THE AMERICAN TARIFF.

The Literary Digest has collected the opinions expressed by Republican and Independent newspapers in the United States on the subject of the Senate tariff bill. These in turn are summarized by the Toronto Globe as follows: "The New York Journal of Commerce calls it a bill to raise living costs and hamper trade."

U. S. SOFT COAL INDUSTRY.

The National Bank of Commerce of New York declares that the miners in the bituminous coal regions are seeking to impose conditions upon the mine owners which would be equivalent to supporting 175,000 men in idleness. It says this is the real meaning of the thirty-hour work proposition. We quote: "Their proposal of a five-day week and six-hour day, that is, a thirty-hour working week on the present or possibly a higher wage scale, is a definite effort to compel the consumer to maintain 175,000 idle men each year."

AFRAID OF HIS OWN TARIFF.

C. N. R. TIME CHANGES. EFFECTIVE APRIL 30. Affect Some of the Trains In and Out of Union Station—Suburban Changes Not in Effect Until May 22.

Time table changes on Canadian National Lines, effective April 30, will affect some of the trains on the main line and also the trains on the Valley Railway. No. 18 train for Truro will leave as usual at 7:10 a. m.

Referring to police department records of arrests in New York, the New York Evening Post says—"One of the strange facts, disclosed by the police figures is that, what the arrests for drunkenness under prohibition, the number of similar arrests among members of the police force has increased." Under such conditions prohibition enforcement would necessarily be confronted with serious difficulties.

What is there about this tariff which frightens the chairman of the Senate finance committee? Aren't the rates right? Well, Mr. McCumber hopes they are. "We believe," he says, "we have made no rate so low as to compel the American producer to surrender the American market if he exercises proper economy in the manufacture and marketing of his products."

If Senator McCumber is disturbed over the fact that his ideal tariff is his highest tariff ever proposed, his uneasiness is quite understandable. He knows that the only safeguard of reasonable prices is competition. He knows that manufacturers do not ask tariff makers for duties which will insure competition from foreign manufacturers. He knows that wholesalers and retailers have denounced the new tariff bill ever since its schedules were made public. And he knows what happens to political parties which jack up the cost of living.

Senator McCumber may well fear the consequences of the tariff which bears his name. In that respect he is at one with millions of his countrymen.

CANADIAN FARMS DECLINE IN VALUE

Lower Prices for Agricultural Produce Hit Holdings All Over the Dominion.

The fall in the prices received for agricultural products in 1920 was reflected in a decline in the average values of farm lands over the Dominion, thus recording the first time in recent agricultural history a period in which no elevation in the prices of farm lands over the preceding year was registered. Up to the year in question the only governing factor in setting the value of Canadian farm lands was that of increasing settlement and the consequent decreasing availability of land remaining open for settlement.

The average value of the occupied farm lands of Canada, which includes both improved and unimproved lands, together with dwelling houses, barns, stables and other farm buildings, is reported for 1921 as \$40, compared with \$48 for 1920, \$46 in 1919, \$41 in 1918, \$38 in 1917, \$36 in 1916, and \$35 in 1915. Thus it is seen that present-day land values have largely assumed the place they would reasonably have filled had not the interruption of inflated prices occurred, causing farmers, in the possible contemplation of relinquishing their holdings, to place a proportionally higher figure upon them.

So many branches of farming are followed in Canada, the practice being so intensive in some areas and so extensive in others where land is more plentiful, that a great variation exists in the prices at which farm lands are held in the various provinces. Thus in British Columbia, where the intensive fruit farm of small acreage is the rule, prices are found to be the highest, and the Pacific coast province leads the Dominion with an average price of \$122 per acre for its farm lands. Alberta, which province has probably more vacant land awaiting settlement than any other region, records the lowest average price with \$28 per acre. The varied farm lands of Ontario return an average price of \$63; those of Quebec \$59; Prince Edward Island \$46; Nova Scotia and Manitoba, \$35; Saskatchewan \$29, and New Brunswick \$28.

