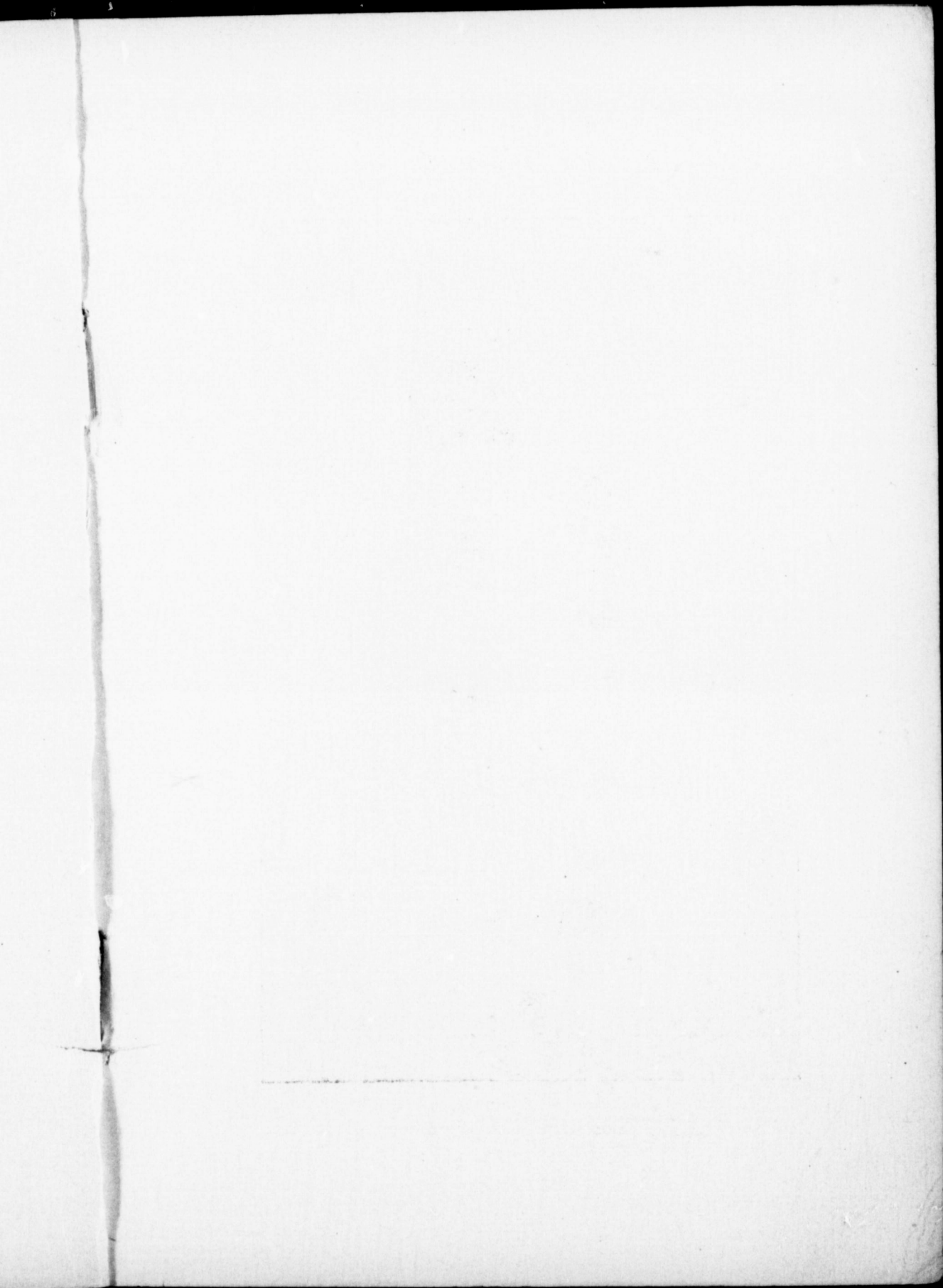

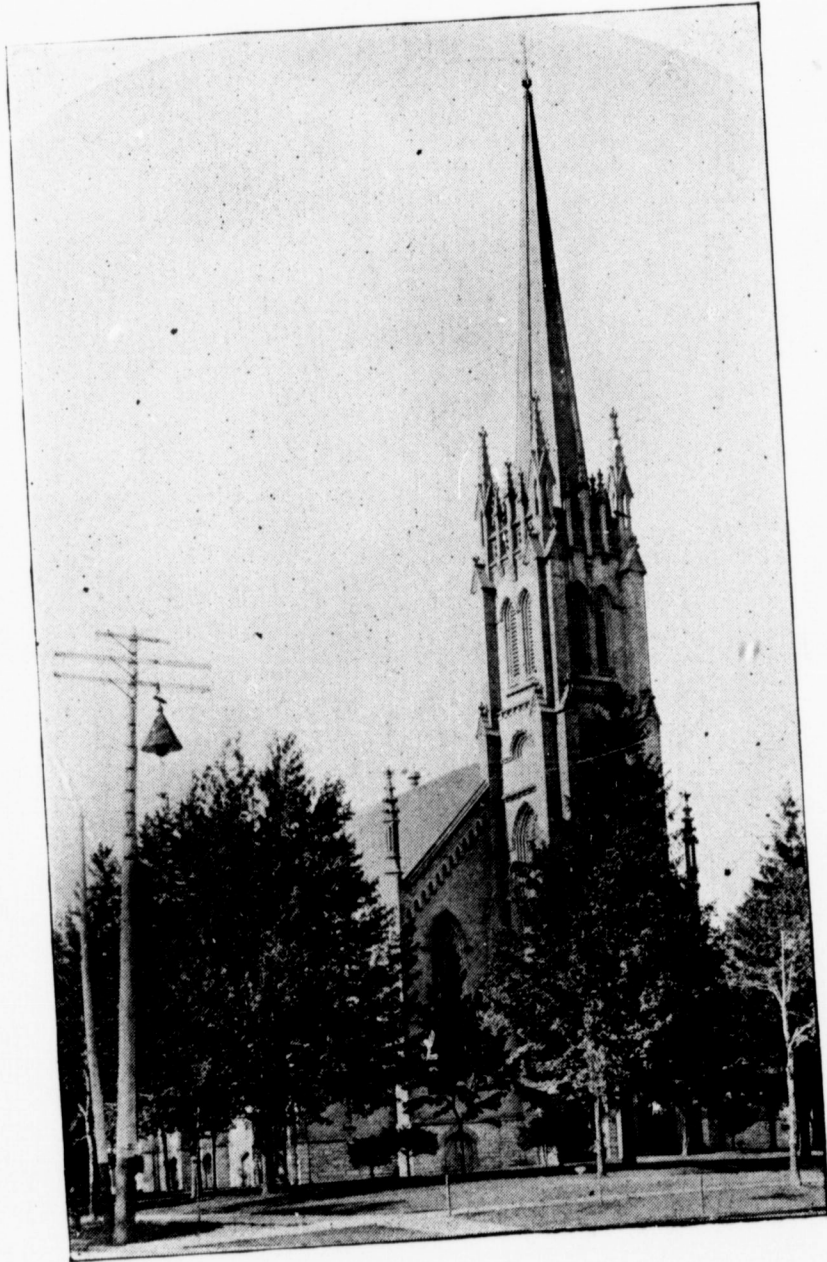

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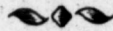

THE KIRK SESSION.

The Session consists of the minister, or ministers, and elders of a congregation.

The duty of the Session is to watch over and promote in every Scriptural way the spiritual interests of the congregation; more particularly to receive applicants for admission into the Church; to admit those who have been baptized into full communion, and to receive persons bringing certificates of membership from other congregations; to grant certificates to members leaving the congregation; to watch over the Christian deportment of the members of the congregation; to exercise discipline by admonition, rebuke, suspension, or exclusion from membership; to restore to privileges; to care for the religious instruction of the young, including the oversight of Sabbath Schools; to determine all matters touching the order of public worship, including the service of praise; to arrange for the dispensation of the sacraments; to appoint congregational fasts or thanksgivings; to appoint the time and mode of making special collections, and where there are no deacons, to provide for the necessities of the poor; to call congregational meetings; to examine and judge of the qualifications of persons elected to the eldership and the deaconship; to receive and judge of petitions; to transmit papers to the Presbytery, and to do whatever else may, in their opinion, promote the religious interests of the congregation.

The Session is responsible to the Presbytery for the use made of the church edifice, and is entitled to the control thereof and to the custody of the key (section 25).

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The service of praise is under the direction of the Session and subject to its control ; but due provision for it should be made by the congregation. The precentor or the conductor of the service of praise may, if the Session sees fit, be chosen by the congregation ; but his appointment must, in all cases, be approved by the Session to whose authority he is subject and whose orders he is bound to obey.

THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

In congregations where there is not a Deacons' Court, the management of the financial affairs of the congregation is intrusted to a Board of Managers. In this case the following regulations are recommended for the guidance of the Board :

(1.) The managers shall be chosen by the congregation from among the members of the Church in full communion, at the annual meeting of the congregation, or at a meeting duly called for this purpose.

(2.) One-third of the Board shall retire each year by rotation, and their places, as also the places of any who die or vacate their office during the year, shall be filled at the annual meeting. The retiring managers may be re-elected.

