British Premier's Warning.

A further note of gravity was added to the situation by Premier Lloyd George in his address last night to the United States and British press correspondents, in which he uttered the warning that a new political crisis was confronting Europe. He affirmed that the Genoa conference would be a serious fall ure unless it adopted some plan aiming at the maintenance of peace in Europe, which was jeopardized by a miltiplicity of conflicting national interests and aspirations due to racial differences and unsettled boundaries questions.

Mr. Lloyd George punctured the popular fallacy that the Genoa conference is primarily economic in nature by a remaining that unless the conference fashioned a pact of peace for Europe, it would accomplish nothing of great significance. 



New York, April 27. - William Hughes, whom Probation Officer James Russell referred to as "a Canadian Romeo," was sentenced to not less than six months, nor more than three years in the penitentiary for stealing an over-coat valued at \$25 at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

According to the probation officer, Hughes, who gave an address in New York, has been known as W. J. Hughes, Captain Hughes, Major Hughes and Dr. Hughes. After his arrest, said the probation officer, Hughes has told so many extraordinary stories about himself that he had been kept under observation for a time.

The officer said he had learned that Hughes was the son of a Canadian farmer. Hughes, he said, had represented himself to be a physician, had medical instruments in his room and had a long list of persons in Canada who were supposed to owe him money for medical services. The probation officer said Hughes was not a doctor, nor had he a military record during the war. Furthermore, Russell said that Hughes had represented himself to be a 32nd degree Mason and wore a Masonic emblem, but several Masons who had conversed with him in the jail said he was not a member of the order.

Russell also said Hughes had stated his wife and child were killed in a London air raid during the war, but this could not be confirmed.

In the room occupied by Hughes had been found a memorandum book, with the names and addresses of about 150 women and about 100 men in various parts of the country whom he claimed were his friends. Russell had written to many of them, and received many unfavorable answers, the officer said.

WOULD STOP JOKING ABOUT DRY LAWS

First Woman Dry Agent Asks Editors and Movies to Take Them Seriously.

Washington, April 26.—Miss Georgia Hopley, the first woman general agent on the staff of Prohibition Enforcement Commissioner Haynes, wants all women of the nation to follow the leadership of the clubwomen of New York and call upon moving picture producers and editors to "adopt a more serious attitude toward the Eighteenth Amendment."

"The concerted action of all organizations of women, following the lead of the clubwomen of New York," said Miss Hopley, "would prove a moving force. They would include a membership of 2,000,000 in the General Federation of Women's Clubs and nearly \$1,000,000 in the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and those enrolled in the Young Women's Christian Association, the Epworth League, the Christian Endeavor and other organizations.

"It is generally conceded that the moving picture houses have become the most popular place of amusement, entertainment and pastime of the people of today and especially the young people. It naturally follows, therefore, that the film productions will prove the preveninent factor for good or evil in moulding the future citizens of our nation.

"It is difficult to understand why exhibitors and producers permit demoralizing, belittling and misrepresentative statements to be thrown on the screen depicting infractions of the law, since it is a well-known and widely acknowled fact that the increase of patronage of the movies stands out conspicuously as one of the notable results of prohibition."

GREAT LUMBER ORDER.

Millions of Feet For Boxes For Orange and Lemon Shipments.

Los Angeles, Calif., April 27 — The largest single order for lumber ever negotiated with the government was placed recently by the Fruit Growers' Supply Company of Los Angeles. It was for 946,000,000 feet of timber in the Lassen national reserve. The present value of the stumpage is \$3,500,000.

This order indicates the vast extent of the California citrus industry, as the lumber will be used to make boxes for oranges and lemons shipped by the California Fruit Growers' Exchange.

The footage contracted for is sufficient to build frame bungalows on fifty-foot lots on both sides of a street 326 miles long. The order is 30 per cent. more than the annual imports of lumber at Los Angeles harbor, which is credited with being the largest lumber import in the world.







Message Written in France is Reproduced in Same Hand in the U. S .- Amazing Progress.

Dellinger's address in "Radio Developments" before the Royal Canadian Institute, in Convocation Ind Toronto, on Saturday evening, but o those who have not kept posted on the progress of the art, his revelations were ittle short of amazing. paratively recently that the discovery was made that light waves were of the same nature as radio waves. The one big difference was that light failed to penetrate the walls of an ordinary building, while such walls were no hindrance to radio waves, provided they do not contain sheets of metal.

The speaker then explained that as the alterations used in radio were too rapid to be detected by the human ear, they had to be modified so as to bring the vibrations to a point where they could be detected. This was accomplished by the use of valves of electron tubes which depended for their ability to function on the fact that heated metals send out streams of negative electric particles. These tubes, in addition to possessing the power to break up the waves coming in, could immensely magnify any current put into them, and in addition, could turn an ordinary direct current from a battery into the alternating current needed for radio.







IMPORTANT CHANGE IN THE FOUL RULE

New York, April 26—The Canadian tennis team which will endeavor to win the Davis Cup for the Dominion will have to go to Europe to play the opening round. This was the decision of the Davis Cup committee of the United States Lawn Tennis Association at a recent private meeting, the details of which have been just disclosed.

The present free throw line is 15 feet in front of the basket, or 17 feet within the court, so that the penalty zone, which will be formed by a line 17 feet from the end line of the court, parallel to the back line, will be as wide as the court. 