The points of exit from Montreal as indicated on the map were the following:—The Boiecherville ferry, Longueuil ferry, Veillon bridge, Verdun ferry, LaSalle bridge road, leading to Lachine, the road to Montreal West, Laurier bridge, and the St. Vincent de Paul ferry. If the number of automobiles stolen in Montreal represents in value a large sum of money, Montreal police officials have contended in the past that the kiosks and shelters would not be very much, and the additional constables needed could be supplied without much inconvenience to the regular police force.

What is suggested is to build small kiosks or shelters large enough to accommodate two or three policemen at each of the island exits. When an automobile is stolen the alarm would be immediately given to each outpost to stop the stolen car. WOMEN OF WORLD URGED TO UNITE. Dr. Stepanek Says International Organization Should Not be Confined to Men.

POSTPONE THE MILITIA VOTE

Not Known When Drill Estimates Will be Considered Again.

Ottawa, April 26—Further consideration of the contested militia estimates has been postponed for the time being.

When the estimates were under consideration on Tuesday night, C. G. Power, Liberal of Quebec South, seconded by Roch Lanctot, also a Liberal, moved a reduction of over \$1,000,000 in the vote for annual militia drill. Mr. Power's motion was strongly opposed by Hon. G. P. Graham, minister of militia and the discussion was adjourned without a vote being reached. It was scheduled to come up again today, following private members' business and public bills, but, as was expected, was not reached. Normally, militia estimates would have come up again tomorrow. But at adjournment today, the prime minister announced that the estimates to be taken up tomorrow would be the departments of Indian affairs, mines and public works. There was no mention of militia estimates.

DANGER OF WAR TOLD BY RT. HON. SIR GEO. FOSTER

Unless Nations of World Apply Themselves to a Duty as Important as That Which Faced Allies in Great Conflict Peace in Peril.

Ottawa, April 26—That war was not finished, unless the nations of the world applied themselves to a duty as important as that which faced the Allied powers in winning the last great struggle, was the declaration of Rt. Hon. Sir George Foster, speaking on the League of Nations in the senate today. Canada, Sir George declared, must give her moral support to the league as other nations were doing if it was to succeed. Moral force was a greater power in keeping people within bounds in Canada than were the handful of police and soldiers maintained here. So it was with the nations of the world. With the League of Nations a success any nation which offended against its principles would be "sent to Coventry." Sir George headed the Canadian delegation at the first assembly of the league. Fifty-one nations had placed themselves behind the League of Nations, and in that fact lay the moral sentiment supporting it. It was absolutely possible, he declared, to bring the league to the fulfillment of its ideals without the force of arms. "Put the United States behind the other fifty-one nations in the league and you will not need force," Sir George asserted. "No nation could withstand such a moral sentiment."

MURPHY ELECTED HALIFAX MAYOR

Halifax, April 26—Alderman John Murphy was today elected mayor of Halifax, defeating his opponent, Alderman John W. Regan, by a majority of 2,456. Unofficial figures for the vote were: Murphy, 3,463; Regan, 1,007.

KILLS WIFE AND SON, BARGAINS FOR THE STORY

Murderer Trades Tale of His Crime with Police Chief for a Cigarette—Reveals it After Smoke.

"Know who I am, chief?" asked a nondescript man of 30, who walked into police headquarters at Woodridge, near Hackensack, N. J., late the other night. "Sure," answered Chief Katschka; "you're Marj Ehlers, from the Laporte place over in Union street."

"Don't be a fool!" Katschka exclaimed.

