SAT PREVIOUSLY IN ONT. LEGISLATURE

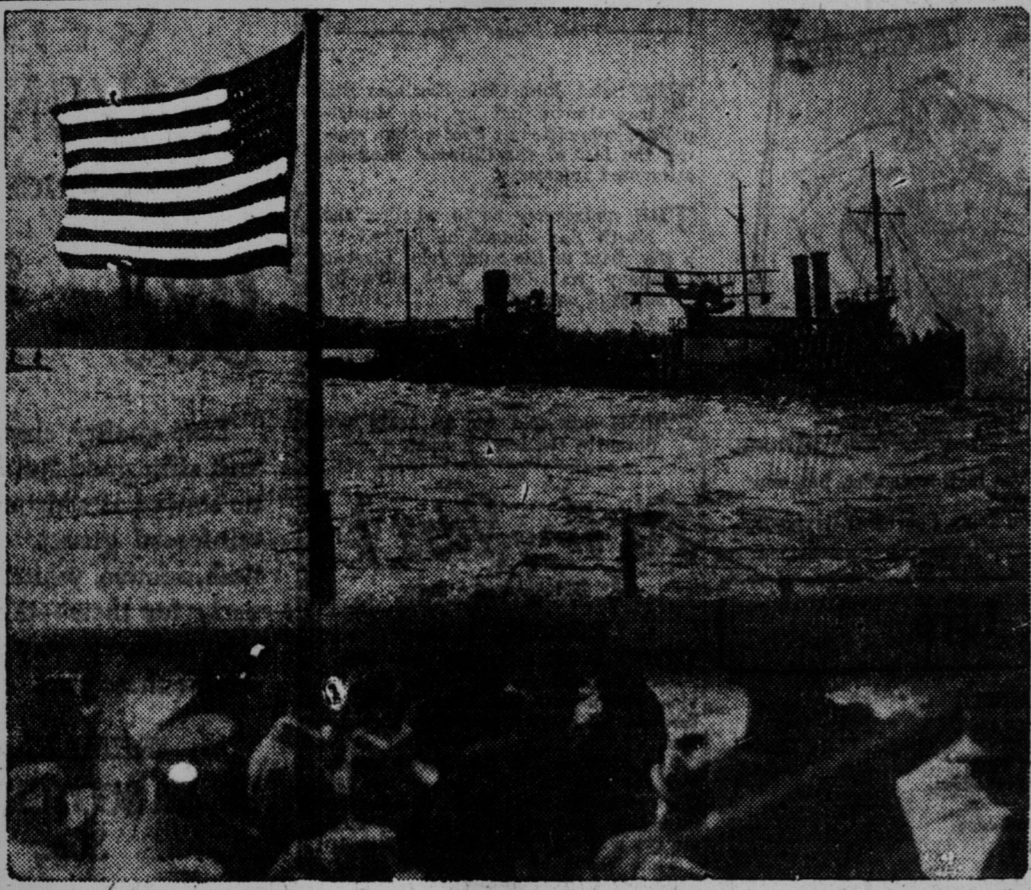
Moved Address in Reply to Speech From Throne at House Opening

OTTAWA, March 8.—John Campbell Elliott, K. C., representing the constituency of West Middlesex in the House of Commons, was today appointed a privy councillor and the Minister of Labor in the government of Premier Mackenzie King.

Mr. Elliott was sworn in before the Governor-General and in the presence of Premier King at Government House this evening. Writs have been issued for the by-election in West Middlesex, nominations to take place on March 22 and polling one week later, on Monday, March 29. Mr. Elliott returned to his home in London this evening.

NEW DEVICE MAKES NAVAL PLANES MORE DANGEROUS



A wide new field of usefulness is opened to naval aviation by successful tests of new catapult which makes it easy to launch amphibian planes from the decks of small vessels. Swift ships could sneak up within 30 or 40 miles of an enemy shore, release its planes by catapult, and after the machines had bombed the enemy fort or city and ended resistance, their amphibian equipment would enable the fliers to come down on water or land to hold what they had captured. THE gift of \$1,000 from Mrs. John H. Thomson, Rothesay, who is now residing in Toronto, was very gratefully acknowledged at the meeting of the directors of the Victorian Order of Nurses held yesterday afternoon in the Health Centre with L. W. Simms, president, in the chair. A resolution of hearty thanks was extended to Mrs. Thomson and it was decided to place her gift in the capital account.

NURSES REPORT.

The report of the superintendent of nurses, Miss H. B. Mackay, showed that the month of February had been exceptionally busy. Although it was a short month the nurses made 1,489 visits of which 551 were nursing visits and 638 were educational visits. A total of 262 patients were cared for and of these 161 were new cases. There were many pneumonia cases under care and much sickness generally. Of the cases attended, 12 were admitted to the General Public Hospital for special care. The nurses also attended 26 confinement cases during the month.

AGAINST CHANGE IN CHURCH ACT

Presbytery at Meeting Here Passes Resolution on Union Matter

Refers to Notice re Legislation—Boundaries Committee on March 15

The Presbytery of Saint John of the United Church of Canada at a meeting in Centenary church here yesterday went on record, through a resolution, as being opposed to any move to change the terms of the United Church of Canada Act.