(3.) If any manager is cut off from Church privileges by process of discipline or leaves the congregation, he shall forthwith cease to act as manager, and another shall, as soon as convenient, be appointed in his place.

(4.) The duties of managers are substantially the same as those of deacons, as follows : The duties of deacons have special regard to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. More particularly it is their duty to obtain from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry and the schemes of the Church, and to disburse all moneys received for these purposes, subject to the approval of the congregation ; to attend to the wants of the poor ; to take care of the property of the congregation ; to provide for the payment of the minister's stipend and other salaries, and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge as the congregation may from time to time direct.

(5.) Meetings of the Board shall be held at stated times, at least once in three months, for the transaction of business ; but a meeting may be held at any time on the call of the chairman, by notice given from the pulpit or addressed personally to the members of the Board.

(6.) Three members present constitute a quorum. Every meeting should be opened and closed with prayer.

(7.) The chairman, secretary and treasurer are appointed at the annual meeting of the congregation from among the members of the Board. If this is not done the Board appoints them at its first meeting held after the annual meeting. Their duties are the same as those set forth in sections 41 and 42. The chairman has only a casting vote.

(8.) Any other regulations may be adopted, but they should be in harmony with the general procedure of the Church, and should have the approval of the congregation and the sanction of the Presbytery of the bounds.

TRUSTEES.

The property of the congregation is held by trustees, appointed by the congregation, as may be provided in the Trust-deed. Trustees should be members of the Church in full communion. Great care should be taken to define clearly the purposes of the trust and the powers, duties, obligations, and mode of appointment of the trustees and their successors.

No debt shall be contracted with security on Church property, unless the Presbytery, at the instance of the congregation, shall have given its sanction.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETINGS.

Meetings of the congregation are called by the authority of the Session of its own motion or on requisition in writing of the Deacons' Court or Board of Managers, or of a number of persons in full communion, or by mandate of a superior court. Meetings are called by public notice, read before the congregation on the Lord's Day; such notice specifies the object of the meeting and is given on at least one Sabbath before the time of meeting, unless otherwise and specially provided for. Congregational meetings are opened and closed with prayer.