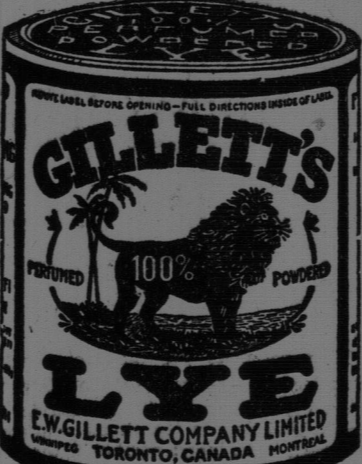
"You just go and see," Katschka told a policeman to "keep an eye on the fellow," and went. This is what he learned: Ehlers had moved from Hoboken to Woodridge seven months ago with his wife, Elizabeth, 36, his boy, Walter, 7, and the 3-year-old twins, Martin and Elizabeth. He lost the job with the oil company that had taken him to Woodridge and got one with a grain elevator in Hoboken, living there and going to his home each week-end.

Complained of Expense. He complained bitterly of the expense of two establishments; he had found the struggle to make ends meet a losing one, and he had grown more and more quarrelsome, threatening at times to destroy the family nestlone that he said hung about his neck. Mrs. Ehlers, looking after the three children and caring for the four rooms they rented from Ellie Laporte, had tried to do her share and more. The Laporte place is an old stone homestead, once the "mansion" of a locally famous

vineyard. Mrs. Laporte felt sorry for the burdened woman upstairs and agreed to let Mrs. Ehlers do her landlord's washing in full payment of the rent. He returned home long after dark. Walter and the twins were asleep. The man's humor had turned more ugly. This time it was Mrs. Ehlers, terrified by threats, who fled the rooms. Until 11 o'clock, while the man stormed upstairs, Mrs. Ehlers sat with the Laporte, mother, father and young Ellie, junior. Then at last Mrs. Laporte persuaded her to go back. She was downstairs again in a moment, to report that the door was locked and her husband would not answer. Then Mrs. Laporte went into the hall and called: "Oh, Martin; won't you let your wife into the bedroom? She wants to go to bed."

"Sure; I'll let her in. Tell her to come on up."

Shoots Wife on Stairs. Mrs. Ehlers started up. She had mounted three steps. Mrs. Laporte standing at the foot, with her hand on the door swung open. Ehlers, shotgun in hand, stalked to the head of the stairs. Before the wife could turn, the gun belched a charge of shot into her breast. She fell at Mrs. Laporte's feet. Mrs. Laporte ran to her husband. He and their boy snatched their hats and started out to look for a policeman. Ehlers had retreated into the bedroom, where Walter slept on a cot. The shot had awakened the boy. He sat up, stupefied with sleep, his clouded eyes perhaps just taking in the fact that his father was crumpling another shell into a shotgun. Before the boy could ask a question the father swung the muzzle toward him and pressed the trigger again. The full charge entered the boy's abdomen. He fell to the floor. The second shot awakened the twins. One slept in a crib, the other in a little bed. Ehlers glanced at them and showed a third shell into the gun. He tried to lock the barrel, but the shell had jammed and it would not close. He rammied in vain. The gun was through, meaning to seek escape. He hid gun and shells behind him. Then he changed his mind and went the three or four blocks to police headquarters. No one molested him. Laporte and his son found a policeman in Hackensack avenue, three blocks from their home, who accompanied them back to the house. Boy Dies in Hospital.



INK VANDALS RUIN \$30,000 IN STONE

Indelible Coat Smeared by Night on Indiana Limestone for Kearny High School.

Kearny, N. J., April 26.—Indiana limestone valued at \$30,000 and brought here for use in constructing a new high school building, was ruined by a coat of indelible ink stealthily applied by vandals. Archibald Salmond, a member of the Salmond-Schrimshaw Company, contractor and owners of the stone, declared that he believed the destruction of the limestone was "the work of some New York Bolshevik or gunman." He told of an alleged threat by a New York labor representative to prevent the completion of the job. The stone, which consisted of four twenty-foot columns to be used at the school entrance and fifty blocks of stone, mostly trim, was brought here several days ago. The cornerstone of the new building, which at a cost \$1,000,000, was laid a week ago and the contractors had begun their operations. A night watchman stationed on the grounds did not detect the vandals. It is believed that they waited until the watchman had gone to another part of the grounds and then did their work quietly. Twelve empty bottles were found this morning near the ink-smearing pillars and blocks. The Kearny police found finger marks on some of the stone. A fingerprint expert was called. The police say that they found evidence that the vandalsism was the work of men, not of boys. Mr. Salmond said that efforts to remove the ink by scraping and by chemicals had proved futile and that the contractors regarded the stone as a dead loss. It was insured against fire only, he said. The contractors will have to bear the loss.