The resolution, which was unanimously adopted, is as follows: "Whereas notice has been given in the Royal Gazette that those opposed to Church Union in the province of New Brunswick will make application to the legislature of the province for what they term 'Legislation Remedial from the United Church of Canada Act'; therefore be it resolved that the Presbytery of Saint John of the United Church of Canada place itself on record as emphatically opposing any move to change the terms of the United Church of Canada Act already passed by the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick after due deliberation; and

Further resolved that we call the attention of the members of the Legislative Assembly to the fact that as a matter of primary and fundamental justice, no change ought to be made in the terms of the United Church of Canada Act, without the consent of the said United Church of Canada."

MISTRUST 43 YEARS AGO. That feeling of pessimism and mistrust which seemed to be so popular today, was popular 43 years ago, said Mr. Dafoe, but the theory of everything "going to the demeriton bow-wow" could so easily be counteracted by a few moments of reading up conditions of former days.

Mr. Dafoe recalled that he had attended the first parliament of Canada, together with R. S. White, now member for Mount Royal, in the press gallery. That was 10 parliaments ago, when the west had five members out of 210 and there was no western bloc, when Winnipeg was a "frontier hamlet built in a swamp." Those were the days, he said, when a Toronto newspaper, in a "superior" article written with a note of finality, declared that it was absurd, of course, to say that the west would produce 6,000,000 bushels of grain. The mistrust then manifested was the more remarkable in that the product produced 452,000,000 bushels two years ago.

CAN COPE WITH PROBLEMS.

"There is nothing in the condition of Canada to justify the belief that we have problems that we cannot cope with successfully," he said.

To ignore the continuity to the United States, he said, was impossible. To adopt the hostile attitude was both foolish and dangerous.

FOUR CANADAS IN ONE.

In regard to Canada's size, Mr. Dafoe said that the Dominion was an association of fragments. "We have at least four Canadas with real divergencies of economic interests," he said. To attain cohesion some sort of cement, a cement of national spirit was needed. The solution must be real compromise. There must be a better political system found, one without sectionalism or regionalism.

50 ANSWER RADIO APPEAL FOR BLOOD

LONDON, March 9.—Within seven minutes of an appeal broadcast the other night from the Leeds B. B. C. station for a volunteer for a blood transfusion operation at the Leeds General Infirmary, the first man had presented himself.

Within an hour over 30 applicants had reached the reception office, a volunteer at Balmforth, near Thirsk, field, had telephoned, and two men had motored to the hospital from Bradford and Dewsbury.

The selected candidate was chosen in half an hour, but volunteers kept on arriving mainly because the B. B. C. sent out a second appeal at 8 o'clock. By 9 o'clock nearly 50 men had arrived. There were no women.

A press representative was informed at the infirmary that the patient requiring the transfusion was a Grimby ex-service man suffering from the effects of gas poisoning.

The operation was successfully carried out.

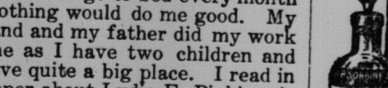

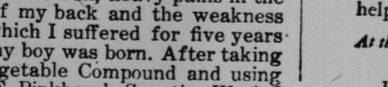

WANT THEATRES TO MAKE FIGHT

AL SMITH BACKS CANAL. ALBANY, N. Y., March 8.—Governor Al Smith tonight sent to the legislature a special message urging continued efforts by the state in advocacy of a ship canal, which would be built and operated by the federal government from Lake Ontario to the Hudson River.

Official Writes Here About Music Copyright License Matter

In a letter received from Colonel John A. Cooper, representing the Motion Picture Distributors and Exhibitors Association of Canada, agent of proposed licensing of theatres using copyrighted music provided as in Bill No. 3, soon to come before the House of Commons at Ottawa, a local theatre manager is informed that the parties back of this new taxation scheme are known as the "Canadian Performing Rights Society" and that their idea is to collect an annual fee from every theatre in Canada covering British and foreign copyrights.

OPENING WEDGE

Colonel Cooper states that if the exhibitors submit to the passage of the proposed legislation without presenting their side of the argument, it will be a matter of mere form for The American Authors and Composers Association of New York to step in and extract thousands of dollars from the people of this country.

The letter further relates that in the United States some of the theatres started to take out licenses in acknowledgment of the copyright arguments, but the authors association is said to have become so increasingly exacting in their demands that real hardship grew upon the theatre with the result that today the theatres are vigorously fighting the principle and trying to rectify what they claim was a false step on their part. In South Africa and other parts of the British Empire similar legislative controversy is going on between the authors and users of musical compositions. The fight for the music publishers is being directed from London, England and New York.

MAY GO TO LAW

Colonel Cooper in his letter strongly advises all theatre managers resolutely to refuse to take out the proposed licenses. He states that N. L. Nathanson, head of the chain of Capitol Theatres in Canada and owner of some of his own accounts, also president of Regal Films Limited, has offered to become defendant in a lawsuit which will test the legality of the licensing scheme.