All members in full communion, male and female, have the right to vote at all congregational meetings, and to them exclusively belongs the right of choosing ministers, elders, and deacons or managers. At any meeting of the congregation when matters relating to the temporal affairs of the congregation, and not affecting the order of worship, the discipline of the Church, or the disposal of property, are under consideration, adherents who contribute regularly for the support of the Church and its ordinances may be invited to vote.

At congregational meetings the minister of the congregation, or the minister appointed by the Presbytery, presides. But if the minister is absent or declines to preside, the meeting appoints one of its number to take the chair. It also appoints its secretary.

System of Finance.

For the fuller information of all members and adherents—especially those who have but recently joined the congregation,—it is deemed wise to give the following brief statement of the system by which current congregational expenses are met and contributions are collected for missionary and benevolent purposes:

1. There are no pew rents; those who desire sittings have simply to apply, personally or by letter, to the chairman of the Pew Committee, who will allot to them their choice of the required number of sittings which may happen to be vacant in any pew. All sittings are held with the understanding that a generous hospitality will be exercised in their use.

2. Pew rents having been abolished, the revenues of the congregation are purely voluntary, and it is desirable that parties securing sittings should at the time indicate to the Secretary-Treasurer the amount which they purpose contributing.

3. The weekly offerings for congregational purposes are made through white envelopes, supplied to all seat-holders at the beginning of each month. From this source of revenue, together with the Sabbath day collections made by plates, are met all expenses connected with salaries, repairs, fuel, light, etc.

It is earnestly urged upon *all* to contribute a weekly offering *by way of the envelope*. "Upon the first day of the week let EVERY ONE OF YOU *lay by him in store* as

God hath prospered him." This scriptural method imparts to the contributions a reliability which is most desirable and essential to the best conducting of congregational affairs. In the Lord's work it is right we should employ the best methods.

It is important also that not only the heads of families, but *every member having any income* should contribute by means of envelopes. These will gladly be supplied by the Secretary-Treasurer to all desiring them.

4. The offerings made monthly through the red envelopes (supplied with the white ones) are for the missionary schemes of the church, a list of which is printed on the envelopes. This work, including all our great Home and Foreign Mission Work, demands the utmost possible liberality.

An earnest appeal is herewith made to EVERY member and adherent of the congregation, to consider seriously and prayerfully his duty and privilege in relation to this whole subject. It matters not that the gift may be small; it is all-important that it should be offered with sincerity and a sense of responsibility, and *be proportionate to ability*.

It is manifestly unfair that *some* only should bear the burdens while *all* profit from the privileges. Whatever the financial burden may be, it is but just that it should be shared by all, that none be unduly burdened, while others are unnecessarily (and to themselves, unprofitably) relieved.

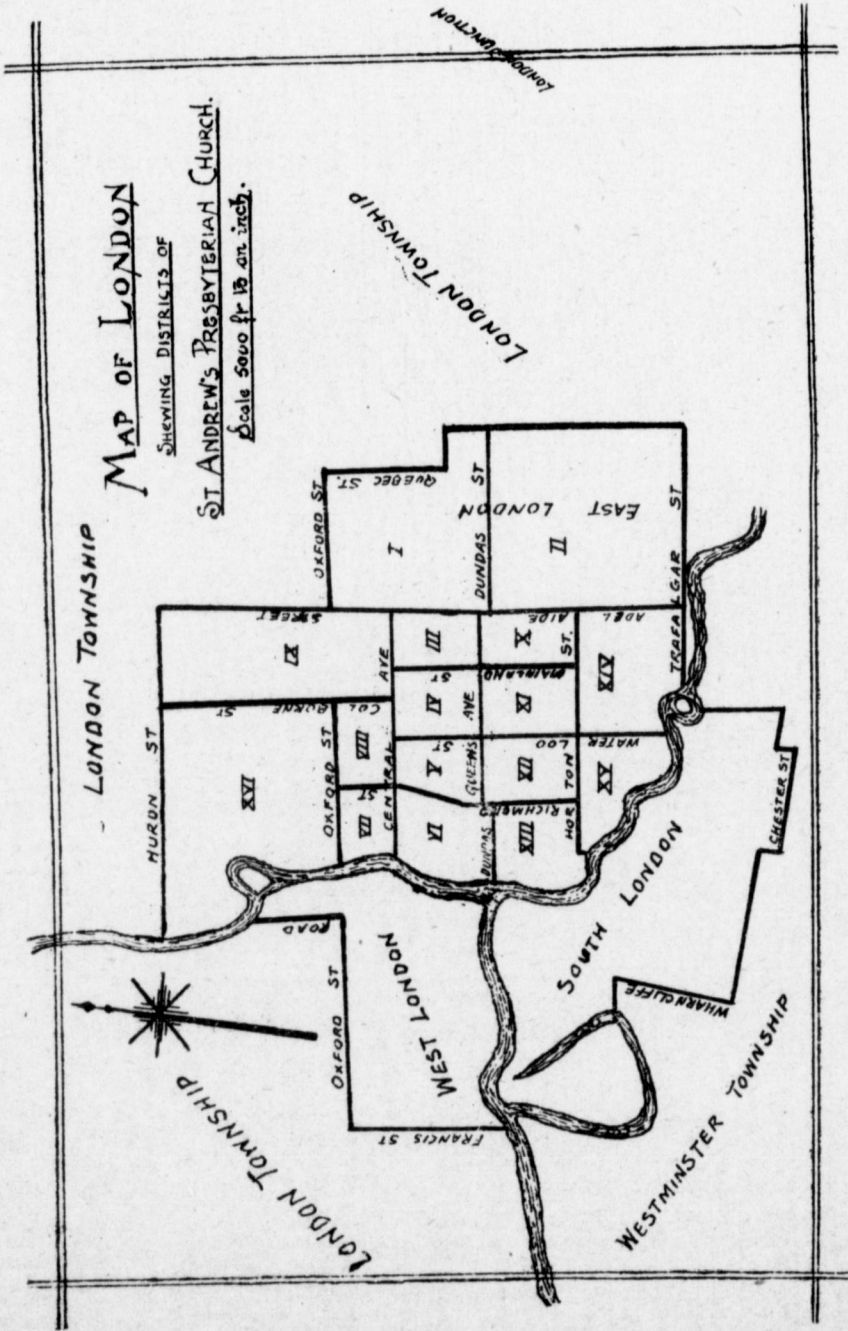

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Pastoral Letter.