CONTRACT FOR NEW SCHOOL

John Flood & Sons have been awarded the contract of building the new school building to be erected in Holy Trinity parish. Work will be started on the building immediately, excavation done by the Flood firm having been completed. The structure will be two stories high with a basement and will be built of brick with freestone trimmings and will face on Bargee avenue. It will contain ten school rooms. The tenders submitted were—George Lawson, \$84,850; J. Corbett, \$83,273; H. O. Clarke, \$78,000; Munro, \$76,400, plus \$2,600 for stone corners; B. Mooney & Sons, \$77,054; J. A. Grant & Co., \$76,000; John Flood & Sons, \$73,000. P. Neil Brodie is the architect.

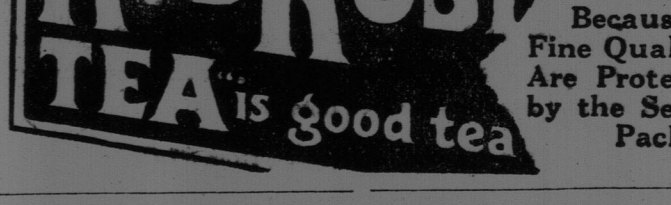

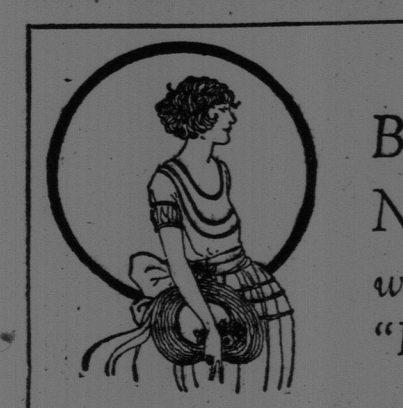

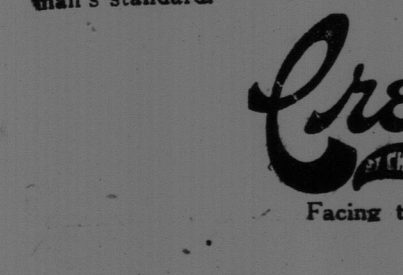

STILL TALKING ABOUT COVEY AFFIDAVIT
There is still some talk in sport circles in Nova Scotia over the affidavit required by the maritime branch of the A. A. U. of C. The Halifax Recorder says:—"A number of Halifax amateurs say they are quite willing to sign the Covey affidavit, with the exception of the clause that makes them swear that their winnings were wholly and solely by medals and trophies given as prizes in said games. They competed in Labor Day and other sports and received as prizes hats, boxes of cigars, pipes, shirts or similar articles, and besides, these events were sanctioned by the M. P. B. of the A. A. U. of C. It is claimed that this was called to the attention of President Covey at St. John, and he would not change the affidavit. However, we should imagine if the Halifax amateurs make their affidavits with the explanation and they give instances where they had won such prizes, they could hardly be refused."
Referring to this matter, A. W. Covey told The Times today that the word "trophy" covers all such cases as the Recorder refers to, and was especially inserted for that purpose. The dictionary definition of a trophy is "any evidence or memorial of victory or conquest."

ATTEMPT TO FREE LIFE PRISONER
Montreal, April 27.—An attempt to free Charles Edward Monette, now serving a life sentence in St. Vincent de Paul prison, after having attempted to dynamite Lord Atholstan's residence and attempting to murder Conrad Therien, a chauffeur, in 1917, is on foot, according to Therien, who was asked to sign a petition that is being circulated for Monette's release.

