

union. The operators have flatly refered to renew for another term of three ears, the present agreement which is the same as that made by the anthracite coal strike commission. The miners' representatives who are all officers in the United Mine Workers of America, have declined to continue the agreement without recognition of the union, and have called the convention for the purpose of making a report of their action and to let the mine workers, themselves, decide what further action shall be taken.

Six hundred delegates, representing all the local unions in the three authracite districts of the miners' organization will sit in the convention. Some of these are instructed to favor a strike if concessions are not made, some are pledged against such action and others will vote according to the advice given by the leaders; but the leaders, it is said, are not unanimous