Brethren, dearly beloved and longed for :—

Thus it was that the apostle wrote to the church at Philippi, and thus I trust in measure I may with sincerity address those whom it has been my privilege to serve in the ministry of the gospel for nearly four years.

The year of 1898 has brought with it varying encouragement and disappointment. We have not been without signs of our Lord's presence with us in our work ; in particular would I mention the time of refreshing which came to many of us during the special services which closed the third year of my ministry in London, and in which we had for a time the acceptable help of Mr. Henry Varley. Some among us will ever bless God for these services. We rejoice, too, to know that our ordinary services have not been without blessing to many, particularly perhaps our services for young people and our mid-week meetings. God has proved the truth of His message to us at the opening of the New Year, "The Spirit of the Lord is not straitened."

In view of this should we not press forward for greater blessings ; we have not exhausted the grace that is in Christ for us. I would urge upon all what I suggested in my New Year's sermon—a more earnest attendance on the public means of grace ; more persistent prayer in secret ; the cultivation of a

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helpful literature. "Let us rise up and build," my friends; life's day is shortening, the night is approaching.

Most earnestly and affectionately would I commend to those in the congregation, who have not yet responded to the claims of Christ, the Gospel of His grace, and the reasonable surrender which he asks of their hearts. O that this year many who have never confessed Him may in simple faith say, "I am the Lord's." For this our unceasing prayer goes up to the Master of the vineyard.

For all the loving assistance of earnest hearts and willing hands I am constrained to express my gratitude; a minister can do little unless he is supported by the prayers and efforts of his people. Gladly do I acknowledge the untiring work of the Session, the Board of Management, the Choir, the Missionary Societies, Pastor's Aid, Sabbath School Workers, Young People's Organizations, and, indeed, of all who, whether privately or publicly, have labored with me in the gospel. Few ministers are so heartily supported, and to few is it given to labor with so little jarring of the machinery in so large a congregation.

But the more we receive the more are we encouraged to expect; therefore let us one and all be "steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord."

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Address of the Kirk Session.

BRETHREN,—We, your fellow workers for the Master, greet you at the close of another year with thankful acknowledgment to God for his loving kindness.

We note with much pleasure an increased interest in all the different organizations of the church, and the spiritual growth amongst the members of the congregation, as evidenced by the large attendance at all the diets of worship.

It is most encouraging to be able to report a large increase in the membership of the church, as well as the large attendance at communion ; especially so at the communion held in June, when the largest number in the history of the church were in attendance ; also the attendance in the Sabbath School has increased considerably.

We have again to thank the members of the choir for their faithful and efficient efforts in leading the service of praise.

To all to whom sorrow or bereavement has come during the year we tender our most heartfelt sympathy, and commend to them the never failing comfort and tender love of our Heavenly Father.

We have endeavored during the year to make a more systematic visitation of the congregation before the communion seasons; but we are sensible that through our many engagements as busy men we have not become as intimately acquainted with the members in the different districts as is desirable.

We are thankful on every occasion on which parents present their children for baptism at the public services in God's House. This is as it should be, and we trust that more will adopt this practice in accordance with the teaching of our church.

Early in the year Elder G. W. Armstrong asked, on account of ill-health and the pressure of business duties, to be permanently relieved from the office of the eldership. The Session, in assuring Mr. Armstrong of their sympathy, requested him, to accept relief from all official work for one year before finally deciding upon the step at first contemplated. This suggestion, we are glad to say, Mr. Armstrong accepted.

Our prayer and heart's desire is that charity, unity and consecration of life and service may characterize this the last year of the century upon which we are entering. The statistical statement of the membership is appended.

REPORT OF THE MANAGERS.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church, London :

In submitting the Forty-Eighth Annual Report together with the Financial Statement of receipts and disbursements, your Managers are very gratified to note the continued loyalty and unity of the congregation, not only in greatly increased attendance upon the regular diets of worship but the general increase of ordinary revenue, thereby placing funds at the disposal of your Managers to meet all current expenses as such accrued, and also to make a substantial reduction in the floating debt accumulated during recent years.

The total revenue for the year from all sources amounts to \$8,736.95.

The revenue from envelope and plate offerings shows an increase over that of 1897 of \$618.88.

The number of contributors by envelope was 487, being an increase of 18 in number over 1897.

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The net expenditure for the year on account of Oxford Street Mission and Pottersburg Church was \$734.30, but the Managers are gratified to see their continued prosperity and the early prospect of the Pottersburg Church becoming self-sustaining.

The Improvement Committee, in view of the proposed Church extension and alteration to the interior of the Church, but deeming it prudent to postpone any material outlay in the Church furnishings, removed the carpet from the pews and aisles, replacing the latter with matting and giving the entire wood work of the Church a thorough cleansing, at an outlay of \$157.09.

The Managers beg to acknowledge at the hands of the executors of the late George Dawson the sum of \$1,000, bequeathed under will to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, London, in aid of their Home Missions, which amount was applied upon the Oxford Street Mission.

The Pew Committee have found considerable difficulty in allocating sittings to new applicants, and several of our old members have made application for sittings in the body of the Church owing to the discomforts of the gallery. We therefore ask the cooperation of all in notifying the chairman of the Pew Committee or the ushers of any vacancies occurring, and we hope to receive a continuance of your favors toward strangers placed in your pews. The committee would urge that some material change be soon made in the re-seating of the Church, enabling them to meet present demands for seats.