LAUVIGNE GIRL WITNESS TODAY
Several Others on the Stand This Morning in Trial of Paris.
Five witnesses for the crown were examined in the case of the King vs. John Paris, charged with the murder of Sadie McAuley, in the circuit court this morning. The larger portion of the time this morning was taken up with the evidence of little Hattie Lavigne, who accompanied the McAuley girl to Douglass avenue on the day of her disappearance. There was nothing new in the evidence of any of the witnesses this morning. During the period that Hattie Lavigne was giving evidence, Paris leaned well forward, as if anxious to take in every word.
Robert Elliott, who was on the stand when the court adjourned yesterday afternoon, was cross-examined by Mr. Vernon. Elliott described the ground around Riverview park. He said the two girls came from the direction of Main street about noon, and that he did not see the accused anywhere around the grounds. The witness then returned to the stand about 12:30 and said he had heard no outcry but that his hearing was not good. There were several other men around.
Robert Douglas of 20 Dorchester street, testified.
William J. Lavigne of 30 Clarence street, father of Hattie, told of the girls bringing his dinner. To Mr. Vernon he said he did not see the accused anywhere in the vicinity, nor did he see any man following the girls.
Hattie Lavigne retold her story as at the previous trials. She said they were picking berries and met a man who said he would show them where there were larger berries. The witness refused to go, but Sadie went. She called to Sadie three times, but she did not come back. The witness then went back to the park and told a man named Bob what Sadie had done. Asked whether the man she saw at the park looked like the prisoner, she replied that the man was about the same size as the prisoner, but that the latter's mustache made him look different and that he had not the red face as when he saw him picking berries. When she saw the prisoner in the police station she did not notice whether he had a mustache or not. The witness then described again the clothes which the man wore when he went with Sadie. Cross-examined by Mr. Vernon she said that she thought that the witness who was picked by the man were laced at the knee and that he wore a peaked gray cap and not a soft hat. She was shown a photograph of the accused and said that it looked like the same coat, but that the face did not look like the man in the park.
Sergeant Detective John T. Power gave evidence in connection with the arrest of the accused and said that it looked like the same coat, but that the face did not look like the man in the park.
The witness told of going to Westfield in company with Detective Biddescombe and of the circumstances of the arrest of Paris. He said that when Paris was arrested he had a slight mustache.

Missionary Work Shown in Motion Pictures

Innovation in Programme of Diocesan W. A. Annual Session Proves Popular

The motion pictures of the missionary work of the Canadian church in Japan and China which were to be a special feature of the nineteenth annual meeting of the Fredericton diocesan W. A., drew such an eager throng that the large upper hall of Trinity church was packed last night when they were shown and, while between 800 and 1,000 people saw the pictures, there were many who tried to see them and were not able to do so because there was no room. The pictures gave a splendid presentation of the good work being done in the foreign fields, much of which is aided by W. A. funds. Rev. Canon R. A. Armstrong was the chairman. The afternoon was taken up with

conferences which were very largely attended and brought forth most helpful discussion. Mrs. G. C. P. McInyre, the general treasurer, led the conferences of treasurers and explained how the financial forms should be filled out. She stressed the importance of meeting the general pledge as the first financial consideration and expressed satisfaction that some branches had increased their general pledge. She hoped none would permit it to fall behind. Much satisfaction was felt that the girls' branches had undertaken to increase their contribution to the educational pledge from \$50 to \$75. The diocese was asked to give \$225 as its educational pledge to educate a missionary's child. The conference on junior work was led by Miss Fortia Mackenzie, secretary treasurer of the Juniors, and ways of interesting the Juniors and of arranging the programmes for their meetings were spoken of, and various problems discussed. The conference of Dorcas work was

