DOUGLAS McARTHUR WINS THE \$20 IN GOLD.

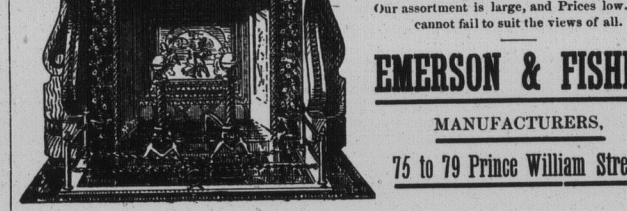

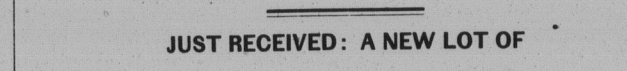