EVERYBODY AFFECTED.

The music tax proposal was fully explained in The Times-Star on last Friday. By Bill No. 3, being introduced by L. J. Laidner, M.P., of Vancouver, authors and publishers of music would be empowered to impose any license fee they care to exact upon every theatre, church, lodge, restaurant, school exercises, dance hall, brass band, orchestra, secular or religious entertainment or ceremony, provided the music used is copyrighted, which, of course, applies to almost every writing on the market. The Canadian opposition is based on principle, although the money exactions it is said would amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. Fines, injunctions and arrest applicable to everyone of these sections of public life are the proposed punishments for not toeing the musical scratch.

U. S. GRIP.

One of the chief arguments against the proposed bill besides its alleged greed, is that music once sold is the property of the buyer without further payment; also that if the Canadian people were made to pay extra tribute for the thousands of compositions flooding this country from the United States, it would be another economic grip on the neighboring republic which would have. Therefore opponents claim Bill No. 3 is inimical to Canadian interests.

MISS HOLLY ILL.

Miss Carrie Holly, nurse, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Murray McL. Holly, who removed to Gaspe last spring, is confined to the General Public Hospital with a quite serious illness. Her mother has arrived from the far-off section to be near her. It will be remembered Miss Holly was one of the occupants of the automobile that rolled over the Gaspe coast cliffs last summer when en route to this city and in which accident Mrs. H. A. Mence met her death.

HELD FOR INQUIRY IN SIKI KILLING

Detectives Trail Man Who Committed Murder Last December

NEW YORK, March 8.—Martin Maroney, 18, a laborer, was arrested tonight on a charge of homicide in connection with the killing of Louis Phal, "Batling Siki," pugilist, on Dec. 15.

The two detectives who made the arrest had disguised themselves as gangsters and kept watch on Maroney for the last two weeks after he had aroused their suspicion by a telephone conversation in a social club. The detectives said Maroney telephoned a man whom they believe to be one of Siki's murderers. They say they overheard him say: "They're close on our trail and know who killed Siki." Siki was found dead on a sidewalk in Hell's Kitchen on the morning of December 15, with two bullet wounds in his back and a revolver lying in a gutter near by.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

"It cannot be denied that much depends upon their first impressions of Canada and these in turn depend upon the welcome which they find awaiting them, at the instance of officials and others at Saint John and other ports for the nonce is Canada. CATTLE RECORD AT SAINT JOHN IS SURPASSED

In Three Months 14,480 Head Are Shipped From Here

MONTH OF MARCH IS BEGINNING WELL

Summer Service Continued Here This Year, Is Expectation

Cattle shipments through Saint John to the United Kingdom during the first three months of the winter port season this year have exceeded all recent records as 14,480 head were shipped during this period. The first week of this month marked a continuation of the heavy export of Canadian livestock and the prospects, according to a local shipper, were excellent for maintenance of the season's average during the month.

The total number of livestock shipped through the port during February was 4,402 head of cattle and 1,045 hogs. The highest month was December, when 5,417 head of cattle passed through the port, while January contributed 4,671 head. There were no live hog shipments previous to February. Last season the average shipments were below 3,000 head of cattle a month.

SUMMER TIME ALSO

While by far the largest shipments of cattle through this port came during the winter season, as Montreal and Quebec are used chiefly during the summer, the Orinole Line for two years has been operating to this port during the summer months for cattle. Last summer there was a steamship nearly every week-end and approximately 10,000 head went through this port. It is expected that this summer service will be continued again this year.

BIRTHDAY OF S. A. LEADER OBSERVED

Local Organization Meetings Told of Life of General Booth — Is 70 Years Old

An outline of the life work of General William Bramwell Booth, head of the Salvation Army, was brought to the attention of all the congregations by the speakers at the four local quarters of the Salvation Army last evening. This was Saint John's part in the celebration of the seventieth birthday anniversary of the veteran Salvation Army head.

The members of the organization throughout the world have gathered \$1,250,000 as a birthday gift. General Booth, however, according to an announcement, will use none of it himself but employ the money as a fund for hospitals, training homes and missionary work.

BORN IN YORKSHIRE

The present head of the Salvation Army was born in the Yorkshire town of Halifax in 1856. His father was known in the "Army" as "General" because of his first military career. He was an early ambassador to be a doctor and took up the work of his father. When he was 25 years old he was made chief of staff of the organization his parents had formed.

He has been in supreme command of the Salvation Army for 14 years. He has made few changes during that period, but has carried out his father's policies.

E. J. McMANUS WINS C. N. R. PROMOTION

Succeeds W. J. Kelly as Baggage Master at Saint John Depot

E. J. McManus, St. James, street, who was assistant baggage-master in the C. N. R. depot under W. J. Kelly, retired, has received official notification of his appointment to the chief position. This appointment is what is known as an advertised one—promotion by selection and qualification—an arrangement into which the government has entered with the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees. V. L. Ward is assistant baggage-master. Mr. McManus has been 19 years in depot baggage work.