led by Mrs. John M. Hay, Dorcas secretary, who emphasized the importance of filling out the outfit form correctly giving the actual cost of the materials and not the amount at which the articles were valued. Mrs. W. Tomlin, formerly matron of the Union Lake school, in Saskatchewan, told of the things that were most liked at the Indian schools. She urged that the articles sent be of the best material and explained how serious it was when bales arrived with some article of the outfit missing. She strongly approved of the new plan of sending money for the boots and shoes. Two large money gifts for the boots were received with much pleasure. Gagetown branch sent \$80 and Chamcook branch sent \$60. A conference of literature secretaries was led by Mrs. Cortland Robinson assisted by Mrs. James F. Robertson. Methods of conducting mission study classes were spoken of and the literature for the coming year was also a subject of much interest. The Letter Leaflet was specially referred to as an indispensable for the W. A. work. Mrs. W. D. Porter, organizing secretary, was the leader of a short session of the organizing committee. The advisability of visiting as many of the branches as possible was the chief matter discussed. The pictures shown in the evening had much of special interest to all W. A.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING PLANS

Plans for the placing of the three additional public health nurses whom the Red Cross Society expects to put in the field in the province early in July were discussed at a meeting of members of the executive of the Red Cross Society held yesterday afternoon in the depot in Prince William street. The president, R. T. Hayes, was in the chair and others present were Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health; Miss H. Mellicolm, supervisor of public health nurses; C. B. Allan and Miss Ethel Hasen Jarvis. There are at the present time six nurses at work in various sections of the province and it is the intention in time to have a nurse placed in every town in the province for a certain period in order to demonstrate the need for public health nursing. The society has assumed responsibility for the nurses' support for a definite period, and when that time expires the community where the nurse is placed must either undertake her support or lose her services. Of the six nurses at present in the field it is hoped that two at least will be maintained by the communities in which they are now working. The advisability of moving the other nurses when the year of demonstration expired was considered. Names of localities where nurses were most needed were considered and, while it was agreed that the nurses should be placed where they were most required, it was thought best that preparation for their coming should be made and that they should be placed only in those localities where there was a branch of the Red Cross Society actively at work. 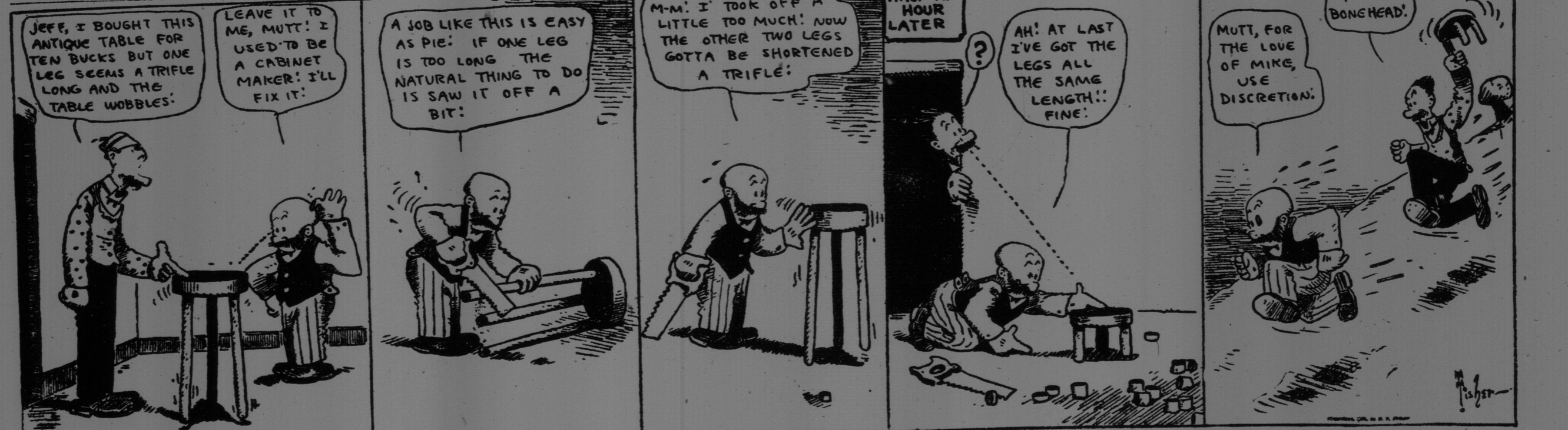