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In accordance with the resolution passed at last Annual Meeting the joint committee on Church Extension and Improvement have made an appeal to the congregation, upon which a special report will be submitted to the Annual Meeting.

In view of the large increase in our congregation, and consequent greatly increased duties of our beloved pastor, Rev. Robert Johnston, your Managers have pleasure in recommending to the congregation an increase of \$500 to his yearly stipend.

May God put it into our hearts to so consider this fact that we may be led to provide the means not only to maintain the work already undertaken, but to do more for carrying that "Word" which giveth light to those who sit in darkness.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was held in the lecture room Wednesday evening, January 18th, 1899.

The Pastor, assisted by the Rev. Archibald Stewart, opened the meeting by devotional exercises.

Rev. Robert Johnston, B. D., the Pastor, occupied the chair, and Mr. J. Gordon McIntosh acted as Secretary.

Mr. John Lohead, acting clerk of the Session, read the letter from the Kirk Session, a copy of which will be found in the printed annual report.

The minutes of the annual meeting of January 19, 1898, having been printed in the annual report, were taken as read and confirmed.

Mr. Alex. Gillean, chairman of the Board of Managers, read the Managers' report and Treasurer's financial statement, and moved that the report be received and adopted.

It was moved by Mr. Alex. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Alex. Tytler, "that the report be received and considered clause by clause."

It was moved by Rev. Archibald Stewart, seconded by Mr. G. A. McGillivray, "that the first page as read be adopted."

It was moved by Mr. J. W. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. C. R. Somerville, "that clause three be adopted."

It was moved by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. J. W. McIntosh, "that all the words of clause four after the word mission be struck out, and that the clause be then adopted."

It was moved by Mr. Thos. Gillean, seconded by Mr. H. H. Wallace, "that clause five be adopted."

It was moved by Mr. Samuel Stevely, seconded by Mr. Alexander Purdom, "that discussion of clause six be laid over till the end of the report, and that during the discussion of clause seven, Mr. Alex. Gillean take the chair."

It was moved by Mr. Alex. Gillean, seconded by Mr. Samuel Stevely, "that clause seven be adopted."

It was moved in amendment by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. M. H. Rowland, "that the following clause be added, 'that the congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church now assembled, after considering the very favorable reports presented this year of the spiritual life in the congregation and of church work in general, desire to express to our Pastor, the Rev. Robert Johnston, our hearty appreciation of his untiring and successful efforts and our sympathy with him in his arduous duties.'

"We pledge him our loyal and undivided support in his ministrations, and trust we may long work together for the furtherance of the Master's Kingdom in this place.

"That we are not indifferent to the manner in which he has discouraged offers from other congregations who were desirous of securing his services, and we earnestly hope and pray that nothing may tran-

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spire to cause a separation between us for many years to come.

“And in thus expressing our appreciation of our Pastor, all that we have said applies with equal force to his partner in life, and we commend them both to the Grace of the God of all Goodness, praying that he will give them health for the work and joy in the service.”

The amendment carried unanimously.

Mr. Johnston after thanking the Congregation, took the chair.

Clause eight was read, and Mr. Alex. Gillean moved “that it be adopted.”

It was moved by Mr. Francis Love, seconded by Mr. Alex. Fraser, “that the sum of \$400 be granted for the Service of Praise, and that it be understood that the selection of singers for the choir shall rest with the choir-leader.”

Moved in amendment by Mr. M. H. Rowland, seconded by Mr. C. R. Somerville, “that the engaging of singers for the Service of Praise be left in the hands of the Pew and Music Committee of the Board of Managers and the Organist.” The motion carried.

Clauses nine, ten and eleven were adopted.

Mr. M. H. Rowland, Secretary of the Building and Improvement Committee, read the following report :—

LONDON, JAN. 18TH, 1899.

REPORT OF BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENT
COMMITTEE.

On behalf of the Committee appointed to solicit subscriptions for the purpose of building a new Sun-

day School and improving the Church, I beg to state that subscriptions to the amount of \$6,267 have been promised, of this amount \$760 has already been paid into the Treasurer of the Church.

The number of subscribers is 231 and the amounts subscribed vary from \$2 up to \$250.

Your Committee has taken no further action in the matter, as it is necessary, according to a resolution passed at the last congregational meeting, that \$9000 should be subscribed before operations can be commenced.

There are still a large number of persons who have not been waited upon who would undoubtedly subscribe were they asked, and there is no doubt that when the work is commenced, the list of subscribers will be increased and the subscriptions of some of those who have already subscribed will be doubled.

The report of the Managers as a whole was received and adopted.

It was moved by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. Alex. Purdom, "that the appointment by the Trustees of Messrs. M. H. Rowland and Alex. Gillean to the Board of Trustees, to take the place of Messrs. Wm. J. McIntosh and H. E. Nelles, be confirmed."

Mr. M. H. Rowland read a report of three plans for improving the Church.

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It was moved by Mr. Thos. Gillean, seconded by Mr. D. McDonald, "that the first proposition be the one accepted."

Moved in amendment by Mr. Samuel Stevely, seconded by Mr. John Marr, "that the matter of Church Improvement be left to a Committee, consisting of the Board of Managers, and with power to add to their number, and that a meeting of the congregation be held one week from to-night to hear their report."

The amendment carried.

Mr. Alex. Gillean, Chairman of the Board of Managers, said that he had appointed Messrs. M. H. Rowland and Samuel Stevely a Committee to nominate managers and asked that their report be adopted.

Owing to ill-health Mr. James Cowan had sent in his resignation from the Board of Managers. His letter of resignation was read to the meeting and reluctantly accepted.

