Government Troops Retreat and Warships Retire Down River-One of Them is Said to Have Been Captur-SEAT FOR HON. MR. FISHER

Hankow, China, Oct. 20 — (Canadian press)—(By wireless to Kieuh-Kiang, 2.45 p.m., relayed by telegraph to Shanghai a p.m.)—The government troops have retreated to Seventy Mile Creek, beyond Hankow Fluvial. The revolutionists claim a great victory. The Chinese warships have retreated down the river out of sight of the settlement, which is quiet.

Still another message says that the revolutionists at Hankow claim a great victory over the imperials. They declare that they captured the riverside and the rail-way station, after which all the Chinese warships retreated with the exception of one cruiser, which seceded to the rebels.

The retreat of the imperialists at Hankow is response to the retreating to Kiu Kiang, which state that Chinese gunboats are retreating to Kiu Kiang. The conduct of the rebels at Hankow is reported to be exemplary. Martial law is being enforced.





To she Editor of the Times.

Sir:—Recently I have been struck with the number of shooting accidents recorded in the columns of your valuable paper—this evening's edition containing two. The victims, in almost all of these cases, are children who have, in my opinion, no business whatever with firearms.





Dublin Writer's Forecast of The Bill Which is to Be Introduced in British Parliament

London, Oct. 20-An interesting forec the bill granting Home Rule to Ireland, next session is given by a Dublin correspondent. He writes that a committee of the cabinet has been at work for some time on the measure, and that Sir John Simon, K. C., M. P., the solicitor-general has been in consultation with officials in Dublin Castle on the subject. A rough draft has already been prepared for presentation to the cabinet.

"If the bill which has been drafted is adopted by the cabinet," says the correspondent "the supremacy of the imperial parliament will be no greater in Ireland than it is in the British colonies. Their whole administration of affairs in Ireland will pass to the Iritish legislature. The executive power in Ireland is to continue vested in the king and the lord-lieutenant. "The lord-lieutenant, as representing the king, is to have the right to veto any bill. It is believed that this provision will quiet the fears of those who believe that the Irish legislature will pass laws inimical to the Protestant minority.

"The great difficulty which has arisen is with regard to the position of Irish members in the imperial parliament. One section of the cabinet is in favor of excluding the Irish members altogether, while the other wishes to follow the lines of the bill of 1893 and retain the Irish members for special purposes.

"A regular battle royal has raged round this question, and a member of the government recently confided to a friend that it was the only one on which there was no prospect of an agreement. If the Irish members are excluded it will mean complete separation.