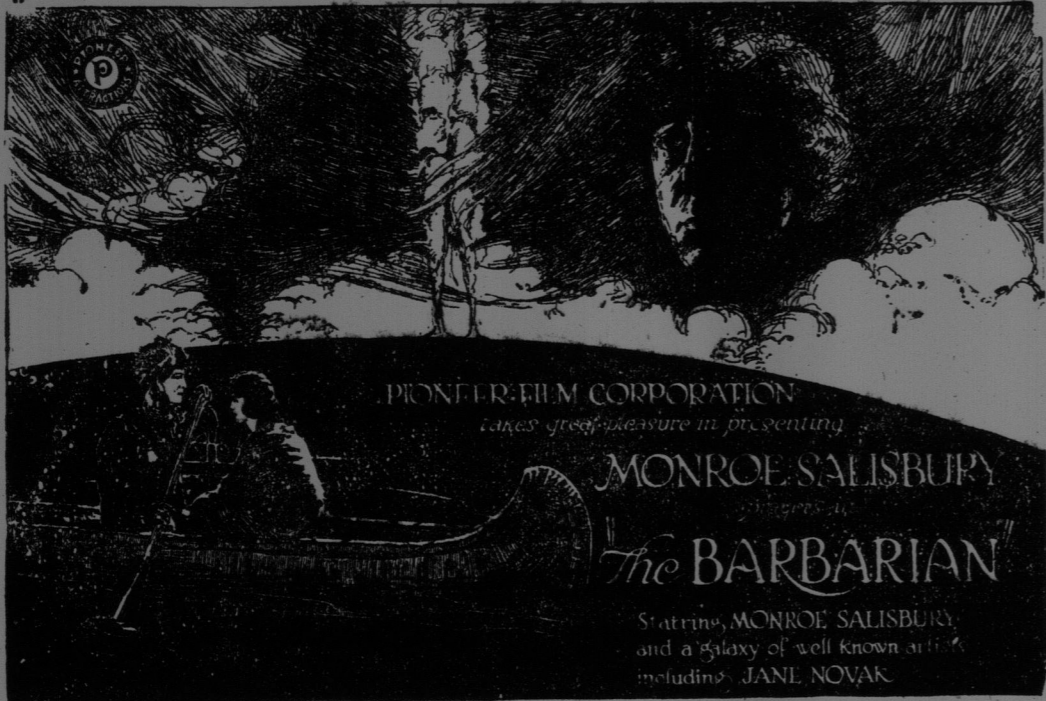

CANADIANS MUST PLAY IN EUROPE

New York, April 26.—The Canadian tennis team which will endeavor to win the Davis Cup for the Dominion will have to go to Europe to play the opening round. This was the decision of the Davis Cup committee of the United States Lawn Tennis Association at a recent private meeting, the details of which have been just disclosed. Canada was drawn against France for the opening round. The French tennis committee suggested that the match be played in Paris on June 17, Canada entered an objection to this, owing to the great distance to be covered and France referred the matter to the United States as the holder of the cup. The United States committee overruled Canada's objection and the initial match of the dominion players must therefore be played in Paris.

IMPORTANT CHANGE IN THE FOUL RULE

At the eighth annual meeting of the Joint New York basketball committee, a change was made in the foul rule which will eliminate fully a third of the present scoring from foul and should, in the opinion of the committee, materially improve the game. At the preliminary session it seemed unlikely that any alteration in the foul rule would be made, but when the matter came up for debate sentiment was found to be overwhelmingly in favor of a change. The new rule, which is the adoption of one of the suggestions of the sub-committee headed by Dr. Hayeroff of Princeton, provides a penalty hitherto never used in basketball—namely, the giving of the ball into the possession of the opponents. This penalty, however, is inflicted after technical fouls only, personal fouls being penalized under a second new rule.