Mr. Samuel Stevely submitted the report of the nominating committee, suggesting that the retiring managers—Messrs. James Houston, J. W. McIntosh, George Laing, F. G. Rumball, O. B. Leslie and Alex. Purdom—be re-elected, and that Mr. John Ferguson be elected in place of Mr. James Cowan. The report was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. James McSween, seconded by Mr. John Lohead, "that Mr. J. Gordon McIntosh be appointed Secretary-Treasurer."

Messrs. F. W. Merchant, M.A., and C. R. Somerville were appointed auditors, and the old ushers were re-appointed.

It was moved by Mr. Alex. Fraser, seconded by Mr. J. W. McIntosh, "that all moneys paid to the treasurer of this church in any way whatever for mission purposes, be handed over by him to the treasurer of the Missionary Association of the church."

It was moved by Mr. G. A. McGillivray, seconded by Hr. H. H. Wallace, "that the balance of the bequest due the church from the estate of the late George Dawson be paid to the Presbyterian Church in London West."

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Alex. Gillean, seconded by Dr. Jas. MacArthur, "that the balance of the bequest from the estate of the late George Dawson be paid to the Missionary Association of the congregation for allocation at a subsequent congregational meeting."

The amendment carried.

It was moved by Mr. Alex. Tytler, seconded by Mr. M. McCrimmon, "that the Managers be instructed to keep the cemetery in good repair."

A deputation from St. James' Presbyterian Church, consisting of Rev. D. C. Johnson and Messrs. James Gray and Neil McNeil, addressed the meeting. They stated that at a meeting of the congregation, held last night, it was decided if their pastor would remain with them, to sell the present church property and build a new church in the northern part of the city. They were not able to do the work without

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help, and asked what help St. Andrew's Church would be willing to give."

It was moved by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. McCallum, "that this congregation is in hearty sympathy with St. James' Congregation in their intention to move farther north, and that this church hand over to them our work and our mission on Oxford Street free of expense.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Frank Love, seconded by Mr. H. H. Wallace, "that St. Andrew's Congregation assure the delegation of their hearty sympathy, and that financial aid will be forthcoming, and that a committee, consisting of the chairman of the Board of Managers, with two other members to be named by him, Messrs. C. R. Somerville, Alex. Fraser and Thos. Bland from the Session; Messrs. R. A. Little, Walter Bell and Frank Love from the congregation, be appointed to look into the matter and suggest what aid had best be given.

The Sabbath School was granted expenses for 1898.

Moved by Mr. M. H. Rowland, seconded by Mr. Alex. Gillean, "that the meeting adjourn for one week."

The meeting closed by singing the long metre Doxology.

Minutes of the Adjourned Meeting.

The adjourned annual meeting was held January 25, 1899.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by the pastor, Rev. Robt. Johnston.

On motion of Messrs. C. R. Somerville and John Marr, Mr. J. W. McIntosh, chairman of the Board of Managers, was appointed chairman.

Mr. Walter Bell, on behalf of the committee appointed to report as to the advisability of assisting St. James' Congregation, read the following report :

" The committee appointed at the annual meeting a week ago to consider the matter of the North Mission property, relative to the St. James' Presbyterian Congregation of this city, met in the Bible Class Room on Monday afternoon, and after due deliberation unanimously agreed to recommend that, in the event of St. James' Congregation removing to the northern part of the city within one year from this time St. Andrew's Congregation should hand over to them as a donation the property known as the North Presbyterian Mission, corner of Oxford and Colborne streets, and further, that the encumbrance on said property be cleared off by St. Andrew's Congregation, so that St. James' Congregation receive the gift entirely free from debt.

" Your committee would further advise that the Managing Board of our church be instructed to apply

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the balance now remaining from the old Improvement Fund to the liquidation of the mortgage now standing against this North Mission property, and that whatever further sum may then be required to complete the discharge of this mortgage should be taken from the balance of the Dawson bequest."

The adoption of the report was moved by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mr. C. R. Somerville.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. C. McCallum, seconded by Mr. R. A. Little, "that \$200 yearly for two years, in addition to the amount named in Mr. Bell's report, be granted to St. James' Church, on condition that their present pastor, Mr. McGillivray, remains with them, and that they build a new church further north."

The amendment carried.

It was moved by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. T. H. Purdom, "that the Session celebrate the handing over of the mission by giving an entertainment in honor of those who for many years have worked so faithfully to make the Mission a success."

It was moved by Mr. T. H. Purdom, seconded by Mr. C. McCallum and carried, "that a suitable Sabbath School be erected ; that whatever expenditure is necessary for this purpose, and also to clean and seat the church to the best advantage, be authorized and referred to a Building Committee to carry out ; that in the opinion of this meeting it is not desirable to alter the walls of St. Andrew's Church in any way ; that this meeting is pleased to learn of the intended removal of St. James' Church, and of the prospect of

a new Presbyterian Church being erected in the north part of the city, and consider that it is preferable that any money St. Andrew's Church can spare be given to assist St. James' Congregation until they are firmly established."

It was moved by Dr. James MacArthur, seconded by Mr. C. McCallum, "that the following gentlemen be a Building Committee: Messrs. M. H. Rowland, James McSween, J. W. McIntosh, R. Ironsides, T. H. Purdom, John Ferguson, John Marr, J. A. Cairncross, John Lohead, Angus M. Gunn, and G. A. McGillivray."

It was moved by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. Alex. Tytler, "that the committee be instructed to advertise for plans in the Toronto and London papers."

The meeting was closed with prayer.

Report of Missionary Association.

The Twenty-Eighth Annual Report of the Missionary Association, we are glad to state to the congregation, shows some progress in advance of any point attained in former years, both in respect to the amount contributed and also in the number of contributors.

