After a short deliberation they adjourned to meet on Monday. Witnesses were examined, but no evidence was adduced at the trial to show that any criminal operation or criminal method had been practiced upon her by a

McLeod. He stated that last Friday Michael Howley came to him and informed him that Frances Orr had been brought to his house last Thursday by Norman Goddard of Apohaqui, and was evidently about to give birth to a child. Howley wanted to know what he had better do about it, and McLeod advised him to send for the girl's grandmother, who lived in St.

Frances complained of feeling sick, and wanted Goddard to go for a doctor, but he declined, as he did not want to make himself known. The girl was evidently about to give birth to a child, and went to bed in Mrs. Howley's room. She suffered considerably, and when Mrs. Howley retired, about 10.30, Frances had the clothes so tightly wrapped about her that Mrs. Howley could not get any covering or see what had happened. Later Frances went out of the house and returned and

asked for a baby's napkin.