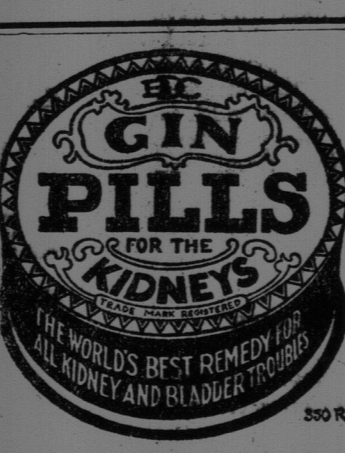
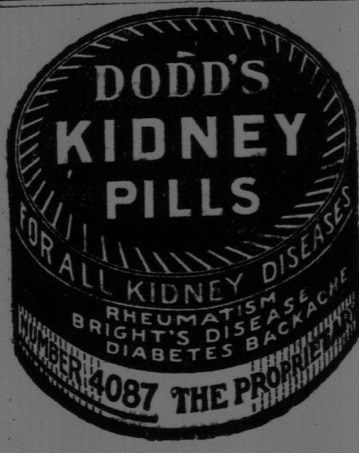
The reading of the rule regarding technical fouls follows: "When the technical foul is made the ball is awarded to the opponents at the point where the foul is committed, with the right to put the ball into play with an unguarded pass. They shall not be permitted to dribble, or shoot for goal." This rule does away entirely with the free throw as a penalty for technical fouls. The penalty for personal fouls differs according to the point on the court where the foul is committed. If the personal foul is committed within a certain area, hereafter to be called the penalty area, at either end of the court, the penalty will be greater than if the foul be committed outside that space. The penalty area is a zone formed by the extension of the present free throw line to either side of the court. The present free throw line is 15 feet in front of the basket, or 17 feet within the court, so that the penalty zone, which will be formed by a line 17 feet from the end line of the court, parallel to the back line, will be as wide as the court. And for personal fouls committed within this zone, the price paid will be two free throws. For a personal foul

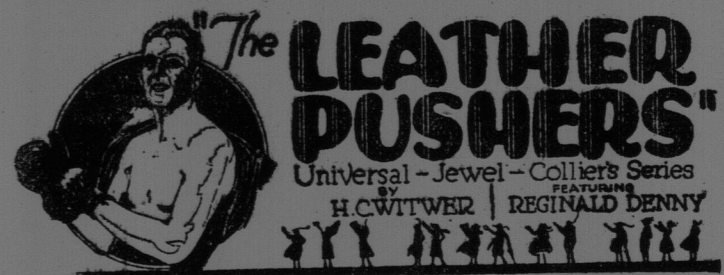

of the court comprising the space between the end line and a line passing through the free throw line or a line passing tangent to the free throw circles as may be decided. All personal fouls committed by a team when the opponents are in possession of the ball in the penalty area under their own goal shall be penalized by the award of two free throws. All other personal fouls committed elsewhere on the court or in either penalty area when the ball is in possession of the defending team shall be penalized by the award of one free throw. In addition to the change in the foul rule, the meeting made a considerable number of minor changes throughout the rule book, all of them to do with further clarification of the existing regulations. Legislation against "stalling" which was one of the subjects of a questionnaire, was voted down, on the ground that it was for the opposing team to break up attempts at "stalling" by aggressive playing. The "time out" rule was changed to give a little more latitude to captains and reads: "A captain may request time out

whenever his team is in possession of the ball, or the ball is dead, except when the ball is dead in the possession of the opponents out of bounds." A slight change also was made in the dribble rule, but merely to clarify. There was considerable sentiment in favor of a somewhat radical change in this regulation, but it was decided, after debate, that the rule had been amended so often that it had not yet received a fair trial and should stand virtually as at present for another year.