We have received for all the schemes of the church during the year \$2,100.32, contributed by 324 persons, the smallest amount contributed being 10 cents and the largest \$220.00.

In looking over the list we are sorry to note that in very few cases is there any material advance on the contributions of last year, while several have found it necessary to reduce their offering to this cause. We realize oftentimes curtailment, by reason of adverse fortune, is necessary, but we feel that where, on the other hand, special prosperity has been granted any, there should be a corresponding advance in gifts to the Lord's work.

In a very few cases is the offering for missions larger than the offering for congregational work. While we would not wish to see the latter reduced at all, we would like to see many showing their recognition of the greatness of the world-wide work by a corresponding liberality towards it. We know, and are glad to know, that, compared with other con-

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gregations, St. Andrew's does well; but not with others, but with the work that is to be done must we ever compare our efforts.

It is with special gladness that we note a marked liberality on the part of many of the young people of the church; in fact, many of them are among our most liberal contributors. This is good now and gives promise of better things for days to come.

We hope to make a determined effort this year to secure a very marked increase as well as liberality in the number of contributors, and all hope for a hearty response from the congregation in our seeking to carry out our Lord's command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Among the contributors for several years have been several very young children, one this year is but a babe. We trust that this example set by some of our parents will be followed by many others.

She vividly pictured the state of the world as regards the religion of Jesus Christ, and spoke of the heroism of missionaries who devoted their lives in bearing the Message of Salvation to the heathen. The offerings amounted to \$106.60.

Miss Laidlaw led in prayer, dedicating the money to the work of the Lord.

Acceptable music was provided at this meeting by Miss Ethel Gunn, Miss Walker and Miss Cowan, and our Pastor, who was present, closed the meeting with prayer.

At the beginning of the year it was arranged that two members should be responsible for the subject and order of each meeting. During the year there were ten meetings thus provided for by nineteen members; the result was interesting and varied programmes, furnishing much information to the members, and profitable, especially to those who by research and study of the several Mission Fields prepared for this work.

The Annual Report of the King's Messengers Mission Band for 1898 is one which speaks of a steady growth—of interest in the work on the part of those engaged in it, and compares favorably in every way with the eleven which have preceded it.

We have held twelve monthly meetings, with an average attendance of 22. Our membership has been increased by 9, and we now have forty-four enrolled.

Mr. Johnston kindly took charge of our February meeting, and gave us a very instructive talk on the life of Robert Moffat; and several times since both Mr. and Mrs. Johnston have encouraged us by being present at our meetings.

Our Honorary President also was with us at our March gathering, and presided.

Our programme committees have, generally speaking, followed the course of study prescribed on the W. F. M. S. prayer card, and the talks and readings on these subjects have always been instructive and of deep interest.

Of the eight hundred dolls which were sent to Central India from our Presbytery, seven dozen were bought and dressed by the members of the K. M. M. B. This little piece of service gave rise to a very pleasant afternoon, which was spent in sewing, and afterwards tea together in the Bible Class Room, early in March.

In the same month Miss Sheldon, teacher of elocution and physical culture at the Conservatory of Music, suggested that we make up a class of 20 or more who desired to take a term in physical culture instruction, and offered as an inducement to give half of the amount raised to our society. We were successful in carrying out her plan, and now look back with much pleasure, as well as two-fold profit, to the hours spent with Miss Sheldon.

At our June meeting Miss Fraser read us her report of the meetings of the W. F. M. S. held in Toronto, no one from our band having been present to report. We realized \$22.50 at our Thank-offering service in November, which is a little less than last year's *seemingly* more generous gift.

In December Mr. Radcliffe very kindly lectured in our behalf on the poetry of Wordsworth. Unfortunately the weather was stormy, consequently the lecture-room was but sparingly filled, and the collection not what we had hoped for.

Our collection during the year, from all sources, amounts to \$90.62, \$80.22 of which will be sent to the General Society.

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And now, as we enter upon a *new* year, we hope and pray that the little successes and failures of the past may be forgotten in an earnest endeavor for more and greater service to our King.

During the year of 1898 the Outlook Mission Band held regular semi-monthly meetings to the number of twenty, the first meeting in each month being devoted to the study of work in the different mission fields, and the second to sewing.

The Band this year provided toys and useful presents to the value of \$41.30 for the mission schools in India, and we take this opportunity of publicly expressing our thanks to several ladies of the congregation who very kindly assisted in providing us with dolls and other toys.

At the beginning of the year we adopted as our motto, "My little children, let us not love in words, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth," and have endeavored always to preserve the spirit of our motto.

Our meetings were bright and interesting, a programme being provided for each meeting, and we are glad to say that no girl ever refused to take part when asked. This year we departed from our usual custom by having the junior Band meet with the senior, but found no reason to regret it since the little ones were always bright, cheerful and attentive.

The number on the roll in the senior Band was 45, with an average attendance of 39; while in the junior Band the number on the roll was 24, with an average attendance of 16, making the total number on the roll 69, with an average attendance of 55. But notwithstanding the fact that this is an increase over last year, there is still room for more, and the more we study the work of the missionaries the more we realize the terrible need there is of the gospel and the pressing necessity of more workers; and therefore we invite every girl in the congregation who is free on Saturday afternoons to come and help us in this important work.

A very entertaining concert, given almost entirely by members of the Band, was held in the spring; while in November Mrs. Anna Ross, of Toronto, gave a very interesting and instructive talk on the "Origin of Missions," which, with a small programme provided by the Band, furnished a very entertaining evening.

In August an exhibition of the work done by all the Mission Bands in the London Presbytery was held in St. Andrew's Church. On November 7th our annual Thank-Offering Meeting was held, and proved both interesting and profitable.

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We close the year feeling that the Lord has helped us hitherto, and hoping to do as good work in the future as we have done in the past.

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REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

As we review our work in the Sabbath School during the past year our deepest feeling is of gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the many blessings we have enjoyed ; and especially for the presence of the Holy Spirit in our midst, as manifested by the very great love and unity pervading the whole school.

The devotion and earnestness of teachers and officers in their work, the increase in number of pupils, and the general expression of interest in the work, are matters for sincere thankfulness. We are especially encouraged to see the fruits of our labors manifested by a goodly number from our Sabbath School openly confessing Jesus as their Saviour, and uniting with the church on confession of faith in Him.

The attendance and devotion on the part of both teachers and pupils are doubly gratifying, when we consider the extremely unfavorable conditions under which we are still forced to carry on our work. We cannot help expressing our regret that greater progress has not been made towards the betterment of our S. S. accommodations. However, we are still hopeful that the congregation will yet fully realize its duty to the S. S. in this regard, and have the courage and will to carry it out. The faithfulness of the officers of all departments in the discharge of their several duties is worthy of all commendation.

We would be much pleased if visitors from our own congregation were more often seen at the sessions of the S. S. A more apparent proof of interest and sympathy with our work, by occasional attendance at our sessions on the part of parents and members of the congregation, would be a distinct benefit and a great source of satisfaction and encouragement to teachers and scholars. We would desire to call the attention of all to the great blessings to one's self, and others, to be derived from work in the S. S. The superintendent is under the constant necessity of providing new teachers in sufficient number for the classes. The lack of teachers is a constant source of weakness to the school and of trouble and worry to the officers that they should not be called upon to bear. We therefore urge upon all the duty and privilege of aiding in the work whenever called upon.

I cannot in words express the depth of my gratitude to the teachers and all workers for the many great tokens of their sympathy, love and support which I have received from them during the year. Our prayer is that the spirit of unity and harmony pervading the school, which is one of the greatest blessings we could receive, and of loyalty to our Master, may under God's blessing ever continue to animate our school.

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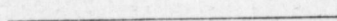

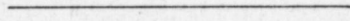

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Pastor's Aid Society.

In submitting the Annual Report of the Pastor's Aid Society, we feel very much encouraged by the increase in liberality of those who have contributed to this very important branch of the Master's work. There is an increase in communion collections over last year of \$12.59, also an increase of \$16.17 above last year in the Thanksgiving offering; and although the beneficiary list is larger than last year, being \$231.50, compared with \$188.00, an increase of \$53.50; we can report a substantial balance on hand of \$89.54. We take this opportunity of thanking the congregation for their increased liberality, knowing they can receive no greater commendation than their Master's words, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these My brethren ye did it unto Me."

One very important branch of the work we have failed to prosecute with the vigor it deserves is that of visiting the sick and strangers who have recently united with our church.

In a congregation so large and scattered as St. Andrew's, it is very difficult for our Pastor, with all the duties he so willingly assumes, to keep in touch with all the congregation, and not only we, but all members in the congregation, can aid him very materially in sympathetic work and hospitality among the sick and strangers.

We have received this year, by the kindness of Mrs. Durand, a gas stove for our kitchen that has lightened very effectively the work in that department on social occasions.

The St. Andrew's Literary Society, the only organization of its kind in connection with the church, is now in its third year, and is enjoying greater success every year of its life, not only in numbers but also in interest and help. As the name indicates, its objects and meetings are of a Literary nature. Anyone attending the meetings of the Society cannot but be impressed by the great good that is being done, not only to those taking an active part but also to silent attenders. Needless to say there are always a goodly number of the latter on the membership list of any society, but we find that the number on this

silent roll is gradually, but steadily, growing smaller, consequently the active and energetic list is much larger.

In its younger days the Society held its meetings in the parlor of the church, but its numbers increased so steadily and fast that it was forced to open the doors of the Lecture Room to accommodate the large and interested crowd.

The membership of the Society is now about one hundred, the meetings being attended by about half as many again. Parliamentary methods and rules govern all meetings, so that members are given a clear idea of how a public meeting should be conducted. To see the great need of learning this while young we have only to look at the style of many while conducting or addressing a meeting who did not learn the art when young.

The regular meetings of the Society are held every alternate Friday evening, beginning at 7:45, and generally closing at 9:45. About forty-five minutes are first occupied by the business of the Society and the learning of Parliamentary practice, the balance of the evening being spent in music, papers, essays, debates, etc.

Every member is given a chance to learn the great art of public speaking and debating, and for those who wish to express themselves on paper rather than on the platform, a paper is prepared and edited by the official editors of the Society, made up of original articles by the members. During the past season it was decided by the Society to have some of its meet-

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ings take the form of a Parliament, and towards this the usual parliamentary officers were elected, including Premier and Cabinet, Leader of the Opposition, Clerks, Sergeant-at-Arms, etc.

In December last an open meeting of the Society was held, to which the congregation and friends of the Society were invited. The meeting in every way was very successful, and showed to a great extent the style and methods of the Society. Although a special invitation was issued to the congregation to be present at the open meeting, anyone interested in Literary work is cordially invited to attend any or all of the regular meetings.

Choir Report.

It affords me pleasure to report my choir in a healthy condition. During the past year we have been by no means inactive. But few people realize what it means to belong to a choir; the constant attendance, rain or shine, Sabbath after Sabbath, and also at our regular rehearsals, means sometimes great inconvenience to some of our members. However, I am glad to say that they have been faithful to their duties, and at all times ready to assist me in making our services helpful. Besides our regular duties we have attended many extra services, for which special music was provided. Our two regular yearly concerts were very successful, not only musically, but also financially, the church being crowded to the doors on both occasions. The collections taken at these "Services of Praise" amounted to (April 11th) \$89.88, and (Oct. 12th) \$73.13, which, after deducting expenses, were handed to the church treasurer.
